Mayor Blase keeps his title

Election night in Niles found Mayor Nicholas B. Blase looking forward to an 11th mayoral term and saying he looks forward to the next challenge.

ward to the next challenge.

Blase won again, his 3,790 votes defeating Leonard R. Reinebach, with his 631.

Reinebach expressed disappointment at the outcome. as well as failure of the School District 71 referenda to pass. He intends to continue participating in local and state elections, he said.

Blase said his goal is to maintain the current lifestyle for Niles residents, to keep property taxes low and to maintain present services for residents.

Three village trustees were reelected with Blase---Robert Callero. Andrew Przybylo and Louella Preston.

District 71 referenda both defeated

Niles voters rejected both District 71 referendums April 3, which was especially disheartening for two newly elected District 71 board members. Bart McGuinn and Karen Johnson.

The defeat was the result of misinformation, said Johnson. Leaflets distributed claimed that the referendums would "cost a bundle," but Johnson disagrees, saying it would increase taxes about \$71 for a homeowner with a property valued at \$150,000.

Another untruth circulating before the election was that superitendent Dr. Eugene Zalewski, earns a "huge" salary. Board president John Zuckerman said that Zalewski earns half of what most North Shore school superintendents make.

Acupressure wristbands seem to be affective for about 50 percent of people who use them.

There are many things to do in your yeard and garden in April. Following is a short list of remin-

Gardening Tips

 Your bulbs will continue to pop up and bloom. After they bloom be sure to let their foliage ripen! That means allow the foliage to die away on its own - do not cut it back, tie it in knots or otherwise destroy it! The foliage provides food for the bulb allowing it to grow and produce a flower the next season. Once the foliage is completely brown, then it is time to cut it back.

• If you are planning to install a new garden area, or revamp an old one, now is the time to do your bed preparation. If your soil is poor, you should work an organic material (like mushroom compost) into the soil when you do your bed preparation. Application rates can very depending on your soil type. An ICN Pro at your local garden center will be able to help you determine the amount your soil re-

• Perennials will be arriving at your local garden center throughout the month of April. Most of the perennials can be planted beginning in April. Some perennials will tolerate cold better than others so to be absolutely certain, ask the ICN Pro at your garden center. Visit your local garden center frequently to see what new perennials are in bloom! There will be something new almost EVERY week!

When planting your annuals you need to think about the danger of frost. Some annuals, Tips.

crabgrass can be seen. A common practice is to apply lawn fertilizer and crabgrass preventer at the same time. This is a granular formulation that can be applied with a spreader. Some garden centers will have a spreader available for your to borrow or rent.

April is a good month to sow your grass seed. Remember that you CAN NOT apply crabgrass preventer on your newly seeded areas!

 Towards the end of April you can spray the weeds that are growing in your yard. It is a good idea to wait until the end of April to spray weeds because by then most of the weeds are actively growing.

• Fruit trees need to be sprayed before they bloom and then again after they bloom. It is very important that you DO NOT spray while the tree is in bloom! Spraying at this stage will kill the pollinating insects, including honeybees, and severely reduce your fruit production!

April is the month for treat for Peach Leaf Curl. If you have Cherry, Apricot or other Prunus species they need to be sprayed before the buds break. Products that are effective are Lime Sulfur and Captan. If you have questions, an ICN Pro at your local graden center will be able to help

Sheriff's office unveils 3-D program

Cook County Sheriff Michael F. Sheahan unveiled the "3-D Program," an interactive first-ofits-kind educational exhibit the Sheriff's Office has developed for high school students to illustrate the dangers of drinking and driv-

The "3-D" (Drinking + Drugs = Destruction) allows students to participate in a series of interactive simultations designed to give them a whole new perspective on how using drugs or alcohol can affect their ability to drive and perform simple physical tasks. The program was launched at Evergreen Park Community High School in the south suburbs, where more than 350 students completed the course.

According to both national and state studies, alcohol-related crashes are the number one cause of death among young people between the ages of 16 and 24. During a typical weekend in the United States, an average of one teen dies every hour in a crash, with almost 50 percent of the accidents involving the use of alcohol.

Students participating in the program will go through a series of hands-on exhibits, including the wearing of so-called "Fatal Vision" goggles, which simulate the affect of being under the influence of drugs or alcohol. The goggles were donated to the Sheriff's Office for the program by the Mothers Against Drunk Driving (MADD) organization.
The "3-D Program" contains

six separate hands-on exhibits that students go through in a 50minute time frame. The first is called "The Convincer," which is a mechanism that simulates an actual auto collision at 7 miles per hour. Two crash test dummies are placed in the Convincer, one wearing a seatbelt and one without. The display shows that even at a slow rate of speed, injuries in a collision can be severe.

Four exhibits involve the use of the "Fatal Vision" goggles, which simulate being intoxicated at various levels of impairment. Students are asked to perform a wide variety of tasks both with and without the goggles to give them a personal understanding of the difference between performing tasks while sober or intoxicated. Wearing the goggles, students walk a straight line, shoot a basketball, drive a golf cart and play a video driving game.

In addition, students will be exposed to the latest in advanced technology equipment utilized by law enforcement in DUI enforcement. This includes a demonstration of an instrument called "Eye Check" which is a non-invasive test that can be performed to provide an immediate read on a personal's alcohol, drug or fatigue level. In addition, students will view a "Dead or Alive" computer

simulation that utilizes their own personal data such as sex, weight, car type and speed to simulate an auto accident and the resulting

"We have all talked to our children repeatedly about the dangers of drinking and driving. With these exhibits, we are actually letting them see, feel and experience how dramaticlly drugs and alcohol can impact physical skills and thought processes and we think that is what makes this so effective," Sheahan said.

The "3-D Program" was developed by the Sheriff's Office of Preventive Programs with a great deal of support from the private sector. Private donations of equipment valued at more than \$250,000 were instrumental in getting the program started, Shea-

Kitchen safety starts with clean surfaces

(NAPS)—Whether on kitchen surfaces, cutting boards or bathroom tiles, disease-causing bacteria are the most common uninvited guests in the home. Unfortunately, too many people are not taking the necessary steps to ensure that their homes are protected from diseasecausing germs; instead, they are relying on homemade concoctions that are often ineffective and even potentially dangerous.

A study by scientists at the University of North Carolina found major differences in the effectiveness of various disinfectants. According to Dr. William A. Rutala, the author of the study, tests confirm that commercial products such as chlorine-based household sanitizers kill more than 99.9 percent of bacteria, including E. coli and Salmonella, while "such natural products as vinegar and baking soda don't work nearly as well."

In fact, these homemade cleaners are 100 times less effective at killing bacteria than commercial products. The difference in effectiveness is illustrated through the example of a household sponge. A single sponge can contain as many as 320 milbacteria. When disinfected

with bleach, nearly all of the bacteria are killed, but if treated with vinegar or baking soda, more than 31 million bacteria can remain in the sponge. These germs can sicken family members who handle the sponge.

Homemade mixtures of natural products are not only less effective at killing germs than commercial disinfectants, they also can be dangerous. For instance, combining hot water, lemon juice and vinegar actually helps to spread disease-causing bacteria, rather than killing them. In contrast, commercial products are extensively tested to ensure their safety and effectiveness; they are clearly labeled with directions for use and safety precautions.

According to Kip Howlett, Executive Director of the Chlorine Chemistry Council, "Keeping families safe from germs means protecting homes with the best disinfectant available. Studies have shown that commercial sanitizers are the most effective disinfectants and should therefore be relied on to rid houses of disease-causing

University of Arizona professor of microbiology, recommended using chlorine bleach (and products that contain it) for cleaning because bleach kills both viruses and bacteria products that only attack the latter.

To safeguard against microbes around the home, consumers should therefore sanitize cutting boards, countertops and surfaces with a solution of one to three tablespoons of household chlorine bleach per gallon of water, let it stand for two minutes, rinse and air dry. A stronger disinfectant solution of 3/4 cup bleach in one gallon of water should be used for sponges, dishcloths and dishtowels. After soaking for two minutes, rinse and air dry.

10 travel tips in case airlines strike

With pilots for Comair Inc. on strike and the possibility that eniployees on one or more of the four major airlines may follow suit later this spring, air travelers need to be aware of all of their options, according to AAA-Chicago Motor Club.

In a worst case scenario. Delta. American. United and Northwest — all in continuing labor disputes — could suffer labor strikes at some point if those disputes are not settled. President Bush has urged the four airlines and their workers to avoid strikes and said he would explore all options if they were not able to work out their differenc-

The following are tips to help minimize your inconvenience in the unfortunate case of an airline strike:

1) If you are booked on Comair, call Delta Airlines at 1-800-221-1212 to find an alternate flight rather than trying to make a change at the airport. Delta handles reservations for Comair.

2) Before booking a flight, check out a variety of carriers that fly to your destination. Consider booking an airline that is not facing a potential strike.

3) Make your reservations through a travel agent. If you do encounter problems due to a carrier strike, the agent can help you make alternate arrangements.

4) If you must book a flight with one of the carriers that may strike, book the first flight of the day and fly non-stop if possible.

5) Request a paper ticket instead of an e-ticket. If your carrier does strike, it will be much easier (particularly if you're already at the airport) to go to another carrier and request a seat on their next available flight non-striking carriers will usually try to accommodate you, bu will give preference to their ticket holders first.

6) Pay for your ticket with a credit card. If your carrier strikes and you can't make alternative arrangements, you can notify our credit card company to credit your account for the full fare.

If you want your children to have access to these funds, make sure they are named on the document, either as a primary or a secondary beneficiary, depending on your pref-

It's essential to get the right beneficiaries listed -- but it's still not enough to assure that your children get everything you want them to have. For that to happen, you may want to explore more sophisticated legal arrangements, one of which is called the qualified terminable interest property ("Q-TIP") marital trust. This type of trust can give your surviving spouse access to your assets while he or she is alive. The trust is "terminable" because your spouse's claims to the property will end upon his or her death.

Once your spouse dies, the trust's remaining assets will be distributed according to your directions, so your children can now get the money.

Your surviving spouse gets all the income from the Q-TIP marital trust, and may receive principal as well. To ensure a steady income stream, you may want to fund your trust with dividend-paying stocks and fixedincome investments -- such as bonds -- that make regular interest payments.

A Q-TIP marital trust offers other advantages, For example, assets inside the trust can't go to anyone else while your surviving spouse is alive. Plus, your spouse cannot change the beneficiary: if you've indicated that you want your children to be the ultimate recipients of your assets, your wishes must be followed.

However, your spouse will have broad access to the funds inside the trust, so he or she could conceivably spend most of the money. To protect your children's interest, you may want to name someone other than our spouse as a trustee. This person could strive to maintain a good balance in your trust, so that your surviving spouse has the money he or she needs to enjoy life and your children can still receive the inheritance you

We've just looked at the rudiments of a Q-TIP marital trust, which, like all trusts, can be a complex legal instrument. When you set up your trust, you'll need to work with an attorney who specializes in estate planning. You also may want to consult with your tax adviser. And you'll need to be married before you can set up this type of arrangement.
