Parents object to French language curriculum

A group of parents with children in District 64's Carpenter and Washington Elementary Schools serving Park Ridge and Niles were disappointed to Tearn a request they made to the school board last April had been

The request, to change the language taught from French to Spanish at Carpenter and Washington, was denied. Instead, the board voted unanimously to retain French as the language curriculum taught at those schools

The foreign language program applies to students in Grades two through five.

The District 64 curriculum model was inaugerated in 1996. It provides that French is taught at Carpenter and Washington Schools, while Spanish is taught at Roosevelt, Field and Franklin Schools.

Maine Township pantry seeks food for area needy

The food supply at Maine Township's Emergency Pantry has slowly slipped away.

The Pantry serves Maine Township individuals or famihes who have applied for and are qualified to receive benefits, or who are found to have an emergency need.

The agency is located at Maine Township Town Hall, 1700 Ballard Road, in Park Ridge.

Marsha Warnick, the township's director of general assistance, says of the diminishing food supply. "It was sort of sudden. I knew we were giving out more and more baskets, but I didn't focus on how that would

affect the food pantry. We need food now, for the holidays and for next year," she said. Warniek will contact schools,

ehurehes and scout groups to see if they will host food drives to benefit the pantry.

The agency gets good donations during October through February, but this year's greater need has left bare space on many shelves.

Warniek said the average number of baskets distributed last year was about 98, but that average jumped to 120 this year.

Wash your hands frquently in cold and flu season. And teach your children to wash their hands properly. Use hot, soapy water and dry thoroughly. If you are ill, be sure to wash hands after coughing or sneezing to avoid spreading your disease.

Keep kitchen and bathroom countertops clean, especially when someone in your family has a cold. And don't share drinking glasses or silverware with other family members.

Children in school or daycare and workers at a busy office come in contact with many people who may be infected. When selecting a daycare center, choose one that emphasizes good hygiene and has strict policies for keeping sick children at home. Smaller childcare centers can also help reduce your child's contact with cold and

Many people try herbs or sup-

er echinacea can reduce the duration of a cold or flu. Results of the research are mixed. The herb may work by increasing the number and activity of white blood cells, which fight infections. Echinacea is available in liquid extracts, tinetures, tablets, and capsules. Begin treatment at the first sign of infection and continue until symptoms are gone. Avoid taking echinacea for more than eight weeks at a time.

Vitamin C helps promote a healthy immune system. Most people get enough vitamin C (also called ascorbic acid) in their diet. When you're sick, your body may use more vitamin C to aid healing. Orange juice, green peppers, strawberries, broecoli, tomato juice, brussels sprouts, and spinach are good sources of vita-

Vitamin C supplements are available as tablets, capsules. powdered crystals, or liquids. Check with your healthcare provider before taking more than 500 or before giving vitamin C to a flushot for prevention.

Zinc lozenges may help prevent or treat colds. Zinc sulfate is the most common supplement form, but may cause stomach upset. Health care providers usually recommend 220 mg zinc sulfate. Higher doses may actually lower immune function

As with all herbs and vitamin supplements, talk with your doctor or pharmacist before taking a supplement, especially before giving one to a child.

Your Best Shot at Prevention While there is no sure way to stay germ-free all winter long, you can protect yourself from the flu with a flu shot. The shots are 70-90 percent effective for preventing the flu and worth the added protection for many. Flu shots are particularly recommended for people over 50, women in the last six months of pregnancy, and anvone with immune suppression, diabetes, or lung, heart, or

kidney disease. Since the influenza virus usually peaks in December, get a flu shot in late October or early November. It takes a week after the shot to establish immunity. You'll need a new flu shot every year. since the viral strains that cause the flu change from year to year.

Two prescription medicines. oseltamivir (Tamiflu) and zanamivir (Relenza), are used to treat the flu and may help prevent mg of vitamin C on a daily basis it. But neither works as well as a



Generic CIPRO now available for U.S. citizens

FEMA and the Red Cross have prepared guidelines for personal and family protection in the event of a Biological attack. These plans call for having any needed prescription drugs on hand and ready for use.

The purchase of CIPRO (generic name Ciprofloxacin) domestically requires a prescription and few physicians will prescribe this for you to have on hand.

However, one of the world's largest producers of Ciprofloxacin, Ranbaxy Ltd. in India, is waiving the prescription requirement for U.S. citizens in light of the current threat. The prescription waiver applies only to those antibiotics used in cases of biological attack.

Average U.S. retail for a single 500 mg tablet is \$7.50, with 120 tablets required for treatment to Anthrax exposure. The Ranbaxy brand is offered at \$2.25 per 500 mg tablet. Prices provided by www.Medicines.MD.

Credit card interest rates aren't dropping

Rhode said.

"Credit card interest rates are like oil prices." said Steve Rhode. president and co-founder of Myvesta.org. "They drop slowly and rise quickly."

The Federal Reserve has cut interest rates aggressively this year leading to low rates for mortgage and auto loan customers. 'Credit card customers aren't as lucky," Rhode said. "Even though credit card interest rates haven't dropped like other loans, shopping around still pays off. With over 20,000 different credit card programs available, chances are you'll be able to find one that suits your needs, if you're willing to do some research."

Rhode added, "Many people think that the only credit offers available are the ones that come to their mailhox. Compare cards on the Web, ask your friends and family about their cards or ask banks what cards they offer. You'll be surprised at the variety of offers."

Often people think that the only way to get a lower rate on a credit card is to switch cards, but the best rate eard may already be in your wallet.

"Once you've done the re-. search to figure what rates are available, call your credit card company and ask them to lower your rate," Rhode said. 



Heroes and victims honored

On Oct. 6, the Cook County State's Attorney's Office honored the victims of violence in our community in a moving ceremony attended by nearly 1,000 people. Each year at our annual Homicide Victims Memorial at the South Shore Cultural Center, the families of the innocents who have been slain on our streets take a moment to remember their loved ones and honor them. Those who are responsible are not faceless foreigners who have slipped in to our country to undermine our society, they are "homegrown terrorists." They walk among us. Many of them are organized into gangs. They have terrorized our citizens too long. They peddle their poisons and threaten us and shoot us. In recent years, these urban terrorists have killed police officers stationed in the community to make it safer. Two police officers have been slain in recent months and two members of street gangs have been charged with first-degree murder in the slayings.

This past month we saw death a thousand times over, transmitted through our television screens. We saw a violent crime of epic proportions. And we saw

our nation's response. We read of firefighters who ran up the stairs of burning skyscrapers as others were running down. We saw rescue workers tirelessly dig through the rubble. day after day, with the hope of saving even one life. They labored in dangerous and unstable conditions. They were heroes looking for heroes.

There was tremendous sympathy for the victims and their families. It was as it should be. One memorial after another has been captured in print and on television, honoring innocent victims. Over the last few weeks, we heard of the passengers in that fourth targeted plane, who banded together to overtake their hijackers. We will never know the whole story of that heroism, but everyone agrees they are heroes. If that plane had somehow made it to Chicago and crashed into one of our high-rise buildings, we know that our police and firefighters would have been surging into that inferno to rescue the innocent, without stopping to worry about the risk to themselves.

These brave men and women spring from a nation of risktakers, of pioneers, and fighters. We are diverse, yet still united.

That is a great and mighty heritage, and that, I believe, is part of what will pull us through. Yet we've also seen the difficulties that diversity brings. For years we've struggled with it. And since September's horrific event, that challenge has appeared before us

once again. Probably many of you have heard of the reactions of some Americans to this horror. They're angry - as we all are - and they've lashed out in anger. They've chosen an unfair target, just as the terrorists did. They've chosen the innocent.

The state's attorney's office have charged several individuals in four hate crimes motivated at least in part by the events of Sept. 11. In one case, a Vernon Hills man went to Chicago's North Side and confronted two Pakistani immigrants - a man and a woman - who were waiting for a bus. He cursed them and told them to "go back where you cane from." He then attacked a man who came

to their defense. He was arrested and charged with a hate crime. The other cases

Prosecutors have to make tough judgment calls on a daily basis. This was no tough call. We

will prosecute anyone who commits a hate crime and seek prison time where appropriate.

Hate and terror may go hand in Richard A. Devine Cook County State's Attorney hand. But vigilante justice will



The store will sit on a land parcel acquired a few years ago by Mega Properties, 4849 Milwaukee Avenue in Chicago. That parcel once held two properties, a manufacturing operation and a residence.

The most recent development proposal for the site met opposition at a zoning board meeting some time back when local residents objected a Burger King and a Mobil gas/car wash on that corner. A spokesman for Mega Properties referred to feedback received from that meeting which indicated to him that area residents would welcome a drugstore.

A local architect, Camburas & Theodore in nearby Des Plaines, will put up the 14,000-squarefoot, free-standing store. The entry will face the corner, with parking lined up along both sides of the building. Landscaping is planned between the street and sidewalk and within parking islands. If space allows, landscaping will also be installed between the sidewalk and parking

This new feature represents further development within the Milwaukee-Touhy TIF District created by the village in 1996.

Recent use of the corner for used-car sales events was not welcomed by some condominium residents living on upper floors. They complained that lamps mounted on poles flooded their living rooms and bedrooms with light.

Postpartum initiative introduced

U.S. Sen. Dick Durbin (D-IL) has introduced new bipartisan legislation in conjunction with U.S. Sen. Peter G. Fitzgerald (R-IL) to help women suffering from postpartum depression. Durbin developed the legisla-

tion, the "Melanie Stokes Postpartum Depression Research and Care Act." in response to a recent rash of suicides linked to postpartum depression.

The bill is a companion to a similar bill introduced in the U.S. House of Representatives by U.S. Rep. Bobby Rush (D-IL).

Since June of this year, four women have committed suicide in the Chicago area while suffering from severe postpartum depression or psychosis. The first was Melanie Stokes, followed by Amy Garvey, Aracely Erives and Jennifer Mudd Houghtaling.

"Postpartum depression can cause a tragic and senseless waste of life," Durbin said. "We can and must do what we can to help the many women suffering because they are failing to receive the treatment they need. I commend Congressman Rush for taking the nitiative on this important issue."

"Studies indicate that a substantial number of new mothers experience postpartum depression. Sadly, we do not fully understand the causes of this depression now how to treat it effectively," Fitzgerald said. "If this bill can help even some of the women afflicted by this disease, it is a step in the right direction."

Durbin and Fitzgerald's bill asks the U.S. Secretary of Health and Human Services to hold a series of national meetings to develop a plan of action for research on postpartum depression and psy-

chosis and implement the plan following its establishment. The research would hopefully lead to effective treatments for this disease. The bill also would set up a community grants program at the federal agency responsible for mental health treatment to provide treatment and services for families suffering from postpartum depression.

The new legislation would create a coordinated approach to understanding and dealing with postpartum depression with the potential to benefit millions of women, children and families na-

Studies indicate at least 50 percent to 75 percent of all new mothers undergo the "baby blues," a feeling of let down after the emotional experience of childbirth. Serious postpartum depression affects 10 percent to 20 percent of women. Symptoms include excessive worry or exhaustion, sadness, feelings of guilt, apathy, phobias, sleep problems, physical complaints and marked fear of criticism of mothering skills. The symptoms may last three months to 14 months. The most severe form of postpartum depression, postpartum psychosis, affects an estimated one in 1,000 new mothers and may lead to attempts at suicide or

At present, very little is known about the causes and effective treatments for depression and psychosis suffered by pregnant or new mothers. However, new evidence suggests the disorder may be treatable if promptly diagnosed and attended to by a trained

ALF sponsors **Hepatitis C testing**

The American Liver Foundation (ALF) Veterans Hepatitis C Liver Disease Council will be sponsoring a new round of hepatitis C testing for U.S. Veterans. During the campaign, which is being held through November 30, 2001 hepatitis C virus home test kits will be made available to veterans. The ALF Veterans Hepatitis C Liver Disease Council. which includes members of the American Legion, AMVETS, Disabled American Veterans, Veterans of Foreign Wars, Vietnam Veterans of America, and the National Veterans Affairs Council/American Federation of Government Employees, held Lubash said he plans to file a two similar initiatives during 2000. The test kit, manufactured by Home Access Health Corporation, is the only FDA-approved, at-home test for hepatitis C. The test is clinically proven to be as accurate as tests used by doctors and hospitals. With the easy-touse test, a person collects a small finger-stick blood sample in the privacy of his/her own home and then mails it to the Home Access lab for processing. Using a personal identification number that guarantees confidentiality, the person can call a toll-free number to learn their test results within 10 business days. Counseling, test results and medical treatment referrals are available 7 days a

IEPA urged to stop food irradiation plant

The Illinois Food Safety Coalition has requested the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency to stop construction of a food irradiation plant in Glendale Heights because the builder has failed to obtain a state-mandated air pollution permit. The plant, which will house a high-power linear accelerator, will release significant amounts of ozone, a smogproducing chemical that can cause serious health problems and environmental damage. In addition to ozone, the plant will also release unspecified quantities of nitrous oxides into the community's air.

San Diego-based SureBeam Corp. began work on the 56,000square-foot facility in the High Grove business park in August. SureBeam is an affiliate of Titan Corp., a defense contractor that has adapted linear accelerators originally designed for the "Star Wars" program to irradiate food with ionizing radiation from electron beam lenear accelerators. The process results in the formation of ozone, a highly volatile form of oxygen that is tightly regulated by state and federal environmental agencies because it is the prime ingredient of smog.

Glendale Heights falls within the Chicago area 8-Hour Ozone Nonattainment Area. The Non-Attainment Area program designates areas with consistent nonattainment of National Ambient Air Quality Standards.

"SureBeam Corporation has not submitted a single document to the IEPA estimating the annual ozone and nitrous oxide releases from the Glendale Heights plant now under construction, and has failed to file for the required permits according to Illinois clean air law and administrative code," said Paul Fehribach, Director of the Illinois Food Safety Coali-

tion. "It is incumbent upon state officials to order construction to cease - immediately."

When inhaled, even by healthy people at very low levels, ground-level ozone can cause permanent lung damage, aggravate asthma and heart disease, reduce lung capacity and impair the body's immune system, making people more susceptible to bronchitis and pneumonia, according to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency. Children are most at risk because their respiratory systems are still developing. Outdoor workers and the elderly are also particularly vulnerable.

Additionally, according to the EPA, ozone can cause a wide range of environmental problems, such as making plants more susceptible to disease and pests, interfering with plants' ability to produce and store food, and, over time, harming entire forests and ecosystems. Ozone is also responsible for destroying a halfbillion dollars worth of crops per year, including wheat, soybeans






