New bus company causing havoc in District 219

District 219's decision to transfer its busing contract to a new vendor has become problematic, at least until the kinks are worked out.

The district awarded the contract to Alltown Bus Company last May after problems arose with Durham Bus, the previous

But although Alltown made a good start with summer scheduling, the full fall schedule finds that drivers are missing stops and are uninformed about their

Alltown's vice president, Sal Guadagna, apologized to the 219 board recently.

He further explained that Alltown has not been told how many students to expect along each route. This has resulted in filled buses unable to pick up students waiting down the line.

He also said that many districts assign students to board at a particular stop. District 219 does not, Guadagna said, which makes it harder still to determine ridership numbers.

Neighbors complain about Dempster St. donut shop

A 24-hour Dunkin' Donuts franchise in Niles has created problems for its residential neighbors across the street in Morton Grove.

The business also includes Baskins Robbins ice cream and Togo's sandwich franchises. added about one year ago.

Neighbors say they have lost sleep because noisy customers loiter in the parking lot and outdoor eating area.

The outdoor area is supposed to be closed between midnight and 7 a.m., according to terms of the special-use permit issued by the Village of Niles.

But the neighborhood residents who signed and presented the petition to officials charge that those conditions are not be-

Des Plaines addresses local flooding problems

In hopes of correcting ongoing problems, city officials are investigating causes for area flooding, which occurs, not surprisingly, along the Des Plaines River system but also in certain western areas of the city.

A tentative study by French & Associates, Ltd., of Park Forest, has located 278 properties within 11 areas of Des Plaines that have sustained flood damage of more than \$1000. The study is based on flood insurance data.

School volunteers to submit to police background check

New policy in District 64 seeks to protect children; Other area school districts seek new policies

This year, Elementary School District 64 will ask any volunteers who might meet unsupervised with a child to submit to background checks.

Recent emphasis on crimes against children has brought security issues to the forefront.

Niles/Park Ridge District 64 Superintendent Fred Schroeder said volunteers will be asked to fill out a form for a background check.

In the past, Schroeder said, the district checked against a list of children's sex offenders on a monthly basis.

Schroeder says the cost of background checking will be

Evanston's District 65 sends newly hired employees for electronic fingerprinting at a cost to district of \$55 per person. Prints are compared with those on file with state and federal agencies.

Helen Mardis of District 65 says electronic fingerprinting improves turnaround time for background checks from a matter of weeks to days.

District 65 approaches the security issue by placing volunteer programs in public areas only.

Homeowners brace for second installment tax bills

The county says that the second-installment property tax bills will be in the mail by the end of September, due in early November.

This year's multiplier has gone up from last year's, from .2235 to 2.3098.

Within Niles, some residents are taxed by one body, others by another, depending on location.

Tax bills for Niles residents living near Park Ridge include a tax for Park Ridge Recreation and Park District, for instance.

Within Niles, Maine Township's rate is .133, a slight decrease from last year,

Niles Township's rate is .036, also a small decrease from last year's rate.

To take a shot at estimating your bill, take your home's fair market value and multiply it by the assessment rate of 16 per-Continued on page 30

Neck pain study initiated

Neck pain is a common problem in adulthood. The lifetime prevalence of neck disorders can be as high as 67% and can lead to large costs to society due to lost workdays. Even more discouraging is the lack of agreement on treatment approach.

The National University of Health Sciences, a not-for-profit teaching and research institution in the suburbs of Chicago, is initiating a study to compare three common methods of care for chronic neck pain. One form of care is flexion distraction (a gentle manual procedure used in chiropractic practice); a second form of care is physical therapy (an active upper body exercise prograni); and the third form of care is a combination of the two.



During the cooler months, your lawn is making food to store in the root system so that it can continue to grow underground in the dormant season. That means it needs more food than normal and all the sunlight it can get. So rake those leaves.

• If raking leaves has become a hassle, simply convert your leaves to mulch by attaching a materials collection system to your mower, or use new mower deck systems that mulch the leaves and blow them right back into the turf. New mower technology means that you can leave your rake in the garage and avoid bagging leaves. Even better, the







Sound too good to be true? It probably is!

We all want fo find the hidden gem, the easy solution, and the get rich quick scheme. Investors bought shares of Enron Corp. and WorldCom, not fully understanding the businesses or the risks. Investors thought, "what's to understand - stocks are going up rapidly." Then the corporate shell game came to an end, and Ennron and WorldCom became two of the largest bankruptcies in United States history.

Just as investors looked for stocks to get rich quick, taxpayers want fo find a way to avoid paying taxes entirely. It is a well accepted principle that a taxpayer can legitimately plan his or her affairs in order to minimize taxes. However, it is illegal to commit tax fraud.

The number of criminal tax convictions is increasing steadi-Some schemes use domestic and international trusts in an attempt to conceal income from the Internal Revenue Service. The IRS has been actively pursuing these schemes, and the number of abusive trust related convictions has risen steadily from 24 in 1999, to 31 in 2000, and 45 in 2001. 


