Niles Library computer lab pro-rate fee plan

by Lisa Ashkenaz Croke

Non-resident patrons of the Niles Public Library could find further incentive to utilize the state-of-the-art facility if the District Board of Trustees approves a proposal to pro-rate Computer Lab fees.

The recommendation from Library Services Manager Linda Weiss was discussed at last month's board meeting. Administer Cary Czarnecki presented the idea to pro-rate the annual \$12 fee for non-residents, giving such patrons the option to pay fees based on three, six or 12-month usage.

The library approved a similar policy in November, allowing library card-holding non-residents to purchase library eards for shorter time periods. Czarnecki said that this was done to encourage participation for the library's summer reading program.

Despite an increase in patrons using the Computer Lab, fees for the year are below budgeted estimates by about \$1,547. In his monthly Administrator's Report, Czarnecki stated that this reflects the increasing number of families

Morton Grove tax levy reduced

Morton Grove village trustees voted to modify tax levies, thereby reducing property tax funds from a gross of \$8.6 million to a net of \$7.8 million, a reduction of \$810,000 for the 2000 tax year.

Higher than expected costs in specific areas require funding transfers within the general fund. These include unexpected legal costs (\$33,000), renovations to the Flickinger Center, to the public works facility as well as to Fire Station #44 (\$70,000), and finally to fire-



Former Maine East student makes it big in songwriting

Born Alfonso Marciante, in Park Ridge, and growing up in Glenview, Al Marcy comes from a family with a rich musical heritage. His great-uncle, Frank Marey, played bass with Louis Prima. Al's grandfather tap-danced, played the violin and sung for the Navy during World Wa II. Al's father, Bob Marcy, being a bandleader and music teacher, started Al off with the drums at the ripe young age of five years old. Education, a future hiring challenge

Research released recently by the Illinois State Board of Education indicates that jobs in administrative school positions will increase over the next few years at a projected 45 percent as current principals retire and leave the field.

Nationally, the Bureau of Labor Statistics has projected that a 10 to 20 percent increase of school administrators will be needed through 2005.

Ben Schwarm, director of governmental relations for the Illinois Association of School Boards, said that recent legislation allows teachers to retire after 34 years with a pension equal to 75 percent of salary, where previously a pension of 75 percent salary accrued after 38

According to the ISBE report, of the 4,439 principals and superintendents assigned during 2000, 24 percent are eligible to retire, and 60 percent of all ad-

Dammrich and Alexander currently serve on the Skokie Park Board of Commissioners, and Ross is on Maine Township's Board of Commissioners, positions they must resign, if elect-

Dammrich described the new party's platform as a multicultuactivism reflective of the community, committed to fighting overdevelopment and restoring a vision of the village they feel has been long ignored by

the incumbent Caucus Party.

The Caucus candidates wil run on their record of 10 years without a property tax increase.

In Lincolnwood, the president spot is vacant after the death of Madeleinc Grant on Nov. 16 and three trustee slots are up for filling. The Lincolnwood Alliance Party has announced its slate with Peter Moy, currently trustee, as mayoral candidate, and with Lawrence Elster, Nicholas Leftakes and Janice Saltz as trustee candidates, plus Carol Krikorian as village clerk candi-

Lincolnwood's Harvey Weintraub, once president of a party that ran a trustee slate in 1999, said the group is considering whether to form a party and run this year. Filing deadline for new parties is Jan. 15-23.





more assertive, or improve our health, or ... well, you fill in the blank. Making a resolution can be one step toward this selfimprovement. And what better time than right

opportunity. All of us have areas

in our lives that we would like to

improve upon. Maybe we want to

be more patient with others, or be

after the holidays? It's a time when family and friends connect at a level rarely seen at other times of the year. We've likely just enjoyed some good times and are feeling good about ourselves and life in general. We're in a good place to make these minor adjustments to our lives.

There are also some things you can do to ensure better success in the resolutions you make. First, be realistic in making resolutions. If you're carrying a few extra pounds, don't resolve to lose it all by the end of January. The goals you establish need to be attaina-

Second, develop a plan that takes into account that your goal requires a change in behavior. Even when we are intentionally trying to change our behavior for the good, we may not be able to do it one hundred percent of the time. We've spent a lifetime learning and perfecting most of our habits - even the bad ones. It's unrealistic to expect them to change instantly.

It can also help to set realistic mileposts. Break big tasks into smaller, more manageable pieces. For example if you are resolving to start or resume exercising, plan on spending a realistic amount of time and effort. Your initial goal might be "to run as much as I can for ten minutes.' Your next goal could then be "to run as much as I can for fifteen minutes," until you hit your ultimate target of running 30 minutes a day or whatever goal is right for

Similarly, if weight loss is your objective, set up achievable minigoals that will help you get to that final goal. A frist goal might be to cut out one high calorie food each day. A second goal might be to replace one high fat favorite with a new fruit or vegetable. Use mini-goals that focus on positive behavioral changes, and use the successes of hitting those mini-goals as a positive reinforcement.

The secret to success with resolutions lies up front, when you are developing them and what you expect from yourself in terms of compliance. Once you have carefully and thoughtfully planned the resolution, you can rest assured that you have begun the process in good fashion and have a better than average chance



### **Senior Prescription Drug Assistance Program**

Seniors ages 65 and older or those who are disabled may now pick up new Circuit Breaker/ Pharmaceutical Assistance Program application forms at Maine Township, 1700 Ballard Road. Park Ridge. The forms are for financial assistance for prescription medication expenses for those who meet income qualifications and certain other criteria.

The state program is administered by Maine Township and those who need prescriptions for heart disease, blood pressure problems, diabetes, arthritis, cancer. Alzeimer's disease. Parkinson's disease, glaucoma, lung disease, or smoking related illness. Individuals must also have an

annual income of \$21.218 or less (\$28,480 for a couple or \$55,740 for a three-person household) to be qualified. Seniors can apply for a Pharmaceutical Assistance Card after they receive their Wothers and provides assistance for 2's, earnings statements, or other

financial information in January each year. Cards cost \$5 for individuals below the proverty level and \$25 for those above it.

With that card a senior can obtain prescription medication for covered diseases with a \$3 co-pay for those with a \$25 card and no co-payment for those with a \$5

After cardholders reaches a \$2.000 annual cap. they must pay 20 percent of costs.

### Make baby's room safe

Most expecting parents start to mentally furnish their baby's room the moment they hear the good news. They decide whether to enlarge an existing room, find space with an architect's help for a completely new room, or to choose the simpler route of painting the room down the hall.

While there is great excitement and fun in gathering ideas for colors, furniture, accessories and window treatments, parents should also consider how they

can make their child's room as safe as possible.

The first five years of a child's life are marked by curiosity. Once children become mobile around eight months or so, it's vital that parents have made their kids' rooms childproof.

Start by looking around the completed room. Do changing tables have safety straps? Are the baby products that you will need for changing easily accessible? Do electrical outlets have child

guards? Do rugs have skid-proof undermats - an important safety consideration for parents and caregivers?

There is one other important area that needs parental attention: the windows. Babies start to stand in their cribs as early as six months. If a crib is near a window, they could reach over the crib railing and become entangled in dangling window cords, leading to a serious accident or even death by stangulation.

For several years now, the Window Covering Safety Council (WCSC) has offered parents and consumers free safety devices for childproofing corded window blinds, shades and draperies. These include retrofit tassels for dealing with looped pull cords on older horizontal blinds and shades, and tie-down devices for securing pull cords on vertical blinds and continuous-draw drapes.

More recently, the Council began offering free cord stops for eliminating the potential innercord strangulation hazard on corded blinds. All of these safety devices are available at no charge to anyone who phones the WCSC hotline at 1-800-506-4636.

However, there are a number of recent window innovations that may make these retrofit safety devices unnecessary. For example, many manufacturers are now producing cordless window coverings.

One of the most talked about is the cordless miniblind. The cordless system is spring-loaded. To raise or lower the blind, all you do is pull down or push up on the bottom bar. Cordless pleaded shades are also gaining in popularity. And if you choose vertical blinds, both the rotation of the vanes as well as the opening and closing functions now can be controlled by a cordless operat-

While the window covering industry is doing everything possible to design safer products, nothing is foolproof," says WCSC Executive Director Peter Rush. "Parents still need to childproof their existing window coverings, and to secure all cords up and away from the reach of chil-

for renovation and repair make it "It's been sad to see it fall into this kind of disrepair," he said.

"I'm hoping for some sort of restoration, but it's kind of a dinosaur now that all of the large theaters have been changed into multiplexes." Rumors are circulating that

Lowe's Cinema, which owns both the Golf Mill theater and the nearby Golf Glen multiplex. plans to tear down the building. (the district manager was out of town and unavailable for comment at press time).

Despite its unarguably shabby appearance, Golf Mill was home to one of the last big screen movie theaters.

Unlike multiplexes, which squeeze at least half a dozen theaters into a building of similar size, Golf Mill only had three screens - two smaller ones at each end, and a good old fashioned forty-footer in the center. complete with a balcony for better viewing, or necking - patron's choice.

I first learned about patience at the Golf Mill theater, while standing in a line that snaked out the front door and around the building.

Star Wars, of course.

A short time later, I joined my grade school class at the theater for a field trip, where we were treated to a surprise preview of The Empire Strikes Back, putting us in the enviable position of knowing before any of ou. friends, or even our parents that Darth Vader and Luke Skywalker were father and son.

I remember going to see Rocky // four times, the first time I'd ever seen a movie more than once (or by myself for that matter). I stood and cheered along with the grownups in the crowded balcony, as if the 15round re-match between Rocky Balboa and Apollo Creed was a real life heavy-weight champi-

In my early teens, I was there when a violent thunderstorm temporarily knocked out the power just as the Gremlins on the screen were wreaking havoc in their own movie theater, making all of us in the audience wonder, for just a moment, if the little monsters had taken over

I grew up in that theater. A few years ago, I went there on a movie date to see Pulp Fiction. with the guy I ended up marrying. A few months ago, I regularly waddled my pregnant self into the theater to escape the

"I knew something was wrong when they didn't have Cast Away on the marquee," my mother-in-law said, as I nodded solemn!v. And it almost hurts like news

of a sudden death. If the theater stays closed there will be no big send off. No last night. And no chance to say goodbye.

to be missing. It is not yet known exactly what was taken from a home that was disturbed sometime between 9:30 p.m. Dec. 31 and 7:15 a.m. Jan. 1 at the 7500 block of Suffield.

The resident's sister told police that she had been coming to the house three times daily to walk the dogs while her sister was away.

Drawers in the master bedroom were opened and empty cardboard jewelry boxes were found on the floor.

Police discovered foorwear prints in the snow coming from the home's front gate, and the back door pried open.

Later on Jan. 1, sometime between 12:15 a.m. and 8:55 p.m., robbers ransacked a home on the 9300 block of Linder, stealing about \$2,000 in jewelry.

A resident at the 9400 block of Overhill returned from a 10day vacation on Jan. 4 to find that his front door had been forced open.

Approximately \$42,000 in valuables were taken, including 16 sets of silverware valued at \$40,000.

Again, police found pry marks on the front door, which had been locked with a deadbolt

Christmas presents left under the tree remained untouched, a detail which further connects the crime to those committed during the holiday week. A boxed DVD player and fur coat were also not taken.

Furs were taken from an apartment robbery at the 8600 block of Ferris, which likely took place on Jan. 4.

The resident was out of the home from 8 p.m. Jan. 2 until 6:47 p.m. Jan. 4. Pry marks were discovered on

both residences' doors. Over \$14,000 in valuables were taken from the first apartment, including \$7,500 in furs, a Lladro figurine valued at \$4,000

and \$3,750 in jewelry. Jewelry and a laptop computer were stolen from the second apartment, for a total loss of over \$8,000.

As each crime is committed, police have been able to gather additional evidence. Furthermore, neighborhoods

are now on the alert, and have been providing authorities with descriptions of vehicles, and/or people seen in the area when the robberies have taken place. Many of the burglaries have

occurred during the afternoon and evening hours. Police suggest that residents take every precaution to make a home look as if it is always occupied. This means keeping lights, televisions, and radios on while the home is vacant.

Community police have joined forces to investigate the crimes, and urge residents to help by keeping vigilant about suspicious activities in their neighborhoods.

#### The Anti-Cruelty Society issues cold weather warnings

As winter sweeps in, The Anti-Cruelty Society would like to remind people that cold weather presents special dangers to their

Most dogs and cats cannot endure the cold of winter for more than a few minutes, despite their fur coats. An animal left outdoors can get frostbite or even freeze to death in a matter of minutes. Signs of frostbite include pale skin that is cool to the touch, and has decreased sensation. If frostbite is suspected, the area should be gently thawed with warm (not hot) water. The animal should then be taken to a veterinarian.

The Anti-Cruelty Society strongly recommends that cats remain inside, away from the dangers of the street, and the cold. During frigid temperatures, dogs should be brought outside for shorter periods of time than usu-

During dog walks, Chicagoans should watch for jagged ice patches and sidewalk salt. Both can be hazards to a dog's footpads. Paws should be thoroughly checked and any salt or ice should be wiped off with a damp towel mmediately after coming in rom a walk




