Capparelli eyes 15th in redistrict fallout

State Rep. Ralph Capparelli. D-13th, will bid for the new seat of the redrawn 15th district, now that parts of his 13th district have been incorporated

Capparelli. deputy speaker and House dean, resides in Chicago's Edison Park community, which falls in the newlydrawn 20th district. A Capparelli win in November would mean he moves, probably to Edgebrook, he says, so he can continue in his post as 41st Ward Democratic Committee-

The new 15th District overlays much of Chicago's north side, including Peterson Park. Sauganash, Edgebrook, Forest Glen. North Mayfair and Mayfair, plus parts of suburban Morton Grove, Lincolnwood and Niles.

His current 13th District is approximately 67 percent Republican, but the new 15th District is 58 percent Democratic. He sees the state's biggest challenge as keeping the budget balanced in the fiscal aftermath of the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks.

Capparelli. who has served in the state house since 1971. worked with Sen. Walter Dudycz (R-7th) to obtain financing both for the new Edgebrook Library as well as for the upcoming branch in Oriole Park.

William Miceli, a resident of Chicago's Jefferson Park community will vie for the 15th district seat on the Republican ballot. and oppose Capparelli in the Nov 5 general election.

Miceli, 53, is a programmer at Jones Academic Magnet High school.

Miceli started politics as a Democrat. serving as precinct captain for former 39th Ward Alderman Anthony Laurino. and switched as he grew older, saying that when the party became more liberal, it did not speak to some issues he had.

AT&T Cable expected to be sold in spring

The anticipated sale of AT&T Broadband has its subscriber communities in the area wondering what kind of service the new company. Comcast Corp., can deliver.

For their answer, those communities affected have hired Stuart Chapman, former Schaumburg assistant manager. and Barry Orton, professor at the University of Wisconsin, to conduct the due-diligence re-

Comcast, a family-owned company based in Philadelphia. has offered to buy AT&T's broadband services, plus cable television and Internet service. for \$72 billion. They hope the sale will be final by year-end.

New law makes leaving child in car illegal

New legislation sponsored by state Senator John Cullerton, D-Chicago, and signed by Governor George Ryan defines legal endangerment in terms of children left unaccompanied in

The new law, scheduled to take effect June 1, establishes a maximum time and a minimum age for leaving a child unattended.

The new law states that a child under 6 years of age must not be left in a vehicle, running or not. for more than 10 minutes, unless accompanied by someone at least 14 years old.

A person who leaves a child unattended and out of sight in an auto can face charges of child endangerment and a penalty of up to one year in prison and a \$2.500 fine.

Wachtel said the sale could benefit Morton Grove cable users because Comcast is in the cable TV business, not the telephone business. "They run it like a traditional cable company," Wachtel said.

Park Ridge hires accounting firm to determine loss in park thefts

Following felony theft charges leveled against two former park district employees, the park district of Park Ridge has hired an accounting firm to help determine the extent of its loss.

Mann, Weitz and Associates, LLC. a Deerfield-based accounting firm. has been engaged to review financial records of the city's ice arena. A first meeting between city officials and the accounting team is tentatively scheduled.

The review will start with representatives of the accounting firm meeting with Lynn Jarog, the park district's superintendent of finance, to go over the accounting system used at the rink. The accountants will review financial records, including daily scheduling for years 1999, 2000 and 2001, and confirm with the rink's major patrons annual payments made for rink rental. Accountants will review the rink's monthly revenue sources plus procedures and controls relating to those revenues, and make recommendations.

"We believe this is the right thing to do," said Renic Schreiber, park district spokeswoman. Matthew Horbas, former revenue and facilities coordinator

for the park district, has been charged with theft of between \$15,000 and \$17,000, and Josephine Chicalace, former arena manager, with theft of over \$12,000. in the same case. Both, accused of using city funds for riverboat gambling expenses, are scheduled to appear in court Jan. 31.

MG to raise parking fees at **Metra Station**

Morton Grove Metra parking fee increased Parking fees will be increased at the Morton Grove Metra Station sometime in February.

Village trustees voted to raise the daily parking rate from \$1 to \$1.25 when the new automated system is complete. The new rate was recommended by Metra, which owns all but one of the lots.

New boxes will accept prepaid fare cards which will be available through the village.

Extra revenue will be used at the station, either for repaying or for a new station building.



Niles North Senior carries Olympic torch


Mary Sievert didn't know what to think when she opened a letter saying her son. Shawn (pictured right), was nominated to carry the Olympic Torch as it passed through Illinois in carly January. The letter asked Shawn's parents not to mention

It's a Great Time to Boost Retirement Plan Contributions

As 2001 comes to an end, it brings all of us in the work force one year closer to retirement. Of course, that day may still be a long time away for you, but it's never too soon to prepare for it. And now you're in a better position to do just that - thanks to the Tax Relief Act of 2001.

When the new tax laws were passed, most of the public attention focused on the reductions in marginal tax rates and one-time tax rebate. But other changes were enacted, too and some of them may prove even more important to people saving for retirement. Specifically, the new laws have increased the contribution limits for IRAs. 401(k)s and other types of employer-sponsored retirement plans.

How much more can you contribute to these plans? Let's take a look

Beginning in 2002, you can contribute up to \$11,000 to your 401(k) or 403(b) plan, up from \$10,500 in 2001. And this contribution ceiling will gradually rise over the next several years, eventually reaching \$15,000 in 2006. After that, the annual contribution limit will be indexed for inflation.

Starting in 2002, you will be able to contribute up to \$3,000

per year to either a traditional or Roth IRA - up from the current \$2,000 limit. From 2005 through 2007, you can contribute up to \$4,000 per year. And in 2008, you will be able to contribute \$5,000 per year. After that, your contribution limits will be indexed for inflation.

While these higher contribution limits will clearly benefit everyone interested in building their retirement savings, workers age 50 and over received even more good news. That's because the new tax laws contain "catch-up" provisions that allow these workers to exceed the new contribution limits.

Starting in 2002, workers 50 and over can contribute an extra \$1,000 per year to their 401 (k) or 403(b) plans. This "catch-up" allowance will increase by \$1,000 per year until it reaches \$5,000 in 2006, after which it will be indexed for inflation.

"Catch-up" contributions also will be allowed for IRAs. Starting in 2002 those age 50 and older before the end of the taxable year can contribute \$500 more than the regular limits of both traditional and Roth IRAs. This amount will increase to \$1.000, starting in 2006.

All these higher contribution limits will benefit you in at least two key areas:

Increased retirement savings - With higher contribution limits, you'll be able to put away more each year for retire-

ment. Over time, these increased contributions can add up to a significantly higher

level of savings for you. Plus. your 401(k) and traditional IRA contributions will grow on a tax-deferred basis, which means more of your money will be working for you right

Potential reduction in income taxes - Generally, you make 401(k) and 403(b) contributions with pretax dollars: consequently, the more you contribute, the lower your annual tax bill. Depending on your individual situation, you also may be able to make taxdeductible contributions to a traditional IRA, so the more you put in, the lower your taxable income may be. (Check with your tax adviser before making any moves with your

As you can see, the new 401 (k) and IRA contributions limits can help you out a great deal. Start taking advantage of them soon.

Tips on selecting home care help

Home care agencies differ in many ways. They may be Medicare certified or non-Medicare certified. They may be for profit or not-for-profit, and they may be independent or affiliated with a larger agency. Agencies differ also in the types of services they pro-





Edward Jones: Two college savings options: Coverdell and 529 plans

If you have children who will be attending college in a few years, you recently got a nice pre-enrollment gift from the government. Specifically, the Tax Relief Act of 2001 enhanced the Coverdell Savings Plan (formerly the Education IRA) and Section 529 plans, giving you more attractive options for college funding. Let's take a look at how these plans compare in some key areas:

• Tax advantages - Your contributions to a Coverdell Savings Plan are not tax-deductible, but all earnings and withdrawals are tax-free, provided you use the money for qualified education expenses. (The new tax law also allows Coverdell Savings Plans to be used to help fund elementary and secondary school

Section 529 plans are offered as either prepaid tuition plans or state-sponsored college savings accounts. Until the Tax Relief Act, you would have had to pay taxes when you took distributions from your 529 plan. These taxes were based on either the increased value of the tuition contract or the savings account earnings. The taxes were assessed at the student's tax rate, but they still had to be paid. However, starting in 2002, all qualified withdrawals will be free from federal income tax, although the money will appear on the child's tax

• Contribution limits - Effective in 2002, if you meet certain income limits, you can contribute \$2,000 a year to a Coverdell Savings Plan. up from just \$500. By contrast. Section 529 plan contribution limits are typically quite high - more than \$200,000 per beneficiary in many state plans. You also can contribute as ittle as \$15 per month, although contribution limits vary by state. (Before making any major contributions to a Section 529 plan, you'll want to consult with your tax adviser, because gift and estate tax laws may be

• Investment options - A Coverdell Savings Plan offers you an almost limitless array of investment options - stocks, bonds, certificates of deposit, etc. If you establish a Section 529 college savings account. you can choose from the investment options offered by the particular state's plan that you've selected.

• Effect on financial aid - Because a Coverdell Savings Plan must be set up in the child's name, a college's financial aid office will count it in his or her assets when calculating aid packages. Colleges generally require children to contribute about 35 percent of their assets for college costs, compared with less than 6 percent of parents' assets. On the other hand, a 529 plan's savings account is considered your asset, with your child or grandchild the beneficiary. However, any money you withdraw from a 529 plan will show up as income on your child or grandchild's tax return this year - and this income, although not federally taxed, will be considered for aid the next year.

As you can see, you must consider several factors before establishing either a Coverdell Savings Plan or a Section 529 plan. Fortunately, you no longer have to choose between the two; the new tax laws allow you to invest in both simultaneously, beginning in 2002.

Whichever path you choose, get started soon. College costs continue to increase rapidly - so you'll want to be ready when you get that first bill from the bursar's office.



"It is defintely not too late to get your flu shot," said CCDPH Director, Dr. Karen Scott. "Since flu has not yet seriously affected suburban Cook County, getting a flu shot now will still offer plenty of protection."

Flu shots will be provided to suburban Cook County residents: 50 years of age or older,

Persons who are allergic to eggs or are sick with an infection or fever on the day of the clinic will not be immunized. A yearly influenza immunization is necessary because the vaccine changes each year and protection lasts for only the current

65 years or older who have never had a pneumococcal shot, those 65 years and older who received the vaccine before age 65

Natural vitamin E is more expensive and is more prone to contamination. You can save money by porchasing synthetic vitamin E which reads on the label as tocopherol and tocopheryl acetate, s merely a matter of personal choice






