These programs are rarely, if ever publicized," says Chris Pongsak, a researcher at Prescription Assistance Coalition. "We've published an A to Z listing of all the drugs that are available to certain qualified groups for free or at very low cost directly from the manufacturer. There are nearly 46 million Americans that are lacking health care insurance, many of whom could benefit from the information in this booklet.'
