Discussions begin on funding expansion of Maine High Schools

The Maine Township District 207 school board heard four options presented on how to finance expansion projects at Maine South and Maine West.

The district's assistant superintendent of business, Marilee McCracken. presented these options with a goal "to start discus-

The first option would pay for the projects using money from the site and construction fund established by the board from the the sale of Maine North in 1990. The fund is intended for site acquisition or building construction, for operations or maintenance of building and sites, or to transfer into any district fund that is in need of money.

Use of this \$10.5 million

fund. while appropriate. would cancel out the fund.

Issuing debt certificates is a second option. These would be similar to the lease agreements the district issues for technology needs. The longer the term of debt, the higher the interest rate the certificates pay, said McCracken.

The district could direct this debt repayment back to the site and construction fund, which would maintain it but reduce the working cash balance.

Another choice would be to restructure current working cash bonds to cover current construction costs. McCracken estimated issuance of an additional \$10 million in bonds.

Local plaza to offer discounts to all uniformed police, firemen

As fundraising continues for families of fallen New York firefighters and police, the retailers at a Morton Grove shopping plaza have chosen to show their appreciation by offering discounts to all uniformed police and firefighters.

Jay Bown, property manager of Lonore Plaza at the northeast corner of Dempster and Harlem said he came up with the idea as a ay to honor rescue workers following the September 11 attacks.

"The great thing is that we got 100 percent participation from, not just the smaller retailers, but the big guys too." said Brown.

"everyone was thrilled to do it." Home to national chains Boston Market and Subway, as well as smaller shops like Murray Cleaners, the strip mall's retailers are offering 10 through 50 percent (their choice) discounts from now until the end of the year.

'We're not limiting it to local police and firemen - we don't care what state you come from," said Brown, who added that several retailers expressed interest in continuing the program beyond December 31.

Officials blame hike on move to central dispatch system Morton Grove voters to

decide on 911 fee hike

Morton Grove trustees have voted to ask residents to approve an increase of the telephone surcharge which supports the village's 911 service.

Village officials hope to increase the surcharge from 75 cents to \$1.50.

If this passes on the March 19 primary ballot, it will be the first 911 surcharge increase since 1994, in Morton Grove.

Park Ridge. Des Plaines and Niles charge \$1 per month for 911 services, noted Morton Grove Administrator Larry Arft at an agenda review session before the meeting.

The village is going to central dispatching next year; however. Arft said the surcharge increase has nothing to do with Morton Grove's joining neighboring communities in the operation of a central emergency dispatching center. The new equipment is needed either way, said Arft.

At the time that the joint dispatching agreement was authorized, a consultant's study indicated such a joint program

would reduce the village's costs. The study stated the village would save about \$329,000 in operating and new equipment costs during the first year.

While joint dispatching is expected to save about \$160,000 after the first year, the actual cost to the village will be about \$21,000 higher than estimated.

The National Safety Council is reporting the rate of child deaths from air bags has declined 90.3 percent between 1996 and 2000, despite the fact that the number of passenger air bags on the road has more than tripled to 80 million in the same time period.

The primary reason for the dramatic decline is a strong shift in how drivers are transporting children in motor vehicles. A new survey found no drivers of vehicles equipped with passenger air bags report they are placing children ages 0-4 in the front seat. Only 10 percent of these drivers say they allow children ages 5-12 to ride in front of an air bag.

"Clearly the message has gotten through to the majority of parents that children 12 and under should always ride correctly buckled in the back seat," said Chuck Hurley, Executive Director of the Air Bag & Seat Belt Safety Campaign of the National Safety Council. "It's the combination of education, stronger seat belt and child passenger safety laws, and high visibility enforcement that has produced the awareness and behavior change we see today, and probably most importantly enforcement of the

While air bags are credited with saving 7.224 lives to date. 191 people including 116 children have died from air bagrelated injuries. Virtually all of the children killed were completely unrestrained or improperly buckled up in the front seat.

Twenty-six children were killed by air bags in 1996 when there were approximately 22 million vehicles equipped with passenger air bags in the U.S. fleet. Child deaths rose to 34 in 1998 as the number of passenger air bags hit almost 50 million, and then declined to nine in 2000 as passenger bags rose to more than 80 million. For all drivers and passengers, the death rate from air bags has declined by 80%.

Several factors contributed to the decline in air bag fatalities. A number of states strengthened seat belt and child passenger safety laws, and enforcement of those laws was stepped up dramatically by all states. Simultaneously, the Air Bag & Seat Belt Safety Campaign along with government.

chances they would cause injury in low severity crashes. "While we are proud of the dramatic reduction in air bag deaths, small children are still being killed by air bags and too many kids ride unbuckled." said Hurley. "Despite changes in behavior and advances in air bag technolo-

gy, our work is not done and our

message remains the same: Everyone should ride buckled up and kids 12 and under should be properly restrained in the back seat." The report notes that many of

the air bag equipped vehicles on the road have older, higherpowered air bags that pose greater risks to occupants. Older air bag vehicles are moving into the hands of second and third owners who may not be informed about air bag risks. It's critical that these consumers hear the safety messages so they can take action to protect their children.





Senior Prescription Drug Assistance Deadline

Seniors ages 65 and older or those who are disabled are reminded to file for these benefits before the end of the year in order to get prescription drug assistance for 2002. The Circuit Breaker/Pharmaceutical Assistance Program is administered by Maine Township, 1700 Ballard Road. Park Ridge.

#19-Miners

Forms are available at Township offices for financial assistance for prescription medication expenses to those who meet income qualifications and certain other criteria. The filing deadline for 2002 is Dec. 31, 2001.

The state program is administered by Maine Township and others and provides assistance for those who need prescriptions for heart disease, blood pressure problems, diabetes, arthritis, cancer. Alzheimer's disease. Parkinson's disease, glaucoma, lung disease, smoking related illness, and now osteoporosis.

Individuals must also have an annual income of \$21,218 or less (\$28,480 for a couple or \$35,740 for a three-person household) to be qualified. Seniors can apply for a Pharmaceutical Assistance Card after they receive their W-2's, earnings statements, or other financial information in January each year. Cards cost \$5 for individuals below the poverty level and \$25 for those above it.

With that card a Senior can obtain prescription medication for covered diseases with a \$3 co-pay for those with a \$25 card and no co-payment for those with a \$5

After cardholders reaches a \$2,000 annual cap, they must pay 20 percent of costs.

Are you a normal or severe driver?

(NAPS) -- How do you think automobile manufacturers would characterize your driving? Surprisingly, according to their definitions, most people who think they are normal drivers are in fact severe.

Take heart. Severe driving is not about your driving style. It refers to the conditions you drive in. If you drive in hot or cold weather, in dusty or muddy conditions, on rough roads, in lots of stop and go traffic, make frequent short trips, and/or drive in coastal areas or where road salts are used, you are a severe driver.

The majority of owner's manuals recommend changing the oil every 3,000 miles if the vehicle is driven under severe conditions. However, according to a recent poll, most people either do not read their manuals (or only skim them when they first purchase a car), or they misinterpret the information. Younger drivers are even less likely to consult their owner's manuals than their older counterparts, according to the

survey.
The Pennzoil-Quaker State Company/Harris Interactive Poll also revealed that 86 percent of the 3.345 people surveyed initially rated themselves as normal drivers. Only 14 percent thought they were severe. However, when given the criteria for severe driving conditions, the numbers dramatically reversed.

Soccer Moms = Severe Drivers Many people are surprised to learn that what they thought were normal driving conditions are actually severe. For example, few people would initially consider "soccer moms" to be severe drivers, but when you consider the numerous short trips and stopand-go traffic that they endure as they shuttle their children to and from their many activities, you

definition. Once normal and severe conditions were explained, the 14 percent of survey respondents who originally assumed they were severe drivers increased dramatically to 55 percent. Also, the 90 percent of female drivers who first assumed they were normal dropped to 40 percent.



Bill signed to protect public safety personnel

Illinois motorists who do not take appropriate actions when approaching accident scenes will face tough penalties, under a new law sponsored by Assistant Senate Majority Leader Walter Dudycz (R-7th, Chicago).

Signed into law by the Governor Aug. 9, House Bill 180 has come to be known as "Scott's Law," after Chicago Firefighter Lt. Scott Gillen, who was killed by a reckless driver on Dec. 23. 2000. when he responded to a traffic accident

"'Scott's Law' is a vital piece of legislation created with the sole purpose of protecting emergency workers throughout Illinois," Lt. Gov. Wood said. "As it has been tragically proven, careless driving around emergency scenes can result in the injury or death to the firefighters, police officers, or other emergency personnel who risk their lives to save ours. This law will help protect those who

The legislation provides that, upon approaching a barricade or a stationary authorized emergency vehicle displaying flashing lights, a person driving an approaching vehicle must:


 proceed with due caution, yield the right-of-way by making lane change into a lane not adjacent to that of the barricade or authorized emergency vehicle, if possible with due regard to safety and traffic conditions, (if on a highway having at least four lanes with not less than two lanes proceeding in the same direction as the approaching vehicle); or

• proceed with due caution, reduce speed while maintaining a safe speed for road conditions, if changing lanes would be impossible or unsafe.

A motorist who violates the above provisions faces a fine of up to \$10,000. If the violation results in damage to the property of another person, in addition to any other penalty imposed, the person's driving privileges will be suspended for not less than 90 days and not more than one year. If the violation results in injury to a person, the suspension would be not less than 180 days and not more than two years. If the violation results in the death of a person, the suspension will be for two years.

House Bill 180 takes effect Jan. 1, 2002.

Storms approaching Will your landscape survive?

Late fall and winter are the seasons for some of nature's most severe weather. Storms in all shapes and forms create havoc throughout the country. One of the greatest dangers posed by storms are presented by falling trees. Unsafe trees are a threat to lives and property.

Many shade and ornamental trees are damaged throughout the year by windstorms, lightning or ice and snow accumulations.

Damage usually consists of a few broken branches. However, more severe damage - such as splitting or pulling apart of branch unions, removal of large areas of bark, twisting and splitting of the trunk, or even uprooting - pose possible

A few tree species, including Chinese elm, silver maple, boxelder and various poplars, have brittle wood that is easily broken.

Homeowners should be aware of these chracteristics and avoid planting them close to potential targets. If such trees are already growing in these locations, preventive pruning, bracing, or cabling may help reduce storm damage this winter. This is particularly true as the tree grows in size and the weight and surface of the leaf and branch

Over the years, growing trees will "catch" more wind and become heavier, so they are prone to increased mechanical stresses, thus increasing the chances of failure. Larger trees will also affect an increased area should they or their larger limbs fall. This means that power lines, homes and other structures that might not have been threatened a few years ago might suddenly be underthreat by a tree that has grown. Preparing trees for these natural disasters is a must and should be done well in advance of the stormy season. To help ease these

dangers, have a professional arborist evaluate your trees. Doing this will help you determine potential weaknesses and dangers.

Look at your trees for the following warning signs:

 Wires in contact with tree branches. Trees may become energized when they are contacted by electric wires.

Dead or partially attached limbs hung up in the higher branches that could fall and cause damage or injury.

Cracked stems and branch forks that could cause catastrophic failure of a tree section.

 Hollow or decayed areas on the trunk or main limbs, or mushrooms growing from the bark that indicate a decayed and weakened

· Peeling bark or gaping wounds in the trunk also indicates structural weakness.

• Fallen or uprooted trees putting pressure on other trees be-• Tight, V-shaped forks which

are much more prone to failure than open U-shaped ones. Heaving soil at the tree base sound root system.

Remember, too, that a tree is a living thing, and its integrity and stability change over time, so don't assume that a tree that has survived 10 severe storms will necessarily survive an 11th.

What can you do?

Homeowners who are looking for someone to assess their landscape should contact the national Arborist Association (NAA), a 63-year-old public and professional resource on trees and arboriculture. It has more than 2.800 members who recognize stringent safety and performance standards, and are required to carry liability insurance An easy way to find a tree care service provider in your area is to use the "Locate Your Local NAA Member Companies" program. 

Advice on winter survival for seniors

Allen Graber. Director of Maine Township's Emergency Management Agency, offers seniors tips and advice on surviving the harsh Chicago winter.

"Timely preparation for yourself, your car, and your home can avoid some costly and unpleasant circumstances or problems when the severe weather hits this area," Graber says. "It is a matter of safety to know what and when to react to a winter storm, even a blizzard."

Graber advises that some advance preparation goes a long way in being safe and sound this winter. For example, store drinking water, a first aid kit, canned/ no-cook food, non-electric can opener, radio, flashlight, and extra batteries where you can get them easily, even in the dark, he

Other tips include: Before Severe Weather Ar-

1. Keep your car and other vehicles fueled and in good repair. Also, keep a winter emergency

kit in each. 2. Know how the public is warned i.e. siren, radio. TV. etc. and the warning terms for each kind of disaster in your community. This might include knowing the differences, for example, between a "winter storm watch" and a "winter storm warning" or a winter weather advisory.

3. Know how to turn off gas, electric power and water in your home in case of the need to evacu-

4. Winterize your home and prepare it by installing storm shutters or windows, clearing rain gutters, repairing roof leaks. and checking the structural ability of the roof to hold unusually heavy amounts of snow and ice.

During Any Storm or Emer-

1. Monitor your local radio and/or TV stations for information and emergency instructions. 2. Have your emergency survival kit ready to go if told to evacu-

3. When going outdoors wear several layers of loose-fitting lightweight, warm clothing rather than one heavy layer. Outer gar-

ments should be water-repellent. Note: mittens are warmer than gloves. Wear a hat. Cover your mouth with a scarf to protect your lungs. Wear sturdy, waterproof

4. If advised to evacuate, tell others where you are going, turn off all utilities, then leave immediately by the routes designated by local officials.

During a Winter Storm.

1. Conserve fuel, if necessary, by keeping your house cooler than normal. Temporarily shut off heat to unsued rooms.

2. If using kerosene heaters, maintain ventilation to avoid a buildup of toxic fumes. Keep heaters at least three feet away from anything flammable. Refuel kerosene heaters outdoors.

3. Avoid travel, if possible. If you must travel, do so during daylight hours and don't travel alone. Stay on main roads and keep others informed of your schedule and route, if possible.

After the Storm. 1. Report downed power lines and broken gas lines immediate-

2. Check for physical damage to your home and confirm that water pipes are working.

3. Check on neighbors, especially anyone who might need

4. Beware of overexertion and exhaustion from shoveling snow, tec. Set priorities and pace your self on any duties or cleanup.
