





To reduce the possibility of suffering one of these painful and possibly disabling injuries, follow these posture improving tips: • Make sure your chair fits correctly. There should be 2 inches between the front edge of the seat and the back of your knees. Ideally, the chair should tilt back so you can rest while you're reading what's on the screen.

• Sit with your knees at approximately a 90 to 120 degree angle. Using an angled foot rest to support your feet. Position your computer monitor so the top of the screen is at or below eye level, and make sure you have adequate lighting. · Keep your wrists in the neutral position, not angled up or down, while you type. A wrist rest can help you to keep a more neutral wrist posture. Take periodic stretch breaks.





It is estimated that more than 20,000 polar bears are in the wild, though exact numbers are not known.
