

Christmas, 1944

Christmas, 1944 was a bitter cold and joyless season for American troops fighting in northern Europe. Our old Bugle friend, Al Johnson, private C company, 39th regiment, 9th Infantry division was a member of a fighting division which fought through Africa and Italy before landing in Normandy and fighting its way through France, Luxembourg and Belgium and then crossing into Germany. His division sustained a 300% casualty rate.

Al wrote me the following letter: "I've been asked to reveal some of the thoughts and pressures of a soldier being away form home at Christmas.

"I don't care what religious persuasion you are, I'm sure there were no atheists living in foxholes.

"My most direct remembrance comes in a rather oblique way. A member of my squad, who was from North Carolina, was always singing, 'Somebody loves you and I want you to know—I wish to be near you, wherever you go. Somebody loves you—sweetheart can't you see? That somebody is me.' Unfortunately, on Christmas eve, December 24th, he suffered 12 shrapnel wounds. He died New Year's eve, 1944. His foxhole was next to mine....and I was devastated.





MATTHEW F. WOJTASZEK SR. was born Jan. 27, 1922. Raised in Chicago, IL and presently resides in Niles, IL. Drafted Dec. 11, 1942, at Fort Sheridan, IL. Basic and airborne training at Fort Bragg, NC, and qualified for the Glider Badge. Assigned to HHB DIVARTY, 82nd ABN. Participated in the glider invasion of Normandy, France and Nijmegen, Holland. He was awarded two Bronze Stars in his Glider Wings.

Other campaigns include: Sicily, Naples-Foggia, Ardennes, Rhineland and Central Europe.

Awards include the EAME Service Ribbon w/6 Bronze Battle Stars, Good Conduct Medal, Distinguished Service Badge, Bronze Arrowhead w/cluster. Unit Citations include Belgian and French Fourragere and Dutch Militaire Willems Order.

Discharged from Separation Center at Camp McCoy, WI, Nov. 19, 1945. Employed by US Postal Service and retired with 44 years of honorable service.

He married Bernice (deceased Feb. 5, 1995) and has two children, Matthew F. Jr. and Margaret Mary; and four grandchildren, Christine, James, Steve and Mary.

Nilesite Matt Wojtaszek's first Christmas overseas was 1943 in Africa where he and thousands of servicemen sat around in the sand watching Bob Hope's Christmas Show with Jerry Colonna and Frances Langford.

By early December of 1944, Wojtaszek, a glider trooper, was enjoying some R&R in Saissones, France when news broke that the 101st Airborne was surrounded by German fire in southeast Belgium, so Wojtaszek, who had already seen action in Holland, France and Italy, was asked to drop in again.

On Christmas day he was in Bastogne with Germany's final major counter offensive, the Battle of the Bulge, erupting around him. Turkeys were flown in for the troops. "I don't know how they did it," he muses. "We ate from our mess kits in the protection of whatever bombed out building remained standing," he recalls. "I was never so cold as I was there," he said, adding, "but there were evergreens all

Although the German army was the first to use gliders, the U.S. had used them twice before---in Sicily, July, 1943 and at Normandy, June 1944.

Built of canvas stretched over a metal frame, riding in a glider was "like sitting inside a box kite," how one former occupant described it. Towed by C47s, each glider (called CG4A in army parlance), carried 15 soldiers: 13 troopers plus the twoman crew. Towards the end of Wojtaszek's time overseas the Army reclassified glider duty to

Christmas for ship's cook meant food for 2,000 Simple gift...

Melvin Baity, of Morton Grove, was inducted into the Army at Fort Sheridan in 1953. He was issued his first uniform and sent to Camp Breckenridge in Kentucky for 16 weeks of basic training, When Baity arrived at camp the men got off the bus and lined up. The Duty Sergeant went down the row and assigned each man a job. One was a driver, the next a secretary and so on. Baity was fortunate to draw

a cook assignment. Back home in Skokie Baity had gained valuable experience cooking at Toppers Restaurant and the Checkerboard Restaurant. Cooking was something he. enjoyed. Since most senior personnel were actually over in Korea the training provided at Breckenridge was a little rough around the edges. Baity offered to help train because of his previous experience and was taken up on that offer during the final eight weeks of basic training. Following basic training Baity was sent to cook and baker's

He boarded Marine Serpent, the World War II Kaiser Troop 20-day trip to Sasebo, Japan. While on board Marine Serpent, Baity and four other men were responsible for cooking breakfast for 2000 troops. On Christmas Day in 1953, Baity began

his usual midnight to six shift. There was a bad storm that night and the weather deck was dark due to lights out at wartime. To make matters worse the deck was covered with water from the waves crashing onboard at either end. Baity had to go from his hold (a compartment where 300 men sleep) up over the deck to get around the watertight area (two places on the

Exciting Circuit Breaker changes

The new year will ring in significant changes in both the Circuit Breaker and Pharmaceutical Assistance programs and CJE's resource centers are getting ready to help the influx of seniors that will now qualify for a cash rebate or prescription drug coverage. Appointments can be made by calling (773) 508-1000 for February and March dates. Seniors can either go to CJE's main office, 3003 W. Touhy, Chicago or Gidwitz Place, 1551 Lake Cook Road, Deerfield.

The Circuit Breaker Tax Relief Program is a cash grant from the Illinois Department of Revenue that reduces property taxes and rent; or nursing home or retirement facilities fees that qualified individuals must pay if they live in a privately owned dwelling.

The Pharmaceutical Assistance Program pays for approved medications and will now cover medical conditions including heart conditions, high blood pressure, arthritis, diabetes, Parkinson's disease, Glaucoma, Alzheimer's disease, lung disease and cancer. This program is for people who are not on Medicaid.

To qualify for assistance, an individual must be 65 years of age or older or disabled, an Illinois resident for all or a portion of 2000, live in a privately owned building and meet the following maximum income eligibility: \$21,218 per one person household; \$28,480 per two person household; \$35,740 for three or more people.

The following information is needed to complete the application: a social security card; records of all income for 2000, including interest statements; landlord's name, address and telephone number; statement of the amount of rent paid in 2000 or amount of property tax paid. Proof of age and/or disability is also required for first-time appli-

"A child should begin feeling better within five days of taking the first dose of antibiotic," said Park. "If this is not the case, or if the child's condition worsens, return to the doctor as soon as possible. Ear infections can spread beyond the eardrum and can lead to a more serious condition, such as meningitis."

Tips for Preventing Ear Infec-

The best action against ear infections, of course, is prevention. Based on the age of the child, Park recommended the following prevention techniques

· Breast-feed a child as long as possible. Studies have shown that infants who are breast-fed exclusively until at least 4 months of age have approximately 50 percent fewer ear infections than infants who were never breast-fed: · Avoid bottle-feeding an infant in bed. Children who are fed while lying on their backs have an increased risk of milk draining into their ears;

> All these galaxies are moving away from each other through space at incredible speeds. How incredible? 

of capturing a Nazi officer, taking him a prisoner of war. He had a Luger revolver which was a prize in itself. The Air Force flyboys were paying 200 bucks for one. I carried it for a couple of days and then gave it away to Thornton. I didn't want to have it on my person if I was captured. For the same reason Thornton gave it to Slaughter and he gave it to Au Coin who passed it on to Levitsky. But the revolver was a bad omen. Each one of the men who were handed the Luger were killed within the week."

Jerry Berg lived on Church Street in Morton Grove for 30 years. Jerry E-mailed this letter about his remembrances of Christmastime, 1944.

"I wasn't expecting a very merry Christmas that December in 1944. I was temporarily stationed at a staging area outside of Boston when we were advised we would be shipping out to Europe in the morning. So I made one last call to home, but I was not permitted to say 'goodbye' or even hint that this was my last day in the country. 'The Enemy is Listening' the sign in the phone booth warned, so when my mother asked whether I would be coming home for the holidays, I lied, 'I'll try my best,

"The next morning we dewhich went to Europe without escort despite warnings of German submarines in the North Atlantic. For more than a week, Allied troops were withdrawing during the Battle of the Bulge, and new troops were needed to replace the neavy casualties. In only 4 days we landed at Liverpool where the British Red Cross met us at the docks and fed us tea and something they called a donut. Dockside trains immediately took us to Southampton where we were boarded onto an ancient Indian tugboat which took 4 days to






