District 71 to place tax hike referendum

Niles Elementary School District 71 is asking taxpayers for more funding so programs and services need not be cut, it was learned.

At a meeting Tues., Jan. 16, the board agreed to place a referendum on the April ballot seeking a 3.8 percent tax increase to benefit the schools. If the referendum is approved, property owners will be asked to vote on a proposed hike in the educational tax fund rate from 1.125 to 1.375, according to superin-

tendent Eugene Zalewski.

The district is losing about \$500,000 each year, according to Zalewski. If this continues, the district will be out of money

Zalewski says the district has been running on reserves left over prior to 1994, the year when tax caps were instituted. Otherwise, the district would have asked for additional funding then, he added.

Niles rebates surplus utility taxes

Niles Mayor Nieholas B. Blase announced that the Village of Niles is rebating the windfall portion of its utility tax on natural

Niles residents will receive a credit of \$15 on their next water bill to offset the extra tax generated by this winter's higher gas rates.

The Village currently has a tax rate of 3% on retail natural gas purchases. The \$15 rebate is the tax that would be paid by a homeowner for a gas increase of \$500 over the current heating season.

For most residents, the rebate will be given in the form of a eredit on the next residential water bill. Condominium residents that do not have individual water bills will receive their rebate by a check to the condo association. Any other residents not served by Village water will receive a check via US mail.

The total amount rebated Village-wide will be approximately

Bail set at one million dollars for each murder suspect

Murder of Morton Grove teen linked to Ecstasy

A Maine East student, Vu Hoang, 16, was found in a farm field near Elgin, dead from a shot in the head, last November.

Investigators provided some answers Wed. Jan 25 when they announced murder charges against two reputed Asian gang members who allegedly trafficked in the drug "Eestasy." Charges have been brought against Artit Changyaleket, 20, and Quang Nguyen, 22, who are believed to be mid-level leaders in the Laotian Posse, a Chicago area street gang. The two thought that Hoang had stolen \$10,000 worth of Eestasy from them, plus eash, or that he knew who did, said Cook County Sheriff Michael F. Sheahan. They killed Hoang to intimidate

whoever ripped them off, Sheahan said, adding that each gave a statement implicating the other.

Changyaleket was detained at an apartment on the North Side,

and Nguyen was picked up in far west suburban Wayne last week. Each will be held on \$1 million bail.



With emergency workers, traffic's the worst

home recently that public servants, such as fire fighters, police, and paramedies, are perhaps as endangered on the street as they are by the job itself, when it means performing in a traffic setting.

That's not news. Niles District Chief Erwin Fleisehmann says, "It's been a concern for the ... 28 years I've been here." He added, "When there is an aceident it ereates an inconvience for drivers, but that inconvenience may mean the safety of our workers."

Those words recall Chicago firefighter Scott Gillen who died recently after been struck at an accident scene by a motorist.

"It's just one more thing to worry about while you're on the scene," says Lieutenant William White of Niles Fire Department. The public may ignore sirens and speed through intersections in an effort to beat the emergency vehicle. And elderly people may get confused and stop in the middle of the road, causing another obstacle.

White, who has driven emergency vehicles in the past, eites from the "Rules of the Road" section that instructs motorists to "always yield to emergency and police vehicles using sirens and or flashing lights."

Niles Finance Director George Van Geem said that Niles levies a 3 percent tax on each utility bill--telephone, electric and natural gas. He makes a guesstimate of \$10,000 additional to the general fund.

The movement of utility tax income is definitely "upward." In 1999, the village realized \$225,000; in 2000, slightly over \$390,000; and in 2001, projections are \$480.5. Van Geem adds that in 2000, a "use" tax was introduced that allows placing a tax onto gas suppliers oth-

Removing the tax temporarily, similar to the break we got on gasoline tax this past summer, is not seen as something that will happen. State Sen. Dave Sullivan (R-28) admits that a temporary repeal was discussed, but adds, "We didn't even vote on it in the Senate beeause we knew it wouldn't be passed in the House."

But Sullivan says the State of Illinois did approve expanding the number of state residents who are eligible for low-income heat bill assistance by raising the qualifying income for the LI-HEAP program by 25 percent. This raised the previous guideline of 125 percent federal poverty guideline to 150 percent federal poverty guideline. For a family of four, the qualifying income has increased to \$25,575.

About my Nicor gas bill: From 10-16 to 11-13-2000 my bill was \$59.52, which was fine.



"How much are we supposed to take?"

It's been reported in the newspapers and on television that heating bills in the Chicago area have more than doubled compared to the same time period last year. Nicor officials readily admit that the price consumers are now paying is 95 cents per therm versus 37.5 cents per therm last year. That's a 253% increase in cost per therm, which is simply passed on to the customer by Nicor officials. Given these facts, is t any wonder why heating costs have more than doubled this year? 



Norwood Park Home withdraws petition to amend Planned Development #107

Norwood Park Home, 6016-20 N. Nina Ave., Chicago announed on Jan. 22, 2001 the withdrawal of its petition to amend Institutional Planned Development #107 from further consideration by the 41st Ward Zoning Advisory Board. In a letter to Ald. Brian Doher-

ty (41st), Marcia Mahood, president/chief executive officer of Norwood Park Home, stated that the "Home no longer has a contract interest in the Our Savior Lutheran School real estate" and will not make "a presentation at the February 7, 2001 meeting." The February meeting would have been the fifth appearance of Norwood Park Home before the 41st Ward Zoning Advisory

"We want to thank members of the 41st Ward Zoning Advsiory Board for their patience and professionalism as well as our own Board members, employees and community residents who took time to speak in support of our efforts at Zoning Board meetings," said Mahood. "We are very grateful to all of them.

"Because of a vocal minority, the whole process lost focus," continued Mahood. "The Home's original petition only asked to amend the Our Savior parcel to our Planned Development at the current .95 FAR (Floor Area Ratio). We intended to complete our planning process and present final plans and drawings in two years. The community forced the Home to produce hypothetical renderings. It even forced the Home to produce financial justification for the amendment something that has never been requested by anyone else appearing before the Zoning Board. We believe it is a travesty that a handful of vocal obstructionists can be so disruptive as to derail a project whose sole purpose is meet the needs of Norwood Park area sen-Mahood said that the "Home

continues to believe that it is in the best interest of the entire community to have permitted the Home's requested changes to zoning," but "timing is such that the Home could not adequately and reasonably respond to the PAZE (People Against Zoning Exploitation) proposal." She added that the Home is grateful for the efforts put forth by PAZE in drafting and presenting its counterproposal but pointed out certain "unworkable" elements" given our time constraints."

In citing specifics, Mahood noted that "the PAZE proposal reires that we significantly reduce the size of any prospective strategic plan is completed.



Groups press for probe on strategy of gas purchases

The Northwest Municipal Conference (NWMC), along with the South Suburban Mayors and Managers Assn., will file a petition on the Illinois Commerce Commission requesting an investigation of both Peoples Gas and Nicor's purchasing practices. NWMC will join with the City of Chicago and Cook County in this action, said

Dave Bennett, NWMC director. "We felt this was necessary because of the drastic increases in natural gas prices," said Paul Keller, Park Ridge City Attorney who will draw up the necessary papers for the NWMC. And we want the gas companies to change the way they want

customers to pay their bills, he

Are the gas utilities' purchasing strategies keeping prices as low as possible?

The strategy calls for the utilities to stockpile gas reserves during summer months and lock in prices with long-term contracts. Those close to the situation are now asking if the utilities have used this method as effectively as possible.

The ICC checks each year whether natural gas utilities

have made "prudent" purchases of product, and this year the Citizens' Utility Board and the Chicago Department of Environment plan to look into that matter as well. The ICC can order a utilitity to pay customers money back, if it decides a utility made a bad deal.

The NWMC also supports a bill to make more low-income households eligible for assistance to pay heating bills, Bennett said. The bill provides that households with an income up to 50 percent above federal poverty level may apply for state assistance for home heating costs.

the Wisdom Bridge (1990) at the Atlanta Public Library, and the Column of the Free Spirit at the Frederik Meijer Gardens and Sculpture Park in Grand Rapids, Michigan. He has participated in numerous exhibitions in museums and galleries, and his works are in the collections of major museums in the United States and abroad.

In 1971, the Museum of Modern Art in New York exhibited a retrospective of his work, and in 1996, his sculpture Farmer's Dream was transferred from the collection of the Museum of Contemporary Art in Chicago to the White House for the fourth session of the series, "Twentieth Century American Sculpture."

The Oakton exhibit explores a significant motif in Hunt's artistic vocabulary -- wings -- which represent transformation, spirituality and especially, freedom, a concept the artist relates to on many levels.

"As an African-American living in the United States, obviously issues like segregation laws, the civil rights movement in the 1960's and South Africa were on my mind when I dealt with the concept of freedom," says Hunt. "But freedom also relates to my career as an artist: fredom of mind, thought and magination. On the artistic level, freedom was a significant principle in the earlier arts movements such as surrealism or abstract expressionist. And, more recently, public art turns into an issue of universal free-

Hunt's use of winged forms based on mythological themes is reflected in several of his works, including Serpentine Winged (1981), a 19-inch bronze sculpture that is part of Oakton's permanent collection. Inspired by the figure of the ancient Minoan Snake Goddess who holds a snake in each of her hands, the sculpture features a snake crawling from the ground over the figure's dress and uplifted wings -like those of the victory goddess, Nike -- in place of hands, representing the victory of freedom and spirituality.

You open the newspaper and see the article -- a company in which you own stock has produced a defective product. Consumers are alarmed. The government is investigating. It's an investor's worst nightmare. Or is

Product difficulties are only one of the factors that can affect a company's stock performance. Here's the first thing to remember: Don't panic. Don't make hasty decisions based on today's headlines. There are at least two good

First, if the media have been spotlighting a company's bad news, it's likely that the stock price isn't just down -- it may be way down. And as you'll recall, the basic rule of investing is to "buy low and sell high." If it's at all possible, you'll usually want to avoid selling a stock when its price is low.

The second reason you shouldn't immediately sell a stock hit by bad news is that the reason for the downturn may be transitory. A defective product can be remedied, or even removed from the market. A change in management could turn out to be for the better. Litigation could end favorably. In other words, once the ailment is remedied, the stock could regain its health -- meaning the price could bounce back.

That's why it's essential that you look beyond a stock's short-term woes. It may be hard to ignore the commotion surrounding a dose of bad publicity, but you must do just that if you're investing for the long term. Your investment representative can help you evaluate your stock's long-term prospects. Are its financial fundamentals still basically sound? Does it have a line of products that, in general, enjoys a competitive advantage within its industry? Is it in a business that's poised for significant growth?

If you can answer "yes" to these questions, then you'll most likely want to maintain your long-term, buyand-hold outlook. In fact, you may want to use the downturn as an opportunity to buy more shares.

To put yourself in a position in which you can turn bad news to your advantage, however, don't pin all your hopes on any one stock. You should have other holdings to fall back on while the temporarily troubled stock has time to recover. That means you need to maintain a diversified portfolio -- one that contains a good mix of stocks, bonds, government securities and "cash" instruments, such as money market funds. Diversification provides you with a variety of growth and income opportunities, while helping you "dilute" the effects that bad news can have on a single stock.

Armed with a long-term perspective and a diversified portfolio, you'll be prepared if trouble comes visiting one of your stocks. And, as is the case in all walks of life, preparation is a cornerstone of success.

Niles seniors now meet in a new lab and work in comfortable surroundings on 15 brand new computers in an expanded program launched Jan. 12 at the Center. All classes are full and have waiting lists.

That earlier offering was a kind of "grass roots" effort, in the sense that it developed from ambitious staffers who invested their sweat equity. And when the six units were set up, the seniors came. "The response was way beyond what village elders anticipated," said Bill Shaw, one of the original planners. After the successful start, village manager Abe Selman came around asking when we planned to enlarge. "That was essentially a green light ... to create what we've got today," Shaw said.

Common myths about cardiac arrest

Myth#1-Sudden cardiac ar- one or more of the following: rest and heart attack are the

False. Sudden cardiac arrest is a condition in which the heartbeat stops abruptly and unexpectedly. All of its causes are not known. but it can result from a heart attack, respiratory arrest, electrocution. drowning, choking. trauma, or it can have no known cause. Sudden cardiac arrest may occur independently from a heart attack and without warning signs. Sudden cardiac arrest results in death if not treated immediately.

A heart attack is a condition in which a blood clot suddenly blocks a coronary artery, resulting in the death of heart muscle supplied by that artery. Heart attack victims usually experience chest pain and usually remain conscious. Heart attacks are serious and sometimes lead to sudden cardiac arrest, but they are not the

If you or someone you know experiences the symptoms of cardiac arrest or a heart attack, call 9-1-1 immediately.

Myth #2 - There is no way of knowing whether a person is in cardiac arrest.

False. During sudden cardiac arrest, a person could experience

False. Cardiovascular diseases are the No. 1 cause of death. They annually kill more Americans than the next seven leading causes of death combined, including cancer, accidents, pneumonia, influenza, diabetes and suicides.

Heart attack is one of the primary causes of cardiac arrest. Each day more then 95 percent of Americans who suffer sudden cardiac arrest die before reaching the hospital. This equates to over 600 deaths each day or 225,000 deaths annually.

The American Heart Association estimates that at least 50,000 lives could be saved each year if the sudden cardiac arrest national survival rate could be increased from the current 5 percent to 20 percent or higher. The survival rate can be increased if Americans take three important steps:

· Know the warning signs of cardiac arrest in order to recognize a medical emergency.

· Call 9-1-1 immediately to access the emergency medical system.

The First Dental Visit: What to Expect

A child's first trip to the dental is allowed to ride up and down in office is an important milestone often recorded in the baby book. meet the dentist and staff. If parents spend a little time preparing for the "big day" with their child, the office visit can go smoothly and without much fuss.

Experts agree that dental care is important to a child's health and should begin at an early age. As a result, the child will develop dental health habits leading to a lifetime of good oral hygiene.

"For the vast majority of children, age 3 is the ideal time for the first visit to the dentist - unless there is an immediate problem that needs to be addressed," said Louis Imburgia, DDS, a general dentist who practices in north suburban Park Ridge.

What happens on the first visit? Dr. Imburgia said the first visit often focuses on getting acquainted with the child and parents. counting and polishing ("tickling") the teeth, letting the child sit in the chair and look at the dental equipment, providing fluoride treatment for any permanent teeth, and answering a parent's questions. He said most dentists provide a small toy for the child at the end of the visit.

"If parents can read a book about a child's first visit to the dentist - prior to the appointment - this can be very helpful," said Dr. Imburgia, "The child will have a good understanding of what to expect and not be scared."

The Chicago Dental Society (CDS) and Dr. Imburgia have some recommendations to help parents with the first dental visit.

· Begin planning the first visit as soon as possible. The earlier the visit, the better the chance of preventing dental problems. Most dentists recommend a visit ut age 2 or 3, unless a problem develops and a dentist must be seen

Lock guns up, up and away

Guns are not toys and should be respected. If you own a gun, remember your responsibility to take appropriate steps to store and handle firearms. Accidents can be avoided by following these

1.If you own a gun, unload it and store in a safety storage device, out of the sight and reach of children. Make sure children cannot get the keys or combination of the locked storage area where your gun is kept.

2.Lock bullets and cartridges in a safety storage device in a sep-

3. Never assume ANYTHING about a gun. All guns should be considered loaded.



requirement, allowing a health service spa and restaurant to proceed at 8468 Golf Road, former site of Women's Workout World. The offering will be modeled after Oriental spas, with separate facilities for men and women. According to the petitioner's presentation, massages will not be offered. The restaurant facility is planned to seat 50 patrons.

The board voted to enter into and authorize execution of a transition plan and service agreement for Niles to join a newly reorganized intergovernmental emergency dispatch center, joining the communities of Morton Grove, Northbrook, North Maine, Prospect Heights, Winnetka and Highwood. The reorganized emergency dispatch center will be housed at Northbrook Fire Station #12.

After discussion, the board passed a resolution to allow Notre Dame High School's \$6 million bond program to issue under the umbrella of the Village of Niles. Trustee Murphy introduced discussion when he pointed out, with a \$10 million total, the village would limit its own ability to issue bonds to a \$4 million cap for the balance of 2001. George VanGeem, village finance officer, stated he sees no need for the village to issue bonds for the balance of this year, and the vote passed over

Trustee Murphy's objection. This action will allow Notre Dame to get a lower rate. The village has the ability to provide such assistance and doing so creates no liability for the village, says Village Attorney Jo-

A second referendum would allow the district levy to be a higher rate next year, Zalowski said. If the referendums do not pass, fees for educational programs, such as book rental lunch prices and activity fees, may increase. Certain teaching positions will also be eliminated.

The last time Niles taxpayers were faced with a referendum placed by District 71 was in 1995, Zalewski said. That involved funds for the remodeling and expansion of Culver School.

Informational meetings about the referendum will be held from February to April.




