

local businesses. Last week, 30 Chicago area businesses reduced earn over \$1 million from Commonwealth Edison (ComEd) through an innovative new incentive program run by the Community Energy Coopera-

Cooperative (Co-op) started in June, 2000 and is the first program in the country to address problems of peak demand and reliability using consumer-based strategies at a community level, rather than a utility-wide approach, and to work with midsized companies. "Reliability is a local issue, especially in geographical areas that have a history of outages," said Kathy Tholin, general manager of the Community Energy Cooperative. "When your electricity goes out, so does your neighbors', and the power outages not only affect the quality of life in a community, but they impact safety, too." Co-op members agree to cut the amount of ComEd's electricity they use during peak times, such as hot summer days, and in turn ComEd compensates the Co-op for the reduction. The Co-op compensates its commercial and industrial members at the rate of \$100 per Kilowatt of reduction cost is the ongoing cost of a per year.
