District 64 teachers declare strike, rally in Uptown

striking Park Ridge/Niles teachers and the District 64 Board of Education resumed yesterday under the watchful eye of a federal mediator but at the time this story was written, no agreement had been reached. Over 4,000 elementary and middle school students have been out of school all week, after a negotiating session Sunday night broke off without success.

The two sides appear unable to close the gap between the amount of salary increase teachers want for each of the next three years, and the amount the district is willing to pay. The district has offered to raise the existing 2 percent step increase to 3.5 percent over each of the next three years. The teachers are asking for a 4 percent raise to 6 percent. Health insurance costs have been a major concern for both sides in the self insured district. Dean Krone, president of the Park Ridge School Board, says the district has offered to raise its contribution for family coverage by over \$3600 per teacher, if the teacher will pick up 5 percent of their individual (See Teacher strike on page 7)

Explosion, fire in unincorporated Niles ruled a suicide

n explosion and fire in unincorporated Niles Thursday night Nov. 6 left one man dead and kept 60 firefighters from five surrounding suburbs busy for hours as they worked extinguish the blaze in the two-story home in the 9300 block of

Greenwood.

The Cook County medical examiners office on Friday determined that Leo McDevitt, 44, died of carbon monoxide

McDevitt, 44, died of carbon monoxide poisoning by intentionally inhaling exhaust fumes as he sat in his car parked in the home's attached garage with the door closed.

McDevitt was found dead in a Chevrolet Monte Carlo that was outfitted as a stock car. Fire officials believe the buildup of carbon monoxide led to the explosion.

The force of the explosion blew the garage door nearly one hundred yards across the street onto the Golf Mill Shopping center parking lot and left the home so structurally weak firefighters were forced to fight the blaze from the outside. Miraculously no one was hit by

debris from the explosion.

"I thought it was an earthquake," said
Maxima Devenecia of 9326 N.
Greenwood, the home directly next to the explosion.

Maxima and her husband Leo had just sat down to dinner when the explosion

"It was like a bomb. My house moved," said Leo Devenecia.

Leo went to check downstairs in his home and as he came up stairs he seen the flames from the home next door.


"My husband told me to get out of the house," said Maxima the night of the explosion. "Our food is still on the table."

Unable to return to their home, the

Devenecia's went to stay with their son.
Although they lived next door the
Devencia's said they did not know much
about McDevitt and his wife aside from
the fact that they had purchased the home
within the last two years from an elderly
couple.

The explosion and fire forced officials to shut down Greenwood for nearly 18 hours as investigators tried to determine the cause.





Lauren Maloney, Park Ridge "It's not a win-win situation for anbody. The longer the kids are out of school the harder it is. I hope it's resolved quickly."





In-Home Care Do You Know What To Ask?

here are many important issues to consider when choosing a caregiver; among them what kind of agency to work with. There are different types of agencies and you will want to know about their differences before you make the decision of whom to employ. The three main types of non-skilled home care agencies you can access are as follows:

1. Hiring an independent caregiver who directly negotiates his/her fees and working schedule with you the client/employer. It initially may appear less costly, but do remember that in this situation you become responsible for the risks associated with being an employer.

2. Using an employment agency/registry where you pay a finder's fee to the agency and they find you a care giver. Again, you become responsible for certain risks associated with using a registry because often once you have paid the initial finder's fee, you the client may be responsible for the employee's social security, insuring sand bonding the employee, covering the employee under worker's compensation and managing the employee, particularly if they need a day off.

3. Using an angency where the caregiver is their employee and therefore the agency is responsible for managing, paying, insuring, bonding and covering the employee under worker's compensation. (Not all agencies choose to insure or bond their staff.) Again, it initially may appear more costly, but you have to take into consideration the risks that are being incurred by the company versus







PANCAKES THAT ARE SURE TO PLEASE

Surprise the family with a weekend breakfast or brunch of pancakes. Not the usual, but an extraordinary plate of cakes studded with toasted walnuts, flavored with cinnamon and topped with a sparkling, warm syrup.

You can stir up your own batter. But why should you when you can use a convenient and reliable boxed pancake/waffle mix? In the interest of time, toast the walnuts a day or two ahead and store them in a covered container.

Want to tickle the smaller tots? Go a step further and, using gingerbread man and lady cookie cutters, cut out shapes for gingerbread people pancakes. For those, we have another spicy batter recipe. Don't waste the leftover pieces. Keep them warm and serve them to Dad!

WALNUT PANCAKES WITH CRANBERRY SYRUP

- 1 cup Aunt Jemima syrup
- 1/2 cup fresh or frozen cranberries*
- 2 cups Aunt Jemima Complete or Buttermilk Complete Pancake and Waffle mix
- 1/2 cup walnuts, finely chopped**
- 1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1 1/2 cups water

Combine syrup and cranberries in small saucepan. Bring to boil over low heat. Cover and simmer 5 minutes or until cranberries burst. Keep warm.

Pour pancake mix into medium bowl. Add toasted walnuts and cinnamon; stir until well-combined. With wire whisk, stir in water. Mix just until large lumps disappear. Let stand 1 to 2 minutes to thicken. Pour slightly less than 1/4 cup batter for each pancake onto lightly greased hot skillet or griddle over moderate heat. Turn pancakes when bubbles form all over and some burst, and bottoms are golden brown. Serve with warm Cranberry Sauce. Makes 12 pancakes.

*Dried cranberries may be substituted. In that case, combine cranberries and syrup in small saucepan. Over medium heat bring to boil: reduce heat to low and simmer 8 to 10 minutes or until cranberries are softened.

**To toast walnuts, preheat oven to 350 F. Spread in single layer on baking sheet. Bake 7 to 9 minutes. Don't overbrown.

GINGERBREAD PEOPLE PANCAKES

- 3 1/2 cups Aunt Jemima Complete or Buttermilk Complete Pancake and Waffle Mix
- 2 teaspoons ground cinnamon
- l teaspoon ground ginger
- 2 1/4 cups milk
- 1/4 cup molasses

Combine mix, cinnamon and ginger in large bowl; set aside. In medium-size bowl, combine milk and molasses with wire whisk until well-blended. Add milk-molasses mixture to dry ingredients in large bowl. Blend until large lumps disappear. Pour slightly less than 1/4 cup batter for each pancake onto lightly greased hot skillet or griddle over moderate heat. Turn pancakes when bubbles form all over and some burst, and bottoms are golden brown. Use a 2-inch person-shaped cookie cutter to make cut-out gingerbread people. If desired, press 2 or 3 blueberries down center to make buttons. Makes about 19 pancakes.

ost people know the conseauences of not scheduling regular followups on patients who have undergone treatments for serious conditions can be tragic. Yet, according to a recent report by Mark Benjamin, a CNN correspondent, and a concurring account from veterans' advocate Steve Robinson, executive director of the National Gulf Resource Center, this is what has been happening to wounded and injured military personnel at Fort Stewart, Ga.

These men and women have complained not only of difficulties in getting follow-ups and other treatments — sometimes waiting for months to see a doctor — but have also described living conditions "substandard." for spokesman Stewart says the descripinaccurate: "Spartan" or "austere" would be the terms he would use.).

Robinson says he was so concerned by what he had seen that when he returned to his office, he called the House Veterans Committee his findings. Robinson's actions, along with CNN's decision to go ahead with Benjamin's story, may well have prompted the Pentagon to form an investigative team and to report back with their conclusions. As write this, there's no word vet on what the team found or what the Pentagon plans to do with whatever was uncovered. Meanwhile, the spotlight has been turned on this situation; let's hope no one tries to push it back into the dark.
