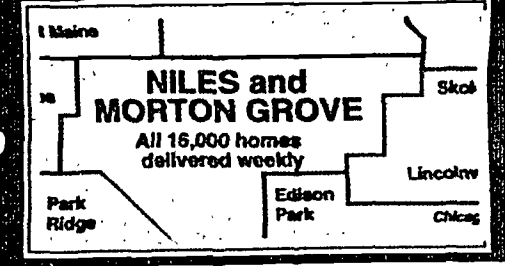

Christmas, 1944

Christmas, 1944 was a bitter cold and joyless season for American troops fighting in northern Europe. Our old-Bugle friend, Al Johnson, private C company, 39th regiment, 9th Infantry division was a member of a fighting division which fought through Africa and Italy before landing in Normandy and fighting its way through France, Luxembourg and Belgium and then crossing into Germany. His division sustained a 300% casualty rate.

Al wrote me the following letter: "I've been asked to reveal some of the thoughts and pressures of a soldier being away from home at Christmas.

"I don't care what religious persuasion you are, I'm sure there were no atheists living in foxholes.

"My most direct remembrance comes in a rather oblique way. A member of my squad, who was from North Carolina, was always singing, 'Somebody loves you and I want you to know-- I wish to be near you, wherever you go. Somebody loves you-- sweetheart can't you see? That somebody is me.' Unfortunately, on Christmas eve, December 24th, he suffered 12 shrapnel wounds. He died New Year's eve, 1944. His foxhole was next to mine....and I was devastated."

Battle of Bulge meant Christmas dinner in bombed out buildings

MATTHEW F. WOJTAZSEK SR. was born Jan. 27, 1922. Raised in Chicago, IL and presently resides in Niles, IL. Drafted Dec. 11, 1942, at Fort Sheridan, IL. Basic and airborne training at Fort Bragg, NC, and qualified for the Glider Badge. Assigned to HHB DIVARTY, 82nd ABN. Participated in the glider invasion of Normandy, France and Nijmegen, Holland. He was awarded two Bronze Stars in his Glider Wings.

Other campaigns include: Sicily, Naples-Foggia, Ardennes, Rhineland and Central Europe.

Awards include the EAME Service Ribbon w/6 Bronze Battle Stars, Good Conduct Medal, Distinguished Service Badge, Bronze Arrowhead w/cluster. Unit Citations include Belgian and French Fourragere and Dutch Militaire Willems Order.

Discharged from Separation Center at Camp McCoy, WI, Nov. 19, 1945. Employed by US Postal Service and retired with 44 years of honorable service.

He married Bernice (deceased Feb. 5, 1995) and has two children, Matthew F. Jr. and Margaret Mary; and four grandchildren, Christine, James, Steve and Mary.

Nilesite Matt Wojtaszek's first Christmas overseas was 1943 in Africa where he and thousands of servicemen sat around in the sand watching Bob Hope's Christmas Show with Jerry Colonna and Frances Langford.

By early December of 1944, Wojtaszek, a glider trooper, was enjoying some R&R in Saisones, France when news broke that the 101st Airborne was surrounded by German fire in southeast Belgium, so Wojtaszek, who had already seen action in Holland, France and Italy, was asked to drop in again.

On Christmas day he was in Bastogne with Germany's final major counter offensive, the Battle of the Bulge, erupting around him. Turkeys were flown in for the troops. "I don't know how they did it," he muses. "We ate from our mess kits in the protection of whatever bombed out building remained standing," he recalls. "I was never so cold as I was there," he said, adding, "but there were evergreens all around."

Although the German army was the first to use gliders, the U.S. had used them twice before—in Sicily, July, 1943 and at Normandy, June 1944.

Built of canvas stretched over a metal frame, riding in a glider was "like sitting inside a box kite," how one former occupant described it. Towed by C47s, each glider (called CG4A in army parlance), carried 15 soldiers: 13 troopers plus the two-man crew. Towards the end of Wojtaszek's time overseas the Army reclassified glider duty to

hazardous pay category.

He recalled the classic response given by General McAuliffe of the 101st. Surrounded by enemy at the Bulge, he was asked to surrender. The German interpreters were mystified by the answer he delivered in standard American slang. "Nuts," he replied, and fought on.

This year Wojtaszek will spend Christmas Eve with a daughter and her family and Christmas Day with extended family.

Beusse recalls Christmas with the Seabees

For Walt Beusse of Niles, getting a real Christmas dinner during his navy service was "never a problem." During his stint with the Seabees (a sort of acronym for "Construction Battalion"), Beusse was assigned to an outfit charged with supplying ammunition to Admiral Halsey's Pacific Fleet.

The barge assigned to this duty had no power of its own and was towed down the Mississippi, eventually through the Panama Canal and into the Pacific, he recalls, and positioned in "the world's largest harbor," off the island of Ulithi in the Carolines. The Seabees onboard worked 12 hours on and 12 off. Smaller craft taxied the ammo to its point of use.

Referred to as a "hotel barge" since it was both living and working quarters, it was christened the "Ritz Carlton," one might expect with tongue-in-cheek.

"We did have it better than lots of guys," Beusse said. "On Christmas we sat down to turkey, ham, cranberries, stuffing and pie." Then he added, "Oh, and the bread."



Beusse explained that the ship's flour harder was weevil-infested, but for location security it couldn't be dumped overboard. So before using it, a portion was sieved, which eliminated the larger specimens but allowed the survival of the smallest. This led to a kind of table game wherein a diner held his slice up to light, and the high count won a prize, perhaps a serving of orange juice donated by a shipmate.

Beusse recalls seeing Bob Hope's show on an island in the Pacific during a torrential rain-fall so bad he couldn't see or hear a thing.

Beusse and his wife will spend this Christmas with their son's family in Elgin.

Philippines Christmas dinner recalled with k-rations and beer

Nick Vittaco of Niles well recalls Christmas of 1944. He spent it in a slit-trench in the Philippines under intense air attack by the Japanese.

Vittaco was with the 7th squadron of the Army Air Corps' 49th fighter group. That was before the Corps became the Army Air Force, he explains.

The Christmas meal was nothing special, just the usual rations like any day. What he does remember is the beer. The army had procured some as a holiday treat. He recalls that the more beer they consumed, the less they focused on events overhead.

"After all, it had been quite a while since our last; we weren't used to it." We quite understand, Nick.

Vittaco served from mid-1943 to November 1945 on a tour that

took him from Darwin in Australia, to New Guinea, Dutch New Guinea, The Philippines, (where he saw Bob Hope and company do their Christmas show), and finally, Tokyo.

He paused to remember the ace of the 49th, Richard Ira Bong, a member of its 9th squadron. Bong, from a farming community in northern Wisconsin, shot down 40 aircraft during his tour. As Vittaco remembers, this was the highest count in the Corps. Bong did survive the war, but died in a California plane crash.

For Christmas 2000, Nick will be right here in Niles with his wife Evelyn, their daughter and her husband Carol and Don Herzog, and extended family.

Have another beer, Nick, and Merry Christmas.

Christmas in Wartime Vietnam

Vietnam Veteran, Kenneth Trumbull ironically came into this world in a Veterans' Hospital. Trumbull's Dad was a lifer in the army and although Ken didn't stop him from joining the Marines. Being in the military one never knows where one may end up. Even holidays are up for grabs.

On November 5, 1969 at the ripe old age of 18, Trumbull enlisted in the Marines. Trumbull's first Marine Christmas was in Marble Mountain, Vietnam where he was a member of Mag16, Mab16 Company. He worked in TAFDS (tactical air refueling and dispensing system) that did exactly as its name suggests: refueled helicopters and jets. There was a ceasefire that lasted from midnight on the 24th to midnight on the 25th. Each of the three sections in Trumbull's company had an eight-hour shift to celebrate the holiday offline. The Christmas party included the traditional hot food, a Santa and drinks. Although Trumbull was not yet 21 and far from home the camaraderie he experienced in the Marines made him feel like he was with family.

Trumbull was lucky to spend his second Christmas on leave at home with his parents in Chicago.

Trumbull's third and fourth Christmases were spent in Okinawa, the Rock as it was affectionately called. Okinawa is an old volcano that is 13 meters long and seven meters wide. Trumbull celebrated his third holiday on base with the guys. There was less shelling on Christmas number four making a more peaceful celebration. Trumbull was engaged to a singer in the Special Services and the two enjoyed dinner at a restaurant and a night on the town.

Trumbull spent a commercial and expensive Christmas number five in Japan. There was a party at the USO with the traditional feast. The show included a magician and jugglers.

Trumbull's sixth and seventh Christmases were spent meeting his fiancée, Elizabeth's family. He was stationed at El Toro Marine Base in Santa Ana, California for number six. Trumbull enjoyed a classic family dinner off base with some of his future relatives. On Christmas number seven Trumbull took a military flight from Okinawa to the Philippines to meet Elizabeth's parents. They roasted a pig at their home and had a splendid meal.

Back on the base in Okinawa

for Christmas number eight, Trumbull spent the day with the guys in his company.

On July 27, 1973, Ken Trumbull married Elizabeth in a Subu

village in the Philippines. They spent a romantic Christmas for two on base in Cherry Point, North Carolina for Trumbull's final Christmas in the Marines. Trumbull left the Marines on July 13, 1979 on a medical discharge due to a hearing problem. He currently works in the private security industry. Trumbull is active at the American Legion in Morton Grove.

The American Legion has 3.5 million members nationwide making it the largest veterans group. The Legion provides community service not only for veterans but kids as well. The members' dues and such fundraisers as Poppy Day are used to support programs for kids through schools and park districts. The Legion also donates money and volunteers time to Veterans Hospitals. Trumbull can be found tending bar on Friday nights at the Legion's weekly fish fry.

A simple gift gave a GI his most memorable Christmas

Morton Grove American Legion Post Commander, Phil Hutchins, is a veteran of both World War II and the Korean War. He said one Christmas of his five spent on foreign soil stands out in his memory.

Hutchins enlisted in the Army and arrived in Korea on Dec. 15, 1951. He spent his first Christmas in Korea at the base in Pusan. Hutchins enjoyed the typical holiday meal of turkey with all the trimmings at the club. He was surrounded by the fellowship and camaraderie of his colleagues.

Hutchins' second Christmas remains true to his heart. He was due to come back to the States after serving a year in Korea. President Truman enacted an extension for the military personnel already stationed in Korea. Hutchins had been planning to be home in Maine in 1952 for

Christmas Day, Korea, 1952: Hutchins had seven GIs and four South Koreans on his boat. One of the Koreans jumped into knee high freezing water and slogged up to an island where he returned with a Christmas tree. The soldiers decorated the tree with torn pieces of paper. The men recited the Lord's Prayer together and for a brief moment they forgot they were far from home.

Christmas where his Mother and Aunts would prepare a special holiday meal.

Instead, Hutchins was the skipper of an 85 foot Army Q

Sailor remembers celebrating with Japanese children

Jerry Weaver, of Morton Grove, enlisted in the Navy in 1953. Originally from Byron, IL, he thought he'd beat the draft by taking matters into his own hands. At 6'7", Weaver was too big for the Air Force (his first choice) and the Navy recruiter happened to be right next door.

After 16 weeks of boot camp at Great Lakes Naval Base, Weaver was sent to San Diego, CA for engineering school. There he learned to turn sea-water into drinkable water and was assigned to the APA 222, USS Pickaway. Weaver was a First Class Petty Officer whose division was in charge of evaporators. The Pickaway was an attack transport. It had 26 boats that it landed on shore loaded

with troops to send into battle. The ship also transported troops to Manila or Hawaii for R & R.

Weaver's first navy Christmas in 1953 was spent at home. Although he enlisted in December he didn't have to report for duty until the new year.

Christmas number two Weaver spent at the Air Force Base in Subic Bay, Philippines. The troops enjoyed a real beach holiday complete with Tiki huts, swimming and fishing.

Weaver was in El Cajon, CA for his third military Christmas. He spent the evening with his Aunt's family.

Sasebo, Japan was the site of Weaver's final Naval Christmas. The USS Pickaway and another ship were on a goodwill mission

for the poverty stricken children in Japan. The troops had a special Christmas party for the Japanese youngsters. At the celebration the troops gave candy, soda and a little toy as gifts for the kids.

Weaver received an Honorable Discharge from the Navy in December of 1956. After Korea, he worked for 22 years with Sunray-DX and then Smith Oil in the oil business. Next Weaver hooked up with Rockford Safety Equipment for 13 years. He was responsible for machine safety according to OSHA regulations. Weaver's company was considered experts in the field.

Weaver is a member of the Morton Grove American Legion and can be found there daily managing the post. He was Post Commander in 1999. The American Legion promotes patriotism and loyalty through such programs as High School Oratorical Competitions and Scouting Sponsorship. The Legion is also responsible for the McGruff Safe Kids Program. Veteran's affairs and rehabilitation are a top priority for the American Legion as well.

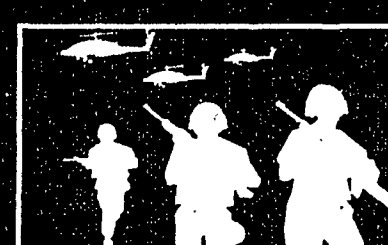

Melvin Baity, of Morton Grove, was inducted into the Army at Fort Sheridan in 1953. He was issued his first uniform and sent to Camp Breckneridge in Kentucky for 16 weeks of basic training. When Baity arrived at camp the men got off the bus and lined up. The Duty Sergeant went down the row and assigned each man a job. One was a driver, the next a secretary and so on. Baity was fortunate to draw a cook assignment.

Back home in Skokie Baity had gained valuable experience cooking at Toppers Restaurant and the Checkerboard Restaurant. Cooking was something he enjoyed. Since most senior personnel were actually over in Korea the training provided at Breckneridge was a little rough around the edges. Baity offered to help train because of his previous experience and was taken up on that offer during the final eight weeks of basic training. Following basic training Baity was sent to cook and baker's school.

He boarded Marine Serpent, the World War II Kaiser Troop Transport One Stuck Ship, for a 20-day trip to Sasebo, Japan. While on board Marine Serpent, Baity and four other men were responsible for cooking breakfast for 2000 troops. On Christmas Day in 1953, Baity began his usual midnight to six shift.

There was a bad storm that night and the weather deck was dark due to lights out at war-time. To make matters worse the deck was covered with water from the waves crashing on-board at either end. Baity had to go from his hold (a compartment where 300 men sleep) up over the deck to get around the watertight area (two places on the

ship where no water could reach to keep the ship from sinking if hit by a torpedo) to the galley (kitchen on the ship) for his shift. Talk about an adventure. Walking in the freezing cold air, through the pitch-black night, over a water-logged deck to crack 4000 eggs is quite a feat of magic.

Breakfast consisted of eggs and oatmeal. Baity made oatmeal for 2000 troops in a 100 gallon vat using steam from the engine to heat it. The galley had eight ovens, four on each side. The men took turns beginning on one side of the room, pulling the tray from each oven and stirring its contents and then moving onto the next oven until the man worked his way around the galley. The galley was about 140 degrees Fahrenheit. By the time the man made it around the galley he was red-faced and bathed in sweat. He would then go up two floors to the deck to cool off. Teamwork was the key in the galley.

Baity spent the Christmas of 1954 much the same way he did in 1953 cooking for 2000 hungry troops. The only difference was that he was on his way home.

Baity was honorably discharged from the Army on January 14, 1961. He returned to cooking at the Checkerboard Restaurant. Baity moved onto working for Commonwealth Edison where he worked for 39 years before retiring.

Baity has been a member of the Morton Grove American Legion for 33 years. He was Post Commander from 1980 - 1981 and Man of the Year by the Legion's Seventh District for February 2000 - February 2001. Mel Baity has a mission. He

doesn't want people to forget about Veterans, their commitment and sacrifice. Baity also wants to educate kids about the wars the United States has been involved in. A project close to his heart is the future Korean War Museum and Library to be built in Tuscola, Illinois.

boat that was to pick up downed flyers and cruise the perimeter of Kojeda. Kojeda was a dusty red island that held the POW camps for North Korean soldiers being detained by the U.S.

Winter in Korea is brutally cold. Some say much worse than Chicago winters. Hutchins had seven GIs and four Katusa on his boat. Katusa were Korean Soldiers attached to the American Army. One of the Katusa, Che-si (tiny guy), realized how important Christmas was to the American soldiers. Che-si asked Hutchins to pull the boat into a small cove. Hutchins figured Che-si knew someone there and wanted to visit. Che-si jumped into the knee high freezing water in his bare feet and slogged up to the island. He returned moments later calling for the spotlight. What Che-si held up in the light was the saddest excuse for a Charlie Brown Christmas tree anyone ever saw but it was the most beautiful gesture Hutchins could imagine.

Che-si brought the tree aboard the boat. The soldier were overwhelmed by the Katusa's gesture and rushed to care for his freezing feet. The soldiers decorated the tree with torn pieces of paper. One GI requested Hutchins to say a prayer. The men all recited the Lord's Prayer together and for a brief moment they forgot they were far from home.

Hutchins marvels about that touching and gratifying Christmas. It ranks as one of his greatest Christmases and it was given to him by a non-Christian. Here were two cultures fighting a war and not understanding much about each other. The majority of Koreans were not Christians but the Katusa on Hutchins' boat understood the true meaning of Christmas. They respected the importance of other people's beliefs and were compassionate towards those who were far from their homes on a special and sacred day.

It was a Christmas to remember.

Christmas Around the World and Holidays of Light Fun Facts

How did Christmas Around the World start at the Museum of Science and Industry? Christmas Around the World started as a United Nations Salute to American Allies during World War II.

What prompted Austrian Father Joseph Mohr and a church organist Franz Gruber to

write the song "Silent Night"? The song was written for Midnight Mass because mice had eaten through the bellows of the organ and it could not be used during mass. Father Mohr and Gruber performed "Silent Night" acoustically.

What do Belgians serve to commemorate Epiphany? Belgians serve a moist cake that has a bean placed inside one piece. The person who finds the bean is crowned king/queen for the

day in honor of the Magi present at Christ's birth.

How did Boxing Day, a Canadian holiday, receive its name? Boxing Day, the day after Christmas, gets its name from the old custom of giving. Employers would give their servants Christmas boxes made of earthenware. Inside the box, money was hidden and the servants would retrieve the money by smashing the box to tiny bits.

What legend guides Belarusians in decorating their tree? Trees are decorated in accordance to the Belarusian legend of a fairy that appeared to a family when they were searching for that perfect tree. The fairy held a tree decorated in all the colors of the rainbow. Families now decorate their trees with geometric shapes made out of straw.

Why is a pickle ornament placed on the German tree? The pickle is the last ornament placed on the tree. When the tree is presented to the children, they scurry to find the pickle. The child that finds the pickle receives a special gift left by Saint Nicholas.

What are Scottish "crackers"? Christmas "crackers" - small paper novelties that make a loud noise when the ends are

What do Muslims do when observing Ramadan? They fast. According to the Muslim religion, in the ninth month, when the full moon appears, a fast begins. During the next month, Muslims will refrain from food, drink and tobacco from sunrise to sunset. They will spend much of this time in mosques praying.

What is the focal point of the Italian Christmas season? The nativity scene or crèche.

Why are firecrackers thrown at the Golden Dragon during the Feast of Lanterns, a Chinese celebration? According to legend, the Golden Dragon has been asleep for years. He will remain awake only during the Feast of Lanterns parade and will then go back into hibernation when it ends. To prevent the dragon from going to sleep during the parade, people throw firecrackers in its path to keep it awake.

What is the African American cultural holiday Kwanzaa based on? In Swahili, Kwanzaa means "first fruits of the harvest" based on seven important principles. The family lights one candle on the kinara (a seven-tiered candelabra) each night for

one of the seven principles. The principles are: umoja (unity), kujichagulia (self-determination), ujima (collective work and responsibility), ujamaa (cooperative economics), nia (purpose), kumba (creativity) and imani (faith).

What other holidays do Swedes traditionally celebrate? St. Lucia Day on December 13. Originally, on the shortest day of the year, St. Lucia, whose name in Latin (lux) means light, became the symbol of new hope.

What does the word "Hanukkah" mean? It means, "dedication" in Hebrew. The festival of Hanukkah is held to commemorate the miracle of the oil lamp that occurred more than 2,000 years ago in Jerusalem. According to Mosaic law, to rededicate a temple, a lamp had to be kept burning in the sanctuary for eight days and nights. After the lamp was lit, it was discovered there was only enough oil for one night. Miraculously, the lamp burned for eight days and nights, a sign to the Jews that the temple had been blessed.

Why is Isakha Puja Day celebrated by Buddhists? Visakha means sixth lunar month. Puja means to pay respect and honor. Buddhists celebrate Visakha Puja Day to commemorate important events which all occurred during the sixth lunar month in the Buddha's life (his birth, his enlightenment and his death).

Why are there egg ornaments on Polish trees? Egg ornaments on the traditional Polish Christmas tree represent birth.

According to Romanian tradition, what was one of the Magi's gifts? The Christmas tree.

Who brings children gifts from Puerto Rico? The children receive gifts left by the Three Kings on January 6.

Video store robbed at gun point

Two women are wanted for an armed robbery of a Hollywood Video store located at the 7000 block of Dempster in Niles.

An employee had just opened the store for business and three customers entered, a mother with her small son and another woman. Approximately five minutes later, a second woman entered the store.

After finishing the sale to the mother and son, the employee went into an office area. The two remaining women approached the office and asked if the movie "American Beauty" was available. As he checked the computer, both women walked behind the counter.

The first woman took out a silver or nickel-plated handgun from beneath her jacket and concealed it in a plastic store bag. The employee told police that she pointed the gun at the employee and said, "This is a stick up. Open the safe."

Police did not identify the contents of the safe given to the women, who also demanded the employee's wallet.

According to the employee, the first woman did most of the

talking. She asked the employee to open the bathroom door. As the door was locked and the key could not be found, the employee used a screwdriver to open the door.

Once inside, the first woman handed the bagged gun to her accomplice. The employee said the second woman seemed nervous with the gun and was hesitant to take it. He heard the first woman tell her, "Be careful, it's loaded."

The employee was tied to the rail alongside the toilet with a black telephone cord and warned him not to leave the room or he'd be shot. After about five minutes, he loosened his bound hands and escaped to call the police.

The first woman is described as black with a light complexion, 20-30 years-old 5'4", 120-130 lbs with a medium build. The second woman meets the same description but is taller, 5'7"-5'9" and 130-140 lbs. Both women wore dark clothes and hooded jackets.

The women's faces could not be seen because of the hooded jackets, but according to the police report, physical and photographic evidence of the incident has been recovered.

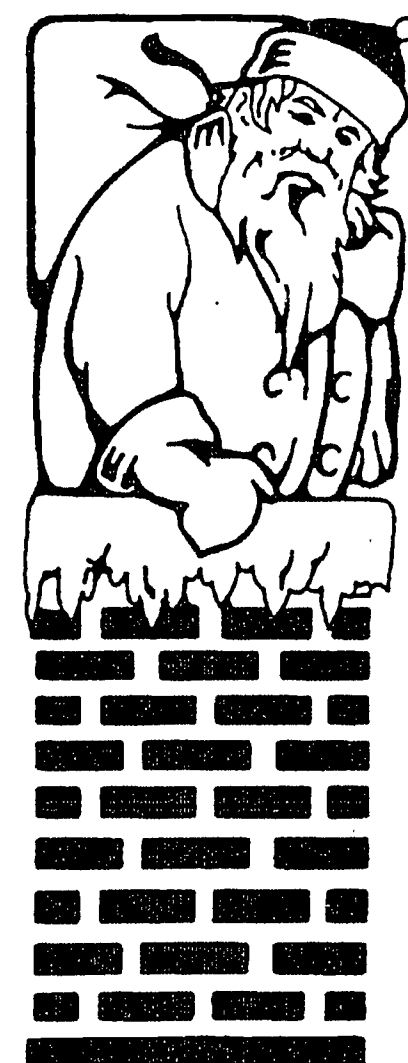

Taking charge of your credit cards

For most of us, the holiday season means increased spending on gifts, travel and entertaining. And, like it or not, increased spending usually translates into heavy credit card usage that can make or break you. As credit card options become more diverse and, in some cases, more expensive, the Illinois CPA Society offers the following advice to help you take charge of your credit card debt.

Know Your Options
All credit cards are not the same. In addition to bank credit cards, travel and entertainment cards, and charge cards issued by retail businesses, now there are cards that give rebates, offer frequent flyer miles and hotel room discounts, and a credit

card that doubles as a telephone calling card.

Keep in mind that even though a card belongs to the Visa or MasterCard network, the issuing bank or financial institution sets the rules regarding annual fees, interest charges, and payment billing practices. With all the options available, it's easy to see why choosing the right credit card is more challenging than ever.

Choose the Card That Suits You Best
If you typically carry a balance on your credit card, you should look for a card with the lowest interest rate. On the other hand, if you pay your balance in full every month -- which is recommended -- you want to look

for a card with no annual fee, and with a grace period (the amount of time you have to pay your bill before you start accruing interest) of 25 days or longer.

Rebate and airline cards usually carry a higher interest rate, but if you pay the entire bill each month, you can come out ahead, particularly when you charge large purchases, such as college tuition, and pay your balance in full at the end of the month. Just be sure to read the fine print. For example, on airline cards check out blackout dates, types of seats available, route restrictions, expiration dates, and the limit on the number of miles you can earn in a year.

And don't kid yourself when it comes to credit cards with tempting introductory offers of super low rates. You may think you will pay off the balance before the rate skyrockets, but unless you're absolutely sure you have the discipline to either pay off the balance or switch the balance to another low-rate card offer, don't fall for this marketing ploy.

Reduce Interest Costs
If you're paying high interest rates on your credit cards, you should consider transferring your balances to a lower-rate credit card. You can search the Internet for a better deal, but if you're a good credit risk, that may not be necessary. In many cases, a credit card issuer will

lower the rate rather than lose a customer. Call the toll-free number on your bill and inform your current card issuer that you're planning to switch cards for a lower rate. If you are a good customer, it may not be too difficult to negotiate a lower interest rate.

Know Your Credit Card Rights
It's a good idea to keep the receipts for all your charge purchases during the month and check them against your monthly statement. If you believe there is an error on your bill, the Fair Credit Billing Act provides you with recourse. You are required to write to the creditor within 60 days of the bill's date, with your name and account number.

Rev. Miehke and his wife, Pat, are looking forward to greeting many of their former parishioners and friends at this festive worship service.

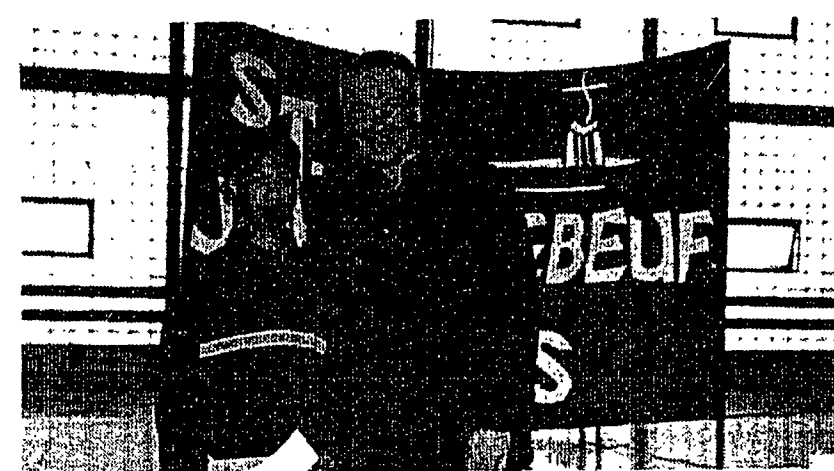

Tax appeal seminar to be held

In keeping with her reputation as a taxpayer advocate, the office of Cook County Board of Review Commissioner Maureen Murphy will conduct a seminar for property owners who want to appeal their property tax assessments. The seminar will be hosted by acting the City of Des Plaines on Monday, December 20th at the Des Plaines Village Hall, 1420 Miner St. in Des Plaines. Registration begins at 6:30 p.m. and the seminar will start promptly at 7 p.m. The hour-long seminar will coach taxpayers on the "ins and outs" of the appeal process, detailing how to gather and present the information they will need for a successful appeal. Citizens attending will receive pamphlets containing information to reinforce the seminar as well as appeal forms needed to begin the process of reducing their assessments. Taxpayers are encouraged to bring their own property tax identification numbers to the seminar so they can submit their applications for appeal right away. December 27th is the last day Maine Township residents may file their appeals. Property owners can call Commissioner Murphy's office at 312-603-3644 for more details.

Real Estate Tax Assessment Appeal Filing Dates

Joseph Berrios, Maureen Murphy, and Robert Shaw, Commissioners of the Cook County Board of Review, have announced the dates for filing assessment appeal complaints by property owners in Niles and Wheeling Townships. The filing dates for property assessment appeals runs through Monday, January 8, 2001, at which time it will close.

Owners of homes, condominiums, townhouses, apartment buildings, and businesses may appeal their assessments to the Board if they feel that their assessment is too high. A lawyer is not required to file an appeal on behalf of a residential property owner.

Evidence which can be particularly helpful to the homeowner seeking an assessment reduction includes any of the following items:

- a photo of the taxpayers property;
- proof of recent sale prices of homes similar to the home of the taxpayer who is appealing;
- a real estate appraisal, if available;
- assessed valuations of comparable properties in your neighborhood; and

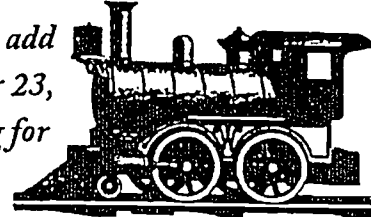

Exciting Circuit Breaker changes

The new year will ring in significant changes in both the Circuit Breaker and Pharmaceutical Assistance programs and CJE's resource centers are getting ready to help the influx of seniors that will now qualify for a cash rebate or prescription drug coverage. Appointments can be made by calling (773) 508-1000 for February and March dates. Seniors can either go to CJE's main office, 3003 W. Touhy, Chicago or Gidwitz Place, 1551 Lake Cook Road, Deerfield.

The Circuit Breaker Tax Relief Program is a cash grant from the Illinois Department of Revenue that reduces property taxes and rent, or nursing home or retirement facilities fees that qualified individuals must pay if they live in a privately owned dwelling.

The Pharmaceutical Assistance Program pays for approved medications and will now cover medical conditions including heart conditions, high blood pressure, arthritis, diabetes, Parkinson's disease, Glaucoma, Alzheimer's disease, lung disease and cancer. This program is for people who are not on Medicaid.

To qualify for assistance, an individual must be 65 years of age or older or disabled, an Illinois resident for all or a portion of 2000, live in a privately owned building and meet the following maximum income eligibility: \$21,218 per one person household; \$28,480 per two person household; \$35,740 for three or more people.

The following information is needed to complete the application: a social security card; records of all income for 2000, including interest statements; landlord's name, address and telephone number; statement of the amount of rent paid in 2000 or amount of property tax paid. Proof of age and/or disability is also required for first-time applicants.

CJE Resource Centers provide a variety of consumer assistance including information about community services, policy, legislation affecting seniors; tax rebates; health/nutrition; and crime trends.

Health News

Ear infections need prompt care

Untreated ear infections can prove serious to a child's health and may lead to permanent hearing loss, delayed speech development or even meningitis, warns Dr. Albert Park, pediatric otolaryngologist with the Ronald McDonald Children's Hospital of Loyola University Medical Center.

Parents and other caregivers of children must be more vigilant for signs and symptoms of ear infections. These infections are so common, in fact, that they are second only to the common cold as the cause of a child's visit to the doctor's office.

"The good news is that ear infections can be treated with proper medical attention to prevent further health problems," said Park.

Ear Infections: what causes them and why are children at greater risk?

Ear infections first occur when bacteria become trapped in the middle ear. Oftentimes, the trapped bacteria grow rapidly because the eustachian tube somehow has become blocked. The eustachian tube runs from the back of the throat to the space behind the ear drum and provides ventilation to prevent pressure

from building up in the middle ear.

Ear infections are most common in children who are between six months and two years of age; more than 65 percent of all children experience at least one ear infection by age three.

Children are more at risk for such infections in part because they have immature immune systems and in part because of the short length and horizontal position of the eustachian tube, which can interfere with proper draining of fluid.

As youngsters grow to age 5 or age 6, the eustachian tube becomes more fully developed - becoming more vertical and allowing for better draining, which minimizes the risk of ear infections.

Recognizing the Symptoms of Infection.

Symptoms of ear infections can vary dramatically, from very subtle signs such as mild fever, irritability, insomnia or ear tugging to more serious symptoms such as hearing loss, high fever and severe pain.

"When one or more of these symptoms are present, the child

should be seen by a physician as soon as possible," said Park, who recommends a pediatrician, or family practice physician. "The only definitive way to determine if a child has an ear infection is by consulting a doctor." If a child has re-occurring ear infections, contact an otolaryngologist, also known as an ear, nose and throat specialist, for more specialized treatment.

Diagnosing and Treating Pediatric Ear Infections.

According to Park, diagnosing an ear infection is painless. Physicians use an otoscope - a medical instrument that allows the physician to see inside the ear canal - to determine whether fluid has built up behind the eardrum, a sign of an infection.

Children who are diagnosed with ear infections typically are prescribed an antibiotic to treat the problem.

"A child should begin feeling better within five days of taking the first dose of antibiotic," said Park. "If this is not the case, or if the child's condition worsens, return to the doctor as soon as possible. Ear infections can spread beyond the eardrum and can lead to a more serious condition, such as meningitis."

Tips for Preventing Ear Infections.

The best action against ear infections, of course, is prevention. Based on the age of the child, Park recommended the following prevention techniques:

- Breast-feed a child as long as possible. Studies have shown that infants who are breast-fed exclusively until at least 4 months of age have approximately 50 percent fewer ear infections than infants who were never breast-fed;
- Avoid bottle-feeding an infant in bed. Children who are fed while lying on their backs have an increased risk of milk draining into their ears;
- Do not smoke near children. Also, limit a child's exposure to cigarette smoke;

- Practice good hygiene. Wash hands frequently to reduce the spread of colds, which can lead to ear infections; and
- Avoid the use of pacifiers. Pacifiers increase saliva and can lead to the spread of viruses from child to child.

Minimally invasive heart surgery performed at Resurrection

chest through a 12-inch incision in the breastbone.

Tubes to connect the patient to the heart-lung machine are placed through small incisions in the thigh and neck instead of into blood vessels in the heart, as in the standard open-chest heart surgery. The heart-lung machine circulates blood throughout the body while the heart is temporarily stopped, allowing surgeons to operate more precisely. Surgeons look at the heart directly or through small cameras, operating through the small ports between the ribs using specially designed instruments.

"HeartPort® technology allows us to make a very precise incision over that part of the heart we're going to fix, whether valve repair or replacement or coronary artery bypass graft," said cardiovascular surgeon Bradford Blakeman, M.D. "An incision is made between the ribs off to the side of the breastbone."

Because of the smaller incision, patients experience less pain and trauma. "The incision is much more cosmetically

pleasing," Dr. Blakeman said. "In fact, for many women, the scar is unnoticeable because we can often go between ribs and underneath the breast."

Patients are typically in the hospital three to four days, compared to eight days with standard heart surgery. They are up 24 hours after surgery and able to resume normal activity and return to work much quicker.

Surgeons at Resurrection are also using a minimally invasive procedure to remove a leg vein used to bypass the coronary arteries. The vein is removed through two or three small incisions instead of an incision the length of the leg. This reduces the leg pain patients experience after open-heart surgery.

"We are proud to have surgeons on our staff whose expertise allows us to offer our patients the latest in minimally invasive heart surgery," said Sister Donna Marie Wolowicki, C.R., Executive Vice President and CEO of Resurrection Medical Center. "Those more patient friendly procedures result in less pain, a shorter hospital stay and a quicker recovery."

Curatek begins study of new treatment for neuropathic pain

Curatek Pharmaceuticals announced that it has begun Phase III human clinical trials with topical clonidine gel, an innovative treatment for peripheral neuropathic pain, including widespread and frequently debilitating conditions where current treatments are often ineffective. The new treatment is an innovative topical gel formulation of clonidine that has been designed to provide concentrated, site-specific therapy over the complete painful area without blocking motor or sensory nerve function. In initial clinical trials, it was associated with minimal side effects and was found effective where other treatments had failed.

In the new multi-center, double-blind, controlled clinical trials, the novel treatment is being studied for two of the most common forms of peripheral neuropathic pain, painful diabetic neuropathy (PDN) and postherpetic neuralgia (PHN). Peripheral neuropathic pain is estimated to affect up to 4 million Americans, and has also been associated with cancer, spinal cord injury, causalgia, multiple sclerosis, postamputation, stroke, HIV and the douloureux. Diabetic neuropathy affects approximately 10 percent of diabetics as a result of injury to peripheral nerves of the feet and

legs, causing pressure-sensitive pain that renders many unable to walk. Postherpetic neuralgia is the chronic and disruptive pain that often follows reactivation of herpes zoster, commonly known as shingles, which is especially prevalent among the elderly.

While clonidine has been widely prescribed in oral form or as a transdermal patch for the treatment of hypertension, it has also been shown to act as a potent local anesthetic. Because its effect is concentration-dependent, however, the compound does not provide analgesia at the site of pain when administered orally.

Moreover, when delivered via transdermal patch, clonidine produces analgesia in only a narrow band with poor pain relief in areas not covered by the patch. In addition, the systemic concentrations of clonidine produced by the transdermal patch may result in systemic side effects, including dry mouth, drowsiness, fatigue, headaches, lethargy and sedation, insomnia, dizziness, impotence, dry throat, constipation, nausea and change in taste.

The new 600-patient clinical trials will be conducted at 20 study centers around the country. Pending successful results of the multi-center clinical trials, the company plans to submit a New Drug Application (NDA)

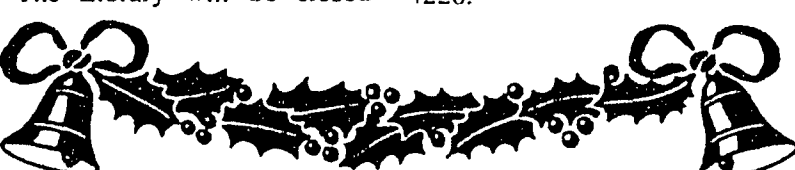

Holiday season calls for putting work, life in perspective

Ah, the holidays: A wondrous time filled with great food, gifts, and thoughts of good will toward men. It's also the season when you have to dig like a gofer to find those decorations stored back behind all that other stuff. And, it's the season that makes you feel like an aging salmon as you fight your way through the river of shoppers at the local mall.

Yes, the holidays certainly fill the heart with joy, the wallet with stress. We are, at times, left wondering what it's all about: We know we're supposed to be as jolly as old St. Nick and as loving as Tiny Tim, but we find ourselves identifying more with Ebenezer Scrooge. Getting into the holiday spirit can seem like one big hassle.

At such times, putting our work, and our lives, in perspective can help. Try walking out-

side some evening and looking up at the night sky. Centuries ago, the Psalmist did this and was moved to ask, "What is man, that thou art mindful of him?"

That brilliant strip of stars spread across the heavens is the Milky Way galaxy. Our home. And, it's big. Real big. So, big, in fact, that light -- traveling at a speed of 186,000 miles per second -- takes 100,000 years to come from one side of the galaxy to the other.

Meanwhile, here on planet Earth, we are hurtling around the Sun at a speed of about 67,000 mph while at the same time the planet is spinning like a top on its axis at a speed of 1,000 mph at the equator. Feeling dizzy?

The Sun and our solar system are halfway to the edge of the Milky Way, out along a spiral

arm called Orion. The Sun revolves around the center of the galaxy at an impressive speed of -- fasten your seat belts, please -- half a million miles an hour. Even so, one revolution of the Sun around the galaxy takes 220 million years.

Because the Sun is 5 billion years old, we can estimate that it has revolved around the galaxy about 23 times during its relatively young life. The Milky Way itself is about 10 billion years old in a universe estimated to be around 14 billion years old.

The Milky Way is not the only galaxy, of course. Some 100 billion galaxies exist in the visible universe. Each galaxy has a couple of billion stars and, probably, planets. Scientists say that if the universe is infinite, there could be an infinite number of galaxies. If it is not infinite, there could be a few trillion galaxies, give or take a billion here and there.

All these galaxies are moving away from each other through space at incredible speeds. How incredible? Well, astronomers measure these velocities in kilometers per second per megaparsec, where a megaparsec is equivalent to 3.26 million light years. Go figure. Astronomers also believe the universe's expansion is actually accelerating. They base this theory on the ob-

servance of supernovae, or exploding stars, that are about 5 billion light years from Earth. Which means, I believe, that their theory is based on information that's 5 billion years old, but, hey, who's counting?

The closest galaxy to the Milky Way is Andromeda, which is 2.5 million light years away. Just one light year equals 6 trillion miles. And, here's some big news: Astronomers say the Milky Way and Andromeda galaxies are going to slam into each other about 3 billion years from now. When they col-

lide, the galaxies could tear each other apart and throw millions of stars, not to mention the Earth, into space, so be prepared.

When we stop to consider the grand scheme of the universe -- with its trillions of stars, billions of galaxies, light-year distances and megaparsec speeds, which our human minds can calculate but cannot truly comprehend -- our daily concerns at work and at home absolutely pale in comparison. It may help to keep that in mind when all those holiday bills come due in January.

"By luck, I got in a position of capturing a Nazi officer, taking him a prisoner of war. He had a Luger revolver which was a prize in itself. The Air Force flyboys were paying 200 bucks for one. I carried it for a couple of days and then gave it away to Thornton. I didn't want to have it on my person if I was captured. For the same reason Thornton gave it to Slaughter and he gave it to Au Coin who passed it on to Levitsky. But the revolver was a bad omen. Each one of the men who were handed the Luger were killed within the week."

Jerry Berg lived on Church Street in Morton Grove for 30 years. Jerry E-mailed this letter about his remembrances of Christmastime, 1944.

"I wasn't expecting a very merry Christmas that December in 1944. I was temporarily stationed at a staging area outside of Boston when we were advised we would be shipping out to Europe in the morning. So I made one last call to home, but I was not permitted to say 'goodbye' or even hint that this was my last day in the country. 'The Enemy is Listening' the sign in the phone booth warned, so when my mother asked whether I would be coming home for the holidays, I lied, 'I'll try my best, Ma.'"

"The next morning we departed on a fast troop transport which went to Europe without escort despite warnings of German submarines in the North Atlantic. For more than a week, Allied troops were withdrawing during the Battle of the Bulge, and new troops were needed to replace the heavy casualties. In only 4 days we landed at Liverpool where the British Red Cross met us at the docks and fed us tea and something they called a donut. Dockside trains immediately took us to Southampton where we were boarded onto an ancient Indian tugboat which took 4 days to cross the Channel instead of

the usual 4 hours because of waiting our turn to pass through the unmined lanes.

"From LeHavre on the French side, we were squeezed into unheated box-cars for a three-day journey; where we took turns in the dark cars, either sitting or standing because there wasn't enough room for all of us to sit on the cold floor at the same time. Finally, in a small town in Belgium we debarked and were crowded into a cold abandoned warehouse on Christmas Day. We were fed turkey for dinner, but it wasn't very festive and failed to lift our spirits very much.

"After the early dinner, we were standing in an open courtyard dipping our mess-kits into pots of boiling water to wash them, when we became aware the sun was peeking through. We looked up into the sky and for the first time saw the gloomy clouds beginning to part, replaced by patches of blue sky and a shining sun. Then came a loud drone of motors, and through the parting clouds came wave after wave of American and British bombers, the first able to fly for weeks because of the overcast weather. We stood there with our upturned faces as though watching Santa Claus arriving, and we cheered, shouted, screamed and waved our arms wildly. At last we were able to hit them back with our strongest weapon. What a merry Christmas!

"That night, we were assigned to our permanent units and I joined the Seventh Armored Division. It had taken a bad beating 10 days previous and needed replacements badly. Several days later, we received our orders to retake the town of St. Vith in Luxembourg adjoining Bastogne. After a few days I was withdrawn and sent back to a General Hospital in Paris.

"It was a merry Christmas, but not a very happy New Year."

• **Loony lawsuit update...**

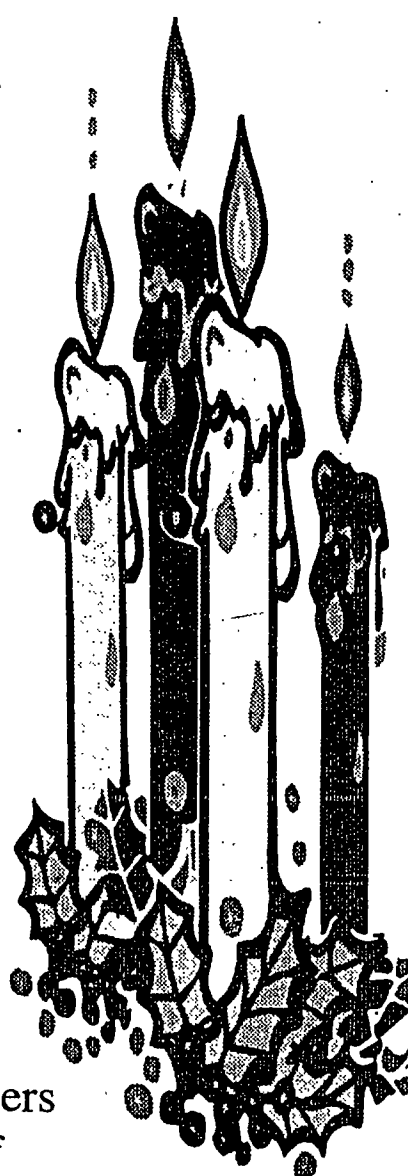

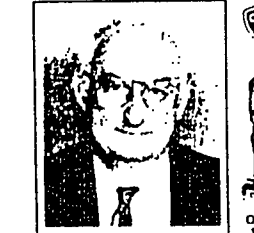

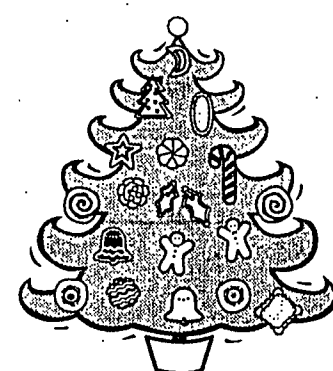
