

### Niles welcomes third Sister

After Niles officials met with 30 delegates from Leixlip, Ireland earlier this month in a formal signing ceremony, the Irish suburb became the village's third sis-

The village, which signed a

similar agreement with Pisa, Italy in 1991 and Nafplion, Greece in 1994, has been corresponding with Irish delegates for over two years at the behest of Niles' Sister Cities Commission. A member of Sister City International, the organizations seek to establish communications between countries in the hope of fostering world peace and understanding. Located 13 miles outside Dublin, Leixlip shares similar demographics with Niles and thus similar concerns. Both communities have a large teenage contingent and the village hopes to eventually engage youths in student ex-

change programs.

"I never had lifted weight in Russia, but I loved it," Paperny said. "I set a goal to participate in the nationals and of course, I want to win, too."

Paperny began his flirtation with weights shortly after arriving at the high school when he was a sophomore. Sidelined by a knee injury, Paperny soon hooked up with a body builder who convinced him to try the sport where form matters more than sheer strength. It was a good match for the

"Everyone supported me a lot," Paperny said. "The principal of the high school, the director of the (physical education) department, they all supported me and acted really interested. It was like

He began working out with Mr. Illinois 1999 Julian Peytchev and found a coach in George

At his peak, Paperny trained two or three hours each day, five or six days per week, he said.
"And that's just working out. You have to be careful with your diet and calories and get enough sleep. It all takes a lot of time."

He also spent time in trying to identify a sponsor for his trip to New York. Life Way, a major kefir manufacturer in Morton Grove, rose to the challenge.

How will After-hours Trading affect you?

However, that's not the case yet -- and if you're interested in after-hours trading, you should be aware that

One of these differences has to do with the pricing of any given stock. During regular trading, you can

place a "market" order to buy or sell a stock at the stock's current price. You won't have to wonder if the

price will change before the trade is executed; what you see is what you'll get. But there is no standard price quote on stocks trading after 4 p.m. Eastern Time, so all after-hours trades are limit orders.

What does that mean? It means when you place an order, you must set a price "ceiling" when you want to

buy, or a "floor" when you want to sell. In other words, you must decide what price range you will not exceed

when you make a trade. That's a different kind of concept for most people used to simply buying and selling

That's not to say that "limit" orders are, by themselves, a problem. In one sense, limit orders may be bene-

ficial, because they can protect you against wild price swings. On the other hand, after-hours trading volume

You also may find other risks in after-hours trading. For one thing, price movements during extended

hours may be more volatile than those during trading sessions. And the impact of news announcements im-

mediately preceding, or during, after-hours sessions may cause an exaggerated effect on the market, because the volume of trades is so much lower than it is during the regular trading day. It's a good idea to read the

day's news on the stock you're trading, especially any announcements that come after regular trading hours.

Is after-hours trading worth it to you? You'll have to decide that for yourself. Generally speaking, though,

there shouldn't be a lot of times where you absolutely must make a trade. Snap judgements and tips on "hot"

stocks may be the stuff of high drama, but most people can do without them. The truth is that you have time

If your stock is moving rapidly up or down, and you can't find an real reason for it, then you might want to

other burglary that was apparently thwarted in Lincolnwood, a police task force has identified two teams that may be involved in the burglaries, according to Commander Mark Erickson, who leads the investigations unit for Morton Grove. Both teams apparently use similar methods of operations and are selective in the items they take, Erickson said.

One team is thought to be a male and female of Middle East-ern descent. The male is described as 5'7" with a thin build and weighing approximately 130 pounds. He reportedly has a long face, skinny nose and thin lips. His hair is reportedly dark brown or black and slicked back and combed into a "widow's peak" on the middle of his forehead.

The woman is described as 100 pounds, approximately 5'5" tall with long, dark, frizzy hair and sunken cheeks. The couple was heard to be speaking in an unidentified foreign language.

A second team, which may have been involved in the Morton Grove break-in, is made up of two white men. One man is described as 5'8" tall with a thin build and light brown hair. The second man is described as approximately 20 years old with a burglary scene in a dark blue, in Niles.

 Monitor tires. Underinflated tires or poorly aligned wheels waste fuel by forcing the engine to work harder. (Let the tires cool down before checking the air pressure.) Out-of-line wheels, as evidenced by uneven the windows closed at highway tread wear, should be aligned by speeds, since air drag is reduced. a professional.

Remove excess weight. conditioning on -- assuming that Remove unnecessary items from the system is in good working the vehicle. Less weight means better mileage.

• Consolidate trips and er-
