

The district's operation fund is on the same downhill track, says Stacy Mallek, executive director of business services. She expects that fund balance to be gone by the end of the 2004-05 school

D207 finances healthier than many

Maine Township District 207 heard a good report from auditors recently.

A representative of the auditing firm William F. Gurrie and Co., Ltd. presented the board with an audit overview at a recent meeting. At present the District is fis-

cally healthy, said Tim Cole, but 12:30 p.m., at Liberty Bank, 6666 warned that once balances start Tom Erd will speak on The Lore Lincoln, Lincolnwood. Coffee to disappear, they go fast.

The District is budgeted to spend \$114.3 million this year versus a revenue of \$107.8 million, with the difference to come from fund balances.

Registration **Deadline for ACT** Exam March 7

College-bound high school students can take the ACT Assessment on April 12, 2003, the next nationwide test date. The registration postmark deadline is March 7. Late registration postmark deadline is March 21 (an additional fee is required for late registration).

ACT scores are accepted by viitually all colleges and universities in the nation, including all lyy League schools. The test fee is \$25 (\$28 in Florida). Colleges use ACT scores, along with a student's high school GPA, the type of college-prep courses taken and other information to help deternume admissions and the appropriate course placement for new students

The Act Assessment is an achievement test in English, reading, math and science. It measures what students have learned in high school, and the skills required for success in college. It is not an aptitude test. Some students find it more comfortable than an aptitude test because it refleets their high school curricuhim The ACT was administered more than 2 million times last

Important tips - Students who have already taken the ACT can take it again and try for a higher score. Juniors can use their scores to examine academic weaknesses, take courses to correct those weaknesses and re-take the exam as seniors. Students who take the exam more than once can report only their highest composite score to prospective colleges if they choose.







WordMasters Challenge

The texts students must ing Maine East High School has analyze for the Challenge can just won highest honors in the second meet of this year's Word-Masters Challenge, a national competition for high school students requiring close reading and analysis of many different kinds of prose and poetry. Participating with 266 high school teams from all across the country, the school's ninth, and tenth-grade Blue Division team tied for eleventh place in the nation in the December meet. The team was upervised by Dennis Wyatt.

Five of the school's students won highest honors for individuial achievement as well. Freshmen Sam Lim and Merin Thomas and sophomores Daniel Kim, Mark Paik, and Yana Yakhnes all carned perfect scores in the meet, where nationwide only 110 ninth and tenth graders did so. At the same time, competing in the Gold Division meet for eleventh and twelfth graders, junior Erica Szczur and seniors Lukasz Gararek and Ellen Lau all placed among the 235 highest-scoring students at these grade levels nationally.

The premise behind the Word-Masters Challenge is that attentive reading and sensitivity to language are among the most important skills students acquire

range from short fiction by Eudora Welty or John Updike to poetry as old as Shakespeare corras recent as Margaret Atwoods and to essays as classic as E. B. White's or as current as Newmer Lopionion piece by George Will Though the texts vary widely in voice, subject, tone, and length, they have one thing in common style. All use language skillfully to convey layers and shades of meaning not always apparent to students on a first or casual reading. Like the questions on the verbal SAT I, the SAT II in English Literature, and the Advanced Placement exams in both Linglish Language and English laterature. the questions posed by the Word-Masters Challenge ask students both to recognize the emotional and/or rational logic of a piece of writing and to notice the ways in which a writer's style shapes and shades his meaning. Because the WordMasters Challenge is a classroom activity and not a college-entrance exam, however, it can be a learning experience, not just a high hurdle. After complete ing a Challenge, classes are encouraged to talk about the texts and the answers to the multiplechoice questions, and are also given addition topics for opennded discussion and/or written

The texts for the second Word-Masters meet this year were an essay by the biologist Lewis Thomas (for 9th and 10th graders) and essays by Jedediah Purdy and Anna Quindlen (for 11th and 12th graders). The school's students will participate in two more meets in the coming months, and medals and certificates will be presented in June to those who achieved and/or improved the most in the course of the year.

Common Asset Protection Mistakes in Estate Planning

We all know that estate planning includes decisions about what should happen to our assets upon our death or disability. However, people often overlook asset protection issues and strategies in the estate planning process. Asset protection is the shielding of assets from potential creditors and others. Here are some common asset

protection mistakes made in the estate planning process:

Failure to consider asset protection in funding the trust. Some states allow property to be held in "tenancy by the entirety." a form of joint ownership between spouses. As long as property is held in tenancy by the entirety, a creditor of one spouse cannot reach the asset. States vary as to whether this protection is lost if the asset is transferred to deprive them of government bena trust. Similarly, states typically allow some of the value of a home as an exemption in bankruptcy. Some states even exempt the entire homestead. Again, states vary as to whether the protection of the homestead exemption applies if the property is in a trust.

Estate Planning is Life Planning

leaps to most people's minds when they think about estate planning? A will. We've all seen he dramatic scenes in films of vesteryear: the reading of the will. The truth of the matter is that the will is no longer the focal point of estate planning.

A well-rounded estate plan inludes four documents: a revocable living trust, a general durable power of attorney, a health care ower of attorney, and a will. Probably the least important of these is the will. A will is only eftective at death, the other three documents have an impact during our lifetime.

In order to be effective, a will must be admitted to probate. Propate is a process to clear title of property from the person who died to the people designated in the will. As with most legal processes, probate can be costly, ime-consuming, and public. Assets which go through this probate process are a matter of public record, open to the prying eyes of nosey neighbors and relatives, as well as con artists and other nefarious individuals.

Assets which are in a trust do not have to go through the probate process. In theory, when you place your assets in your trust, the legal title is no longer vested in you as an individual, but in the trustee of the trust. As a result, when you die, no probate process is necessary to clear title to the property. Thus, the trust bypasses the will and the probate process entirely. A "revocable living trust" is a trust, which is created while you are living, and which you can revoke or amend at any ume. A well-drafted trust can be extremely flexible and can facilitate management of your assets while you are well, during a period of incapacity, and long after your death. While you are alive and well, you would be the trustee and manage the assets in your trust. Upon your incapacity or death, someone designated by you would take over as trustee and would maange the trust, making investment and distribution decisions in accordance with the instructions you set forth in the

trust, providing continuity in asset management. In a general durable power of attorney, you appoint someone to make decisions for property not controlled by the trust. For example, your "agent" could file income tax returns for you, change beneficiary designations on life insurance and retirmenet plans, etc. The agent can also transfer any forgotten property into the trust. Again, this provides for a smoother transition during peri-

ods of incupacity.

In a health care power of attorney, you appoint someone to make medical decisions for you in the event you can no longer do so for yourself. You may also express any wishes you have regarding life-prolonging meas-




