Niles dispatchers not guaranteed jobs

Earlier assurances that Niles' eight 911 dispatchers could continue to work within the village if they chose not to transfer a local consolidated 911 dispatch center failed to mention two crucial points: village positions could come with a salary freeze, and workers have to pass a qualifying test for the transfer.

Board trustees recently approved a measure allowing the village to join the Des Plaines/ Park Ridge Emergency Communications Center. Once finalized the Niles Police Department's 911 telecommunications department will effectively relocate to the center in Des Plaines.

Have you noticed how the gas prices have risen daily? During the month of August, there was a refinery fire in Lemont, IL. At that time, the cause was unknown. Officials at the refinery said this fire would only affect the small, independent gas stations, not the major stations. The small independent station owners are now scurrying around to find another source to fill their tanks. This refinery in Lemont produced regular gas with the state of Illinois Emission and

Pollution Controls. Three weeks ago I purchased gas in Itasca, IL., at \$1.19 a gallon. Last week I purchased gas in Niles at \$1.47 a gallon for my truck. As I paid the owner of the station the \$19.50, he laughed and said, "1950 was a good year." We both agreed. I added that gas was about \$.30 a gallon back in 1950. The owner then commented that I was lucky to have come in when I did. He

No one studies Latin anymore because it's a "dead" language, right? Wrong.

After plummeting enrollment in the late 1960's, U.S. high schools are seeing a resurgence in the study of Latin, with enrollment in some schools doubling since 1980. Now even elementary and middle schools offer Latin.

What has prompted this renaissance? It is the knowledge that Latin serves as a foundation for improved English skills, as well as a basis for learning other modern languages.

Another boost to enrollment is a change in the way the language is being taught. Students who use to spend all their class time memorizing the ablative case and the subjunctive mood are now also learning about the daily lives of the ancient Romans and learning to interpret classic texts.

Perhaps more compelling is a growning body of research which shows that studying Latin improves students' problemsolving ability, vocabulary and college entrance exam scores. For example, in one study of sixth-graders who studied Latin for 30 minutes a day for five months showed the students advanced nine months in their math problem-solving abilities. Another group of fourth, fifth and sixth-graders who studied Latin a mere 15 to 20 minutes a day for a year performed a full year higher on standardized vocabulary tests than thier peers who had not. Similarly, students who studied Latin in high school consistently score higher on the verbal portion of the SAT college entrance exam-

Teens, sports, and steroids

Sports are a great way for girls and boys to develop self-esteem, leadership, and an active, healthy lifestyle. But the pressure to be leaner, faster, and stronger may tempt athletic teens to use performance-enhancing drugs and sup-

Steroids and supplements may boost performance, but they can damage health - or even cause death. Even harmless-sounding protein powders can have serious long-term effects. Most studies are based on adult users, so little is known about how these products affect teen growth.

If you're a parent, talk to your young athlete about healthy ways to improve performance and the risks of using drugs and other products for a quick - but potentially dangerous - boost.

Anabolic Steroids

Anabolic steroids are hormones that affect body growth and metabolism. Doctors prescribe them to treat certain types of anemia or delayed sexual development in boys. Anabolic steroids also increase muscle strength and performance, which is why they tempt athletes. A recent study found that 3.5 percent of tenth graders have tried steroids illegally, that is, without a prescription.

The known side effects of anabolic steroids include health risks that are particularly troubling for young bodies. They can cause acne, enlarged breasts in boys, irritability, baldness, and headaches. Abuse of anabolic steroids has also been associated with jaundice, heart attacks, strokes, high blood pressure, high cholesterol, and infertility. Even shortterm use increases the risk of permanent liver problems such as

Aspiring basketball pros. beware: anabolic steroids can stunt your growth. Studies show that steroids shut down the final growth spurts of adolescents.

Using injectable steroids can mean shared needles and contamination. This puts your child at risk for diseases such as AIDS and hepatitis. And because steroids sold to teens are often smuggled into the U.S. or synthesized in illegal laboratories, they may contain dangerous impurities.

Beware of Supplements You've convinced your child to avoid steroid drugs, but what about supplements?

Many dietary supplements promise to improve athletic performance. Some contain testosterone-precursor chemicals such as' androstenedione or dehydroepiandrosterone (DHEA). Others boast herbs that promise to speed up metabolism, such as ma huang and guarana, or ingredients to make muscle cells work harder, such as creatine or proteins.

Since the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) does not regulate dietary supplements, manufacturers may make unproven claims about their products. There's little scientific proof that any supplement can help you run faster, bulk up your muscles, or otherwise improve your appearance or athletic performance.

Teenagers should avoid testosterone-boosting ingredients such as androstenedione and DHEA. since they can interfere with normai growth and development. these supplements can cause serious and sometimes permanent side effects including acne, hair loss, voice deepening, and kidney or liver damage. While androstenedione is legally sold in the United States, it is banned from use at most amateur and professional athletic events.

more than a few days or at doses higher than recommended on the package. Ma huang can cause fast and iregular heartbeats, high blood pressure, chest pain, nervousness, tremor, and trouble sleeping. Some reports have linked ma huang use to heart attacks, strokes, seizures, and death. Guarana and other herbal sources of caffeine can also cause fast heartbeats and anxiety.

Creatine is a popular supplement that appears relatively safe when used as directed on most product packages. It may increase lean body mass and improve performance in sprinting, weightlifting, and similar exer-


cises. Creatine supplements appear to have no effect on endurance. And the added "lean" mass may actually be water, not muscle. Doses greater than 2 grams per day provide no benefit over lower doses and are more likely to damage the kidneys. Protein shakes and powders

are promoted for building muscle mass. Short-term use of protein supplements appears safe, but they have not been evaluated for long-term safety or effectiveness. Too much protein can cause serious kidney problems.

Boost Performance Naturally Supplements are no substitute for a good diet and a rigorous training program - for any sport.

If your tecnager wants to take a supplement, help him first examine his diet. A healthy, wellbalanced diet contains all the necessary protein, calorie, vitamin, and mineral requirements. Consult a doctor or a registered dietitian if your teen needs help in changing his diet or to discuss supplement use. The doctor or dictitian can recommend dietary adjustments and determine whether supplements would be beneficial and safe based on your teen's medical history.







In the vaccine safe and effective? Is it expensive? Yes, the vaccine is safe and

effective. No vaccine provides 100 percent protection, but this vaccine does protect against four strains of meningococci, A, C, Y. and W-135. The most common side effect is soreness at the injection site, and occasionally mild fever. The vaccine is relatively inexpensive, and is often available through student health services at reduced cost. If your physician does not have the vaccine, Travel Medicine Clinics usually have a supply for per-

sons going to certain areas of Africa and the Middle East.

Does my child need other shots for college?

Vaccine requirements for individual colleges may vary. Check with your child's college. and then with your child's physician to see if her immunizations are up-to-date. Diphtheria and tetanus (Td) boosters should be given every ten years. Her measles, mumps, rubella (MMR) should also be current, and if your child has not been vaccinated against Hepatitis B. this would be an excellent time to begin this series.

Depression in the elderly is treatable

normal part of aging, according to research supported by the National Institute of Mental Health (NIMH). Warning signals family and friends should look for include chronic sleep problems and inability to rest, excessive worrying. increasing dependency. withdrawal from friends, hypochondria and complaints of chronic aches or pains that cannot be attributed to other disorders.

"Family members are the key in getting clders into treatment, because too often elders don't recognize depression in themselves." points out Dr. Charles Reynolds, director of the Late Life Depression Clinic at the University of Pittsburgh, one of three Intervention Research Centers

(NAPSI)-Depression is not a supported by NIMH. In addition. he said, many senior citizens will not discuss mental health problems with their doctors because they don't want the term "depression" associated with them.

> With clinical depression in the elderly comes a far more serious threat - suicide. The highest rates of suicide are among the elderly. particularly white men ages 80 to 85. says Dr. Reynolds. Getting the proper treatment for a depressed elder is vital to prevent depression from getting worse. Yet only one in six elders with clinical depression gets diagnosed and treated for the illness. according to an updated NIH consensus development statement.

The steps to handling depression are easy to remember for both seniors and their loved ones:

• Recognize that depression is not a normal part of aging, and take symptoms seriously.

· Seek information from individuals and organizations experienced in helping the elderly.

 Mobilize social support from relatives and friends.

• Most importantly, get treated



Individuals enrolled in an HMO or who do not subscribe to Medicare Part B must p[ay \$10 for the flu shot and \$20 for the pneumonia shot. Balancing down payment and monthly payments

'How much money should I put toward a down payment?' It's a question every homebuyer asks.

According to Tom Ward, president of Majestic Mortgage Corp., a Mundelein-based mortgage banker and broker, the answer not only depends on how much money a homebuyer has, but also on individual circumstances such as month-to-month cash flow and larger life goals.

These circumstances can include variables like credit card debt, a car payment, decorating or remodeling needs, and the need to invest for retirement or col-

To understand how a down payment can affect monthly expenses, as well as the big picture, Majestic Mortgage Corp. presented a few seenarios involving homebuyers purchasing a \$200,000 home. The scenarios demonstrate the importance of an in-depth financial analysis when arranging for a mortgage.

In the first scenario, the buyers have \$60,000 available for a down payment. If they use the entire \$60,000 (30 percent of the home's price), and obtain a 30year mortgage at a 7.25 percent interest rate, their monthly payment (principal and interest) will bc \$995.05.

"However, let's assume these buyers have other obligations, too," said Ward. "Let's say they have \$10,000 in credit card debt. Plus, the house they're buying could use new window treatments, and the carpeting needs to be replaced. What would happen if these buyers put \$40,000 down or 20 percent - instead?"

With the same mortgage terms, their payment will be \$1,091.48 an additional \$96.43 per month. But, if the interest rate on their credit cards is in line with the national average (15.70 percent according to bankrate.com), then credit card finance charges alone arc costing the buyers \$130.83

"By putting down \$20,000 less, these buyers can use \$10,000 to pay off their credit \$10,000 put 5 percent down for

cards, actually improving their monthly cash flow by \$34.40. Plus, they can use another \$10,000 to replace the ugly drapery and carpeting. Not bad!' Ward noted.

What if these homebuyers face the same questions, but have just \$40,000 in cash at the outset of planning? How much of that should be put toward a down payment and how much toward eliminating other kinds of debt?

The matter is complicated in this situation because making a down payment of less than 20 percent of the purchase price less than \$40,000 in this case - requires the borrower to pay private mortgage insurance. PMI, which protects the lender against default, can cost a borrower more than \$100 per month.

However, according to Ward. there is a way to structure the loan so that the borrower can put less moncy down, avoid PMI charges. and still have cash to pay off credit card debt and decorate the new home. It's called a purchasemoney second, often referred to as a "piggyback mortgage."

The buyers will make a down payment of 10 percent (\$20,000). but, instead of taking out one mortgage for 90 percent of the home's value, they will take out two mortgages: a first mortgage for 80 percent and a second mortgage for 10 percent. Since the first mortgage does not exceed 80 percent loan-to-value, no PMI is required. The only additional cost is a slightly higher interest rate on the second mortgage.

With a straight 90 percent loan the monthly payment would have been \$1,305. With the piggyback option, the monthly payment is \$1,256. The purchase-money second improves monthly cash flow by \$49, and the homebuyers, who started with \$40,000 in cash, have \$20,000 left over to eliminate credit card debt and redeco-

The FHA option reveals a surprising result, thanks to mortgage insurance rates, Ward explained.

"Government-backed, FHA mortgages require mortgage insurance just like private mortgages require PMI. However, the mortgage insurance rate on an FHA loan is only about twothirds the rate of PMI. So, in this

With 5 percent (\$10,000) down on the \$200,000 home, the monthly principal and interest is \$1,419.65. With 3 percent (\$6,000) down and an FHA loan, monthly payment is \$1,404.25. And the homebuyers

still have \$4,000 in cash left over. "These examples prove that analyzing down payment options is just as important as analyzing monthly payment options," Ward noted. "With regard to the down payment, homebuyers are looking at assets and liabilities, and determining how to balance the two in order to accomplish objectives that go beyond purchasing a





Dairy and Stroke

Eating more Milk Group foods may help reduce the risk of stroke according to a new research review recently published in the Journal of Nutrition. Each year, more than half a million Americans have a stroke, which can result in permanent brain damage or even death.

The research review analyzed 30 studies to examine the link between the nutrients in Milk Group foods - particularly, calcium, magnesium and potassium - and the reduced risk of stroke.

"There's strong evidence that the nutrients in Milk Group foods can play a significant role in helping millions of Americans who are at risk for stroke. This is especially important for African Americans who are at an increased risk for high blood pressure, the strongest risk factor for stroke, and have a 35 percent greater risk of dying from a stroke." said author, Linda K. Massey. PhD, professor of food science and human nutrition, Washington State University Spokane.

Massey concludes that milk's mineral mix may help reduce or

prevent high blood pressure, clotting of the blood and hardening of the arteries, all of which the American Heart Association considers key factors for stroke risk.

"What's compelling about this research is that Americans may be able to reduce their risk for stroke and take charge of their heart health by simply incorporating 3-a-day of dairy into their diets," said Molly Pelzer, registered dietitian and National Dairy Council ambassador, "In addition, by eating more dairy products, you may also be reducing your risk of osteoporosis, certain cancers and even obesity.

Editor's note: the FDA recently approved linking foods that are good sources of potassium such as milk to potentially reducing the risk of high blood pressure and stroke.



A veteran Niles 911 dispatcher, who requested anonymity, said the village board was told that telecommunicators could transfer to one of the five positions available or retain employment within Niles as Community Service Officers (CSOs); according to the Niles Village Board's July 24 meeting minutes, a daily 24hour ČSO Station with two people maintaining a constant presence will be created to balance the relocated dispatch de-

CSO starting pay is less than the \$32,000 to \$48,000 range for a dispatcher, and Niles 911 telecommunication workers have reportedly been informed that those who stay will have their salaries frozen until pay CSO pay catches up.

While the exact CSO salary was not able to be confirmed at press time, Niles Village Manager Abe Selman confirmed CSO salary was less, and could not guarantee that dispatch wages wouldn't be frozen.

'There have not been any decisions or discussions. We still need to develop job descriptions," said Selman.

The minutes also note that should Niles join the municipal emergency center, five workers would be needed to fill a yearround chair, and they are not guaranteed to Niles dispatch-

Center director Cheryl Ornberg affirmed that Niles workers would be given "a shot" at the slots because of their qualifications and the difficulty in training new people.

Selman said that Ornberg requested that Niles dispatchers take a qualifying test.

But the anonymous worker said it's not a request.

"We're being forced to take a test to get into Des Plaines or face disciplinary action," said the dispatcher reporting that six of the 10 have been Niles dispatchers for over 10 years (the remaining two have been with Niles for eight and three

The three-part test ends with an oral interview. Afterwards, the top five scorers will be put on a list of qualified dispatchers who can transfer to the Des Plaines center.

"That's wrong that we're not guaranteed jobs

Subsequently, the stress is beginning to show. The operator said that the level of absenteeism has gone up recently and that co-workers feel abandoned by the Niles Police Department. With no assured employment at either location, the dispatchers are all looking for

This is just shocking beyond belief...there is no way that anyone with any power is backing us."

Selman emphasized that Niles has only made a preliminary agreement to join the Des Plaines/Park Ridge 911 center.

"We're going to try to be as fair with our employees as we possibly can," he said.

mission paying interest on a credit balance is required, but interest is not allowed to be charged on a debit balance.

With NICOR's budget plan, "budget billing customers get a 4.78 percent interest rate paid when the customer account is kept in a positive state" (the budget amount is paid on time monthly over the budget plan cycle), explained Whyte. "Where can you get a better savings plan?"

When the customer has a debit balance, and the account is in arrears, a fee is charged that includes the annual credit rate plus three percent (4.78% plus 3% or a total of 7.78%), along with the budget plan fixed monthly amount.

According to Cook County, the suit against NICOR alleges that the interest charge is "NICOR budget billing cus-

tomers are paying twice for costs the company claims to be associated with allowing customers to have a debit balance. Budget customers through NI-COR's service rates are already paying these costs," states the press release.

Cook County further alleges that the interest charge is discriminatory because there is no reason for budget customers to

"Moreover, NICOR's imposition of an additional three percent interest charge serves no function other than to charge extra to those can't afford the increase in gas prices in the first place."




