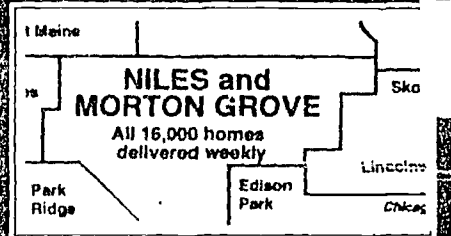

Niles sells Trident Center

Niles has found a buyer for the Trident Center, located at 8060 W. Oakton St.

NorthSide Community Bank of Gurnee will purchase the property for \$1,027,000, and plans to build a bank and rental office space on the 450,570 square foot side.

In a memo to Village Manager Abe Selman, NorthSide President and CEO Patricia Clausen said that the standing 13,954 sq. ft. building will be rased and a new two story 18,000 sq. ft. building will be built in the front center of the property.

School threat
shows up good
relationships

Two local schools, Niles North High School and Old Orchard Junior High, were recently the object of violence threats. Both incidents coincided with the April 20 anniversary of the Columbine shootings in Littleton, Colo.

A 16-year-old Niles North student was taken into police custody after he left an anonymous note in a school hallway on April 17, threatening that violence would take place on April 20. The note, left in the school's writing center, was found April 18 by a faculty member. The student, who admitted writing the note as a prank and leaving an undetermined number of copies at the school, was referred to Juvenile Court. School officials reported the incident to the Skokie Police who have the boy's

water rate increase

To combat additional expenses from the City of Chicago, the Niles Board of Trustees unanimously approved increasing the village's water rate by 4.05 percent.

The hike passes on a four percent increase from Chicago city, which supplies water to Niles.

Property owners will now pay \$3.08 per 1,000 gallons of water, up from \$2.96.

The city also raised its rate four percent in 2000. At the time, the village followed with a 3.86 percent increase of \$.09, generating an additional \$280,000 in revenue.

For 2001, the village and incor-

porated areas supplied by Niles will pay an additional \$.12, for a total increase of almost eight per-

cent in the last two years.

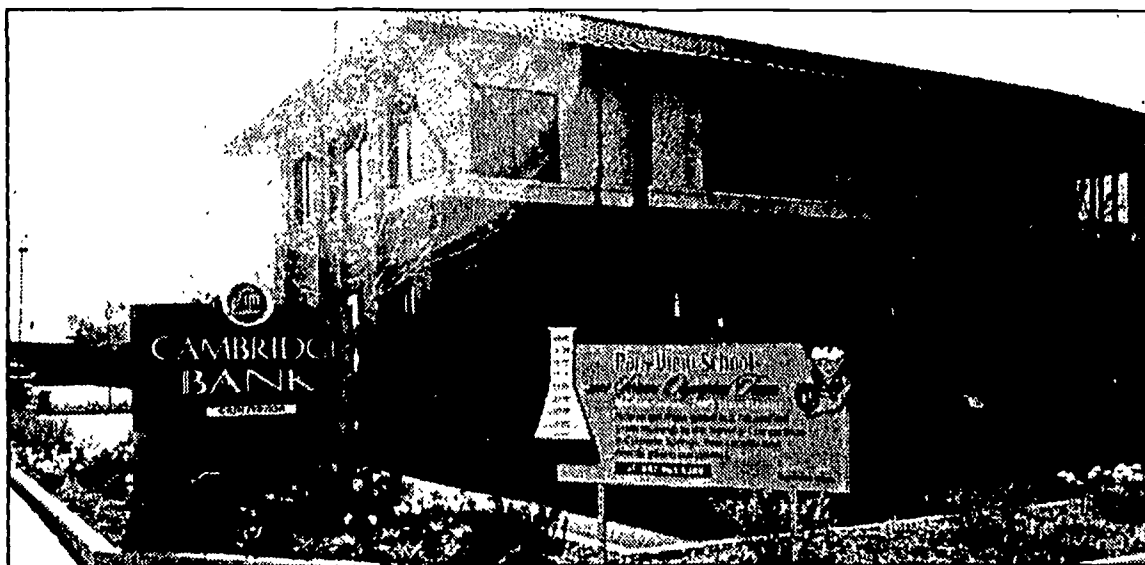

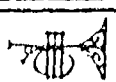

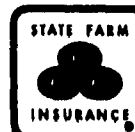

Morton Grove's crime profile updated

Results contained in the Illinois Uniform Crime Report, a document compiled annually from FBI statistics, show only slight changes in the nature of reported crimes and arrests for Morton Grove.

Arrests for drug crimes and burglary/theft each showed slight increases, while arrests for aggravated assault remained at the 1999 level, it was learned. There were 25 arrests for possession of marijuana in 2000, compared to five in 1999.

Arrests more than doubled for possession of drug paraphernalia, with 13 during 2000, versus five during 1999. Four arrests for controlled substance was only slightly higher in 2000. Possession of syringe was five in 2000; one in 1999.

There were no arrests for mur-

der, criminal sexual assault, or arson in either year; however, two criminal sexual assaults were reported in 2000, versus three the year before. No arson was reported in 2000, down from five reports in 1999.

Robbery arrests went from none in 1999 to two in 2000; robbery reports decreased, with seven reported in 1999 and five in 2000.

For burglaries, 2000 had 121 reported with five arrests; 1999 had 114 reported with four arrests.

In 2000, 60 arrests were made for theft, with 59 in 1999. Reported thefts were 366 for 2000, down from 393 in 1999.

One auto theft was reported in 2000, with none in 1999, but reported motorcycle thefts hovered around 30 in each year.

Culver board to re-evaluate program cuts

Despite the recent defeat of two referendums to finance programs at District 71's Culver School, officials are not yet rushing to take action against targeted programs.

Both parents and teachers offered opinions how the deficit should be resolved during a recent, highly-attended school board meeting.

Barbara Groshon, a parent, suggested that parents and residents work with the school board and PTA to locate revenues to preserve programs. Any suggestions should be presented to the school board, Groshon added.

The board approved \$586,000 of cuts and services for next year. These include the hot lunch program, reduction of special education services, and

the elimination of all extra-curricular activities, including the band and orchestra program. Cutting these programs would affect 21 individuals, school officials said.

School board president John Zuckerman said board members will re-evaluate programs selected for elimination and make their final decision within the month.

Diane Gremley, a parent with three children at Culver, suggested that supporters bring the message to public facilities, such as the Fitness and Senior Centers, to inform the public of the need to pass the referendums.

A second try at passing a referendum package is possible next spring, but the school board has not yet approved such action.

Area district road improvements

More than \$15.2 million has been allocated for road and bridge improvements in the 7th District during Fiscal Year 2002, according to Assistant Senate Majority Leader Walter Dudyecz (R-7th, Chicago).

The 7th District Senator released details of local projects included in Illinois' \$2.3 billion road plan for Fiscal Year 2002, which starts July 1, 2001.

"We are scheduled to receive funding in the new fiscal year for 13 new and on-going road improvements that affect 11.37 miles of our roads," Dudyecz said. "The five-year plan also has an additional \$31.3 million for 19 projects that will improve 34.66

miles of our roads."

Fiscal Year 2002 road projects for the 7th District include:

- \$3,635,000 for bridge superstructure, intersection improvement and land acquisition on I-90/Kennedy Expressway at Cumberland Avenue in Chicago.

- \$3,213,000 for new bridge deck, intersection improvement, traffic signal modernization and land acquisition on I-90/Kennedy Expressway at Nagle Avenue in Chicago.

- \$1,545,000 for bridge superstructure on I-90/Kennedy Expressway at Sayre Avenue in Chicago.

- \$1,300,000 to rebuild 0.78 mile on Gross Point Road, from

north of Main Street to Oakton Street in Morton Grove and Skokie.

- \$1,066,000 to resurface 1.34 miles on Illinois 21/Milwaukee Avenue, from Glenview Road to Greenwood Road in Glenview and Niles. Includes loop detectors.

- \$1,030,000 to resurface 3.11 miles on Illinois 21/Milwaukee Avenue, from Greenwood Road to Howard Street in Niles and Chicago.

- \$412,000 for preliminary engineering and land acquisition for a project on Illinois 43/Harlem Avenue, from Cullom Avenue to south of Illinois 19/Irving Park Road in Chicago and Norridge.

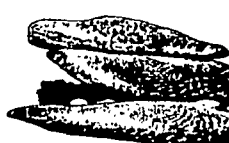

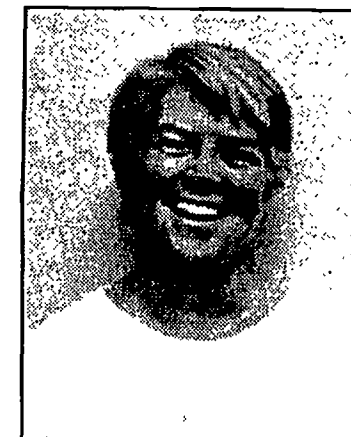

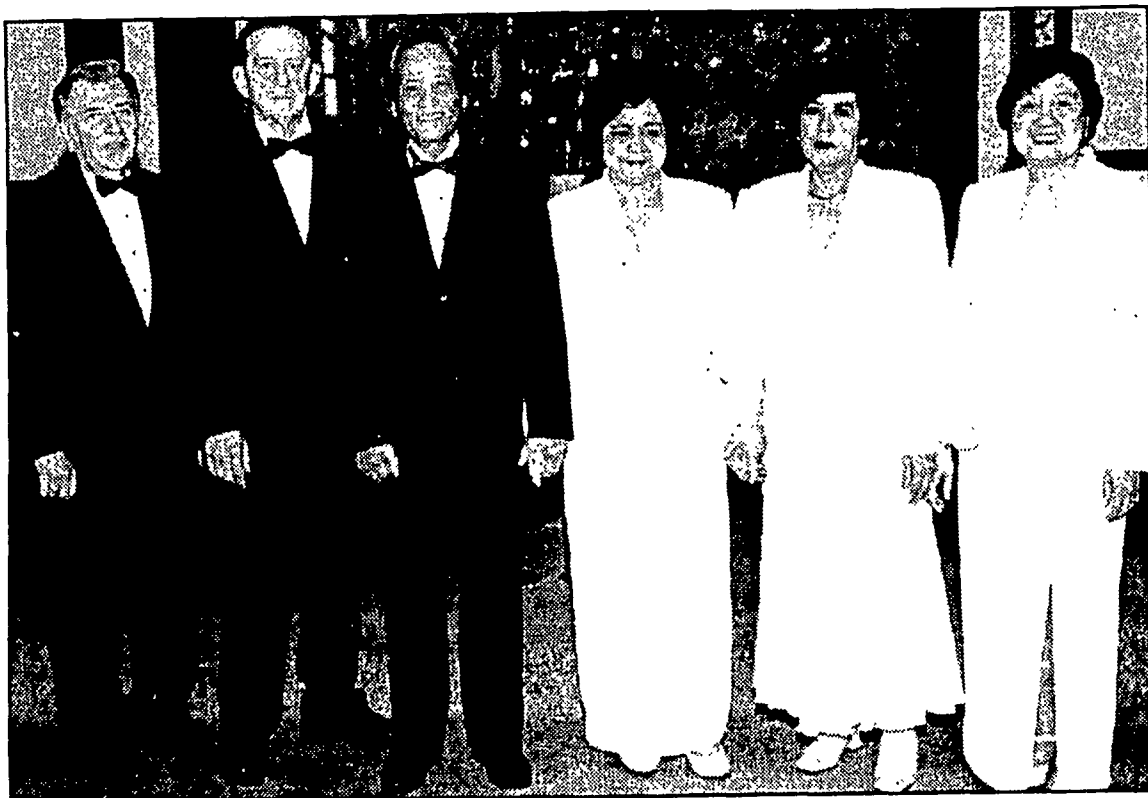

The Karizma Story....

Perhaps Chef Marty Rogak named the restaurant he owns with Partner Elaine Cook Karizma because the food Rogak serves up in their American bistro has lots of it.

The unpretentious Chef Rogak likes to say that there are real cooks in his kitchen, he included. Rogak, 38, spent 10 years in his family's automotive

business before he traveled down the road of fulfilling his dream of being a professional chef. He spent time during high school working as a short order cook at fast food restaurants and he always enjoyed the fast-paced environment of the restaurant business.

"In our family, I was the one who cooked. My mother made

He trained under Jean Pierre Henri, at the Nikko Hotel and later worked under Mike Gregson of Kiki's Bistro. With Jackie Plouton and Frederick Boyer he opened Provence

and while looking for a location to start his restaurant, he worked at Betise as a sous chef.

"I wanted my training to be French-based because I wanted to learn the classic techniques and the right way to do things. I learned a lot from the French people I worked for."

It will only take you one or two meals to see that Rogak was an excellent learner. His American regional cuisine is creative and outstanding. His skill in addition to his cooking philosophy helps define Rogak as one of Chicago's rising star chefs.

"I am not of the belief that you have to use a lot of different ingredients just to be different. If you make jambalaya, for example, let it be your own interpretation, but let it be jambalaya."

Rogak's creative menu, which changes seasonally, explores American regional cuisine, which he says, "allows me to do everything I want."

"European immigrants brought many foodstuffs to this country. Just because my food is American regional, I don't want to limit myself to American-only products."

There is nothing limiting about Karizma's menu. To the contrary, many of his dishes marry interesting flavor combinations without overpowering each other.

Starters on the Karizma menu include a variety of delicious and delightful choices. *Trilogy of Salmon* combines Scottish Smoked Salmon, Salmon Pastrami and Salmon Caviar served with Blue Corn Blini's, Watercress, Capers and a Horseradish Creme Fraiche. Also tempting is the *Pan-Seared Crab Cake* with White & Green Asparagus served with Ancho Chili Aioli and *New Orleans Style BBQ Shrimp* served over Golden Brown Polenta is tangy and

Northern Illinois Civil War Round Table

The topic for this meeting, "If He Had Less Rank: Major Green Lewis Wallace," will be presented by guest speaker Stacy Allen, Chief Historian at Shiloh National Military Park.

Lewis Wallace would have preferred to be remembered as a military hero, however, he is best remembered as the author of *Ben Hur*. Born in Brookville, Indiana in 1827, he began his working life as a clerk. During the Mexican War he saw limited action as a second lieutenant with the 1st Indiana. After the war Wallace left the military for a legal and political career, entering the Indiana senate in 1856. At the outbreak of the Civil War he offered his services and in April 1861 was appointed Adjutant General of Indiana and colonel of the 11th Indiana. In less than a year Wallace rose to the rank of major general. Shortly after this incredible rise his

reputation plummeted at the Battle of Shiloh. The mix-up on the first day of the battle that caused his delayed arrival to the main battlefield and the need for a scapegoat resulted in Wallace being removed from combat duty and sent back home to Indiana to await further orders.

Stacey Allen will tell the story of Major General Lewis Wallace, what really happened at Shiloh, and how his rapid rise to major general had an impact on his later career.

Prevent scooter riders from landing in emergency room

The hip new fold-up scooters that continue to soar in popularity threaten to send riders to the emergency room. More than 5 million scooters were sold in 2000, making scooter safety more important than ever.

To help teach safe riding habits, Country Insurance & Financial Services created Reddy's Safety Zone at www.reddykids.com. The Web

site, featuring Reddy Safety Dog, uses interactive games to teach children, ages 6-11, about scooter, bicycle, in-line skates and skateboard safety.

In 2000, the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission reported 9,400 scooter-related injuries requiring emergency room treatment. Of those, 90 percent involved children age 15 or younger.

Most injuries resulted when riders fell from the scooter and nearly 30 percent of scooter-related injuries resulted in a fracture or dislocation, often to riders' hands or arms.

The Consumer Product Safety Commission estimates more than 60 percent of injuries can be prevented or reduced in severity if protective gear is worn.

Controlling chronic pain

(NAPS) -- Many of the Americans who suffer from chronic pain have begun taking steps toward relieving their condition -- literally.

Dancing and other fun exercises and activities have been found to reduce chronic pain. Doctors say that during physical activity the body releases chemicals that block pain signals from reaching your brain. These chemicals also help alleviate anxiety and depression, conditions that can make pain more difficult to control.

The book *Mayo Clinic on Chronic Pain* offers pain sufferers the following exercise tips to help them stay motivated and possibly walk away from their conditions:

- **Set Goals.** Start with simple goals and then progress to longer-range ones. People who can stay physically active for six months usually end up making regular activity a habit. Remember to make goals realistic and achievable.

- **Pace Yourself.** Do a little bit at a time and then rest. When you first exercise, you may experience discomfort from muscle weakness and joint stiffness. But after a few days, as you gain strength and flexibility, the pain should start to lessen.

- **Add Variety.** Vary what you do to prevent boredom. For example, try alternating walking and cycling with swimming or a low impact aerobics class.

- **Be Flexible.** If you're especially busy or under the weather on a certain day, it's okay to adapt or completely skip exercising on occasion.

- **Track Your Progress.** Record what you do each time you exercise, how long you do it and how you feel during and after activity. Recording your efforts can help you reach goals and remind you that you're making progress.

- **Reward Yourself.** Work on developing an internal reward that comes from feelings of accomplishment, self-esteem and control of your own behavior. After each activity session, take five minutes to sit down and savor the good feelings that exercise can give you.

Help available for workplace violence

When Des Plaines Police Capt. David Hachmeister heard about the Navistar shootings in Melrose Park, he organized the Workplace Violence Prevention Task Force.

The force includes two detectives, two sergeants, and the department's counselor. They encourage business owners and managers to call police if any hint of a violence problem arises at a workplace.

Hachmeister feels their task force was instrumental in dealing with a situation at Symons Corp., 200 E. Touhy Ave. An employee threatened to bring a weapon to work when confronted with a dress code policy he found objectionable.

Management called the police who charged the employee with disorderly conduct and revoked his gun registration card. They persuaded the man to sell an arsenal of 47 legally-registered weapons in his possession, including an AK-47 rifle. The employee received psychiatric counseling and was later discharged.

The Des Plaines Police publicize the task force to local businesses and have addressed the Des Plaines Chamber of Commerce and Industry.

Since its inception February 2001, they have received eight

phone inquiries and investigated all. Two resulted in brought charges, according to Hachmeister.

Sometimes their response is as simple as informing an employee that he's made an inappropriate remark, he added. Hachmeister invites calls, pointing out that minor intervention may prevent a serious situation.

Neither the Illinois State Police, the FBI or other law enforcement officials are aware of any other such group within the state.

Workplace violence results in about 1,000 homicides and one million assaults each year.

When a call comes in the task force forms a plan. The counselor may interview company officials while one of the detectives looks into the problem individual's background. Both counselor and investigating detective will meet with a company supervisor. From there, a problem may be handled in-house or may be subject to further police investigation.

The task force urges companies to have a violence policy in place so any threat or incident can be acted on immediately.

"River Rescue Day is very

important to the Chicago River," said Laurene von Klan, Friends' executive director. "Not only does it unite individuals, families, school groups, municipalities, and corporate America in a common effort, it highlights the fact the river really belongs to everybody." The Chicago River flows 156 miles, passing through more than 50 communities in Lake and Cook counties.

Founded in 1992 with 30 volunteers at one location, over the years, River Rescue Day has attracted thousands of volunteers who have logged over 15,000 hours improving the Chicago River. On River Rescue Day last year, some of the 1,800 volun-

teers cleared away 28 tons of trash including a conversion van, a vacuum cleaner, shopping carts, lawn chairs, a car door, teletubbies, while others planted native plants and spruced up trails at Bereau Street, Gompers Park, Ronan Park and Prairie Wolf Slough.

River Rescue Day activities begin at 9 a.m. with a three-hour clean up at over 55 sites managed by trained volunteer site captains. The clean up is followed by a FREE volunteer appreciation picnic from 12 noon until 3 p.m. at River Park at Foster and Francisco Avenues, Chicago. The picnic will feature a river celebration with great food, canoe rides, games, booths and more.

10 easy ways to cut excess calories

- Replace "empty calorie" foods and snacks with nutrient-dense foods. For example, rather than white bread, switch to whole grain bread that's packed with vitamins, minerals and fiber.

- Cut back on fried food such as those you get at fast-food restaurants. At home, cook your food in the oven instead of in fat.
- Substitute leaner cuts of meat. Choose choice or select grades of beef.
- Begin each meal with large salad or a bowl of vegetable-packed soup.
- Eat smaller portions.
- When you're eating, don't feel obligated to eat everything that's put before you. Ask to have leftovers put in a doggy bag so you can have them later home.
- List areas of your diet that need improvement. For example, if you feel that you drink too much soda, reduce your intake to one-third.
- Be sure to have breakfast. Studies show this tends to prevent excessive eating during the day.
- Find out why you want to eat so much. Maybe it's because you're angry or lonely. If that's the case, call a friend and talk out. Above all, eat only when you're hungry.

Experts agree that finding a new job is full-time work

Now is the best time to start looking for a job. You're as qualified as other applicants, so start now before someone else gets "your" job.

What's the most important thing to know about your job search? Learning that finding a job is full-time work.

Here are some tips for planning an effective job search: Make a "To Do List" every day. Outline daily activities to look for a job. Apply for jobs early in the day. This will make a good impression and give you time to complete applications, have interviews, take tests, etc.

Call employers to find out the best times to apply. Some companies take applications only on certain days and times during the week.

Write down all employers you contact, the date of your contacts, people you talk to, and special notes about your contacts.

ing, trustee Robert Callero cited prices paid by neighboring municipalities, and said that even with this year's augmentation, Niles has the sixth lowest water rate out of 30 other communities.

Arlington Heights pays \$4.15 per 1,000 gallons, DesPlaines \$3.25, Mount Prospect \$4.05, and Park Ridge \$3.50.

A formal request for the action by Finance Director George VanGeem explains the increase is calculated to offset the village's increased costs, and that the water fund is a break-even fund which does not generate a surplus from

the village.

VanGeem was also the recipient of a Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting by the Government Finance Officers Association for his work on the Village's 2000 fiscal year audit.

Mayor Nicholas Blase presented VanGeem with the commendation at this month's board meeting. This is the sixteenth year that Niles has been recognized for meeting the association's highest accounting standards in government accounting and financial reporting.

confession and say they are sure he acted alone.

Officials sent 4,500 letters to homes informing parents of the incident. Classes were held April 20 with 60 percent attendance. The district school board will decide whether the student should be expelled.

A district spokesman has described the boy as "an average student." He has received a 5-day suspension, and the district superintendent has recommended expulsion.

The incident did highlight that good relationships exist within the Niles North community. Principal Neil Codell told the District 219 board, "Kids came forward in droves to talk to the deans, to me." They understood the importance of naming the student, he said, and added that some students showed great concern that the student be allowed

to continue attending school, as well as to receive help.

Both school security and the Skokie Police received praise for their handling of the situation.

In a second incident at Old Orchard Junior High School on April 18, a female student's angry remarks included a verbal threat.

According to police reports, the assistant principal told police that a teacher denied a 14-year-old girl's request to go to the washroom. The girls then asked permission to visit the school nurse to get an Advil, but that request was also denied.

The student then said, "I'll blow up this ---- school," the reports state.

The girl's mother was summoned and the girl turned over to a detective for investigation.

"We intend to operate the bank in a community banking fashion, servicing the financial needs of Niles and the surrounding communities," she stated.

The former senior activity center has been designated as an unused surplus property for some time. According to the village, the site has been appraised at \$1 million.

A bid opening meeting for Trident's purchase was held on April 16; NorthSide was the only bidder.

In other news, the board approved a \$1,875,250 bond transfer to the Village of Robbins to help the municipality in its acquisition of funds for construction of multi-family senior housing.

"Niles has private bonding authority for 2001 that will be lost if it's not used by May," explained Trustee Bart Murphy at this month's board meeting.

In other words, Niles is allowed a volume cap of tax funds it collects equal to \$62.50 per resident. If not used within a fiscal year, the money cannot be held

by the village, but may be allocated for certain tax-exempt private activity bonds.

Robbins plans to gather such unused revenue from other municipalities for the construction of a 144-unit assisted living facility to be used primarily for Medicaid-eligible tenants.

In a memo from Robbins' project financier Stern Brothers & Co., Managing Director David Rasch states that the company intends to raise approximately \$7.5 million of private activity bonding authority from neighboring Cook County Communities.

Robbins will pay Niles a \$37,505 fee for the bond allocation.

The board also approved an annual Condominium Rebate to compensate owners for waste disposal costs.

Condominium owners are charged for refuse service, which Niles' single-family homeowners receive for free.

Niles' 32 condominium associations will be rebated a total of \$115,395.50.

ator fires a laser-targeted ping pong-sized nylon ball traveling 60-70 mph at the trainee.

"It will sting," said Sgt. James Zimmerman of the NPD, "The idea is that it will really get your attention."

The feature is meant to teach officers to take cover in a deadly force situation. A second option allows a frame by frame play back of the scene, showing the trainee exactly when the situation went awry.

Sgt. James Zimmerman showed village trustees a tape from CBS news highlighting the new technology. Playing cop, a reporter was placed into a scene where a couple had been pulled over in a routine traffic stop. As the female driver opened her purse to retrieve her driver's license, the male passenger began badgering the "officer" as to why they'd been pulled over. While engaged with the agitated passenger, the reporter didn't see that the pleasant looking driver had pulled out a gun. A brief shoot out ensued until the reporter realized he'd been shot in the leg.

"With the amount of shootings going on day-by-day all over the country, (this system) is important to have," said Gerald Sheehan, Niles Police Chief.

While Niles has been relatively free of such incidents, Zimmerman said the training is still vital.

"Denial is what kills people. If we deny that we're going to be in these situations, people are going to get hurt," he said, adding that the system will help Niles police train pro-actively for extreme circumstances.

The simulator is not just meant to train officers to fire, but also when to show restraint. The system includes eight disks containing different scenarios with a variety of endings. A situation can escalate to where deadly force is used, or de-escalate to a surrender; everything depends on how the officer responds.

The entire cost of the system is \$71,700, including \$25,000 that had been budgeted for the basic system and \$27,000 for the two options plus shipping costs. In a memo to the village Sheehan said that the department will receive the eight scenario disks (\$3,000 each) for free, lopping off \$24,000 from the price for a total cost of \$47,700.

The cost for the system is compensated by another department purchase, which came in at approximately \$50,000 below budget estimates.

The department will spend \$79,808 for video camera systems to be installed in 16 squad cars (originally budgeted for \$130,000).

Sheehan said that the cameras serve a multitude of purposes.

"It's a great enhancement tool in court as an evidentiary tool... (and) as an aid in combating allegations of racial profiling," he said. The cameras can also be used as a training tool by replaying the tapes for new officers.

Daley received his Bachelor of Arts degree from Loyola University and holds an LL.B. from John Marshall Law School.

William (Bill) Kurtis has earned the respect of viewers, colleagues and competitors in television journalism for more than 30 years. Kurtis anchors the week-nightly primetime series *Investigative Reports*, the long-running regularly scheduled series devoting a full-hour to a single contemporary news topic.

As a young reporter Kurtis reported the protests, riots and violence of the sixties from the streets of Chicago. Kurtis became Chicago's first local foreign

correspondent, reporting international stories of special interest to the Chicago area. Beginning in 1982, he spent three and a half years as the CBS Morning News anchor in New York. Kurtis graduated from the University of Kansas with a B.S. in journalism and received a juris doctor from Washburn University School of Law. Dominican University will also present William Kurtis with an honorary degree.

Diane Kennedy, O.P., vice president and academic dean of Aquinas Institute of Theology in St. Louis, will receive an honorary degree at the undergraduate ceremony.
