FLU & PNEUMONIA IMMUNIZATIONS The Village of Morton Grove will provide influenza and pneumonia immunizations for residents over age 60. The cost of the shots are free for those whose primary insurance is Medicare Part B. Patients who are enrolled in an HMO, or who do not subscribe to Medicare Part B, must pay \$10 for the flu shot, and \$15 for the pneumonia shot.

Seniors should get a flu shot each year to provide immunity to the most commonly predicted flu strains for the coming winter. Pneumonia immunizations provide lifelong immunity to the most common forms of pneumonia and already received, *does not* need to be repeated. Anyone: 1) allergic to chicken, chicken feathers or eggs;

2) allergic to contact lens solution or thermerisol (mercurial antiseptic); 3) allergic to the antibiotic family called aminoglycosides

(gentamycin, kanamycin or neomycin); 4) who has ever suffered from the illness known as Guillian-Barre Syndrome; or

5) who has cold symptoms the day of their shot; will not be immunized.

This year, Evanston Northwestern Healthcare Home Services administers the immunizations and offers a choice of a traditional needle injection or a Biojector (needle-free) injection. BLOOD PRESSURE Periodic blood pressure measurement is helpful in determining if health is threatened by high blood pressure (hypertension). Skokie police secretly conveyed a gun to Clark along with a protective vest, which she gave to Schifman to wear during her escape. After making sure that Schifman had reached the ground safely, Clark also climbed down the ladder, police said.

Davis apparently did not realize that Schifman and Clark were on the second-floor balcony as he allegedly menaced and sexually assaulted his ex-girlfriend. Clark, who hid behind a partition, testified that she heard a man yelling and saw Davis holding the victim in a choke-hold. Clark also told the court that she heard Davis

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


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
