

Residents catch glimpse of officers' lives at 'Citizens Police Academy'

For anyone who has ever wondered what it's like to be a police officer, the time has come to learn. The Niles Police Department will be offering a ten-week Citizens' Police Academy to any interested residents starting September 2.

"We want people to understand why we do the things we do," says Officer Ronald Brandt. "People wonder why cops sit at the side of the road, where their tax dollars are going, and what the police department does in general, so this is a good place to start."

Those involved in the academy will learn the basics of being a police officer. Such activities as a day at the shooting range, a day at the fire station, and an ride-along with officers on a full shift have been planned. In addition, Officer Brandt says, there will be one night when traffic stops are discussed. "We'll let [the students] try to do a traffic

stop on our own people," he says, "and let them get a feel for what a real roadside stop is, put a toy gun on them, and see what they can do."

After graduation, the alumni of the academy can continue their involvement with the Village of Niles. While there will be no "citizens' patrol," the hope of the academy is that those trained can more easily spot suspicious activities and recognize what the officers' jobs really are.

The CPA Alumni Association also helps run local events, including booths at the Fourth of July festival, the National Night Out, and Child Seat Check Days. The Citizens" Police Academy will run every Tuesday evening for ten weeks beginning September 2. Each class will last four hours and be held at the Niles Police Department, 7200 N. 
Andy Schneider Named **Bugle Managing Editor**

Schakowsky calls drug bill effort to privatize Medicare

Both the House and Senate approved a prescription drug benefit this summer that will affect over a quarter of Niles residents; but Rep. Jan Schakowski says landmark legislation's actual goal is to privatize Medicare.

"The bill that passed the house is really an insult to seniors and (other) Medicare beneficiaries," said Rep. Schakowski (D-9th) in an interview at her Washington DC office July 23, "This is a prescription drug benefit in name only."

At issue is a provision in the House bill requiring Medicare recipients to join a private insurance plan in order to receive the prescription drug benefit. Medicare would then pay insurance companies for the cost of

the drugs. While the Senate eventually removed the requirement from its bill, the White House heavily favors the provision. The requirement could be re-instated by a joint House-Senate conference committee working to reconcile both versions. President country have been dropped, Bush has said he hopes to sign a final bill into law by summer's

Additionally, the House version calls for traditional Medicare coverage, such as doctors' visits and hospitalization, to convert to a voucher program in 2010.

"What this does, really is change (Medicare) to a voucher plan, where seniors get

X-amount of dollars in order to find private insurance or HMO's that will take care of them," said Schakowski.

Illinois Council of Senior Citizens from 1985 to 1990, called the House bill "an insult to seniors" that would result in a loss of health care options for Medicare recipients and drive up

"Seniors don't want to be forced to go into HMO's. Actually, in Illinois, we have the lowest utilization of HMOs in the country. Seniors don't like them and their experience in HMOs is that many have been dropped, just as millions throughout the

because HMOs have shut down. So, turning Medicare to the private insurance companies is not the way to go," she said.

Fitzgerald, who said he voted for the Senate bill "with some reservations," explained that with hundreds, possibly thousands of insurance companies buying prescription drugs in place of Medicare, the drugs would not be ordered in bulk

"Here we have a unit of approximately 40 million people in Medicare, but the government can't really negotiate for more Schakowski, who directed the reasonable prices to give taxpayers the best deal," said Schakowski. "So we'll have to fund a \$400 billion program with nothing to contain costs."

Schakowski pointed to a report by the non-partisan Congressional Budget Office estimating that one-third of those Medicare recipients will lose their current prescription drug coverage.

"Right now 70 percent seniors do have some prescription drug coverage," said Fitzgerald. "Well, businesses in

America were excited about this bill because they see themselves dropping their drug health benefit for retirees and putting that burden on the Federal government." Fitzgerald added that he hopes the Senate-House committee will make the necessary changes and improve the bill.

Currently, Medicare is a "defined benefit plan," where medical insurance beneficiaries pay 20 percent of medical costs and the government picks up the percent. remaining 80 Beneficiaries also pay a monthly premium of about \$58.70 and a \$100 annual deductible (prices are higher for hospital insurance).

Though both the Senate and House versions estimate a \$35 monthly premium, private insurance companies will determine the actual price.

Under the Senate's version, beneficiaries will pay an annual \$275 deductible and 50 percent of their annual drug costs up to \$4,500. Beneficiaries with annual expenses over \$5,800 will pay only 10 percent.

However, if a beneficiary's annual prescription costs fall between \$4,500 and \$5,800, he or she will receive no drug coverage.

Under the House bill, beneficiaries will receive no coverage for drug costs between \$2,000 and \$4,900 annually.

The House version calls for a \$250 annual deductible and covers 80 percent of costs-up to \$2,000 annually for some beneficiaries. Individuals with annual incomes higher than \$60,000 (\$120,000 for couples) could spend as much as \$13,200 in prescriptions annually before the catastrophic coverage provision kicks in.

"This is so far inferior to what members of congress get that a bill was actually passed that says federal employees, including members of Congress, will continue to get the plan they get now and will not be forced into this new plan. So there's an acknowledgement that it's no good."

The measure barely passed the House by a vote of 216 -215, with 19 Republicans opposing. The Senate approved the bill 7

Greg, I'm a fan of open-wheel racing, especially the IRL and USAC. However, I can't understand how Formula One gets so much exposure on the Speed Channel. The racing is boring, and it's just recently that a little bit of passing has started. What's the big deal with Formula One? It's usually follow the leader. Let's have more American open-wheel racing. — Kevin H., Pennsylvania

A. Kevin, you are not alone in your feelings toward Formula One, as many American open-wheel fans feel the same. However, in defense of the series, I believe Formula One is the ultimate racing series in the world,

Formula One has been around since 1950 and is the only open-wheel automobile-based worldwide racing series. The finest drivers compete in this series, and the American-series flavor of drivers like Jacques Villeneuve, Juan Pablo Montoya and

Christiano da Matta (all former CART champs) make Formula One even more interesting. Other drivers who made major contributions from an American standpoint are Phil Hill and Mario Andretti, both former World Driving Champions who call the United States home. The cars, too, are the ultimate in rac-

ing machines and are completely

rebuilt after every race. Revving to

more than 18,000 rpm, a modern For-

mula One engine will consume a phe-

nomenal 650 liters of air every sec-

ond, with race fuel consumption typi-

cally around the 4 mpg mark. Revving at such massive speeds equates to an accelerative force on the pistons of nearly 9,000 times gravity. 





Understanding Fund Classes: Not Always as Easy as A, B, C

Before you buy a mutual fund, you'll want to do some research. What is the fund's investment philosophy? Who manages it? How diversified are its holdings?: Then, after you've done your homework, you'll have to use it for the right class. Specifically, you may need to choose which type - or "class" - of mutual fund shares you want to buy.

The most common classes are "A," "B" and "C." Which is right for you? Let's take a look at all three:

• Class A shares - When you buy Class A shares, you will pay an upfront sales charge, taken out of your initial investment. These sales charges (or "loads") usually range from 3 percent to 6 percent. So, for example, if you pay \$10,000 for a mututal fund that has a 5 percent load, \$500 of your money will go for the sales charge, with \$9,500 used to buy shares. Class A shares may also impose a "12b- 1 fee" to cover marketing and distribution expenses. These 12b- 1 fees are fairly low - about 0.25 percent annually. Class A shares traditionally have the lowest ongoing expenses of any class.

• Class B shares - If you purchase Class B shares, you don't pay a sales charge right away. Instead, you'll pay a "backend load" when you sell your shares. Typically, this back-end load decreases over time; for most Class B shares, the load disappears after about six or seven years. Class B shares often charge a higher 12b- 1 fee - as much as 1 percent per year. However, class B shares often convert to Class A shares over time, so you would then start paying the lower 12b- 1 fee.

• Class C shares - Generally, Class C shares do not charge either front-end or back-end loads if held for more than one year. But if you buy Class C shares, you may pay a 1 percent 12b- 1 fee for as long as you own the fund. Class C shares may not convert to Class A shares, so these continually high 12b- 1 fees can make Class C shares quite expensive, if you plan on

Which of these share classes is right for you? The answer depends somewhat on your individual situation. If you plan to hold a mutual fund for many years, then you might be best served by purchasing Class A shares.

How about Class B shares? After all, the vanishing sales load can be an attractive feature - if you are absolutely sure that you will hold your fund long enough to benefit from it. If you sell your shares early, you will have to deal with the backend charge. Plus, not all Class B shares convert to Class A, so you could be stuck with high 12b-1 fees, as well.

As for Class C shares, we've already mentioned a potential drawback - the inability to convert to class A shares with lower 12b-1 fees. Still, if you think you may only invest in a particular mutual fund for a few years, you might benefit from Class C's lack of front-end or back-end sales charges. Be careful, though - some Class C shares do carry these charges.

Clearly, you need to be sure of what your share class options are before you invest in a mututal fund. If you are investing in stock mutual funds, they are subject to market risks, including the potential loss of principal invested. Ask your investment representative which mutual funds are right for you and carefully read the prospectus, which should provide complete information, including fees, about any fund. But you also must focus on how a fund can fit into a diversified portfolio, based on your goals, risk tolerance and time horizon. If a fund isn't right for you, then it's not a bargain - no matter what it costs.

Last week we talked about the quick loans offered by many debt-relief companies to help you pay off your debts, but at super-high interest rates. This week we'll touch on the second of the three practices often used by companies that promise to relieve you of your debtor woes, but in doing so, will also relieve you of a chunk of

Let's say most of what you owe was run up when you used your (fictional) "Ajax" Credit Card to charge whatev-

er you wanted, whenever you wanted it. Then, for some reason, you were unable to make payments on time. With the interest rising on the unpaid balances, you were soon up to your neck in red ink. You might have used other credit cards to keep affoat, but they only weighed you down. You knew you needed help, and soon.

So, you turn to the debt consolidators who promise to do everything to provide you with quick relief from vour money problems, and all that with hardly any effort on your part. They'll arrange to consolidate your debts so you'll have only one payment a month, not several. They'll also negotiate a lower interest rate. All that's left for you to do is send them your payments (which, by the way, have a built-in fee) on time. They will forward them to your creditors who, in turn, will send them a rebate based on

a percentage of your payment. If you're willing to let the consolidators do all this for you for a rather hefty fee, OK. But you can do the same things they do and perhaps apply the money you save to reduce your debt sooner, thus also reducing your interest. Start by meeting with your creditors to set up a payment schedule. Get a commitment from them to lower your interest rates as you continue making timely payments. It's a win-

A new University of Michigan study shows that some 20 percent of seniors are using herbal supplements to selftreat symptoms of depression as well as dementia. And, according to the study's authors, this is a troubling trend. As lead author Dr. Helen Kales told the American Association for Geriatric Psychiatry, "Many patients in our study felt these preparations were harmless, even though they were not certain what they contained."

With seniors comprising the largest group of prescription-drug users,

there's always a risk that the ingredients in the herbal preparations, whether their manufacturers call them "safe" or "natural," or both, could cause serious interactions if used with the prescribed medications.

It's especially easy to be misled by the term "natural," which the supplement industry uses to sell the notion of safety without actually having to prove their claims. After all, if something is natural it has to be safe, so even if it can't help you, it can't harm you. Right?

Wrong. As I've written many times over the years, everything can be found in nature, which means everything is natural. But not everything that's natural is safe for human consumption. For example, the poison found in a small part of fugo, the Japanese blowfish, is a natural sub-

stance. But just a taste can kill almost instantly.


To sum up: If you, or someone you're caring for, uses herbal supplements to treat symptoms of depression and/or dementia, or for any other condition for that matter, tell your doctor so that she or he can act to prevent potential drug interactions before they can cause even more serious health problems.

Senator Durbin Proposal Wins Approval

Late last week, the Senate ap- addition to this document, Mitch proved a proposal in the Homeland Security Appropriations bill authored by U.S. Senator Dick (OMB), penned a note to Durbin Durbin (D-IL) that is designed to improve communications between federal law enforcement and intelligence agencies and to plug existing gaps in those agencies' computer systems. The Senate action came on the same day that Congress released a critical report highlighting "missed opportunities" to disrupt terrorism activities prior to the September

11, 2001, attacks. "As they stand today, the computer systems of the major agencies which we depend on to protect America cannot communicate with one another. In the post-September 11 world, that is a situation that we cannot tolerate," Durbin said. "The Administrtation has acknowledged this problem, but our progress toward alleviating it is not advancing as rapidly as it should. My amendment sets out a reasonable timeline to take stock of where we stand, where we need to go and how we should get there."

More than a year ago, the President issued a "National Strategy for Homeland Security" that stated: "(We) will build a national environment that enables the sharing of essential homeland security information. We must build a 'system of systems' that can provide the right information to the right people at all times." In

Replacement China

Six or seven years ago, I pur-chased a set of china — service for four — at a local discount store. It was Sakura in the Laredo pattern. Since then, I have broken a cup, a dinner plate and a salad bowl. How can I find replacements? - Bruce, Hondo, Texas

↑ There's good news and bad news. First the good. You can find replacement pieces for your china. The bad news is that a cup or saucer will probably cost you almost as much as you originally paid for your service for four. Even though your pattern isn't very old, it was discontinued in 1998 and prices for available pieces are not cheap.

One of the better companies to track down missing pieces of china, sterling and crystal is Replacements, Inc., P.O. Box 26029, Greenboro, NC 27420. The toll free number is 1-800-737-5223. Replacements was founded in 1981 by Bob Page, and the company has more than 180,000 "retired" china patterns housed in its 300,000 squarefoot facility. Availability isn't the problem, but price might be. Expect to pay \$45 for a dinner plate and about \$30 for a cup in your Laredo pattern.





Construction to Begin August 7th on **Edens Ramps at Old Orchard Road**

The Open-Door Policy

"O" is for "opportunity," and the knocking is loud now in Cleveland, as the baseball door is wide open.

The Indians, once a dominant force in the A.L. Central, are securely locked into the rebuilding process. Right before this year's All-Star break in July, they faced two opponents who vividly illustrated the various states of development for a franchise.

The New York Yankees are baseball's powerhouse, with the sport' highest payroll and stars galore. Their sole purpose is to win World Series crowns, and rebuilding is not spoken

The Chicago White Sox, meanwhile, made trades for two key players in early July. But despite the moves, the White Sox will likely embrace mediocrity for the near future, possibly winning the A.L. Central in a given year, but far from being a World Series threat. Rebuilding might not be all that far off for them.

The Indians, meanwhile, are definitely rebuilding, and the club that once was heavy on power hitters and light on clutch pitching has now gone the other direction, stocking up on potential quality arms and fielding a

lineup that is more well-rounded. The hope is that, come 2005, the India will be a serious contender.


In the meantime, Cleveland features a roster with names familiar perhaps only to their most ardent fans: Jody Gerut, Coco Crisp, Victor Martinez, Ben Broussard, Jason Davis and Billy Traber. Injuries to veterans Ellis Burks, Omar Vizquel and Matt Lawton have opened up more opportunities for younger players.

But the problem with a rebuilding team is that consistency is tough to find. The Indians started 7-20 this season, but have played around .500 ball since. During the series with the Yankees, Traber pitched a one-hitter one night, only to have C.C. Sabathia, the Indians' lone all-star this year at the age of 23, walk three batters in the first inning the next night and suffer a loss. Closer Danys Baez, in a doubleheader versus the White Sox, blew the save in the first game before recording a rocky one in the second.

Such things happen during rebuilding, but General Manager Mark Shapiro and first-year skipper Eric Wedge are committed to the plan. The Tribe won four of seven from the two teams before the break, but that, and the team's overall record, means-little this season, other than the experience of winning against quality opponents. In truth, some of the youngsters with

"forgettable" names will be forgotten in the long run. For now, the door is open. Yet the players know that when this year's window closes, next year's version won't be open quite as wide.
