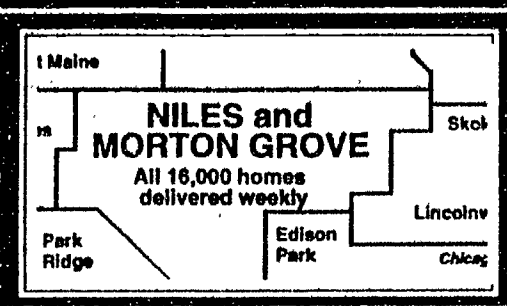

Mayor Madeline Grant said that Lincolnwood's Board of Trustees voted to increase water rates in order to combat new prices that the village will now have to pay for water supplied by Chicago.

Residents will pay \$2.45 per 100 gallons, a 10 cent increase. The new rate will begin after the May 10 billing cycle.

Car's passenger, 27-year-old Park Ridge man, killed; Driver of car, Niles resident, charged with DUI, reckless homicide

One killed as car hits house in Park Ridge

One man was killed and another injured when the first crashed into a Park Ridge residence on Friday, April 14.

Park Ridge police and fire departments responded to the accident at Glenview and Hamlin Avenues at approximately 1:45 a.m.

According to police, the driver, 23-year-old Mario Grana of Niles, was driving southbound on Hamlin in a 2000 Mitsubishi Eclipse when he apparently lost control of the vehicle, striking the single-family residence.

No one in the home was reported as injured. Passenger Theodore Kuras, 27 of Park Ridge was treated at the scene and then rushed to Lutheran General Hospital for treatment.

Kuras was pronounced dead at 2:20 a.m. Grana was also treated at the scene and then sent to Luthran

General. He was released into police custody later Friday night. Grana was transported to

Five of ten Niles liquor stores cited for violations

Half of Niles liquor stores targeted by police last week failed to ID purchasers of alcoholic beverages.

"We went to liquor stores all around Niles and tried to buy alcohol," said a police department spokesperson. "Five out of 10 places didn't ask for ID."

According to police, this mini-sting operation occurs on a

regular basis as part of the department's attempt to thwart illegal sales of alcohol to minors.

Last Wednesday and Thursday, police sent a young-looking officer into liquor stores throughout Niles with a \$20 bill to buy beer. In half of those incidents, the officer was not asked for any identification and

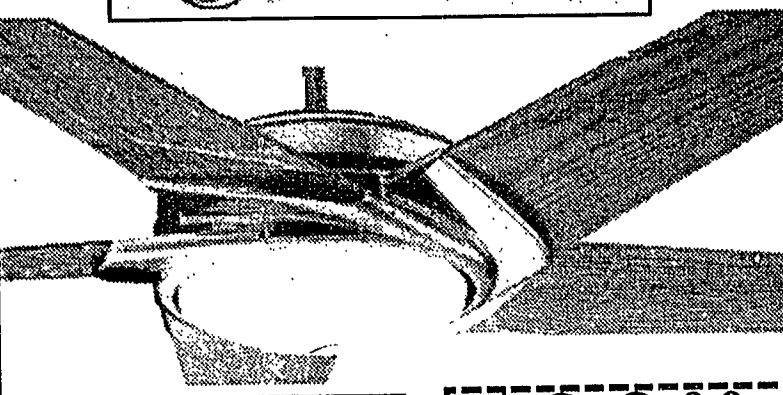

TAX INCREMENT FINANCING REDEVELOPMENT PROJECT AREA

REGISTRATION FOR INTERESTED PARTIES REGISTRY

Pursuant to Section § 5/11-74.4-4.2 of the Tax Increment Allocation Redevelopment Act, 65 ILCS § 5/11-74.4-1 et seq. (the "Act"), the Village of Niles (the "Village") is required to establish an interested parties registry ("Registry" or "Registries") for each Tax Increment Financing ("TIF") redevelopment project area created pursuant to the Act. (a "Redevelopment Project Area") whether existing as of the date of this notice or hereafter established. On March 28, 2000, THE Village adopted an ordinance authorizing the establishment of Registries by the Village Clerk ("Clerk") and adopting registration rules for such Registries. The purpose of this notice is to inform interested parties of the Registries and registration rules for the Registries and to invite interested parties (as defined below) to register in the Registry for any Redevelopment Project Area.

Any organization active within the Village and any resident of the Village (an "Interested Party") is entitled to register in the Registry for any Redevelopment Project Area. Organizations include, but are not limited to, businesses, business organizations, civic groups, not-for-profit corporations, and community organizations.

An organization seeking to register as an Interested Party with respect to a Redevelopment Project Area must also complete and submit a registration form to the Clerk. Such individual must also submit a copy of a current driver's license, lease, voter registration card, utility bill, financial statement or such other evidence as may be acceptable to the Clerk to establish the individual's current Village residency.

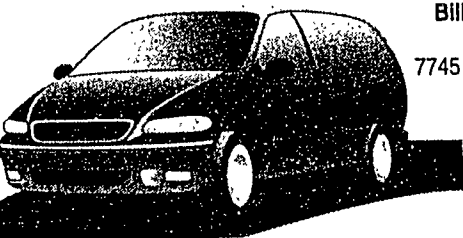
Interested Party Registries are being established for the following TIF Redevelopment Project Areas, which have either been adopted by the Village or which the Village has decided to consider establishing:

Lawrencewood TIF
Touhy Melvina TIF
Milwaukee Touhy TIF
Touhy Central TIF

All individuals and organizations whose registration form and supporting documentation comply with the registration rules and who submit such documentation, either in person or by mail, to the Village Clerk, 1000 Civic Center Drive, Niles, Illinois 60714, will be registered in the applicable individual's current Village residency.

Registry within ten (10) business days of the Clerk's receipt of all such documents. The Clerk will provide written notice to the registrant confirming such registration. Upon registration, Interested Parties will be entitled to receive all notices and documents required to be delivered under the Act with respect to the applicable Redevelopment Project Area. If the Clerk determines that a registrant's registration form and/or supporting documentation is incomplete or does not comply with the registration rules adopted by the Village, the Clerk will give written notice to the registrant specifying the defects. The registrant will be entitled to correct any defects and resubmit a new registration form and supporting documentation. An Interested Party's registration will remain effective for a period of three years. Rules for the renewal or amendment of an Interested Party's registration are included with the registration form that may be obtained as described herein.

Each Registry will be available for public inspection at the office of the Clerk during normal Village business hours. The Registry will include the name, address and telephone number of each Interested Person and, for organizations, the name and phone number of a designated contact person.

Interested Parties will be sent the following notices and any other notices required under the Act with respect to the applicable Redevelopment Project Area:

- pursuant to § 5/11-74.4-5(a) of the Act, notice of the availability of a proposed redevelopment plan and eligibility report, including how to obtain this information; such notice will be sent by mail within a reasonable period of time after the adoption of the ordinance fixing the public hearing for the proposed redevelopment plan;
- pursuant to § 5/11-74.4-4(a) of the Act, notice of changes to proposed redevelopment plans that do not (1) add additional parcels of property to the proposed redevelopment project area, (2) substantially affect the general land uses proposed in the redevelopment plan, (3) substantially change the nature of or extend the life of the redevelopment project or (4) increase the number of low or very low income households to be displaced from the redevelopment project area, provided that, measured from the time of creation of the redevelopment project area, the total displacement of inhabited households will exceed 10; such notice will be sent by mail not later than 10 days following the Village's adoption by ordinance of such changes;
- pursuant to § 5/11-74.4-5 (c) of the Act, notice of amendments to previously approved redevelopment plans that do not (1) add additional parcels of property to the redevelopment project area, (2) substantially affect the general land uses in the redevelopment plan, (3) substantially change the nature of the

'Health Community - Healthy Youth'

Forty-five members of the community met to learn how to nurture our youth at a seminar held at the Niles Human Services facility on Tuesday, April 4. Representatives attended from our congressional district and the local governments and agencies of Niles, Des Plaines, Park Ridge, and Skokie - plus schools, churches, youth service groups, hospitals and businesses.

The Niles Village Board agreed to sponsor the day-long seminar after the Niles Healthy Community Partnership attended a Search Institute presentation. The Search Institute is a non-profit research organization based in Minnesota that focuses on defining young people's needs and setting up initiatives to nurture those needs.

The Institute researches, evaluates and surveys young people using a confidential process. From this, it has developed a list of 40 "developmental assets," both external (nurturing that comes from the home and community) and internal (self-developed positive characteristics and attitudes).

Data shows that, to the degree these assets are present in a young person's life, the greater the probability that he or she will avoid certain high-risk behaviors. The seminar's format is built around these 40 assets and is an out-

growth of the Institute's "Healthy Community - Healthy Youth" initiative.

The facilitator, an educator from New Mexico, introduced data that shows the total number of assets claimed by pupils in grades 8-12 is generally lower than the number claimed by younger children, and she challenged the group by asking, "Who is socializing those children?" Their peers, and the media, she answered, making the point that we're missing the opportunity.

She explained how neighbors can contribute. "Just smile and show you know kids by name," she urged, adding that recognition can do much to make young people feel a part of their community.

In St. Louis Park, Minn., a lady avoided walking a certain route to the park because some of the kids who congregated on a corner looked strange, with colored hair and pierced faces. But she reconsidered and modified her route. Ultimately, smiles and greetings were exchanged. When something kept her away, she received a call. A woman said, "You don't know me, but my daughter knows you, and she noticed you haven't been to the park recently. She asked that I call to see if you're well."

The facilitator agreed that dis-

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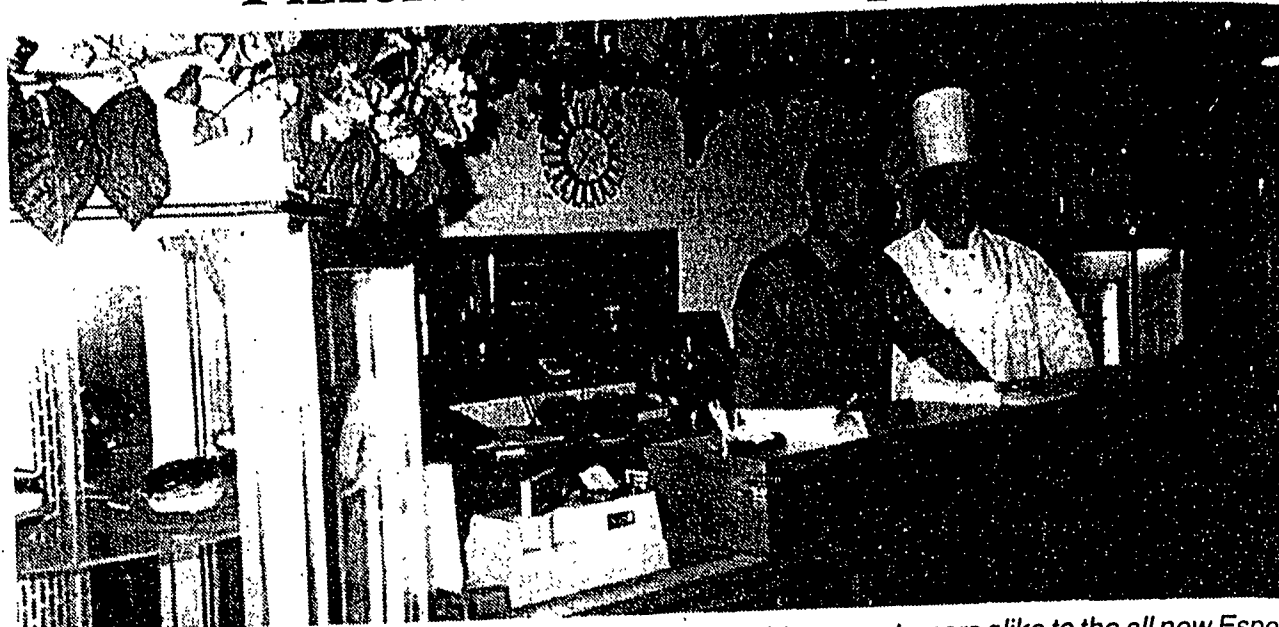

How to Win At Losing Weight

A 10-week program designed to help people lose weight through healthy food choices, exercise guidelines, nutrition assessment, a low-fat eating plan and behavior modification will be presented by Resurrection Medical Center, 7435 West Talcott Avenue.

Win At Losing Weight will be presented on 10 consecutive Wednesdays from 6 to 7 p.m. beginning April 26 in the Sister Gregory Room on the ground

floor of Resurrection Medical Center. The program will be conducted by two Resurrection health care professionals, Jan Fortina, a registered dietitian, and Carrie Zakarias, exercise physiologist.

Some of the topics that will be covered in the 10-week program include: Healthy food choices, an overview of essential nutrients, Are you fit or fat? Body composition: Setting goals. The ABCs of Behavior.

How to shop smarter in the supermarket; Restaurant survival - making better choices when eating out.

Participants will receive assertiveness training and learn stress management techniques and strategies for long-term success. "Winning at losing weight isn't about dieting at all - this program is for people who've tried and failed to keep off the pounds when using the latest diets," Fortina said. "This program is about working on changing behaviors and attitudes about eating. Long-term weight loss comes from knowing about different foods and their effect on the body. Choosing alternative, lower fat foods, and knowing how much can be eaten is what leads to long-term weight loss - and weight control."

Participants in the program will also learn about the importance of regular exercise in weight loss and weight control. "Weight control can be much more effective when regular exercise is part of the plan," said Zakarias. "Exercise - which doesn't have to be drudgery - not only helps you control your weight, it also helps reduce stress, improves your stamina and generally contributes to overall good health."

Outpatient exercise program for cardiac patients finds devotees

It's Monday morning and nearly every piece of exercise equipment is humming. Some people are rowing, others are working out on treadmills, recumbent bikes and stairmasters. The scene could be any neighborhood health club, except almost all the 23 faces of those working out here are of older folks. It's all taking place in the Center for Heart and Lung Fitness at Resurrection Medical Center, 7435 West Talcott Avenue.

Debbie Baumgart, Supervisor of the Cardiac and Pulmonary Rehabilitation Department, seems excited as she explains activities planned for the center's patients to celebrate National Cardiac Rehabilitation Week.

Upon completion of Phase II, a patient graduates to an ongoing Phase III program, also medically supervised. Patients rotate from one piece of exercise equipment to another, completing four 10-minute exercises. Following each exercise, participants monitor their heart rate by taking their pulse. Phase III patients begin training on equipment designed for aerobic exercise, then move up to include resistance, or weight training exercise. There are currently 150 cardiac patients in Phase III classes.

After receiving a stress test and a written order from their physician, a cardiac patient may then enroll in Phase II. This is a 12-week program of 36 one-hour group sessions in the fitness center. During exercise, the patient's heart rate and blood pressure are monitored. An individual case manager is assigned to guide and monitor the patient's progress.

Phase II not only includes exercise supervised by extensively trained physiologists and registered nurses, but educational handouts, speakers and, during Cardiac Rehab Week, heart-healthy snacks. About 70 cardiac patients are now enrolled in Resurrection's Phase II program.

Each day we're posting on our bulletin board a trivia question on some aspect of heart disease, and every Phase II or III patient who answers a question correctly has a chance to win prizes," Baumgart says.

In the cardiac rehabilitation program, a patient progresses through three levels, or phases, of exercise. Phase I begins in the hospital, soon after the patient has suffered a heart attack, had angioplasty or open-heart surgery. Phase I includes bedside exercises, getting up and walking, going up and down stairs, instruction on levels of physical activity when the patient goes home and education about risk factors such as diet, stress and smoking.
