





After more than 30 years of service to the Niles Police Department, Sgt. Roger N. Wilson announced Sept. 19 that he will retire effective Oct. 1.

A native of Cleveland, Ohio, Wilson, 52, moved to the Chicago area with his family "the day after my high school graduation in 1965 when his father moved the family to Niles after accepting the position of comptroller at the Union Linen Supply Copmpany on Chicago's North Side.

Wilson attended junior college and the Northwest Police Academy in Arlington Heights before being hired by the Niles Police Department as a rookie patrolman April 21, 1969.

In 1972, Wilson was transferred to the original Metropolitan Enforcement Group, a local drug intervention group composed of undercover officers from 16 suburbs and the Cook County Sheriff's Police. For two years, Wilson worked throughout Cook County on the local level of enforcement, "going after little dealers, pot smokers and high school pushers," Wilson said. 



## Poor posture the culprit in many injuries





Back and neck injuries in the workplace have traditionally been attributed to heavy lifting, bending or twisting and have been a major cause of time lost and expense. Recently, insurers have become aware of a trend in which a variety of wrist, neck, shoulder and back problems are being caused by long-term, repetitive motion injuries, many times associated with computers.

Serious wrist, shoulder, neck and even low back problems are being caused by low-level, even long-term trauma associated with sitting posture. Work is not the only site where injuries occur. It's now estimated that 85 million Americans are "on-line," and spend hours in front of their home PC's. • Make sure your chair fits correctly. There should be two

inches between the front edge of the seat and back of your knees. Ideally the chair should tilt back and have arms on the sides. • Sit with your knees at a 90- to 120-degree angle, using an

angled footrest to support your feet. Position your computer monitor so that the top of the screen is at or below eye level, to avoid neck strain.

• Use an antiglare screen if necessary.

• Keep your wrists in the neutral position while you type, not angled up or down. A wrist rest or ergonomic keyboard can help you to keep a more neutral position. • Take periodic stretch breaks.



With so many possible forces at play, dentists or other health care professionals can become caught up in the treatment by prescribing a single cause for a per-son's TMD. "There are no simple formulas for treating TMD yet," says Dr. Bitter. "I would be very wary when someone suggests a permanent change to the mouth or the jaw such as braces to fix a bad bite, or crowns or caps to build up teeth, or jaw surgery to correct a structural defect. Such interventions are usually not necessary and can even make matters worse. It is more productive to focus on relieving discomfort and
