Przybylo niece missing in NY terror attack

Vanessa Kolpak, 21, daughter of Niles lawyer, presumed lost in World Trade Center; parents travel to NYC to await word

The tragedy in New York hit here with deadly force for local readers of the Sun-Times story about 21-year-old Vanessa Kolpak

Kolpak, the youngest daughter of Paul and Vivian Przybylo Kolpak, has family and extended-family with ties in Niles---to the White Eagle Restaurant, to various boards that administer village affairs, and to a community of builders that's developed condos throughout the village.

Kolpak reportedly called from her desk on the 87th floor at Keefe, Bruyette and Woods in the World Trade Center's South Tower to her mother, saying, "Don't worry, it wasn't my building, I'm OK." Her mother notified the rest of the family five minutes before the second plane struck the South Tower.

An uncle. Andrew Przybylo. said Vanessa assumed, like others, that the first impact was a terrible fluke, not a terrorist attack.

Kolpak had joined the investment firm only three weeks before, following her graduation from Georgetown University magna cum laude, where she carned a degree in philosophy and a minor in economics. She Continued on Page 34

MG Muslim school reports bomb threat

The Sept. 11 terrorist attacks on American soil, not only claimed the immediate victims: those in New York. Washington, DC and Pennsylvania, but Islamic communities throughout the country have suffered the backlash. The suspected identity of the terrorist hijackers, militant leaders and web of followers in many countries throughout Saudi Arabia. Iran. Iraq, Afghanistan. Africa. the Middle East, Europe and South America have made targets out of innocents throughout the United States.

At press time (Sept. 18)

there are at least 40 suspected hate crimes against these American citizens and emigrants - two people have been killed in the southwest.

The day following the attack, the Muslim Education Center at 8601 Menard received an anonymous call,

"You are doing this to us," said the voice. "The United States is going to take care of this and we're going to take care of this. There is a bomb coming at 3 p.m."

"Pick a Peck of Books" will allow blind and physically handicapped students in grades 5 through 12 to read any of a number of books written by Peck, and have the chance to win an audio book by the author. The contest runs now through Oct. 20. Each contest participants will also be invited to meet Peck and receive a signed certificate during the Illinois Authors Book Fair Oct. 27 at the Illinois State Library in Spring-

It is Tuesday night and a string of cars winds its way through the parking lot at Notre Dame High School in Niles. Each one stops near a door outside the gym entrance and a kid or two hops out with case in hand and scurries down the steps into the bowels of the building. It's time for band practice and the Notre Dame Community Youth Band is tun-

This September marks the eighteenth year this ritual will be followed. The only difference this year is that Notre Dame has remodeled an area at the south end of its building into a modern practice/rehearsal facility replacing the sometimes hot, sometimes cold, sometimes damp area under the gym bleachers that has served as the band room since the school opened.

The Notre Dame Community Youth Band consists of elementary school musicians from all over the northwest Chicago area who come together once a week for music making. Since 1984 the group has been directed by John Badsing and Greg Stepanck, parochial school band directors, who reorganized what had been the Notre Dame Extension Band.

Since their next performance will be their Christmas Concert they will begin rehearsing familiar Christmas carols and medleys. During the course of the year, however, their repertoire will include traditional concert marches and overtures as well as a smattering of pop, rock and snow tunes.

Besides the Christmas Concert the band presents a Spring Concert and will participate in band and solo contests, also in the spring. A summer session culminates in a "Pops" concert in July. Enrollment during the school year has averaged fifty to sixty students and has grown to over one hundred during some summer sessions.



forcement Officers Memorial Fund (NLEOMF) and the Concerns of Police Survivors (COPS). That is 13 percent higher than the 134 officers who made the ultimate sacrifice in 1999.

Of the 151 officers who were

killed during the past year, 51 were shot to death; 47 died in automobile accidents: 20 were struck by automobiles while outside of their own vehicles: eight died in motorcycle accidents: seven were killed in aircraft accidents: six succumbed to jobrelated illnesses; three drowned: three died in falls; two were stabbed; one died in a bicycle accident: one officer was killed in an accident involving a horse: one was beaten to death; and one officer died in a bomb-related incident. Texas was the deadliest state in the nation over the past year for police officers with 14 fatalities: followed by California with 11; and Georgia and Tennessee with 10 each. Six of the officers killed during the past year

"Despite improved equipment and better training, law enforcement remains the deadliest profession in America," declared NLEOMF Chairman Craig W. Floyd. On average, he noted, one police officer is killed somewhere in our country every 57 hours. There are also 62,000 assaults committed against our officers every year, resulting in more than 21,000 injuries. Dating back to the first law enforcement fatality in 1792, more than 15,000 officers have lost their lives in the

line of duty. "The sacrifices made by our police officers, and their families. are too often taken for granted. observed COPS National President Molly Winters. "Not a day goes by that an officers does not risk his or her life for the safety and protection of others."

Organization helps vets help themselves

New programs are helping thousands of U.S. veterans who don't have sight realize a bright-

According to government sources, there are over 93,000 blind veterans living in our nation today. Sadly, statistics indicate that only half of them take advantage of or know about benefits available to them.

These benefits can help blinded veterans through difficult times, as was the case with Jerry Ellis, a blinded veteran who runs a roadside restaurant with his wife. Helen, near the coal mines of West Virginia.

Home

"My life has never been bet-

ter," says Ellis, who received a medical discharge from the Marines in 1969 after losing a lung. Jerry's happiness, however,

did not come easily. "Like most things worth having," he says, "it had to be worked for." In 1989 Ellis discovered the

brain tumor that caused his vision loss. He was unable to work, and his family was forced to get by on his modest VA pension. Shortly after losing his vision, he fell into a deep depression. "Why bother, I felt," Ellis explained. "I couldn't work. I couldn't find my way around the house. I couldn't even get myself a glass of water."

Programs advocated and supported by the Blinded Veterans Association (BVA), specifically Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) Comprehensive Blind Rehabilitation Services, helped change all that. The rehab program helped Ellis learn how to live a fulfilling and productive life without sight.

This program, which is conducted at various locations throughout the U.S., helped Ellis with everything from the basics---like crossing streets safely---to more-complex issues, like coming to terms with his condition and dealing with life without vision

In fact, it was during his stay in the West Haven, Connecticut VA Rehab Program that Jerry Ellis felt the inspiration to start his restaurant business. "I stood for a moment inhaling the rich, earthy smell of the vegetable garden, and it reminded me of. the smell of Momma's kitchen from so long ago." From that point on Jerry knew he was going to open his restaurant and that nothing would stand in his

The BVA traces its roots back to World War II and a group of veterans who lost their sight during the conflict. In 1945 they met at an army hospital in Connecticut and founded the association. The organization has helped sustain programs and services for blinded veterans ever

For example, it maintains field service offices throught the country that provide advice, information and aid to blind veterans and their families. BVA field reps. all of whom are blinded veterans themselves, counsel other blinded veterans in their respective regions. Reps link vets with services, rehabilitation, training and other benefits. Additionally, the BVA helps veterans who get counseling find and hold on to jobs within the

There is no charge for any BVA service, and all legally blind veterans are eligible for assistance regardless of when they lost their vision---whether during their service or, as in the case of Jerry Ellis, afterward.

Cure-all Caims

A former healthcare practitioner from Seattle had several reasons for complaining to the Arizona Attorney General about website touting an AIDS cure. ne knew that the claim was bogus: Scientists have yet to discover a cure for AIDS. And he knew that the \$1,100 charge for a six-week "treatment" to cure the disease was tantamount to stealing. But the "clincher" was the claim that the product was a '100-percent guaranteed."

The man, who asked that his name not be used, said the guarantee could lead people who used the product to think they had been cured when they hadn't, a fact that could cause them to put others at risk for HIV infection.

False promotions like this have the Federal Trade Commission (FTC) concerned, too. "These bogus claims put consumers' health at risk," says Howard Beales, Director of the FTC's Bureau of Consumer Protection. "And with millions of Americans going to the Internet for health information, it's doubly troubling.

Why the concern about health fraud? Like other fraud, it cheats consumers out of their money and harms legitimate marketers striving to compete fairly. Health fraud often targets the very sick and even desperate consumers who may even be lured away from treatments that have proven benefits. It can mislead people who use an advertised "cure-all" product into thinking they're disease-free. As a result, they may not seek or continue medical care, receive the drugs or legitimate treatment that could keep them healthier longer, or take precautions to prevent the spread of their disease. Some products can interact with medicines, causing serious side effects or reducing the medicine's ability to work as it should. And some products may

contain harmful substances. In one case, reported in the Annals of Internal Medicine in 2000, a 52-year-old man died from kidney and liver failure, which his doctors attributed to his use of hydrazine sulfate, an unapproved product that had been touted on the Internet for treat-

To combat health fraud on the Internet, the FTC launched Operation Cure. All in 1999. It is an ongoing federal state law enforcement and consumer education campaign. The FTC has since brought 13 law enforcement actions against Internet marketers for unsubstantiated health claims. One case resulted in a \$1 million settlement with the maker of the shark cartilage product promoted as a cure for cancer. Two other settlements stopped companies from claiming that St. John's Wort was a safe and effective treatment for HIV/AIDS and required warnings about the serious drug interaction risks associated with St. John's Wort. Another settlement required consumer refunds for electronic devices and herbal remedies that were sold as cures for cancer, AIDS, Gulf War Syndrome and many other diseases. All were required to remove their bogus claims from the Web. In addition, the FTC estimates that more than 100 other websites have taken down their sites or removed their claims after the FTC contacted

forgot the first rule of advertising law," the FTC's Cleland says. "If you're going to make a claim, you better have solid evidence to back it up."

The Food and Drug Administration's efforts to curtail online martketing of unapproved drugs have resulted in at least 12 product seizures, 11 product recalls 43 arrests and 22 convictions The FDA continues to investigate more than 80 incidences of Internet health fraud and unapproved drug products.



serves children of resident and naturalized American Muslims from all over the world. Morton Grove police have been asked to keep a special watch on the center, which was subsequently closed during the

An earlier request for a police patrol was made by a Morton Grove resident following a threatening call made to his home hours after the attack. "We are going to get you," an anonymous male voice told the Arab-American father. The caller then hung up.

In light of such incidences, and with the realization that in the weeks and months to come such occurrences will likely continue, it is time to impart some understanding of the religion and culture of Chicagoland's 350,000 American Muslim residents, who represent 56 countries including India

Dr. Asad Husain, President of the American Islamic College in Chicago, has indicated

that the most useful expression of sentiment may be an explanation of what Islam repre-

"Islam means submission to the will of God," said Husain, who explained that as the Torah is to Judaism and the Bible to Christianity, so is the foundation of Islamic belief and practice found in the Quran.

The prophet Mohammed preached nonviolence, except n instances of defense.

"To kill one person is a crime against humanity. To save one individual is saving humanity to God," said Husain.

Compulsory prayer is practiced five times daily in the morning, afternoon, sunset, after sunset and at night. One month a year fasting from food drink and sexual activity from daybreak to sunset is required Ramadan is a time for reflection and spiritual discipline, for expressing gratitude for God's guidance and atoning for past

Albert Hoelbl is survived by three sons and five daughters: Albert (Diane); Deedee (Jack) Reddington; Peggy (Alan) Baily; Joyce Kenna; Lynn (Dennis) Frederick; Billy (Michelle); Kim (Jim) McCormack; and Gary (Val), plus 23 grandchildren and 5 great-granehildren. He was the brother of Betty Bates, Dorothy Tamillo, and Louis, de-




