

The most recent robbery was April 17 at the World Savings Bank I-SB, 2289 Howard Street in Evanston.


According to Chicago police reports, the first took place on Dec. 7, 2000 at the First National Bank of Wheaton, 7757 W. Devon Ave., Chicago, about

Savings vs. Debt — The Battle Continues

than 40 percent of Americans who have no savings, you are one paycheck away from financial ruin," said Mike Kidwell. vice president and co-founder of Myvesta.org. "All it takes is one unexpected event, like a job loss or a medical emergency, and your financial life could be flipped upside down."



Tips to avoid conflict when visiting the dentist with children

General and pediatric dentists are accustomed to treating the dental needs of their small patients. Sometimes they don't know how to handle the actions of the child's parents, turning a dental visit into a bad situation for everyone. To make visiting the dentist painless for all involved, the Chicago Dental Society has issued the following guidelines for parents to consider.

Parents can avoid interfering with the care of their children by being aware of some of the most common problems dentists encounter when dealing with par-

·Arrive on time for the apnointment and schedule an appropriate amount of time for treatment. "Parents need to appreciate that patients are on kid time," says Mary Hayes, DDS, a pediatric dentist who practices in Chicago. "Kids need time to relax and be given the opportunity to learn - not rushed through the experience."

•Follow the advice prescribed by the dentist. "The parents' responsibility is to do dentistry every day at home, and the professional guides the care," says Dr. Hayes. "It's the parents' responsibility to follow the advice given by the dentist."

•Be courteous to the receptionist and office personnel on the phone. Do not insist on immediate attention and then not show up or call to cancel the appointment.

•Only bring those children who have an appointment. "Call in advance. People who bring extra kids without calling are taking chances that they may not be seen. This also applies to parents who don't bring all children with appointments.'

 Do not expect a diagnosis over the phone - the dentist needs to examine a child. "Every child's needs are different and dentists simply cannot make a diagnosis over the phone. It is improper to expect an accurate diagnosis without the child having direct contact with the doctor."

•Don't expect the dentist to agree with your self-diagnosis. Parents sometimes are convinced that their child has a condition described recently in a magazine or newspaper, or they want a diagnosis they believe will cost less money to treat. Parents can differ respectfully and pursue second opinions. However, it is important to work out good cominunications between parents, office staff and dentist because trust helps ensure successful treatment for the child.

•Don't transfer your fear to your children. "Most kids are very calm about dental visits but pick up fear from the way their

parents are acting - the expressions on their faces or body language. When parents anticipate pain before dental treatment has begun, problems frequently arise. Parents need to recognize that their presence is sometimes detrimental to care and they may be asked to remain in the waiting room. The dental appointment is a great time for children to learn to be on their own."

•Don't pretend there is an emergency. "The opposite is when there is a true emergency but the parent won't bring the child in because it doesn't fit their schedules. Sometimes, we'll see a child whose face has been swollen for several days and we ask the parent why they didn't bring the children in. In other cases, we have parents call who want us to confirm over the phone that their child does not have an emergency, they are looking for permission not to come in."

"When it comes to children, the first and foremost goal of any dentist is to make sure the child gets the appropriate treatment and is not suffering pain or experiencing infection," concludes Dr. Hayes. "Parents usually have the same philosophy in mind. If parents can avoid a few key pitfalls, everyone will be happy and the best care will be delivered."



Ronald McDonald Children's Hospital makes efforts to make sleepwear safer

The Ronald McDonald Children's Hospital of Loyola University Medical Center in Maywood, has emerged as one of the institutional leaders advocating a return of tougher federal government restrictions on the sale of sleepwear in an effort to provide some protection against the risk of serious. burns in children.

The burn center provides care to an estimated 150 to 200 children each year.

As a board member and secretary for the American Burn Association (ABA), Gamelli has joined his voice with those of other leading national burn experts in petitioning the Consumer Products Safety Commission (CPSC) to return to the stricter standards that governed the manufacture and sale of children's sleepwear prior to 1997.

In that year, CPSC exempted infant garments from all the flammability restrictions that had been in place for more than 20 years and permitted the use of flammable materials in tightfitting sleepwear in larger sizes

for older children. Tight-fitting sleepwear is known to be at lower risk than loose-fitting wear, which is more likely to brush up against sources of ignition.

For older children, sleepwear that is not flame-retardant must be nearly skintight to provide some level of safety, and even such tight-fitting garments may not compensate for the increased flammability of cotton and other materials now permitted in the manufacture of these clothes.

Gamelli and others also have questioned the assumption that parents will clothe their children in skintight sleepwear when opting to buy garments containing flammable materials. Actually, parents tend to buy larger sizes of the same children's garment to allow room for growth, pass oversized hand-me-downs from one sibling to the next or allow their children to wear non-traditional sleepwear, such as cotton Tshirts, sweatshirts and shorts, to

Burn experts and representatives of the ABA contend that the

adopted in the early 1970s dramatically reduced the numbers of children severely burned or killed by fire. In comparing similar time periods before and after the flammability restrictions were lifted, one major children's hospital in the United States determined that the number of its pediatric admissions for burns due to ignition of clothing and increased by 55 percent following the relaxation of leepwear standards

sleepwear standards

Flame-retardant sleepwear will not protect children from scalds, which represent the majority of burn injuries treated in the Ronald McDonald Children's Hospital of Loyola, but it would provide a level of protection against serious burns from other sources, Gamelli said.

Although early last year the CPSC initiated an overall review of the sleepwar situation with the intention of possibly restoring the former flammability standards, no further actions at the federal level have occurred to date.



The Responsibilities of Being in the Middle

Most of us face a time in our lives, somewhere between our late 30's and our early 50's, when we become a member of the "sandwich" generation. We have children of our own, perhaps at home, at college, or starting a career, who still need us as parents, even though it may be in considerably different ways than when

We may be at a job level with considerable supervisory responsibility, or have become self-employed or started our own business. Career-wise, this can often be a time of considerable stress and responsibility. and one that may demand a great

may also be placing upon us. A good starting point may be in exanining the situation for your own children. They are struggling for independence. Do what you can to allow them increasing amounts of responsibility and commensurate freedom to run their own lives

Letting go of the parenting role is not always easy for most people. One way to lessen the blow is to keep the lines of communication open. Invite your children to share concerns or questions as they arise. Treat them, as much as possible, as adults in providing answers and advice. But also let them know that they will be expected to initiate more of the conversations. That responsibility is part of their growing indepen-


This can free you up somewhat to deal with your changing role with your own parents. While you will certainly invite them to share any concerns or ask any questions regarding finances, health, and other issues, you may also find that it is you who will need increasingly to initiate these

You will have to ask about how

they are doing and perhaps even be insistent to get complete answers. You may want to check with them to be sure that they are getting the healthcare they need, paying their bills on time, and managing their finances proper-

In a sense, the responsibility that you are shedding in regard to your children is what you will be picking up with your parents. And if you look at it in that light it can help make the burden lighter. If you can see it not as added responsibility, but as a continuation of responsibility, you may be able to minimize the frustration. If you have brothers and sisters, it can also be a relief to have a family conference to disucss how these responsibilities for your parents can be shared with one another.

The issues stemming from having aging parents are a common problem today. Many counselors deal with it on a regular basis and can provide significant help. Check with your local council on aging, senior citizen center or in the phone directory under counselors if you feel a professional counselor could help you in dealing with your situation.

• JULIE, Inc. (Joint Utility Locating Information for Excavators), also known as the "Illinois One-Call System," is a notfor-profit corporation that provides contractors/excavators. homeowners, and others who may be disturbing the earth, with a free service through a single toll-free phone number (1-800-892-0123) to call for the locating and marketing of underground utility facilities.

• JULIE is not a utility. JU-LIE owns no facilities and does not locate underground facilities. JULIE serves as a message handling service for utilities, taking information about planned excavations and distributing this information to its utility membership. It is then the responsibility of each utility to mark the location of their underground facilities at the excavation site.

 JULIE has logged over 11 million calls and its annual call volume makes it one of the largest one-call systems in the United States. Annual call volume has grown from 680,000 in 1994 to over 962.000 in 2000, an increase of over 41 percent. Because one call to JULIE can result in communication with multiple member utility companies, calls in 2000 resulted in over 5.99 million

• The Illinois General Assembly enacted the Illinois Underground Utility Facilities Damage Prevention Act on January 1, 1991. The law requires persons excavating to contact the Illinois One-Call System before digging. and requires owners of underground utilities to be members of the one-call system. There are ap-



In-stent restenosis fact sheet

osis? Often described as the 'Achilles' heel of interventional cardiology, restenosis is the reocclusion, or reclogging, of a coronary artery following a successful intravascular procedure to reestablish adequate blood flow through the vessel.

What is in-stent restenosis? Instent restenosis is essentially tissue regrowth - the body's attempt to heal the innermost layer of vessel lining where it was disturbed by the placement of the coronary artery stent. As the cells proliferate, they push through the openings in the stent mesh and, over time, cause a progressive narrowing of the stent's center.

How common is in-stent restenosis? Although estimates vary, a substantial percentage of patients who undergo successful implantation of a coronary artery stent experience some degree of in-stent restenosis. Consequently, patients often must undergo repeat treatments to maintain adequate blood flow through the affected artery.

Are some vessels more prone than others to in-stent restenosis? Recent advances in coronary artery stenting have vastly enlarged

What is coronary artery restentier the realm of treatable coronary artery lesions, enabling cardiologists to deploy stents in lesions previously deemed untreatable or unreachable. Examples include unusually long lesions and lesions in small, narrowed vessels. such as those typically found in diabetics. Unfortunately, lesions in these categories are especially prone to restenosis. Thus, advancements in coronary stent technology have been tempered by the recurrent problem of instent restenosis.

> Prior to the introduction of brachytherapy, how did the cardiologist treat in-stent restenosis? Even though cardiologists have used a variety of procedures - balloon angioplasty, repeat stenting, rotational atherectomy and excimer laser ablation - to treat instent restenosis, recurrence rates have remained high, posing a stubborn obstacle to successful ong-term outcomes.

Study links swelling and excessive tissue

Growing evidence now confirms that rhinophyma, the excess growth of tissue on the nose that represents the most advanced stage of rosacea, is a result of the chronic lymphedema (swelling) that often appears in rosacea, according to a new study published in the Journal of the American Academy of Dermatology.

"This study's findings have tracked the link between the vascular system and the more permanent disfiguring effects of rosacea," said Dr. Jonathan Wilkin, director of Dermatologic and Dental Products, U.S. Food and Drug Administration. "This new finding emphasizes the importance of avoiding flushing to prevent later excess tissue growth that cannot be treated with medi-

Lymphedema is the swelling that occurs when excess fluid accumulates because of the lymphatic system's flawed ability to clear it away normally. The study, by Dr. Filippo Aloi and colleagues at the University of Turin in Italy, documented microscopic changes that indicate chronic edema leads to excess tissue. The researchers noted that

An early sign of rhinophyma may be an indentation on the bridge of the nose after wearing glasses, Dr. Wilkin said. Some physicians have even noted that heavy glasses themselves can contribute to swelling of the nose. Opting for a lighter pair of glasses may help.

Edward Jones: Look Beyond Mutual Fund's Past Performance

If you've ever noticed an ad for a mutual fund, you've probably seen, in a large typeface, some numbers indicating how well the fund has performed in the past few years. The message is clear: This fund is "sizzling" -- and you should be investing in it.

But then, way down at the bottom of the ad, in tiny type, are the words: "Past performance is no guarantee of future results." This isn't just a legal disclaimer -- it's the truth. What a fund has done may not be a guide to what it will do. The factors affecting a mutual fund's performance today may be quite different from those of the past -- so it's never a good idea to rely on history as an investment guide.

If you don't base your mutual fund investment decisions on previous performance, how should you evaluate prospective funds? You'll want to consider a variety of factors, including the following:

• Fees and expenses - Mutual funds charge investors fees and expenses. If you purchase a fund that has high costs, it must perform better than a low-cost fund to generate the same returns. Before you buy a mutual fund, review its prospectus to evaluate its level of fees and expenses. Then, see how these costs relate to those of comparable funds. You may find you can get a "better deal" on a substantially similar fund.

 Age and size of the fund -- Newly created or smaller funds sometimes have excellent short-term performance records -- which can be misleading. Because these funds may invest in just a small number of stocks, a few successful holdings can weight the overall performance. But as the fund adds more stocks, the effect of these winning holdings will be diluted -- and performance may decline. To learn about a fund's age or size, read the prospectus.

 Volatility of the fund -- All stock-based mutual funds will fluctuate in price. But some stock funds are far more volatile than others are -- and, generally speaking, the more volatile a fund is, the greater the investment risk. If you plan on selling some shares of a fund within a year or two, you may want to stay away from the volatile funds, because they might be down at the time you want to sell. By reviewing a mutual fund's prospectus and annual report, you can see how volatile it has been over time. For instance, a fund may report that it's earned 10 percent per year, on average, over the course of 10 years. But when you look at its history, you may find that much of these gains came from two or three strong years, sprinkled among several bad ones. You could be better off looking for a fund whose average return has been fairly constant.

So the next time you're considering investing in a mutual fund, don't stop at the past performance information -- it won't tell you what you need to know. Instead, look at the key factors that may affect your fund's future. In the investment world, tomorrow is much more important than yesterday.

OSHA now requires more protection for workers handling hypodermics

The Occupational Safety and Health Administration announced recently that changes in its bloodborne pathogens standard intended to reduce needlesticks among healthcare workers and others who handle medical sharps has gone into effect.

The agency is planning a 90-day outreach and education effort before enforcing the new rules.

Mandated by the Needlestick Safety and Prevention Act, changes to OSHA's bloodborne pathogens standard were published January 18, 2001, to take effect April 18, 2001. The revisions clarify the need for employers to select safer needle devices as they pecome available and to involve employees in identifying and choosing the devices. The updated standard also requires employers to maintain a log of injuries from contaminated sharps.

Specifically, the revised OSHA bloodborne pathogens standard obligates employers to consider safer needle devices when they conduct their annual review of their exposure control plan.

Safer sharps are considered appropriate engineering controls, the best strategy for worker protection. Involving frontline employees in selecting safer devices will help ensure that workers who are using the equipment have the opportunity for input into purchasing

The new needlestick log will help both employees and employers track all needlesticks to help identify problem areas or operations. The original bloodborne pathogens standard only required recording of those cuts or sticks that actually resulted in illness. The updated standard also includes provisions designed to maintain the privacy of employees who have experienced needlesticks.

Passed unanimously by Congress, the Needlestick Safety and Prevention Act took effect November 6, 2000. It specified revi sions of OSHA's bloodborne pathogens standard and directed the agency to make these changes within six months. The legislation exempted OSHA from certain standard rulemaking requirements so that the revised bloodborne pathogens standard could be adopted quickly. These changes now go into effect as originally

Bene touched the lives of many through his many personal activities. He was president of the Chicago-branch of the Variety Club and befriended many famous people. After movie star Cary Grant died his widow sent Bene a note thank-

Bene was a big lovable guy who may well have been the Cubs baseball team's number one fan. Annually, he'd visit their winter training camps and was ensconced in a Wrigley Field box seat alongside the field at hundreds of games throughout the regular seasons. He was in the eye of the amera many times and was in

Ben Bentley also died last week. He was a boxing promoter, manager, T.V. sports host as well as a former publicity flak for the old Chicago Bulls, whose Benny the Bull cheerleader was named for Bentley. He was a warm affectionate man beloved by all who knew him. We first met him at a party in Florida and subsequently was at his daughter's bas mitzvah. As the Chicago Tribune's Bob Greene wrote, he was a Willie Loman seat-of-your-pants kind of guy who was one of a kind, always hustling. Like Mike Royko and Studs Terkel, Bentley was an original, a Chicago-street guy who was always on the move, trying to give the guys he worked for an edge - but doing it with softness and gentleness. His sweetness made him someone

Basketball star Andy Phillip also died last week. Andy was a member of the earlyforties Illinois basketball teams which won back-toback championships in 1941 and 1942, before he marched

In 1946 I had just joined the university's Daily Illini sports staff. At the beginning of the basketball season I was in the hospital when Phillip was wheeled into my room and beeame my roomate. I thought this was a great opportunity to get an interview for the newspaper. But as luck would have it, Phillip was not allowed to talk. He had just had his tonsils removed. The hot-shot reporter lost what he tought would be his first "Illini sports

In that first post-war class, 200 candidates applied for jobs on the Illini sports staff. When I missed covering a couple of games due to my hospital stay the sports editor replaced me with one of the remaining 200. Fifty years later the reporter who missed the great Andy Phillip sports scoop wound up in Niles and Morton Grove and the Illini sports editor, Gene Shalit, went back home to New York and became the longtime movie critic for NBC's Today

So in 1998 he robbed two banks--one in Skokie and one in Glenview. Rabin said he would hand tellers a note demanding money and show them a gun that he said wouldn't fire, nor would he have injured anyone. The judge reminded him that the tellers didn't know that.

He was arrested while driving away from a bank with a .32 caliber revolver in his pocket and \$3.242 stuffed inside his shirt.

Telling police "I wish I was dead," Rabin added, "I can't believe I did something so stupid."


