EDITORIAL

Safeway should put up the for-sale sign; because when they bought Dominick's they moved into the wrong neighborhood

Dominick's Finer Foods, a fixture in Chicago's grocery business for three generations, has been repeatedly bought and sold over the past years. The current owner, Safeway of California, purchased the 130-store chain in 1998 for \$1.8 billion.

In 1999 Safeway negotiated a three-year labor contract with their 9,000 Dominick's employees belonging to the United Food and Commercial Workers union. Now, as they negotiate a new contract, Safeway is demanding union members accept a \$2 to \$3 reduction in wages to put them on par with workers at Jewel Foods. Safeway also wants seniority rules changed and union members to contribute to their health insurance.

Safeway has announced that these terms are non-negotiable and they are making plans to close down the Dominick's chain if the union does not agree to its demands. Safeway top executives have been quoted in the press saying the company could make more money selling off the assets of Dominick's, as opposed to continuing in the grocery business. Other executives have said if the union does not accept large wage cuts, stores will be torn down and turned into parking lots.

Those in the know have repeatedly said Safeway has brought all of its problems upon itself. They purchased a respected grocery chain known for the service it provided customers and the enormous quantity of product on its shelves. Safeway promptly tried to remake Dominick's into a generic Safeway store. They eliminated the large selection of product and replaced name brands with their own Safeway brand. They fired long-time store managers and corporate managers who knew this market intimately. They fired local buyers and centralized many critical decisions out of their California headquarters. And guess what happened?

Dominick's store sales have declined annually for the past three years. During the first 36 weeks of this year Safeway's net income fell by 75 percent to \$222.7 million. While the Standard & Poor's 500 Food Retail Index showed a nation-wide grocery decline of 35 percent, Safeway fell 47 percent.

Now they want to regain profitability at the expense of their union employees. Rather than admit the mistakes they made, they claim employee salaries are at the root of their problems. Don't mention, of course, that it was Safeway which agreed to these salaries and benefits when they signed the 1999 contract.

The bottom line is that Saseway has failed miserably in managing a large grocery chain in Chicago's extremely competitive market. And to add to the mismanagement, their approach to negotiating a union contract is, simply, beyond stupidity.

Safeway of California has delusional thoughts that they can break the union in Chicago to pave the way for other union negotiations they have around the country. While we staid midwesterners like to joke about the strange things they smoke in California, Safeway's behavior may prove this joke to be too true.

The bean-counters have told all 15,000 Dominick's employees that they may soon be out of work. Who do these bean-counters think they are to behave like this?

Safeway thinks they can come into Chicago, one of the great labor union cities of the world, and dictate like a California rancher talking to migrant workers. Well, that just does not cut it here.

This is Chicago. Unions built this city. They produced the steel that built the United States. Unions broke their backs to keep the railroads growing to create the greatest wealth in the history of the world. The unions in Chicago butchered the meat which the unions in Chicago put on their railroads and sent to feed this country.

If Safeway is blind enough to allow the United Food and Commercial Workers union to strike, the Teamsters will not allow any deliveries into Dominick's stores. Customers will join in the boycott of the stores and the results will be disastrous.

What has happened at Dominick's is that the company has been bought and is now being run, not by grocers, but by bean-counters. Whether these bean-counters were in the grocery business or women's clothing or garbage collection business, they would behave the same way. They would push very hard for profits and, along the way, produce a mediocre product.

However, these bean-counters figured wrong when they came to Chicago. Here there is competition. Here you need to take off your \$600 suits, put down your little-boy-toy computers and cell phones, get into the Dominick's stores and......work. You need to be the bag boys, you need to be the cashiers, you need to stock shelves, work behind the deli counters, work in the back room. You need to work at the front desk taking guff from customers while maintaining a smile. You have to work until your soft, bean-counter hands become calloused. Then, and only then, you might have some idea how to profitably operate the grocery stores you just paid \$1.8 billion for.

Unfortunately, when the bean-counters graduated from college they hadn't learned very much about the real world. So now, their idea of negotiating with a union is to threaten to close the stores. Besides the 9,000 members of the union, there are an additional 6,000 employees. The bean-counters have told all 15,000 Dominick's employees that they may soon be out of work. Who do these bean-counters think they are to behave like this?

Well, bean-counters, you have come to the wrong place. This is Chicago. Carl Sandburg's 'City of the big shoulders,' and Nelson Algren's 'City on the make.' This is the city where things happen. They happen for better and for worse, with money above the table and below the table, and in ways which are not always pretty.

This is Chicago. Unlike you California bean-counters, we drive General Motors cars, live in modest homes, cut our own lawns, and send our kids to state schools for college.

You know what else? In Chicago we eat meat for lunch. We eat meat for dinner. And we are about to eat California bean-counters for breakfast.





Through fliers and newspaper ads, which read, 'items bought and sold for cash' police alerted criminals to the pawn shop. Large quantities of ecstacy, cocaine, and other drugs were sold to undercover investigators. Stolen jewelry valued at \$15,000 Sheriff Michael Sheahan said

Historic cemetery hopes to keep jets at bay

St. John's United Church of Christ once stood on land now occupied by O'Hare Internation-

The congregation moved to Bensenville when forced out for airport construction in the late 1950s but left its historic churchyard cemetery behind.

Today. Chicago officials would have history repeat itself. but St. John's is resisting.

The church has filed suit in DuPage Circuit Court against the City of Chicago to prevent removal of its 153-year-old ce-

Named as partners to the suit are two ladies of the congregation aged 78 and 69. The first has a husband and an infant child buried there; the second has all four grandparents resting under the jets.

The suit charges that removal of St. Johannes Cemetery violates three statutes.

First, it claims that Illinois law prohibits removing a cemetery without the assent of its owners or trustees.

The church's board of directors and its legal caretakers, the St. Johannes Cemetery Committee, have not given assent.

Second, the suit claims that removal, which would substantially burden church members' exercise of religion, is allowable only if (Chicago) can show compelling governmental interest, and if relocation is the least restrictive means of accomplishing that interest. St. John's suit maintains that Clucago has not so demonstrated.

You can contribute large amounts to an annuity. and, as is the case with a 401(k), your earnings grow on a tax-deferred basis. If you need to make a withdrawal from an annuity, any accumulated carnings are taxable at the time of the withdrawal. In addition to paying income taxes, you may also be subject to a surrender charge by the issuing insurance company. And if you are younger than 59-1/2, you may be subject to a 10 percent IRS penalty on the earnings.

You have a wide array of investment options in all these retirement plans - 401(k)s, IRAs and annuities. But the volatile stock market of the past few years may make you leery of funding your retirement plan with stocks. However, stocks historically have been the only financial asset to provide the type of growth that most people need to achieve their long-term goals.

But what can you do to help protect yourself from the volatility of the stock market? First, start investing early for retirement - the more time you have on your side, the better your chances of overcoming temporary market downturns. Next. diversify the investments within your retirement plans. By spreading your dollars among a wide array of stocks - along with bonds. government securities and money market vehicles - you can blunt the impact of volatility and give yourself more chances for success.

By taking these steps you'll go a long way toward achieving your retirement objectives - and when National Retirement Planning Week rolls around again, you can look back on a year's worth of progress.
