
veloped two significant techniques that gave artists new options of expression, collage and frottage (techniques of rubbing impressions of the surface texture of a material onto paper). The Oakton exhibition -- which includes collotypes, etchings, lithographs, frottage, a gouache painting and a glass scupture by the German-born artist -- is from the personal collection of William A. and Phyllis G. Koehnline, who will attend the opening Reception. William A. Koehnline, the founding president of Oakton, has had a lifelong interest in collecting art.

Included in the exhibition are 22 collotypes (the technique for reproducing frottage drawings) from Natural History, a portfolio that depicts Ernst's surrealistic version of the creation of the

published in 1964 with the colaboration of the Russian poet Iliazd, reveals another dimension of Ernst's work: the integration of drawing and writing. Maximiliana, or the "Illegal Practice of Astronomy," is a series of 30 folios (16 are in the current exhibition) which Ernst engraved in homage to the 19th-century German astronomer Guillame Tempel, famous for discovering the planet Maximiliana in 1861. In Maximiliana, Ernst invented a type of writing that resembles runes and hieroglyphics.

Of special note in the exhibition is a glass sculpture, Federico the Fearless, one of three versions designed by Ernst and created by an Italian glass worker in 1964. The 15" sculpture, in the image of a bird, reflects one of Ernst's common motifs. The other two scuptures were purchased by Nelson Rockefeller and the Museum of Fine Arts,



FLU & PNEUMONIA SHOTS The Village of Morton Grove will provide flu and pneumonia shots for residents age 60+. Shots are free if the patient's primary insurance in Medicare Part B. Those enrolled in an HMO or who do not subscribe to Medicare Part B pay \$10 for the flu, and \$20

Influenza damages the mucous lining of the lungs, causing susceptibility to pneumonia. This can be dangerous for people with heart disease, diabetes, anemia, lung disease and kidney disease. Influenza shots provide immunity to the most commonly predicted flu strains for the coming winter. Seniors should get a flue shot each year. Pneumonia shots provide lifelong immmunity to the most common forms of pneumonia. People who have already received this shot do not need another one. Anyone:

1) Allerigic to chicken, chicken feathers or eggs; 2) Allergic to contact lens solution or thermerisol (mercuri-3) Allergic to the anitbiotic family called amino glycosides



With more than 10,000 mutual funds on the market, you'll almost be able to find, at any given time, a few funds that are earning truly extraordinary returns. But before you invest in these funds, take a good, long look

Some of these "super-winners" could be showing triple-digit returns in a particular year. If you look beyond the current numbers, however, you may find some things that are unsettling. First, an ultra-high performing fund may have a high "expense ratio" -- a figure used to determine the percent of assets taken from a fund to cover all operating costs. High expenses can cut into your returns.

Even more importantly, funds with stratospheric short-term performance may have poor long-term track records. To really get a sense of how a mutual fund has performed in different economic environments, you should look at its five- and 10-year returns. Even these longer-term figures can't really help you predict how the fund will do in the future, but they will give you a more realistic sense of what the fund's managers have achieved over time.

Finally, some funds achieve their high short-term numbers because most of their assets are heavily concentrated in a few different stocks in one particular sector. That can work if the sector is "hot," but when it cools off, the fund's performance will plummet. The more diversified a fund's holdings are, the less susceptible the fund is to sudden "meltdowns."


Instead of chasing after those funds with sizzling short-term returns, how should you go about building a portfolio of mutual funds? Start by identifying your own investment goals and preferences and discussing them with your investment representative. If you want your mutual funds to help pay for college for your children or a comfortable retirement for yourself, then you will want funds with significant growth potential, such as stock funds. But if you also need current income, you may be interested in adding bond funds to your

After you've identified the type of funds you're interested in, seek out the ones with proven management and an investment philosophy that you are comfortable with. Also, it's important to watch fund fees and expenses. If a fund has achieved strong long-term results while keeping its expenses down, then you can be fairly certain that a good management team is at work. (On the other hand, funds do change managers; when that happens, you may want to see if the fund still makes sense for you.)

Above all else, don't look to "get rich quick" from mutual funds. They are truly designed for long-term investors. If you can keep that perspective in mind, and you do your homework, then you won't have to worry about pursuing the so-called "super-winners."
