



Be prepared for cardiac emergencies

Sudden cardiac arrest kills about 225,000 Americans yearly -- over 600 a day. To reduce those numbers, February has been designated American Heart Month, a yearly observance that encourages people to learn the warning signs of cardiac arrest and take quick action in an emergency. The Cook County Department of Public Health (CCDPH) and the American Heart Association (AHA) have teamed up to remind residents of what to do in an emergency.

When a person goes into cardiac arrest, a 7-10 minute window of opportunity exists to save their lives. The American Heart Month 2001 message is: Be Prepared for Cardiac Emergencies. Know the warning signs of cardiac arrest. Call 911 immediately. Give CPR.

1. Know the warning signs of cardiac arrest so you recognize it when it occurs. Arrest may happen suddenly and dramatically. When the heart goes into arrest, it's electrical impuls-

es become chaotic. This irregular heart rhythm, called ventricular fibrillation, causes the heart to stop suddenly. A cardiac ar-•collapse and lose conscious-

stop normal breathing; ·lose pulse and blood pres-

Cardiac arrrest may be caused by heart attack, electrocution, drowning or trauma, or may have no known cause.

2. Call 911 immediately upon recognizing any cardiac arrest warning signs.





As many as half of the children and siblings of individuals with diseased coronary arteries may have signs of atherosclerosis, even though they have no symptoms of heart or vessel disease, according to a study in today's Circulation: Journal of the American Heart Association.

'We've known that family history is a risk factor for heart disease, however that relationship has been associated with secondary risk factors such as high cholesterol, hypertension and diabetes," says K. Lance Gould, M.D., professor of medicine at the University of Texas Medical School at Houston.

"It appears that family history alone can carry the same weight as the standard risk factors through mechanisms we do not understand," he says. "What's important is that we can find early disease in these family members long before it causes symptoms and we can offer intense preventive and reversal treatment."

Gould says doctors can find heart and blood vessel disease early in these high-risk individuals - before it has caused any clinical signs such as a heart attack, tron emission tomography (PET) Positron emission tomography is a highly accurate, non-invasive

Don't Let Probate Get You...Twice

Almost everyone dreams of someday owning a little log cabin on river in Montana or a beachfront condo in California or Florida. For some, a simple timeshare will do, or maybe you want to retire to Arizona and play golf and retain your family home as a rental property. Perhaps your family has property that has passed down from generation to generation and you want to continue that tradition Many people end up owning more than one piece of property ir their lifetime, and often those properties are not located in the same state. As if estate planning weren't confusing enough, what can you do when you own an interest in real estate in another state?

If you have a will or die intestate and you own an interest in rea property in states other than where you reside, your family may face several difficulties. When you have a will, your property must pass through probate so that the titles to all property can be changed. This property includes real estate as well as your bank accounts, retirement accounts and other assets. For each state in which you own property, your will must go through probate. For example, if you live in California and own that fishing cabin on a river in Montana, the California probate judge can't alter the title on your fishing cabin. A Montana probate judge must change the title. So, even i you're lucky enough to have the probate process in California finish quickly, your probate in other states may take longer and cost more. Some states have inheritance taxes that may apply in addition to the federal estate tax. For example, Montana may also tax your property as well. Your family may not be able to afford to keep that fishing cabin you worked so hard to buy because of both probate fees and state inheritance taxes. Not every state has these additional death taxes, but you shouldn't have to check the death laws in a state before you buy a piece of property.

The same challenges apply to family lands and homes. If you haven't planned properly, your children or grandchildren could be forced to sell real property you intended for them and for their children's children because of high probate fees and estate taxes. If you think this is unlikely because your family would want to honor your wishes and could find another way to pay these fees, think again. Many people who are property rich are cash poor and may use that real estate to cover costs. However, there are ways to protect your out-of-state property from probate just as you protect your other as-

A living trust avoids costly probate, invasion of your privacy and guarantees that your wishes are carried out. A good estate planning attorney will also help you find ways to protect as much of your estate as possible from estate taxes that range anywhere between 37-55%. Even if you have property in Montana or in any of the other seventeen states with similar inheritance taxes a well-crafted estate plan can save you and your family money and time. The key is that you need to find the trust by transferring title of that out-of-state property along with your other property. If the trust isn't funded, then it's useless and any property not transferred to the trust is not protected by that trust. Any property not in the trust will go through probate in the state in which it is located.

There are also other ways to protect your property. But, before you make any decisions, talk to a qualified estate planning attorney. It is much easier for you to take care of your estate plan now, regardless of how many states it covers. Once you're gone it could take years and cost a bundle for your family to take care of it if you don't properly plan for their future.



Do you know where all your IRAs are?

Actually, the answer may be trickier than you would have thought. Over the years, you may have started IRAs with a variety of financial institutions. You could have a traditional IRA at one place and a Roth IRA at another. If you're self-employed, you also may own a Simplified Employee Pension (SEP) IRA. To complicate matters further, your spouse also could have multiple IRAs at multiple locations.

Is there anything really wrong with having all these IRAs all over the place? After all, what difference

does it make where they are, as long as they're (hopefully) still growing?

Actually, it could make a considerable difference to you. For one thing, you could lose track of some of these IRAs. And if you think things like that don't happen, just ask any bank, brokerage or insurance company how much time and effort they've spent trying to track down the rightful owners of savings accounts, stocks and insurance policies. Through death, divorce, moves and other factors, owners and heirs of valuable assets get separated from their property -- and sometimes they never get it back.

You may think this will never happen to you and your IRAs. And maybe it won't. But even if you know exactly where all your IRAs are, that doesn't mean it's a good idea to have them all spread out. You may want to consolidate them -- in other words, keep all your IRA accounts at one financial institution.

Consolidation offers some potentially significant advantages. There's the reduced paperwork, for starters. Instead of having to deal with multiple statements from different companies, you'll only have one. Also, you may be able to reduce the fees you're paying to maintain all your IRAs. By consolidating them, you should be able to pay just one fee to one institution.

Saving paperwork and fees are two of the most obvious benefits of consolidating IRAs. But there's another one that may be just as important: tracking your required minimum distributions. If you have a traditional IRA, you will need to take required minimum distributions beginning at age 70-1/2. With all your count, it will be easier for you to keep tabs on these distributions -- and on how much money you have left after the distributions are made. Also, some financial-services companies will even calculate the distributions for you: You'll find these calculations extremely useful in helping you map out your finances during retirement. Keep in mind that, if you're already over age 70-1/2, you'll have to take your required

minimum distribution for the current year before you transfer your IRA.

Ethnic diversity and national customs were just a few of the experiences shared by sixth graders during a religion lesson at St. John Brebeuf School.





Reading - Two important ways parents can help

A tip from: Michele Boyer, M.Ed - Educational Specialist/ St. John Brebeuf

I am often asked for suggestions by St. John Brebeuf parents who want to do something to help and encourage their early reader. There are two areas which research has shown as areas important to good reading development. These areas are also both ones in which the parent can help significantly.

First, reading fluency or lack thereof, can be based in the amount of modeling the student had been exposed to. Although some students can have high levels of comprehension even if their reading is characterized with slow labored rendering of a passage, this is not often the case. Speed does matter. One way which parents can help their young reader to improve reading rate, is to access the stories on tape. These are available in most libraries or they are available for purchase, at most book stores. A book and taped reading thereof are packaged together. The child can read along as he/she listens to the tape. Progress toward fluency will be the result. It is imporatnt to choose books that are at the child's age or grade level. If it is a well loved book, the child will listen and read along many times. This will give the experience of modeling, correct phrasing and

Second, studies have shown that the missing link between phonics and comprehension is vocabulary. I saw this frequently in my previous job as a reading

Niles resident's suggestions on snow plowing

Let me commend the Public Works Department on the speed with which the streets were cleared of snow during our blizzard of 2001 and other periods of



Look Ma, no cords...

Whether shopping for toasters or alarm systems, Americans want their homes to feature the latest in modern technology.

When it comes to window coverings, there are plenty of choices to satisfy even the most technologically savvy consumer.

Quickly climbing the charts of favorite innovations is the cordless miniblind. On the market for several years now, the cordless miniblind gives a clean and modern look to a room.

In a recent survey of consumers who were purchasing miniblinds, the overwhelming majority specifically chose to go cordless. The most frequently mentioned reason was their sleek, uncluttered look, but many noted that freedom from cord worries was an important selling point.

The movement toward eliminating cords on window coverings began about six years ago, when the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission addressed the increasing number of children accidentally strangling on window cords.

The Commission found that too often parents had placed cribs or other furniture underneath windows. Infants and young children in cribs were then able to reach a dangling cord and unknowingly wrap the cord around their neck and head area. Toddlers and older children were found tangled in window cords after climbing onto beds or other furniture to look out a nearby window.

To address the problem, the U.S. window covering industry began redesigning all window blinds, shades and draperies for improved cord safety, eventually

leading to many of today's cordless products. In addition, the industry created the Window Covering Safety Council to educate consumers about cord safety.

The Council currently provides consumers with window covering safety information as well as free cord safety kits. These kits include replacement tassels to childproof older window coverings with looped pull cords; tie-down devices for vertical blinds and continuous-loop draperies; and cord stops to childproof all types of corded horizontal blinds. Consumers can order kits at no charge by phoning the Council's hotline at 1-800-506-

But as Peter Rush, executive director of the Council explains, "nothing is foolproof. Parents sill need to childproof their existing window coverings and to secure all cords up and away from the reach of children."

Home-care tips for dry skin

(NAPS)-For people with seasonal or year-round, dry skin, the colder months can be especially hard on the skin. As you spend more time indoors, your skin is exposed to low indoor humidity created by forced-air heat. Dry air can cause skin to become dry, as can excessive bathing with strong soaps and hot water.

"As we age, our skin produces less of the natural oils that help skin retain moisture," said Peter J. Plantes, M.D. "Without good care, the skin can become red, and infections. The lower legs, forearms, hands and scalp are especially prone to dry skin as they are most exposed to seasonal weather."

LaurusHealth.com, a health information Web site, offers consumers a few simple steps to help prevent or aid in alleviating dry skin and itching:

· Humidify your home, particularly the bedroom.

Avoid strong detergents. Limit use of perfumes and perfumed products.

· Bathe every other day instead of every day. Use warm or cool water and a gentle soap (such as Basis, Dove, Oil of Olay). Use little or no soap on dry skin areas. Pat dry with a towel: don't rub skin.

• To seal in moisture, apply a moisturizer (Eucerin, Lubriderm, Keri Lotion or Vaseline Intensive Care Lotion) while the skin is damp. Petroleum jelly also is an effective and inexpensive moisu-

• For very dry hands, apply a thin layer of petroleum jelly and wear thin cotton gloves to bed Similar treatment also may help dry feet. Severely dry skin may require several treatments.

Untreated dry skin can be a sign of other health problems, said Dr. Plantes. "If your body itches all over and you do not have a rash or any obvious cause for itching, contact a health pro-



made from cellular phones. The center proposed for Northbrook would still require such calls to be routed through state police or the county sheriff's department. Glenview sees such handling as an extra step and not a desirable way to handle emergencies. Glenview's plans call for handling such calls through its own

Another wrinkle was RED Center's policy of one vote per municipality, while assigning charges on a per-call basis. This works against Glenview because of its larger population, said village manager Paul McCarthy. Although Glenview was paying some 22 percent of the bill, the village was allowed only one vote, he said.

Another factor is the RED move out of Glenview to Northbrook. Putting new money into a center located outside the village does not seem wise with village's police facilities already overcrowded and needing action

Morton Grove fire chief Ralph Czerwinski, chairman of the present RED, summed up the two positions. Morton Grove feels it makes more sense to pay a percentage of an RED center operation than to go it alone.

But Czerwinski admits that Glenview is alot bigger than Morton Grove and has more stations to maintain.

"I don't think public safety will be jeopardized. It's just a business and philosophical difference on how calls will behandled," said Czerwinski.

Glenview's new center is scheduled to open in July.

The present RED will remain at that site until its move to Northbrook in September.
