Local Anthrax scares unfounded

Local law enforcement wasted their time and taxpayer money last week, investigating fraudulent Anthrax mail scares in Niles and Des Plaines.

It started on Oct. 13 at the TJ .85 retail store in Morton Grove, when an employee reported a package with a suspicious-looking powder on it and the floor nearby to the police. The MGFD Mazmat team evacuated the building, as well as the neighboring buildings the Morton Grove Police Bomb Squad was also there. The substance was secured by Morton Grove authorities and turned over to the FB1.

After examining powder, The FBI notified Morton Grove authorities that Anthrax had been ruled out, and that the TJ .85 could resume business.

Morton Grove Police Com-

mander Mark Erickson said he is "urging people to use a little common sense." regarding what they put in the mail. He added that he has not yet been informed as to what the substance turned out to be.

Two days later, mail service was stopped when the Des Plaines Post Office received its own scare. Around 8 a.m., a package inside one of the gurneys was revealed to have a powder-like material inside it. Des Plaines police were notified and the building was immediately cleared.

Des Plaines Communica-

Des Plaines Communications Manager Jim Ratliff, who was at the Post Office when the package was found, said that there was not much panic when this all happened.

OCC lecture explores Taliban origins, US role

"It enrages me," said Philosophy teacher Holly Graff, speaking of Osama Bin Laden calling Palestinian Muslims to join a Jihad against the United States

"They are among the most secular group of Muslims. The very kind that he's against."

Graff joined other Oakton Community College instructors, providing lectures focusing on the origins of the Taliban movement and an overview of Central and Middle Eastern history in two days of public educational forums held at its Des Plaines and Skokie campuses Oct. 11 and 12.

Margaret Norton, a lecture attendee and Humanities teacher familiar with Islamic beliefs and the region's history, said she was previously unaware that Islam contained so many diverse factions.

At an Oct. 12 forum, lecturers explained that Osama Bin Laden embraced a violent view of Wahhabi fundamentalism, a religious movement solidified in Saudi Arabia in the mid 1800's as a repudiation of growing European power imparted by the Ottoman Empire

Asians, Hispanics now 41% of Maine East

Local high schools get a report card of their own, one that comes in the nature of a demographic report of 31 suburban high schools.

That report, presented to the District 207 school board in early August, shows that Maine South High School in Park Ridge has experienced the least degree of cultural change and the lowest ethnic diversity of student body in the north and northwest suburbs.

In test scores Maine South ranks in the upper third among 31 high schools reported on, according to the report.

Other data indicate that Maine South's population is 93.8 per-

cent white and has no students with only a limited knowledge of the English language. Less than one percent of South's students come from families with lower incomes and South has the lowest dropout rate among the 31 area high schools, the report shows.

At Maine East, also located in Park Ridge but serving an ethnically-diverse unincorporated area, the student population is 54.4 percent whites, 31 percent Asians and close to 10 percent Hispanies. At East. 18.5 percent of its students are from lower income families. and 12 percent have limited knowledge of Eng-



Five ways to encourage children to brush their teeth

few dental basics can help parents start their child on a lifetime of good de ital care.

Teeth should be cleaned as soon as they appear. Use a soft cotton cloth and gently wipe the teeth after feeding. Start using a toothbrush when baby's molars appear. With meals, snacks and bottles, toddlers can eat between seven and ten times a day. Pack the toothbrush with you and use it whenever you can, especially before going to bed.

Until a child is about six, it would be a good idea to dispense the toothpaste -- just a dab.

If a child is reluctant to brush, vou can try five tips:

1. Praise the child for the effort.

2. Reward the child for brushing teeth by reading a favorite story or singing a song.

3. Encourage children to brush their teeth at the same time as you do. Young children like to imitate what their parents do.

4. Make it fun. A new toothbrush known as the Bolt Max has a light-up head that lets kids see inside their mouths





Is One Million Dollars Enough To Retire On?

As more and more Americans plan their road to retirement, the question for many has become a practical one: How much will it cost to live on easy street?

Experts say the answer depends mostly on two factors: life span and cost of living. While life span is almost impossible to predict, cost of livng can be calculated.

For example, if a couple earned an annual income of \$110.000 a year experts say their estimated retirement needs would be \$82,000 annually (most people will need between 75 and 80 percent of their pre-retirement incomes to maintain their standards of liv-

How much will that couple need to have saved? Would one million dollars be enough? The answer may surprise

If inflation were to average just four percent, the couple would need an annual income of \$104,000 just six years from when they begin retirement to maintain their standard of living. That sum would increase to \$127,000 after five more years, and \$278,000 after 25 years. Even if their one million

dollar portfolio outpaced inflation by two percent annually. the couple would still need to cut their cost of living every year or face running out of

That's why many financial experts stress the fact that when people stop working. their portfolios can't. They say it is important for people to develop a financial plan before they retire and continue to actively manage their money after they stop working.

online financial tools can help people do just that. For example, The Retirement Planner (found online at CNBC on MSN Money from Microsoft) helps consumers map out their long-term financial goals while allowing them to analyze and optimize their retirement holdings. Consumers can then use the site to double check their investment strategies by running simulations that let them see how their decisions affect

their retirement goals. The site works in conjunction with mPower, a leader in online advice, to provide personalized guidance that helps investors reallocate their holdings as the market and their





Answers to common phone customer queries

The Illinois Telephone Consumer Education Fund (ITCEF) is providing answers to commonly asked telephone customer questions as part of a recently launched education campaign to help consumers better understand their telephone service and take advantage of their options. ITCEF

is offering consumer information on its Web site, www. ittef org and a free brochure, available by calling toll-free, 1-800-622-0200. ITCEF conducted 2,000

telephone interviews with household heads responsible for paying the telephone bill Areas where consumers are in greatest need of information about their telephone service include the following

Q. Is there competition available for local service?

A. Yes. A growing number of Illinois residential customers have a choice among local telephone companies. Different companies serve different areas. Some companies serve only business customers. Your local telephone service may not be transferred to another carrier without your authorization. You can link from the ITCEF Web site to the Illinois Commerce Commission Web site to review a list of companies that currently offer local telephone service.

Q. What are local toll calls? A. Local toll calls go beyond the areas considered "local

calling" but are not long distance calls. Local toll calls may cover more than one area code. These calls are also called regional toll service, local long distance and short haul long distance. In some cases, local toll calls may cross

Check your White Pages directory for a map of your local toll calling area. Carriers frequently charge for these calls based upon when you called and how long you were on the

Q. Do I have a choice of local toll companies?.

A. Yes. Illinois customers can chooses among different pro-

viders of local toll service. You may choose to do nothing and keep your current provider. On the other hand, you may choose among various companies that sell local and long distance service and can provide local toll service as well. You can also use 10-10 dial-around services for local toll calls. See ITCEF's Web site or brochure for more infor-

services. Q. Is long distance provider selection mandatory?

mation on 10-10 dial-around

A. No. If you do not make long distance calls from your home, or if you make very few, the best option for you might be NOT to have any long distance provider at all. Be aware that, if you do not select a long distance company, you will not be able to dial 1 plus the area code plus the phone number to make a long distance call. Instead, you will have to use an alternative means of dialing such as a pre-paid calling card or a 10-10 dial around number. Or, you can make operator as-

sisted long distance calls by dialing zero. However, this is a costly option.

Q. Do I have to pay a monthly service fee for long distance service?

A. Not necessarily. While some providers charge a monthly fee, others do not. Sometimes there is no fee or the fee is waived after a certain calling level is reached. Shop around and compare because providers with no or lower monthly fees may charge more per minute. ITCEF's checklists can help you understand your calling patterns and ask the right questions.

"Our research shows consumers can gain a lot from learning more about their telephone service and their options. The Illinois Telephone Consumer Education Fund is providing phone customers with information that can help them get the best deal to fit their needs. 

Why women hold keys to successful estate planning

Some people still assume that, when it comes to financial legal matters, women are not key players: However, this is entirely naccurate. Women are most likely to be highly involved and greatly affected by estate plan-

In recent generations, women have taken on a larger role in the financial arena. The number of women in the workplace has tripled in the last fifty years. Meanwhile, the real median income of women has increased by sixtythree percent, while that of men has declined by six percent in the same period. This income shift changes the family dynamics and gives women a greater voice in financial matter.s

According to a recent survey. women have an equal say in major financial decisions in seventyfive percent of households. In homes where one partner is solely responsible for financial decisions, women outnumber men in that role by a four to three margin.

In fact, women own a majority of all publicly traded stock in the United States. Women control seventy precent of all wealth in the United States and inherit about seventy-five percent of all estates. This is the reason estate planning is even more important to women than to men: they are more likely to benefit from good planning or pay the price for poor planning (or no planning).

A recent study by the New England Journal of Medicine suggests that the odds of needing long-term care at some period in life is roughly fifty percent. More than forty percent will spend more than six months in longterm care. Guess who are likely to be the caretakers? Women. becomes incapacitated what hapnens to his assets? How does a wife refinance the house to pay bills if her husband is unable or unavailable to sign necessary documents? Without planning, a wife must go to court and have her husband declared incompetent. This is an arduous process that is eniotionally draining for all involved. However, this can be avoided with proper planning. A General Durable Power of Attorney allows the "Principal" to designate an "Agent" who will make financial decisions for him when he is unable to do so. With this document, a wife can sign for her husband in the event of his in-

Similar problems arise regarding health care issues when a person becomes incapacitated. Who decides the appropriate treatment

the patient cannot? Like the General Durable Power of Attrorney. a Health Care Durable Power of Attorney designates an "Agent" to make health care decisions for the principal if he is unable to make them for himself. As women typically cope with their mate's illness, it is they who usually serve as the agent. Without this document, she may face difficulty in getting health care providers to follow her instructions.

Like incapacity, at death a per-

son cannot express his or her

wishes regarding various decisions. Who should inherit the family business? Who should care for minor children? A Will provides these answers and has several functions. First, and most importantly, the only manner to designate a guardian for minor children in most states is in a Will. Without a Will, you have no input in the decision, and the court will decide. Unfortunately, no matter how caring the judge may be, he or she does not know and love your children as you do. Second, the Will distributes any assets held in your name. Without a Will, the state decides who receives the assets, in accordance with a set list for "intestate succession." Unfortunately, this set list provides the same distribution to your wonderful sister with seven children as to your brother who has not spoken with you in eight years. The Will can provide that the assets "pourover" into a Revocable Living Trust, to be distributed by its terms.

Even with a Will, any assets owned by you at your death must go through "probate" in order to be distributed to those designated by you. The process of transferring title from the person who died to the person who is designated to receive the property is 'probate." Probate can be expensive, time consuming, and emotionally draining for those left behind. A Revocable Living Trust is set up now, during your lifetime, and holds legal title to your assets. Because the trust owns the

the Trust. If you become incapacitated, the person you have chosen as your successor "Trustee" will manage the assets for you. much like the Agent under your General Durable Power of Attorney. The Trust can be very flexible and directs how and when the assets will be used. For example, the Trust can keep the children from squandering the assets, ensuring the assets are available for college or graduate school. Since the woman is likely to be the survivor and, therefore, the successor Trustee, it is essential that she take an active part in the planning In addition to preparing basic documents, periodically review

That 14-year-old girl received stitches at Lutheran General Hospital in Park Ridge; in all six people were injured by falling debris, none seriously.

Nicor workers joined area firefighters and police on the scene when a gas leak was discovered.

A third witness, Reid McCarthy, 20 was working in the office of the null's Cybertech game room during the incident. With video games clamoring outside, McCarthy was unaware of the crash until he energed 20 minutes later, nauseous from the gas leak, to find the game room evacuated and rain pouring down from the ceiling.

The shaken Chicago resident said he was upset that no one had come for him. "If you can clear everyone out, why can't you come knock on the door?"

While the National Weather Service reported that area winds were no stronger than 35 uph, NPD Commander Dan Halley said that just prior to the collapse, small funnel cloud sightings were called into the police station by area residents.
