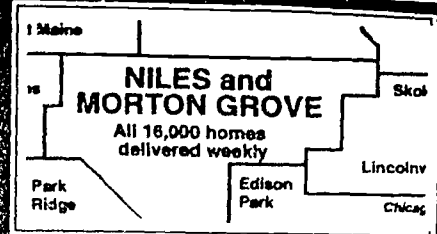

Niles Library computer lab pro-rate fee plan

Non-resident patrons of the Niles Public Library could find further incentive to utilize the state-of-the-art facility if the District Board of Trustees approves a proposal to pro-rate Computer Lab fees.

The recommendation from Library Services Manager Linda Weiss was discussed at last month's board meeting. Administrator Cary Czarnecki presented the idea to pro-rate the annual \$12 fee for non-residents, giving such patrons the option to pay fees based on three, six or 12-month usage.

The library approved a similar policy in November, allowing library card-holding non-residents to purchase library cards for shorter time periods. Czarnecki said that this was done to encourage participation for the library's summer reading program.

Despite an increase in patrons using the Computer Lab, fees for the year are below budgeted estimates by about \$1,547. In his monthly Administrator's Report, Czarnecki stated that this reflects the increasing number of families

Niles Board OKs "boot" (will count to 10 ...)

Ten outstanding parking tickets can now get you "booted," confirms Niles Police Public Information Officer Sgt. James A. Zimmerman.

Although Niles had access to this device for some time, it was unused because enabling ordinance was not in place, Zimmerman said. But the issue did come up at the Village Board's Nov. 28 meeting when an incident pointed to the wisdom of having such a policy in place. As an provision of the new ordi-

nance, only the Niles police can legally apply it to any vehicle in Niles, whether on public or private property.

Certain provisions exist: first, that the registered owner get notice that 10 unpaid parking violations have accrued and a date set to appear for a hearing. If the hearing determines that the owner is negligent and deserves the boot, a second notice is served and an opportunity for a second hearing is made availa-

Morton Grove tax levy reduced

Morton Grove village trustees voted to modify tax levies, thereby reducing property tax funds from a gross of \$8.6 million to a net of \$7.8 million, a reduction of \$810,000 for the 2000 tax year.

Higher than expected costs in specific areas require funding transfers within the general fund. These include unexpected legal costs (\$33,000), renovations to the Flickinger Center, to the public works facility as well as to Fire Station #44 (\$70,000), and finally to fire-

Asbestos discovered and badly in need of repairs, theater could be torn down

IEPA closes down Golf Mill Theater

There's no way to mince words on this one, so I'll just say it straight. After almost 40 years, the Golf Mill movie theater has closed its doors.

"It's kind of an institution in the community," said Niles Village Manager Abe Selman, who told me that the theater was closed by the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency after asbestos was discovered on the premises.

As long time patrons know, the three-screen theater has been suffering from neglect for years.

"We had some problems with maintenance. Chairs needed to be replaced, there was trouble with the bathrooms," said Selman.

The asbestos was discovered during a maintenance inspection just after Christmas. The theater was closed immediately.

Selman said he doesn't know if there are plans to re-open the theater, but added that the costs

On Dec. 30, a family living on the 6500 block of Lyons arrived home and found all of their kitchen cabinets and the front door open.

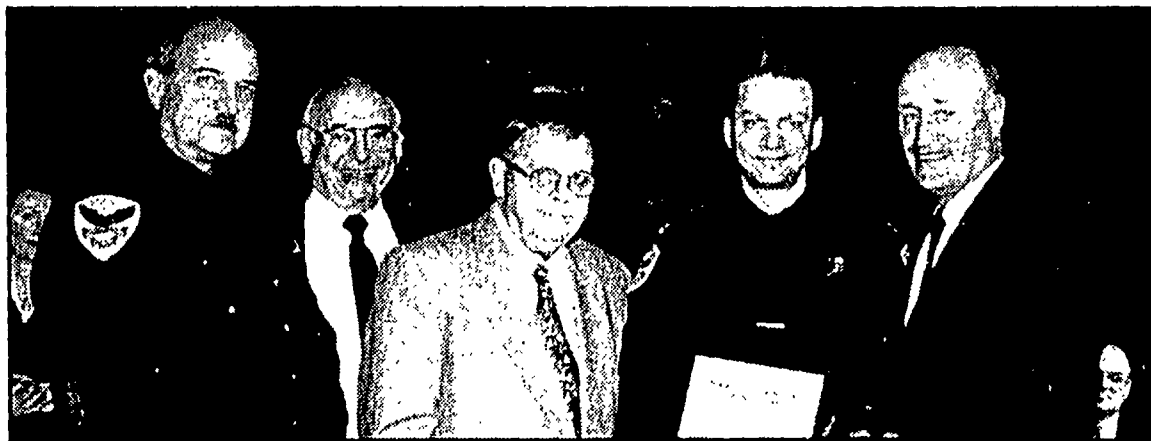
The family told police that

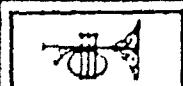
Sheriff awards 'top cops' in Morton Grove

Former Maine East student makes it big in songwriting

Born Alfonso Marciano, in Park Ridge, and growing up in Glenview, Al Marcy comes from a family with a rich musical heritage. His great-uncle, Frank Marcy, played bass with Louis Prima. Al's grandfather tap-danced, played the violin and sung for the Navy during World War II. Al's father, Bob Marcy, being a bandleader and music teacher, started Al off with the drums at the ripe young age of five years old. "I remember banging away on the drums when I couldn't even tie my own shoes," Al says. By the time junior high rolled around, Al



was jobbing around Chicago with his father's quartet and big band and also occasionally jobbed with his band teacher. Al played steadily all through his years at Maine East High School and Oakton Community College. He knew music was something he would always be involved in because it was what he loved, and now living in Joliet, IL, Al continues playing with several different groups around the Midwest to this day.

Al's right-brained, free-thinking, creative juices for song writing have been flowing for many years. Never without a tape recorder or pencil and paper, Al is an idea man. Whether they've been "little ditties" or jingles or songs for children or rock-and-roll songs or sad songs (but mainly fun songs), Al's ideas run the gamut of styles. He began his first

writing/recording adventure in his home studio with "The Big One." This encompassed not only the percussion aspect, but also the beginning of Al's singing career. After completing "The Big One" in 1991, Al followed it up with "Take Two" in 1992 and "Three of a Kind" in 1993. Al said, "At that time I had never intended for any of my work to be taken seriously. I was just experimenting and having fun." Then, in 1998, inspired by a wealth of experiences and topics, Al started on his first, serious project "Eclipse." The song styles on "Eclipse" range from rock to swing to funky jazz to ballads. Although he takes pride in his originality, Al's song writing styles have been compared to the likes of Paul Simon, Randy Newman, Lyle Lovett and Phil Collins.

The "Eclipse" album brought Al a contract to be published through Black Rose Productions located in New York and New Jersey, and sub-published through BMG Corporation. All nine songs from the "Eclipse" album, plus four songs from Al's prior recordings have been published. "I thought the rock songs I had worked on would be what would catch a publisher's ear, but, in fact, the light-hearted, kiddie-style songs that come the most naturally to me had been what they were were most interested in because of their wide, even international, audience appeal," said Marcy.

In between gigs, any free time Al has is writing time and studio time. Al's next album "Monologic" is already in the works.

Petitions available for District 63 school board candidates

Nominating petition forms for the April 3, 2001 school board election in East Maine School District 63 are now available. Forms may be picked up in the office of the Board Secretary, at 10150 Dee Road, DesPlaines, on any business day between 7:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m.

A school board candidate's petition must be filed in the same office no earlier than 7:30 a.m., Tuesday, January 16, 2001, and no later than 5 p.m., Tuesday, January 23, 2001. Candidates' names will appear on the election ballot in the order in which their nominating papers are received in the secretary's office. Five (5) seats on the seven-member Board of Education will be filled at the

April 3, 2001 election. Four seats are for four year terms, ending April, 2005. One seat is for a two year term, ending April, 2003.

To be eligible to serve, a school board member must be, on the date of election, a citizen of the United States, at least 18 years old, a resident of the State of Illinois and the school district for at least one year immediately preceding the election, and a registered voter. Elections are non-partisan and board candidates are not required to indicate a political party affiliation. Candidates should be aware of financial conflict-of-interest limitations set forth in the School code.

Education, a future hiring challenge

Research released recently by the Illinois State Board of Education indicates that jobs in administrative school positions will increase over the next few years at a projected 45 percent as current principals retire and leave the field.

Nationally, the Bureau of Labor Statistics has projected that a 10 to 20 percent increase of school administrators will be needed through 2005.

Ben Schwarm, director of governmental relations for the Illinois Association of School Boards, said that recent legislation allows teachers to retire after 34 years with a pension equal to 75 percent of salary, where previously a pension of 75 percent salary accrued after 38 years.

According to the ISBE report, of the 4,439 principals and superintendents assigned during 2000, 24 percent are eligible to retire, and 60 percent of all administrators are over age 50.

District 64's superintendent, Fred Schroeder, recognizes the problem, as does District 63's Kathleen Williams.

Sizing up local elections

With our national election that overflowed into December finally over, we can look ahead to municipal elections April 3.

In Skokie, the entire village government—all six trustees plus the mayoral slot—are up. The incumbent Skokie Caucus Party will run George Van Dusen for mayor and four of the incumbent trustees—Michael Geller, Frank McCabe, Donald Perille and Harry Piper. Incumbent village clerk, Marlene Williams, will also run again. Trustees Robert Fritzshall and Manly Croft have chosen to not run and their ballot slots will be taken by Michele Bromberg and Randall Roberts.

An opposition party, the Community Vision Party, will offer a slate to voters, it was announced Dec. 11. Thom Dammrich is mayoral candidate. Trustee candidates are Deborah Alexander, Mohammed Farooqui, Ellen Lyon McHugh, Judith Rae Ross, Ferdinand P. Soco and Alan Slodki, with Ellen J. Scheer as village clerk candidate.

Dammrich and Alexander currently serve on the Skokie Park Board of Commissioners, and Ross is on Maine Township's Board of Commissioners, positions they must resign, if elected.

Dammrich described the new party's platform as a multicultural activism reflective of the community, committed to fighting overdevelopment and restoring a vision of the village they feel has been long ignored by

the incumbent Caucus Party. The Caucus candidates will run on their record of 10 years without a property tax increase.

In Lincolnwood, the president spot is vacant after the death of Madeleine Grant on Nov. 16, and three trustee slots are up for filling. The Lincolnwood Alliance Party has announced its slate with Peter Moy, currently trustee, as mayoral candidate, and with Lawrence Elster, Nicholas Leftakes and Janice Saltz as trustee candidates, plus Carol Krikorian as village clerk candidate.

Lincolnwood's Harvey Weintraub, once president of a party that ran a trustee slate in 1999, said the group is considering whether to form a party and run this year. Filing deadline for new parties is Jan. 15-23.

The ruling Action Committee of Morton Grove has not yet announced its slate for president and the three trustee slots, but it is expected that Mayor Dan Scanlon, along with trustees Teresa Liston, James Karp and Larry Gomborg, will be on it. Village Clerk Eileen Winkler will not seek reelection. No opposition to the ruling party is expected.

Residents are pleased with the program's first phase, which was finished this summer, that included resurfacing, landscaping, new curbs and water main, intersection widening and lighting along the 7300 block of Monticello.

Phase two will begin in 2001 and will cover about 6,600 feet of improvements to sections of Central Park, Lawndale, Ridgeway, Chase, Jarvis and Hamlin Avenues.

Is it Worth Making New Year's Resolutions?

We all make them every year. That resolution to lose weight, to stop smoking, to eat healthier, to improve a relationship...the list is long and varied. Some of them we manage to keep - most we soon break. But do New Year's Resolutions really matter? More importantly, are there times when New Year's Resolutions can actually be harmful?

The first of every year brings

with it a sense of being able to begin anew. It offers a good psychological opportunity to examine where we are and to set some goals for things we would like to change. As innocent as that sounds, however, for some people making resolutions can carry a negative potential.

From a mental health point of view, resolutions can carry harm because of what we do to ourselves if we fall short of our goals. If we take this failure to

comply as yet one more example of how weak we are as a person or how bad life is for us in general, then those New Year's resolutions have probably eroded our self-confidence and that could be harmful.

Most of us don't assign that much significance to a New Year's resolution, but some people do. For someone who truly feels that he or she has "failed" when a resolution has been broken, it might be a good reason to

talk with a licensed professional counselor and discuss why not being able to fulfill a resolution is so troubling.

For most of us, however, resolutions can offer a very positive opportunity. All of us have areas in our lives that we would like to improve upon. Maybe we want to be more patient with others, or be more assertive, or improve our health, or...well, you fill in the blank. Making a resolution can be one step toward this self-improvement.

And what better time than right after the holidays? It's a time when family and friends connect at a level rarely seen at other times of the year. We've likely just enjoyed some good times and are feeling good about ourselves and life in general. We're in a good place to make these minor adjustments to our lives.

There are also some things you can do to ensure better success in the resolutions you make. First, be realistic in making resolutions. If you're carrying a few extra pounds, don't resolve to lose it all by the end of January. The goals you establish need to be attainable.

Second, develop a plan that takes into account that your goal requires a change in behavior. Even when we are intentionally trying to change our behavior for the good, we may not be able to do it one hundred percent of the time. We've spent a lifetime learning and perfecting most of our habits - even the bad ones. It's unrealistic to expect them to change instantly.

It can also help to set realistic mileposts. Break big tasks into smaller, more manageable pieces. For example if you are resolving to start or resume exercising, plan on spending a realistic amount of time and effort. Your initial goal might be "to run as much as I can for ten minutes." Your next goal could then be "to run as much as I can for fifteen minutes," until you hit your ultimate target of running 30 minutes a day or whatever goal is right for you.

Similarly, if weight loss is your objective, set up achievable mini-goals that will help you get to that final goal. A first goal might be to cut out one high calorie food each day. A second goal might be to replace one high fat favorite with a new fruit or vegetable. Use mini-goals that focus on positive behavioral changes, and use the successes of hitting those mini-goals as a positive reinforcement.

The secret to success with resolutions lies up front, when you are developing them and what you expect from yourself in terms of compliance. Once you have carefully and thoughtfully planned the resolution, you can rest assured that you have begun the process in good fashion and have a better than average chance of success.

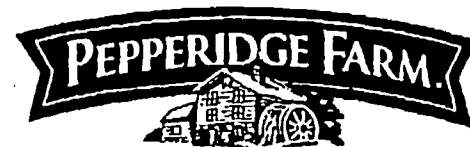

Senior Prescription Drug Assistance Program

Seniors ages 65 and older or those who are disabled may now pick up new Circuit Breaker/Pharmaceutical Assistance Program application forms at Maine Township, 1700 Ballard Road, Park Ridge. The forms are for financial assistance for prescription medication expenses for those who meet income qualifications and certain other criteria.

The state program is administered by Maine Township and others and provides assistance for

those who need prescriptions for heart disease, blood pressure problems, diabetes, arthritis, cancer, Alzheimer's disease, Parkinson's disease, glaucoma, lung disease, or smoking related illness.

Individuals must also have an annual income of \$21,218 or less (\$28,480 for a couple or \$55,740 for a three-person household) to be qualified. Seniors can apply for a Pharmaceutical Assistance Card after they receive their W-2's, earnings statements, or other

financial information in January each year. Cards cost \$5 for individuals below the poverty level and \$25 for those above it.

With that card a senior can obtain prescription medication for covered diseases with a \$3 co-pay for those with a \$25 card and no co-payment for those with a \$5 card.

After cardholders reaches a \$2,000 annual cap, they must pay 20 percent of costs.

Forms may be picked up at Town Hall, Monday through Friday, from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.. For further information, call the General Assistance Office of Maine Township at (847) 297-2510, ext. 236.

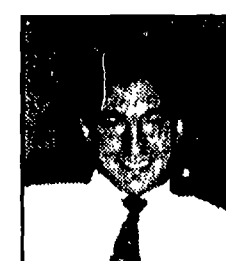

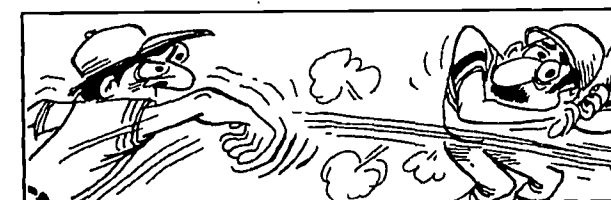

Dist. 71 considers changes to school holidays

The school board of District 71 has given its approval to eliminate four school holidays.

Superintendent Eugene Zalewski said that of the 12 holidays on which schools are required to close, the district now has the option to eliminate Lincoln's birthday, Martin Luther King's birthday, Casimir Pulaski Day and Columbus Day.

Zalewski said the point here is to bring the nine elementary districts and the high schools into line "to get similar holidays." District 219 (Niles West and

Niles North) has already approved a waiver for those holidays, Zalewski said, adding that the total number of school days would not be affected by elimination of these holidays.

A public hearing has been scheduled for 8 p.m. on Jan. 16 for any objections from the public to be heard. The proposed waiver will then be put to either the State Board of Education or the General Assembly for state approval, Zalewski said.

If approved, any calendar changes would take place next school year.

Make baby's room safe

The first five years of a child's life are marked by curiosity. Once children become mobile, around eight months or so, it's vital that parents have made their kids' rooms childproof.

Start by looking around the completed room. Do changing tables have safety straps? Are the baby products that you will need for changing easily accessible? Do electrical outlets have child

guards? Do rugs have skid-proof undermats - an important safety consideration for parents and caregivers?

There is one other important area that needs parental attention: the windows. Babies start to stand in their cribs as early as six months. If a crib is near a window, they could reach over the crib railing and become entangled in dangling window cords, leading to a serious accident or even death by strangulation.

For several years now, the Window Covering Safety Council (WCSC) has offered parents and consumers free safety devices for childproofing corded window blinds, shades and draperies. These include retrofit tassels for dealing with looped pull cords on older horizontal blinds and shades, and tie-down devices for securing pull cords on vertical blinds and continuous-draw drapes.

More recently, the Council began offering free cord stops for eliminating the potential inner-cord strangulation hazard on corded blinds. All of these safety devices are available at no charge to anyone who phones the WCSC hotline at 1-800-506-4636.

However, there are a number of recent window innovations that may make these retrofit safety devices unnecessary. For example, many manufacturers are now producing cordless window coverings.

One of the most talked about is the cordless miniblind. The cordless system is spring-loaded. To raise or lower the blind, all you do is pull down or push up on the bottom bar. Cordless pleated shades are also gaining in popularity. And if you choose vertical blinds, both the rotation of the vanes as well as the opening and closing functions now can be controlled by a cordless operating system.

"While the window covering industry is doing everything possible to design safer products, nothing is foolproof," says WCSC Executive Director Peter Rush. "Parents still need to childproof their existing window coverings, and to secure all cords up and away from the reach of children."

Saving money on energy can be a gas

- Protect against drafts by caulking and weather stripping around windows and doors.

- If you are thinking of adding a fireplace, consider adding one fueled by propane. Propane fireplaces are said to heat more evenly and burn more efficiently than wood-burning models.

- You may save more than 10 percent on your hot-water bill by turning down your water heater from the standard 140 degrees to 130 degrees.

- To extend your water heater's life and increase energy efficiency, drain and clean your water heater every six months.

- Ranges that use propane gas with electronic ignition systems will use 40 percent less energy than a standing pilot system.

Tips on breathing easier at home

for renovation and repair make it unlikely.

"It's been sad to see it fall into this kind of disrepair," he said. "I'm hoping for some sort of restoration, but it's kind of a dinosaur now that all of the large theaters have been changed into multiplexes."

Rumors are circulating that Lowe's Cinema, which owns both the Golf Mill theater and the nearby Golf Glen multiplex, plans to tear down the building. (The district manager was out of town and unavailable for comment at press time).

Despite its unarguably shabby appearance, Golf Mill was home to one of the last big screen movie theaters.

Unlike multiplexes, which squeeze at least half a dozen theaters into a building of similar size, Golf Mill only had three screens - two smaller ones at each end, and a good old fashioned forty-footer in the center, complete with a balcony for better viewing, or necking - patron's choice.

I first learned about patience at the Golf Mill theater, while standing in a line that snaked out the front door and around the building.

Star Wars, of course.

A short time later, I joined my grade school class at the theater for a field trip, where we were treated to a surprise preview of *The Empire Strikes Back*, putting us in the enviable position of knowing before any of our friends, or even our parents that Darth Vader and Luke Skywalker were father and son.

I remember going to see *Rocky II* four times, the first time I'd ever seen a movie more than once (or by myself for that matter). I stood and cheered along with the grownups in the crowded balcony, as if the 15-round re-match between Rocky Balboa and Apollo Creed was a real life heavy-weight championship.

In my early teens, I was there when a violent thunderstorm temporarily knocked out the power just as the Gremlins on the screen were wreaking havoc in their own movie theater, making all of us in the audience wonder, for just a moment, if the little monsters had taken over Golf Mill.

I grew up in that theater. A few years ago, I went there on a movie date to see *Pulp Fiction*, with the guy I ended up marrying. A few months ago, I regularly waddled my pregnant self into the theater to escape the summer heat.

"I knew something was wrong when they didn't have *Cast Away* on the marquee," my mother-in-law said, as I nodded solemnly.

And it almost hurts like news of a sudden death. If the theater stays closed there will be no big send off. No last night. And no chance to say goodbye.

Banking papers had also been gone through, but none appeared to be missing.

It is not yet known exactly what was taken from a home that was disturbed sometime between 9:30 p.m. Dec. 31 and 7:15 a.m. Jan. 1 at the 7500 block of Suffield.

The resident's sister told police that she had been coming to the house three times daily to walk the dogs while her sister was away.

Drawers in the master bedroom were opened and empty cardboard jewelry boxes were found on the floor.

Police discovered footwear prints in the snow coming from the home's front gate, and the back door pried open.

Later on Jan. 1, sometime between 12:15 a.m. and 8:55 p.m., robbers ransacked a home on the 9300 block of Linder, stealing about \$2,000 in jewelry.

A resident at the 9400 block of Overhill returned from a 10-day vacation on Jan. 4 to find that his front door had been forced open.

Approximately \$42,000 in valuables were taken, including 16 sets of silverware valued at \$40,000.

Again, police found pry marks on the front door, which had been locked with a deadbolt.

Christmas presents left under the tree remained untouched, a detail which further connects the crime to those committed during the holiday week. A boxed DVD player and fur coat were also not taken.

Furs were taken from an apartment robbery at the 8600 block of Ferris, which likely took place on Jan. 4.

The resident was out of the home from 8 p.m. Jan. 2 until 6:47 p.m. Jan. 4.

Pry marks were discovered on both residences' doors.

Over \$14,000 in valuables were taken from the first apartment, including \$7,500 in furs, a Lladro figurine valued at \$4,000 and \$3,750 in jewelry.

Jewelry and a laptop computer were stolen from the second apartment, for a total loss of over \$8,000.

As each crime is committed, police have been able to gather additional evidence.

Furthermore, neighborhoods are now on the alert, and have been providing authorities with descriptions of vehicles, and/or people seen in the area when the robberies have taken place.

Many of the burglaries have occurred during the afternoon and evening hours. Police suggest that residents take every precaution to make a home look as if it is always occupied. This means keeping lights, televisions, and radios on while the home is vacant.

Community police have joined forces to investigate the crimes, and urge residents to help by keeping vigilant about suspicious activities in their neighborhoods.

The Anti-Cruelty Society issues cold weather warnings

As winter sweeps in, The Anti-Cruelty Society would like to remind people that cold weather presents special dangers to their pets.

Most dogs and cats cannot endure the cold of winter for more than a few minutes, despite their fur coats. An animal left outdoors can get frostbite or even freeze to death in a matter of minutes. Signs of frostbite include pale skin that is cool to the touch, and has decreased sensation. If frostbite is suspected, the area should be gently thawed with warm (not hot) water. The animal should then be taken to a veterinarian.

The Anti-Cruelty Society strongly recommends that cats remain inside, away from the dangers of the street, and the cold. During frigid temperatures, dogs should be brought outside for shorter periods of time than usual.

During dog walks, Chicagoans should watch for jagged ice patches and sidewalk salt. Both can be hazards to a dog's footpads. Paws should be thoroughly checked and any salt or ice should be wiped off with a damp towel immediately after coming in from a walk.
