More than 1,500 people attended Saturday's Memorial Mass at All Saints Basilica for Vanessa Lynn Przybyło Kopak, a missing victim of New York's World Trade Centers September 11 tragedy.

Fathers Wayne Prist and Frances Rog were the celebrants at the 10 a.m. mass.

Father Prist emphasized the importance of memory, faith and hope at this time. Memory reminds us of Vanessa's vitality, laughter, vibrancy and generosity - her outgoing flow for life. He spoke of the mystery of faith which gives a source for peace. He said the amazing grace of Christ's presence enables one to be radiant in life in heaven. He said hope is in the Lord Jesus' dealing with Vanessa's death and asked everyone to pray for her family. whose love in their hearts will be flowing for years.

Her sister, Alexis, spoke lovingly of Vanessa. She said Vanessa means "butterfly," a young woman who excelled in listening and talking, who had

Morton Grove couple victims of home invasion

A Morton Grove couple was confronted at home Sunday, Oct. 21 by two men who presented themselves as police officers. One of them then forced his way inside the home on the 9000 block of Oriole Avenue.

Niles woman gets 8 years for embezzlement

A Niles resident received a prison sentence of 8 years after pleading guilty to an embezzlement that left her former employer on the brink of financial

Barbara A. Olsen, 35, stole an estimated \$610,000 from Automated Equipment Inc., a familyowned Mt. Prospect company, over a 4-year period that ended last January.

Judge John Fecarotta in his Rolling Meadows Courtroom said the thefts had caused severe hardships to her former employer. to his business, and to other employees.

Memorial held for terror victim Vanessa Kolpak

A parishoner making her daily visitation Saturday morning. Oct. 20 to Queen of All Saints Basilica in Chicago's Sauganash neighborhood had planned nothing more than to say a few prayers inside a darkened church. Instead, she found its gothic interior filled. its parking lot looking like a Sunday morn-

Sliding into a back pew in the crowded church, she waited out an appropriate interlude, then approached a pew-mate to ask who was being honored. Referring to programs available in a

basket on the floor, she explained, "I have bad eyesight; I

The parishoner was told she had stumbled onto the memorial mass for Vanessa Kolpak. 22, the local young woman of great promise who was missing in the World Trade Center tragedy.

Father Wayne Prist, the basilica's pastor, shared with the congregation that just the previous Monday Vanessa's family had celebrated her 23rd birthday "at the chapel, here," he gestured.

Eugene was 77 and Betty. 75. The couple is survived by a son, Richard; a daughter, Janice; and four grandchildren. Mr. Bravieri is survived by a

sister Yvonne Klatt, and Mrs. Bravieri by a sister. Bernadine Yardley.

A mass for the couple was celebrated at Park Ridge's St. Paul of the Cross.

whether or add them to the Village Theater's chain.







nator Ross Rice, said that the agency doesn't have a responsibility to monitor the Internet and the postings put on it. They can only take action in postings that m to be eredible, or threats inst a specific person or place. And even if those threats turn out to be hoaxes, then the Attorney General will prosecute that person to the fullest extent of the law.

Rice also said he supports full punishment against those who wish to commit hoaxes of any kind, in light of the mail tainted with powdery substances. Regardless if the letters contain anthrax or not. "these are still considered acts of terrorism," he said.

As far as the FBI is concerned, however, they are not involved with the e-mail that tells the story of a young lady who was dating a man from Afghanistan until he disappeared on September 6.

ACT scores are accepted by virtually all colleges in the nation, including all Ivy League schools. The test fee is \$24 (\$27 in Florida). A student's ACT scores are considered by colleges for admissions and course placement, along with several other important factors including high school GPA, college prep courses taken in high school, extracurricular activities, personal background and other information.

To learn more about the ACT Assessment, including registration forms and test locations, contact your high school counselor or

Seniors who have already taken the ACT can take it again and try for a higher score. Juniors and sophomores can also take the exam and use their scores to examine academic weaknesses, take courses to correct those weaknesses and re-take the exam at a later date. Students who take the exam more than once can report only their highest composite score to prospective colleges if

There are four sections to the ACT Assessment: English, reading, math and science reasoning. Some colleges and universities require only the ACT Assessit measures four academic areas. Save money on heating bills

- 3. Scal air leaks in the attic floor and add insulation. The Infiltrometer blower door test often finds significant air leaks in the attic floor. Examples are open partition walls, recessed lights and gaps around chimneys and plumbing stacks. Seal them and then add insulation up to today's code to cut heat loss through your
- 4. Install and use a programmable thermostat, Lowering the temperature at night and 'when no-one's home does save enrgy. But you don't have to sacrifice comfort! Ask your heating contractor to install a "programmable thermostat" that will turn the heat back up before you wake up or before you come home.
- 5. Replace your furnace air filter. Most systems need a new filter every month to ensure safe and efficient operation.
- 6. Have your heating system cleaned and timed by a qualifed contractor. A furnace or heat pump tune up is a good investment. It reduces the chances of breakdowns in the middle of winter and pays for itself through more energy efficient operation. 

Edward Jones: What to do if the 'Pink Slip' Arrives

In recent months, we've seen report after report of companies making major layoffs. It may not happen to you, but if it does, what financial moves should you make?

Before you take any steps, just remember one thing: You don't need to panic. While getting laid off is certainly not pleasant, it's also not the end of the world. In fact, many people who go through this experience land on their feet, with jobs as good as or even better than they had before.

Nonetheless, you'll still want to ensure you make the right decisions during any time you are laid off. Here are a few ideas to consider:

- Be prepared. The best time to deal with any financial pressures resulting from a layoff is well before the layoff occurs. That's why you should maintain an emergency fund to cover at least six months to a year's worth of living expenses. You may want to keep these funds in a money market account that offers liquidity and competitive returns. Then, if you do get laid off, you won't have to rush into selling off your long-term
- Protect your 401(k). If you're laid off, your 401(k) will present you with a tempting target. After all, it's just sitting there -- and it may contain a lot of money. But raiding your 401(k) could be one of the worst mistakes you make. If you do cash it out, you'll have to pay income taxes on the proceeds, and if you're under 59-1/2, you also may have to pay a 10 percent premature distribution penalty. And, just as bad, you'll be depriving yourself of a major source of retirement income. If you're really cash-strapped, you may be able to take out a loan on your 401(k), but you should take this step only as a last resort. You'll be better off either keeping your 401(k) in your former employer's plan, moving it to your existing IRA, or transferring it to a "rollover" IRA, from which you can eventually move it to your new employer's 401(k).
- Consider adjusting your asset mix. If you've maintained a diversified portfolio of investments, you'll be in good shape to make some needed adjustments in case of a layoff. For example, if you have a lot of growth-oriented investments, such as stocks, you may want to think about selling some and then investing the proceeds into income-producing vehicles, such as bonds. That way, you won't have to deplete all your assets -- and once you're employed again, you can readjust your portfolio to match your investment personaljty, time horizon and long-term goals.
- Borrow wisely. If you have to borrow, be smart about it. A loan from a family member or close friend may affect your pride, but it's less expensive than one offered by a high-interest-rate credit card.

By planning ahead and using your resources wisely, you can almost certainly get through a layoff with your financial future intact. So take the necessary steps -- and keep moving forward.



That Time of Year

School is back in full swing and the seasons are begining to change. Gone are the hot and sweaty summer days. Back are the crisp and cool days where nothing can beat a comfy sweatshirt and worn-out jeans. Time to get out the rain-coat, hats and galoshes to protect from the chilly autumn rains. Whether it's the kids going back to school or the change in the seasons, the flu rears its ugly head once again.

Influenza (or the flu, as it is commonly called) is many times confused with other viral infections like colds and intestinal ailments such as gastroenteritis. Influenza has more serious symptoms and can lead to medical complications like pneumonia. Influenza is a viral infection that attacks the respiratory tract, but it does not affect the intestines as many people believe. People who have influenza experience a fairly high fever, cough, sore throat, runny or stuffy nose that may be confused with the common cold. Influenza differs in the severity and additional symptoms like headache, muscle aches, extreme fatigue and in rare cases nausea, vomiting and diarrhea. Although most people recover completely from infuenza after 1 to 2 weeks, a small percentage are hospitalized due to complications. Influenza should he taken seriously because approximately 20.000 Americans die annually from influenza and another 100.000 require hospital-

There are three types of influenza-A. B and C. Type C has the mildest symptoms and is relatively stable so it does not evolve into a large outbreak. Types A and B occur almost every winter therefore they are the types people worry the most about. Types A and B are constantly changing viruses that develp regularly into different versions every couple of years and are responsible for large outbreaks. The constant changing enables the virus to evade the immune system. Occasionally there is a sudden change in the make-up of a type of influenza that may infect a large

portion of the population because there is not an antibody to protect against that particular strain. If the new virus is easily spread from person to person an epidemic may develop quickly.

There have been three epidemies of influenza this century. The first one, Spanish flu in 1918 was responsible for 500,000 deaths in the U.S. and 20 million globally. In 1957 there was the Asian flu when 70,000 people in the U.S. died. The most recent epidemic was the Hong Kong Flu of 1968 that caused 34,000 deaths.

The best way to guard against influenza is to get an annual flu shot. Older people and those who suffer from chronic heart, lung or kidney problems, diabetes or live in an institution have a higher risk of contracting influenza. Influenza is contracted by inhaling small droplets of infected air. People with chronic diseases or diabetes may have a weaker immune system that has difficulty fighting off the influenza virus. Those who live in institutions increase their chances of contracting influenza through sheer numbers. The more people someone comes into close daily contact with the higher the chances of contracting an air-The influenza vaccine's effec-

tiveness fluctuates from year to year depending on the similarity between the previous year's strain and the current year's strain in circulation. The influenza season is from October to May with the peak being December to March. The vaccine's efficacy varies from person to person depending on age and general health. Contray to what most people believe a person cannot contract influenza rom the vaccine. Vaccines in the U.S. are manufactured from dead influenza viruses that cannot cause afection. The vaccine provides antibodies to help fight the influenza virus and has very few side effects. The most common side effect is soreness at the injection site. On a rare occasion people have allergic reactions to the vaccine so those who have a predisposition to allergies should check with their doctor first.

Folic Acid could prevent birth defects

The Illinois Spina Bifida Association said today that during October. Spina Bifida Awareness Month, it is reminding women of childbearing years that consuming increased amounts of folic acid daily before becoming pregnant could significantly reduce the risk of spina bifida, the most common disabling birth defect.

Ann Walsh Johnson, executive director of ISBA, explained that the organization is offering a new brochure explaining the benefits of taking folic acid before pregnaney. The brochure has been distributed to health care providers and high school health instructors throughout the state. Additional copies in English or .Spanish are available from Illinois Spina Bifida Association. 3080 Ögden Avenue. Suite 103. Lisle, ILlinois, 60532, or by calling (630) 637-1050 or 1-800-969-ISBA.

Johnson added that the U.S. Public Health Service reconsmends that all women of childbearing years consume 0.4 milligranis, or 400 micrograms, of folic acid every day, and cat foods rich in folate, which refers to the vitaniin as it naturally oeeurs in foods. Johnson pointed out that spina bifida and other neural tube defects occur within the first month of development, when many women are not yet aware that they are pregnant. That's why it's important that they maintain a sufficient level of folic acid BEFORE they become preg-

Folic acid, a B vitamin, is found in orange juice and other citrus fruits and juices, leafy green vegetables, beans, peanuts. broccoli, asparagus, peas, lentils and whole-grain products. Many foods are fortified with folic acid, such as breakfast cereals, breads, rice and pasta made with enriched

flow of chi (pronounced "chee"). Chi is the life force or vital energy that flows through the body along 14 invisible channels (meridians). 





Secondhand smoke poses serious health risks

Each year thousands of innocent nonsmokers suffer needlessly from secondhand smoke - the smoke exhaled by smokers and the smoke that comes from the burning end of a cigarette, pipe or cigar. According to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), secondhand smoke "is responsible for" 3,000 lung cancer deaths among non-smoking Americans each year. Second hand smoke also accounts for as many as 62,000 deaths from coronary heart disease in the United States annually. Studies rank secondhand smoke as the thirdleading cause of preventable



The Eyes Have It

Glaucoma sounds like a grandma and grandpa disease of the eye. Approximately 5 percent of people over age fifty will devleop glauconia. Glaucoma results in a loss of vision and hardening of the eyeball. If left untreated, glancoma can cause blindness.

Glaucoma occurs when pressure in the eyeball increases. damaging the optic nerve. The front of the eyeball is filled with aqueous (fluid) that is continually produced and drained from the eye. When too much fluid is produced or too little fluid drainsfrom the eyeball, intraocular pressure is increased. Glaucoma s almost always the result of drainage problems.

Open-angle (angle referring to the angle where the iris meets the eornea) or chronic glaucoma is the most common type of glaucoma. Over 90 percent of glaucoma Chronic glaucoma does not have and progressively damage the optic nerve. Vision loss is not usually noticed because it begins with the edges of the fields of vision. The most telltale risk factors for chronic glaucoma are age and of open-angle glaucoma is usually unknown.

is quite different from ehronic glaucoma in that symptoms usually strike one eye only and are sudden. Symptoms range from severe headaches or eye pain, nausea, severely blurred vision and colored halos (rainbows) around lights, these symptoms are coupled with an initially slight decrease in sight that develops rapidly. Sometimes the eyelids swell and the eyes become red and watery. Acute glaucoma is usually due to the shape of the eyeball. When the pupil dilates due to dim lighting, eye drops and certain medications, the drainage canal becomes clogged.

There are three kinds of tests used to determine if a person has glaucoma. The test everyone remembers from routine eye exams is the air puff test. The puff of air electronically measures intraoeular pressure of the eyeball. Yellow drops may also be used to cases are of the chronic variety. measure intraocular pressure. A second test involves an ophthalany symptoms because there is a mose ope to utilize a bright light very gradual increase in pressure to view the health of the optic as drainage canals slowly clog nerve at the back of the eyeball. The third test checks visual fields or peripheral vision. The patient looks straight ahead and is asked to report when he/she sees a spot of flashing light at the side. Failing the third test is usually the family history. The actual cause first sign of chronic glaucoma as it affects peripheral vision first.

The most common type of Close-angle or acute glaucoma treatment for both chronic and

acute glaucoma is usually medicated eye droips. Medicated drops routinely increase aqueous drainage thereby controlling the development of the disease. Medication is used to relieve the pressure for those suffering from acute glancoma but microsurgery or laser surgery is usually required to permanently alleviate the disease. On occasion medication does not fully ease intraocufar pressure of chronic glaucoma and surgery is necessary to complete treatment. Most people respond positively to treatment for chronic and acute glaucoma.

The best way to "prevent' glaucoma is routine eye exams. It important to eatch glaucoma early minimizing optic nerve



"Compulsive gamblers often undergo personality changes, becoming angry, irritable, and argumentative," said Dr. Lorenz. Family mmebers may also withdraw and feel depressed and helpless."
