## Village receives \$69,000 check



### **Niles PD: "training** prevents racial profiling"

In an earlier interview with the Niles Journal. Niles PD Public Information Officer Sgt. James Zimmerman said that figluing racial profiling calls for a program built around training, education and awareness conditioning, and is not solved by kéeping statisties around traffic arrests.

Since then. Niles police officers have anended two such sessions in-house, with a third scheduled for March.

The sessions grew out of a three-day seminar on police liability that Zimmerman along with Chief Gerald Sheehan attended last October. The two were so impressed with both the program and its presentor that they arranged to present it to the Niles force.

The presentor, Laura Scarry. is a lawyer who specializes in

police liability cases. She was formerly a Lake County police

Scarry developed a program that contained both case law and policies tailored specifically to he Niles PD.

"Scarry." said Sheehan. "is very knowledgeable on the subject." She is one of a handful of auorneys nationwide defending police departments against charges of racial profiling.

In regard to the seminar, Zintmerman said. "She did a fantas-

Scarry summarizes that within the last year she's educated approximately 1.000 police officers, from pairol officers to police chiefs and even village administrators."

### Glenview political parties face off over raffle

A raffle that was held to benefit Glenview's "Glenview Good Government" party (shortened as G3) was illegal, claims opponent party, "Unite Glenview."

The opponent's complaint is one of tinting. Illinois law requires that a political party be established for one year before holding a raffle, whereas, says a spokesman for "Unite Glenview." it has only been in existance for two months. The parshould have applied for a raffle license, but did not.

The party's chairman, Mark Ganchiff, apologized for the omission, saying, "Our auorney is taking care of the paperwork, and we are returning the money raised---less than \$500. We are sorry for the mistake."

The duration is the issue. Glenview parties historically change their names for each village election. By name changing, they avoid state requirements to hold local party primaries, said former village president Jim Smirles.







## Choosing a tax preparer

(NAPS)--Enlisting an Enrolled Agent can keep April 15 from becoming too taxing a time for you. Enrolled Agents (EAs) are tax practitioners empowered and licensed by the federal government to represent you before all administrative levels of the Internal Revenue Service. Unlike attorneys or CPAs -- who may or may not choose to specialize in taxes -- all EAs specialize in taxation.

Remember, not all tax practitioners are created alike. CPAs and tax attorneys earn their credentials through recognized professional channels. Their license to practice, however, comes from the individual states where they work.

EAs, a select group of highly trained and extraordinarily experienced tax professionals, must demonstrate critical technical competence in the fields of Taxation to the Internal Revenue Service before they can represent taxpayers. The EA designation is earned in one of two

(1) An individual must pass a difficult, two-day examination administered by the IRS which covers taxation of individuals, corporations, partnerships, estates and trusts, procedures and ethics. Then, a successful candidate is subjected to a rigorous background check conducted by the Internal Revenue Service.

(2) An individual may become an EA based on his or her employment at the Internal Revenue Service for a minimum of five years in a job where he or out the year.

In addition to their stringent testing and application process, Enrolled Agents are required to complete 72 hours of continuing professional education -- reported every three years -- to main-





### Capital gains tax planning: The long and short of it

Most of us can't escape the fact that we have to pay taxes, but one tax we can control is the capital gains tax. That's because the amount of capital gains tax incurred is triggered by whether and when you sell capital assets. Read what the Illinois CPA Society has to say about how effective tax planning can reduce or, capital gains tax bill.

A eapital gain is the profit that can result from buying and selling capital assets. To compute your capital gain, you subtract your basis (the cost of the asset, plus the expenses associated with buying and holding it) from the net proceeds you realize from the sale. Under current law, if you've held the property for more than one year, your gain or loss is a long-term capital gain or loss. If, on the other hand, you've held the property for one year or less, your capital gain or loss is short-term.

The Taxpayer Relief Act of 1997 lowered the long-term capital gains tax rates. The maximum capital gains tax rate on most long-term capital gains is 20% (10% for those in the 15% tax bracket). Under prior law, the maximum rate was 28% and 15% respectively. (The long-

term capital gain tax on collectibles such as artwork, rugs, trading cards, stamp and coin collections, and memorabilia remains at 28%). Short-term eapital gains are taxed at the taxpayer's ordinary income-tax rate, which could be as high as 39.6%.

#### New Rules to Take Effect January 1, 2001

Beginning January 1, 2001. the capital gains tax rate is lowered to 18% (8% for those in the 15% bracket) for assets held more than 5 years. For those in the 15% bracket, assets held prior to January 1, 2001 are eligible for lower rates, provided they are held for more than 5

years. To qualify for lower capital gains rates, those in tax brackets above 15% must acquire the asset after December 31, 2000 and hold it more than

Higher-bracket taxpayers who want to apply these lower rates to assets held on December 31, 2000 may do so by electing to treat the asset as sold on January 1, 2001 (or the next business day) for its fair market value and paying the tax due on the gain. Under this election, the five-year holding period would begin on January 2, 2001. You cannot recognize a loss under these

Capital Gains Taxes

There are a number of strategies that taxpayers can employ to reduce capital gain taxes. The first requires absolutely no effort on the taxpayer's part. Just hold on to your capital assets. It's that simple. Your stock may soar from an initial price of \$2 pershare to \$200 a share, but you don't owe a dime on its appreciated value unless you sell it.

A second strategy involves planning. If you have a taxable capital gain in any one year and some losing investments in your portfolio, selling them can help offset your taxable gain and reduce your overall tax bill. You begin by matching short-term losses against short-term gains and long-term losses against long-term gains. Then, if you have an overall net loss, you may deduct it from ordinary income (i.e., your salary) up to a maximum of \$3,000 in one year (\$1,500 if you're married filing separately). If your loss is greater than what you're allowed to deduct, you may deduct the excess in later years. Be sure to avoid the "wash sale" rule, which states that you cannot claim a loss from the sale of security if you buy the same security as a replacement within 30 days before or after the sale.

With the third stategy, rather than selling assets, you give them a way. When you donate appreciated property that you've charity, you may be able to deduet the fair market value and avoid capital gains tax on the appreciation. In general, there is a this type of gift of 30% of your AGI. Any excess may be carried over for five years. A similar strategy calls for gifting your child, age 14 or over, the appreciated assets. Presuming that your child is in a lower tax bracket than you are, he or she would owe less in taxes when the property is sold. "Our goal is to get the word out about RxAssist to providers across the country," notes H. Denman Scott, MD, VIH's program director and Chief of Medieine at the Memorial Hospital of RI. Continues Dr Scott. "RxAssist was developed to take, as much as possible, the guessing out of applying for these programs, which may undergo changes in format, and procedures without notification of potential applicants. Providers tell us that applying for these programs is very time-consuming. They are more likely to invest the time if they can access the latest information on how to apply, particularly as these programs are one of the few options available for access to medication for uninsured and lowincome individuals."

## Jump-start your love life

The hoopla over Viagra -- including 1996 presidential candidate Bob Dole's televised endorsement -- was embarrassing for some. But all that publicity made it easier for people to speak frankly about male sexuality, and for men with impotence, to ask for treatment. Impotence, also called erectile dysfunction, is a condition in which men have difficulty getting or keeping an erection. An occasional incident of impotence is perfectly normal. Stress, too much alcohol, medications, and medical conditions can dampen a sexual encounter. But if impotence is a recurring problem, talk to your doctor about treatment

Most cases of impotence -- up to 90 percent -- are caused by a physical or medical condition. Hypertension, heart disease, diabetes, stroke, neurological problems, medication side effects, alcohol abuse, and smoking can all contribute to impotence. Since these conditions are more common in older men, impotence rates increase with age. Between 15 and 25 percent of men over 65 have a form of impotence.

The outlook for men with impotence is excellent: up to 95 percent of men who seek treatment regain normal sexual function.

Natural Love Potions Aphrodisiacs -- foods, aromas, or even ideas that can stimulate sexual desire -- have been around for centuries. Some people turn to herbal products, such as ginseng, oat extract, and yohimbe, to enhance sexual desire or function or both. But studies have not proven that these herbal products work, and they may cause side effect. Consult a doctor before treating yourself with herbs -- especially if you have another medical con-

Ginseng has been used as an aphrodisiac for hundreds of years. But there's no reliable evidence that it works. Ginseng's possible side effects include diarrhea, skin cruptions, sleeplessness, nervousness, and high blood pressure.

Oat extract is found in several products that purport to improve sexual function. Some herbal manufacturers report that it has been clinically proven to stimulate and enhance sexual function and response. But independent scientific studies have not confirmed this. Oat extract is generally well tolerated with few reported side effects.

For many years, yohimbe, derived from the bark of an African tree, has been promoted as an aphrodisiac and studied in the treatment of impotence. However, recent studies concluded that yohimbe does not work. Yohimbe can cause anxiety, high blood pressure, stomach upset, and trouble sleeping. For this reason, yohimbe is not recommended for men who have high blood pressure or sensitive stomachs.

Other reports suggest that ginkgo can increase blood circulation throughout the body and, thus, enhance erections. Medical studies have yet to verify such claims. Adverse effects of ginkgo include headaches and stomache

Prescription For Love Several prescription medications have been proven to help treat impotence. Viagra (generic name sildenafil), Caverject, and Muse are effective treatments for impotance. Alprostadil is the active ingredient in both Caverject and Muse. But these two alternatives are not taken orally, so many men find Viagra, which is administered as a tablet, to be the

Reports show that Viagra increases sexual ability in 65 to 88 percent of men who use it. In most cases, you take a 50-mg pill one hour before sexual activity. Viagra works by helping the penis fill with enough blood to cause an erection. Sexual stimulation is also needed for an erection -- Viagra won't cause an erection on its own.

Your doctor may adjust the Viagra dosage to impove effectiveness or avoid side effects. People with heart conditions, bleeding disorders, or stomach ulcers should not take Viagra.

Caverject is a liquid medication that you self-inject into the penis using a syringe and needle. Must is a small suppository that you insert into the opening in the tip of the penis. Use Muse or Caverject approximately ten minutes before sexual activity to help achieve an erection.

Reports claim that Muse works in approximately 65 percent of men, and Caverject works in up to 87 percent of men. The effects of these medications generally last 30 to 60 minutes. The actual time will vary from person to person, though. Potential side effects of these drugs can include localized pain and hypotension.

Only one of these products should be taken at a time, and only one dose in any 24-hour pe-





### **Meet the Beetles: Nutrition Mysteries Explained**

Despite all that is known about foods, certain questions keep coming up again and again. Here's the truth behind some of those "mysteries."

Why do I get a headache when I don't eat?

"Hunger headaches" can be caused by muscle tension and low blood sugar, which results in the swelling of blood vessels in your scalp and around your brain. Prevention: Avoid strenuous dieting... don't skip meals... healthy between-meal snacks. Avoid bingeing on sugary snacks, since coming down from a "sugar high" can bring on headache.

What makes my stomach growl?

That's simply your stomach or upper intestinal muscles contracting to move food and digestive juices down the digestive tract. It happens whether or not food is present -- but more often when you're hungry,

What causes "ice cream headaches"?

That short, sharp pain results when the roof of the mouth is rapidly cooled, affecting nerve endings that trigger headaches --

the same nerves that trigger toothaches. To avoid: eat frozen foods slowly, warming them in the front of your mouth first to allow your palate time to adjust.

Are watermelon seeds edi-

Absolutely. In China, for example, watermelon seeds are often roasted, salted and eaten like popcorn. Like most seeds, however, they're high in fat and calories -- 536 calories in 3.5 ounces. 67% from fat.

Is it true that some artificial colorings are actually made from bugs?

Yes. Rosy-colored "eachineal extract" and "earmine" are made from the dried shells of female beetles. They're common in beverages (such as ruby red grapefruit juice), yogurt, pasta, ice cream, candy, soup and bakery toppings. But don't worry: both are considered safe by the Food and Drug Administration.





#### The Good, the Bad and the **Triglycerides**

You're probably familiar with "good" and "bad" cholesterol. Low density lipoprotein (LDL) cholesterol, the bad kind, clogs arteries and deprives your heart of oxygen. High density lipoprotein (HDL) cholesterol, the good kind, sweeps harmful fatty deposits out of your arteries.

But for your heart's sake, there's another word you should know: triglycerides.

What Are They?

Triglycerides are fats in the blood that provide energy. They come from the foods you eat and from your liver.

The problem is, high triglyceride levels are almost always accompanied by low HDL cholesterol levels. That's bad, since low HDL levels are a risk factor for heart attack.

In fact, many researchers now believe that high triglyceride levels -- defined as over 400 mg/ dl with 200-400 mg/dl termed "borerline high" -- is a marker for a heart attack. Levels normally range from 50-200 mg/di. What Should I Do?

If you learn that your triglyceride level is high, losing weight, cutting down on saturated fat, quitting smoking and exercising an neip, as does eating more itsi high in omega-3 fatty acids. Interestingly, some research shows that exercise before a fatty meal may lower triglyceride levels af-

The bottom line: The lower your triglycerides and the higher your HDL levels, the better for your heart.





Prepaid tuition programs -- In a prepaid tuition plan, you buy future tuition credit -- at today's prices -- at an in-state, public school.

Tax-deferred savings plans -- Under these plans, your earnings grow tax-deferred until you withdraw the money to pay for qualified higher education costs. Withdrawals are then taxed at the student's tax rate, which will typically be lower than yours.

Of the two arrangements, the tax-deferred savings plan is far more popular because it doesn't restrict students to certain colleges in specific states, as does the prepaid tuition plan. In other words, you can invest in any state's plan. Also, you'll receive several other significant benefits, including the following:

You can contribute large amounts. Generally, you can contribute more than \$100,000 per year to a 529 plan, although contribution limits vary by state. You may want to consider the applicable gift tax rules.

You control withdrawals. If you're the account owner of the 529 plan, you'll manage all withdrawals for the life of the account. The student doesn't automatically take control of the assets at the age of majority. You can even change beneficiaries, if you choose.

• You'll minimize the impact on financial aid awards. Because the money in a 529 plan is held in your name, it won't significantly jeopardize any financial aid packages your child or grandchild may receive. Colleges generally require students to contribute 35 percent of their assets to pay for school, compared to less than 6 percent for parents.

The 529 plan offers some important benefits. But make sure you use your plan strictly for college. If you make a withdrawal for anything other than higher education expenses, you may have to pay taxes and a 10 percent penalty on the earnings at your tax rate. Also, keep in mind that different state plans choose different money managers -- so you might want to research the organization that's investing your money.

But if you're satisfied that you've found a good 529 plan, give it some careful consideration -- it can help you cope with the high costs of higher education.

### **Parent-teen communications - when** to seek help

As noted in previous columns, communications between teens and their parents are often a difficult issue for a variety of reasons. Teens want to look mature and responsible in their parents' eyes. They may believe talking about problems or anxieties will stop that from happening. At the same time, parents want to protect their teens and not give too much fredom too quickly -- a source of conflict that often leads to communication difficulties. Yet parental fears and hesitancy are often justified, especially in a society that offers so many opportunities and so many dangers.

It is not surprising that such a relationship often leads to strained or almost non-existent communication. Yet it is clear that a great deal of this conflict between teen and parent is often unavoidable, simply a normal part of human development. Within that "normal" level of disagreement, frustration and stress, as parents, most of us recognize how important it is to keep the lines of communication open. You need to keep talking with your kids.

But sometimes we may find that "normal human development" may not cover changes in behavior and communications that we see with our teens. An important question is how to tell the difference between what is normal and what is a sign that outside help may be needed. When serious communication difficulties arise between the teens and parents, it is time to look at the behaviors and stresses leading to those difficulties. There may be indicators as to whether things are within the "normal" range, or if more serious problems exist.

Take notice when your teen. either physically or emotionally withdraws from the family, begins consistently breaking previosly agreed upon rules; doesn't follow through with family chores, or shows other negative and growing changes in behav-

You may notice that there has been a change in the groups of friends, a drop in grades at school, or sudden changes in dress or appearance. Your teen may become increasingly argumentative over small issues. Such behaviors, coupled with communication difficulties, can be an indicator that something serious may be wrong. If you notice any of these things, ask yourself the following questions:

•Was the onset of this communication or behavioral problem sudden or over a period of time? A sudden onset may be situational, something due to an outside force or recent event, and is more likely to resolve itself with a little patience on the part of the parent. However, if things have gotten progressively more difficult, that could be an indication that help is needed.

•Are the difficulties in your relationship escalating or occuring more often? If the intensity and frequency of the flare-ups are increasing, it may mean that help is needed.

•Are the stressful episodes lasting longer than usual? You may need outside help if the duration is increasing and out of proportion for the actual event that caused the difficulty.

Parents also need to ask if they are contributing more to the problem than to the solution. There may be events or circumstances in their own lives that are contributing to their overall stress load and thus magnifying the difficulty with the teenager.

But if it appears that your teen would benefit from outside help, where do you turn? A good place to start is with the school counselor. These professionals understand what is "normal" and what is an indication that help is needed for teenagers.

A second source of help is in the Community Mental Health Center. You will find a variety of well-trained mental health professionals who will be able to be of assistance in working through some of these communication problems.

A third source of help can be found in private practitioners.





### **Sheriff introduces "3-D" program** for high school students



Cook County Sheriff Michael F. The Sheriff's "3D Program" (Drinking + Drugs = Destruction) is available to schools throughout Cook County.

Cook County Sheriff Michael F. Sheahan announced recently that his office is offering an interactive educational exhibit for high school students which illustrates the dangers of drinking and

The "3-D Program" (Drinking + Drugs = Destruction) is a firstof-its-kind, hands-on simulation designed to give teens a whole new perspective on how using drugs or alcohol can affect a person's ability to drive and perform simple physical tasks.

According to both national and state studies, alcohol-related crashes are the number one cause of death among young people between the ages of 16 and 24. During a typical weekend in the United States, an average of one teen dies every hour in a crash, with almost 50 percent of the accidents involving the use of alcohol.

The "3-D Program" contains six separate hands-on exhibits that students go through in a 50minute time frame. The first is called "The Convincer," which is a mechanism that simulates an actual auto collision at 7 miles per hour. Two crash test dummies are placed in the Convincer, one wearing a seatbelt and one without. The display shows that even at a slow rate of speed, injuries in a collision can be severe.

Four exhibits involve the use of the "Fatal Vision" goggles, · which simulate being intoxicated at various levels of impairment. Students are asked to perform a wide variety of tasks both with and without the goggles to give them a personal understanding of the difference between performing tasks while sober or intoxicated. Wearing the goggles, students walk a straight line, shoot a basketball, drive a golf cart and playa video driving game.

In addition, students will be exposed to the latest in advanced technology utilitzed by law enforcement in DUI enforcement. This includes a demonstration of an instrument called "Eye Check," a non-invasive test that can be performed to provide an immediate read on a person's alcohol, drug or fatigue level. In addition, students will view a "Dead

or Alive" computer simulation that utilizes their own personal data such as sex, weight, car type and speed to simulate an auto accident and the resutling collision.
