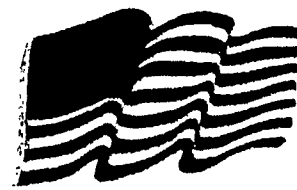

Medical campus considered for former Abt property

A Des Plaines developer's plan to put a medical campus and general office space on two adjacent properties along Waukegan Road will be presented to the Morton Grove Village Board of Trustees at its meeting Monday, Jan. 12.

The two properties, 8930 and 9000 Waukegan, include a multi-story office building once home to St. Paul Federal Bank, and the former Abt Electronics property.

Morton Grove Economic Development Director Tim Angell says the village plan and zone commission gave unanimous approval to the project at its meeting Dec. 16, and will recommend the village board do the same.

The project includes a major renovation of the two existing buildings and the reconstruction of a warehouse area into a park-

ing garage at the rear of the old Abt building. The application, by developer Debb/Kosich, LLC, calls for Illinois Bone and Joint Institute to become a major tenant of the project, primarily on the Abt property. That building would be reconstructed to include medical offices, physical therapy space, an outpatient surgical center and indoor parking facilities. Illinois Bone and Joint currently has two other locations, one in Des Plaines and one on Dempster St. in Morton Grove. There are currently no plans to close those facilities. The project would also bring in 200 new jobs to the community.

If the Village board gives its approval to the project, the developer can then apply for the special use permit that will be required to operate more than one structure on a single lot.

Drivers handle first snow-fall responsibly

The first challenging snow of the season came down on the heels of the New Year and local drivers seemed to handle it with caution. Only minor traffic accidents were reported Sunday evening in Niles, Morton Grove and Park Ridge. Although fender benders or a car in the ditch may be a headache for drivers, there were no major accidents with injuries reported by any of the three police departments.

Deputy Chief Thomas

Swoboda of Park Ridge said there were ten accidents handled by his people Sunday, one involving a woman 7 months pregnant. "She was taken to Lutheran General just as a precaution," said Swoboda.

In Niles, slippery streets and packed snow kept squads busy answering calls for 8 minor collisions, which Day Shift Commander Daniel Halley says all seemed to come at one time. His advice to drivers getting reacquainted with win-

ter?

"Slow down, keep a good distance between vehicles, and start breaking ahead of time. If you begin to slide, turn into the slide and feather the brakes." Seasoned drivers know the rules, but often have to be reminded when the first good snowfall of the season arrives. Halley also says driving an SUV doesn't make you invincible.

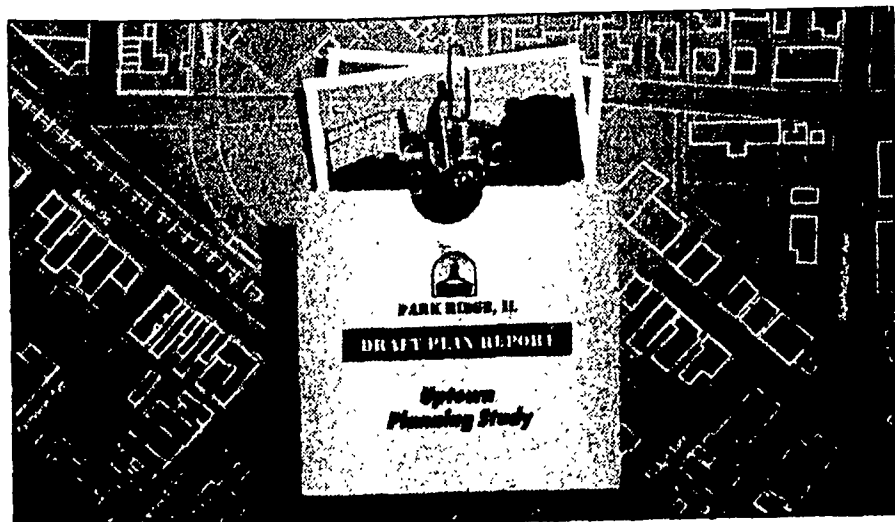
"SUV drivers are a little more courageous because they have the ability to take off

faster and drive through deep drifts," said Halley. "But they forget their stopping ability is the same as a two wheel drive vehicle."

Timing may have helped the situation. Because it was Sunday evening following the New Year's holiday, many people were intending to stay home and prepare for a start to the new work week the next day. Now that the first snow is behind us, however, everybody should be a little more cautious behind the wheel.

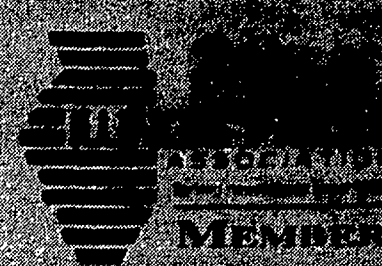

Des Plaines police involved in shooting

The Des Plaines Police Department was involved in a shooting incident at the Dunkin' Donuts at 1080 E. Oakton last Thursday, Jan. 1. Police arrived at the store in response to a 9-1-1 hang-up call. No one was located the payphone outside and officers began checking the area.

They observed someone at a strip mall in the 1500 block of Lee St. and asked if he needed assistance. According to police, he immediately produced a long blade knife and attacked an officer by approaching in a threatening manner while holding the knife over his head.

Police said a second officer came to the assistance of the

other officer and the man attempted to attack him. The second officer stumbled while backing away from the man. When the man continued to quickly approach the stumbling officer, the first officer shot him.

The man was provided with medical attention after being subdued and transported to Lutheran General Hospital for treatment. The man was tentatively identified as Daniel Peterson of Neillsville, Wisconsin. Charges filed against him include Attempted Murder of a Police Officer and Attempted Armed Robbery. According to police, prior to the shooting incident, Peterson attempted to rob a near-

by TCF Bank but was unsuccessful.

The shooting incident is under investigation by the Illinois State Police Public Integrity Unit to determine if the shooting was justified.

"Whenever we're involved in a shooting incident this State Police come in to investigate," said Des Plaines Police Sergeant Nick Treantafeles. "We're one of several places they have jurisdiction. They're an independent agency that comes in to conduct an unbiased investigation."

Treantafeles said that the State Police investigation is conducted in order to independently justify the use of force.

Morton Grove mentioned in book

A newly published book about land use in the United States devotes several pages to the Village of Morton Grove and its "gallant effort" to face the challenges of re-development.

"Halfway to Everywhere: A portrait of America's First-Tier Suburbs," is a look at how some of the oldest big city suburbs are dealing with land locked borders, home-town industries with a desire to

grow, and giving new life to blighted areas.

Former Village Administrator Larry Arft is quoted in the book, along with Economic Development Director Tim Angell, and Mayor Dan Scanlon.

Author William Hudnut III cites Morton Grove as a village that has come to grips with its physical limitations, and has begun to implement a comprehensive plan not to give in to rundown buildings, boarded up storefronts and general malaise.

"Morton Grove deserves credit for discerning the signs of the times and seeking to align itself with them,"

the book states at the end of Chapter 8. "Morton Grove is trying to reinvent itself for the time ahead."

The book was published by the Urban Land Institute in Washington, D.C. of which Morton Grove is a member. Author Hudnut visited the village at length in 2000 to do research for his book, after meeting Village planner Bonnie Jacobsen at a conference. For Angell, the book is a verification of the work he's done since joining the city 3 years ago. "It shows our citizens and village trustee that we're on the right track."

Life after Abt for Morton Grove

For Morton Grove, there is indeed, life after Abt. That's Abt Electronics, which until May of 2003, was Morton Grove's largest sales tax generator, putting as much as \$3 million annually into city coffers. But last year, Abt moved its operations to a 30 acre site in Glenview, and since then, village administrators have been trying to find new ways to generate revenue for the village.

Many of those money makers, such as an increase in the local option sales tax, and shifting the cost of garbage pickup directly to the resident, have been the subject of heated discussions at recent Town Hall meetings. But Jan. 1, 2004, has come and gone, and those new taxes and fees have now, or will soon, take effect.

More than one frustrated taxpayer has asked why Morton Grove let Abt Electronics go, but Village officials are quick to point out that they did everything in their power to keep the electronics retailing giant within

the village limits. In the end, it all came down to space.

"The village approached them and said 'what can we do to keep you?'" said Tim Angell, Morton Grove's Economic Development director, but the village couldn't offer what it didn't have. "They would have needed 10 acres at least and we didn't have it at the time."

"We were choking over there," said Bob Abt. "Morton Grove was extremely nice to us, but we had a chance to get 27 or 28 acres in Glenview and we had to act on it." In fact, a few months later, 3Com bought the U.S. Robotics facility in Morton Grove and shut it down. That opened up a 20 acre parcel, but it was too late.

It wasn't the first time Abt needed more space. The firm moved from its Dempster Street location in Niles to Waukegan Road in Morton Grove in 1989. A few years later it bought the property at 8930 Waukegan, location of Oscar's restaurant and the Illinois Bell Building, and built a larger retail facility. Still, they needed more warehouse space and the village

found them some elsewhere in Morton Grove. That, however, was not an ideal situation.

"In 1999 the Abts internally decided they needed a much larger facility and they would never have a warehouse separate from their showroom again," said Angell.

"We need everything in one spot. When the customer buys a TV they want it now," said Abt. "It used to take our guys 2 hours to load a truck. Now they do it in 5 to 10 minutes."

Abt's dilemma simply illustrates a new reality for villages like Morton Grove that have no where to expand. Any new development is actually re-development. "We don't have 10 or 20 acres of green field," said Angell. "We're lucky now that we can get 2 acres of land to offer businesses." New business is not impossible, however. Menard's has moved onto the old US Robotics property, and a new Saab Dealership opens up in the next couple of weeks. Plans are also underway to build a medical campus on the old Abt site on Waukegan Road. Life goes on.

Niles Park District bans cell phones in some areas

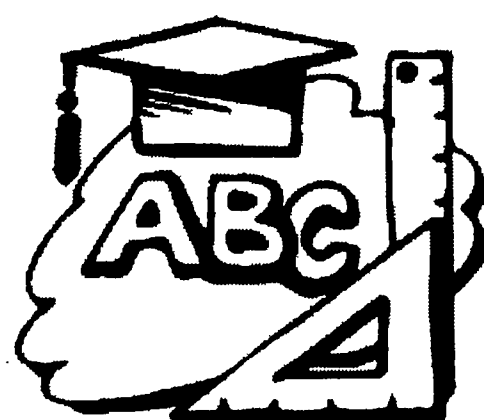
At the Niles Park District's December Board of Commissioners meeting, a cell phone ban was approved and went into effect January 1st, 2004. Executive Director Joe LoVerde says this ban is aimed to stop individuals from taking pictures of someone without their knowledge in an inappropriate place and manner. The Niles Park District cellular phone ban will prohibit the use of phones that have photo capabilities in sensitive areas. Such areas are locker rooms and shower facilities.

To alert the public of this new measure, the park district has displayed signage in the appropriate facilities. Those caught in violation of the ban will be fined for the first offense and terminated from the facility for a repeated offense. LoVerde said he is confident all the users of our facilities will police the enforcement of this ordinance.

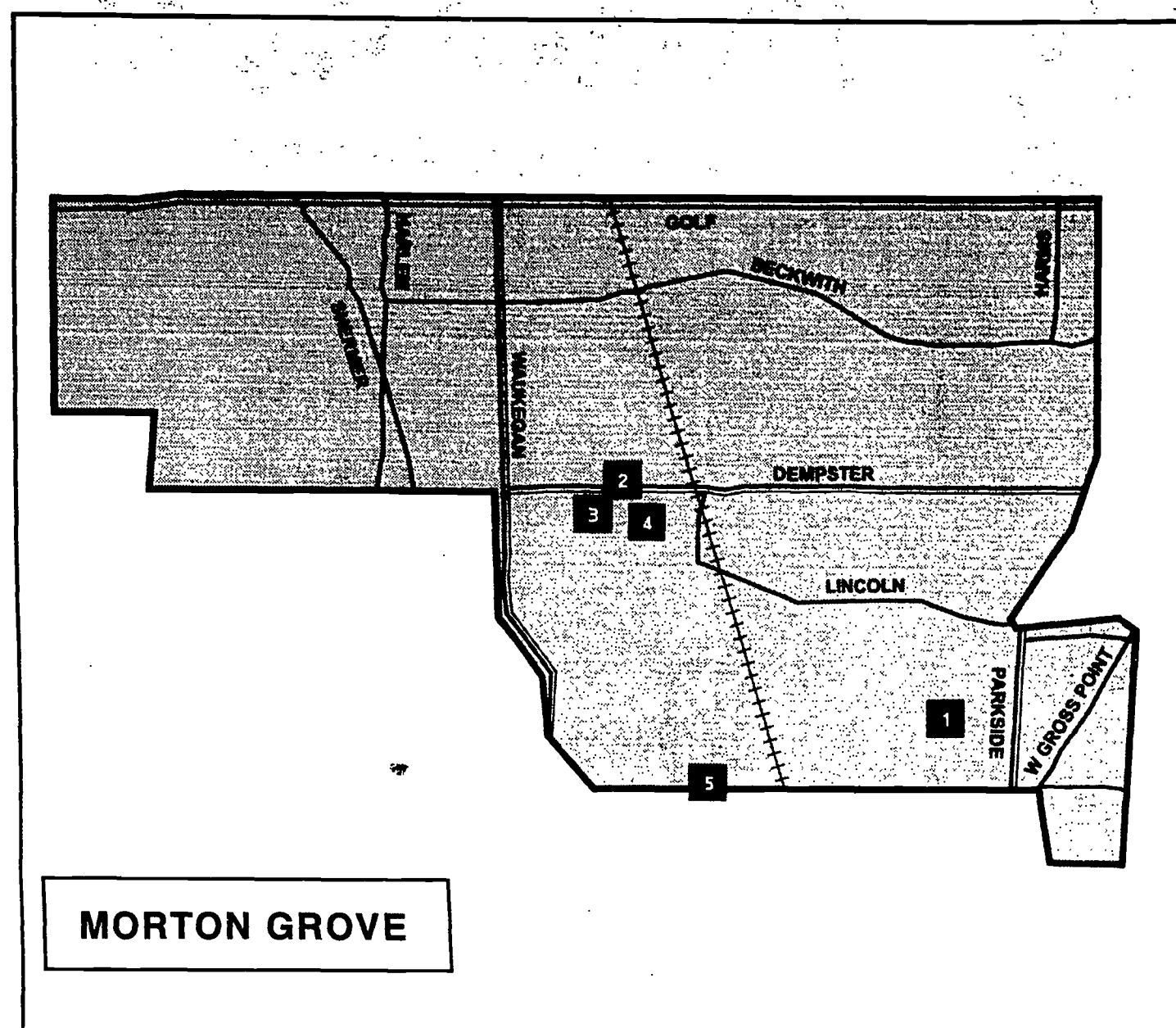

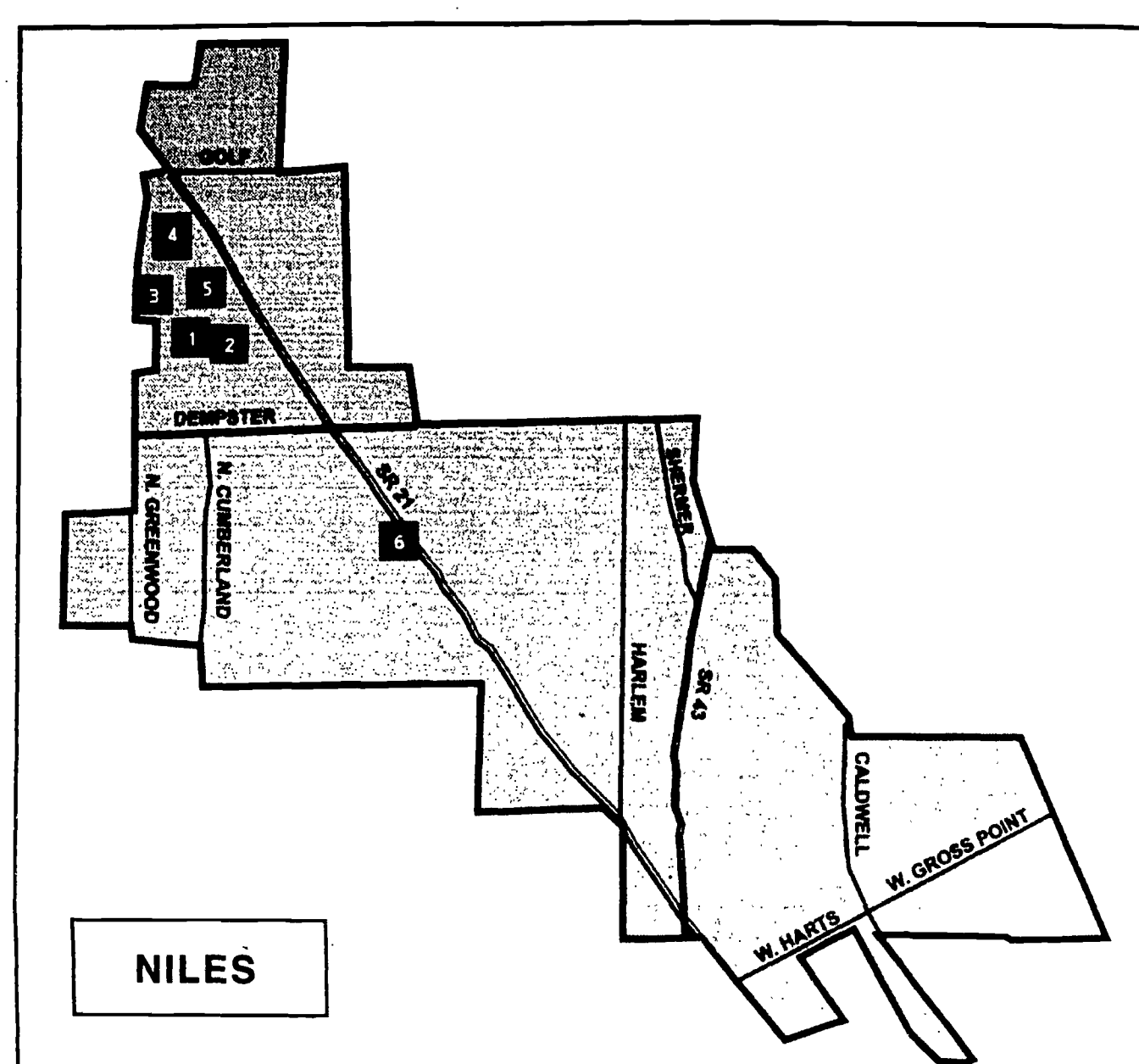

At least 25 cars in Park Ridge have had windows shot out by BB guns over a six day period beginning December 26 police said Monday January 5.

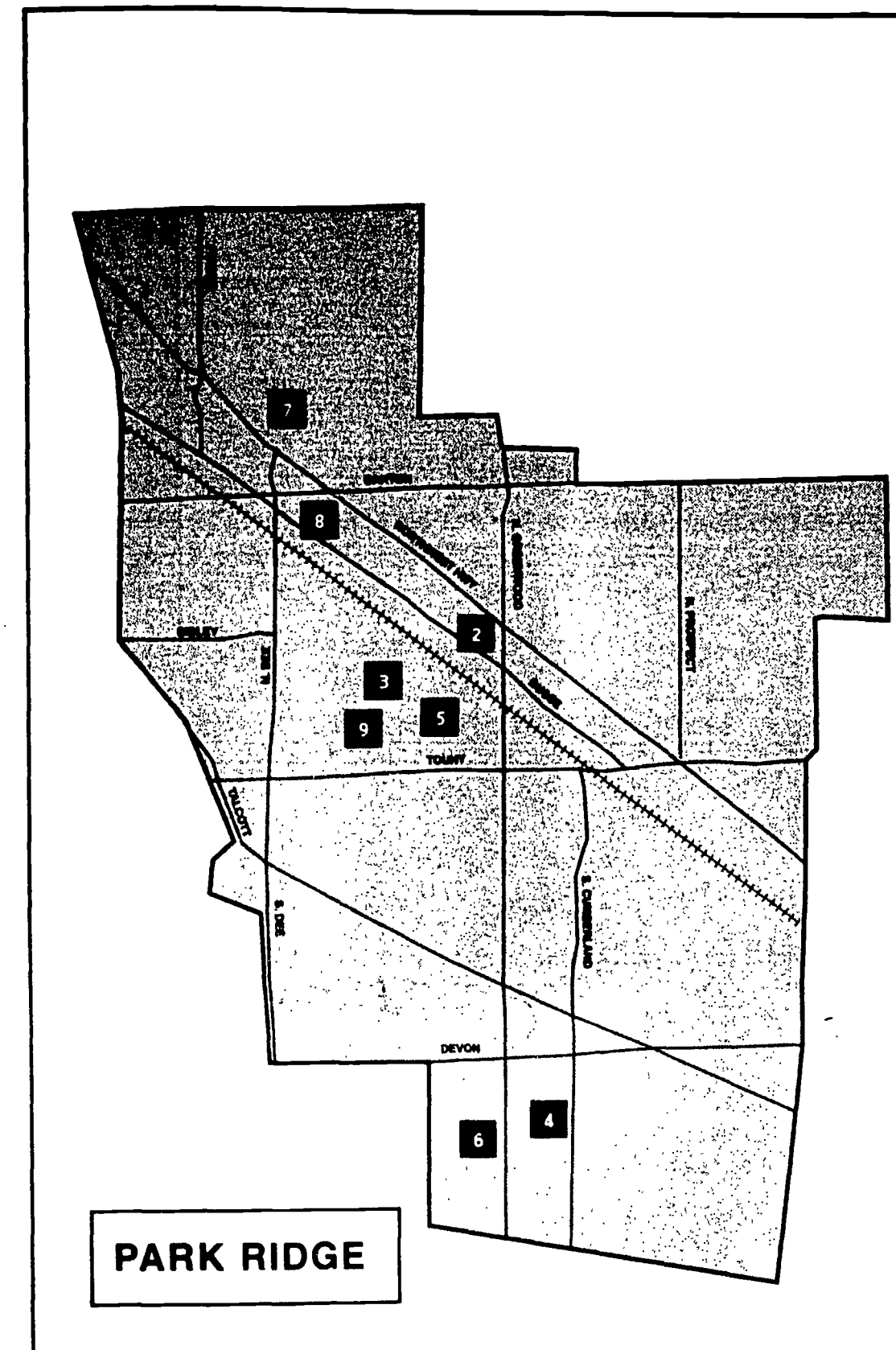

Colonial-Wojciechowski Funeral Homes since 1905

To the unfamiliar, the fact that a funeral home's roots lay in the livery business may seem odd.

But that's exactly how the Colonial-Wojciechowski Funeral Homes got its start.

"My grandfather was in the livery business," owner Jody Wojciechowski said. "He started with horses and carriages. Then he went to limos. He used to get calls from funeral homes wanting to rent cars."

"He got so many calls he decided to start his own funeral home. He gave up the livery business and it turned out the exact opposite; they started the funeral home and started renting cars from others."

The original funeral home, then named simply Wojciechowski Funeral Home, was in Chicago's Bucktown neighborhood.

"We can trace our roots back to 1905," Wojciechowski said. "We've been family owned for three generations."

A second Chicago location was opened in 1950 by Wojciechowski's father, Joe Wojciechowski Jr., at 6250 N. Milwaukee Ave.

When the Bucktown neighborhood became more gentrified in the early 1990s, Wojciechowski and his brother Mark, closed the original funeral home in Bucktown and opened a location at 8025 W. Golf Road in Niles.

The name was also lengthened to its current state, Colonial-Wojciechowski Funeral Homes.

The name change was intended to attract a broader base of families from different ethnic and religious backgrounds, Wojciechowski said.

The Chicago location still attracts a "very traditional Polish Catholic" clientele.

"People still come to us because of our Polish Heritage,"

Wojciechowski said. "It's much more diverse in the Niles area." One of the funeral directors speaks Polish while another is female. Both are feathers in the funeral homes' caps, Wojciechowski said.

"We have a female funeral director," he said. "That's not very common in the business. Some families are more comfortable talking to a woman. Women who have lost their husbands may come in and want to talk to a woman."

Wojciechowski is also proud of the family-owned aspect of the business.

"Family-owned funeral homes have started disappearing in the past 10 years," he said. "We've always found we could do a better job with some things. We want to make sure we are giving the quality you are going to pay for. Corporations have different priorities. They have a board of directors and stockholders. Our priorities are to the family."

Re/Max agents from Chicago area optimistic about 2004 home market

2003 has been a record year for home sales in the Chicago area. The number of homes sold in the Chicago area during the first 10 months of 2003 was 127,813, up 7.8 percent from the same period in 2002, according to Multiple Listing Service of Northern Illinois.

The Illinois Association of realtors reports that the median cost of a single-family home in the Chicago area during the third quarter of 2003 was \$233,400, up 8.6 percent from the third quarter of 2002. The median price of a condo or townhouse rose to \$185,200 for the quarter, an increase of 6.6 percent.

According to a sampling of top Re/Max agents from across Chicagoland, home sales activity should remain brisk, with strong demand for housing in most market areas.

Jim Merriam, regional director of Re/Max Northern Illinois, takes an optimistic outlook. He believes that if mortgage rates rise by no more than 0.5 percent, and the economy continues to improve, 2004 home sales could hold some surprises on the upside.

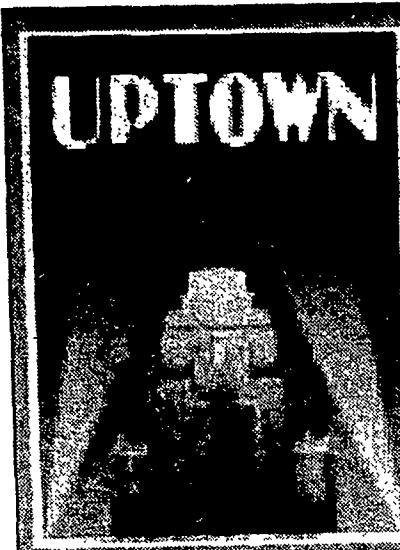

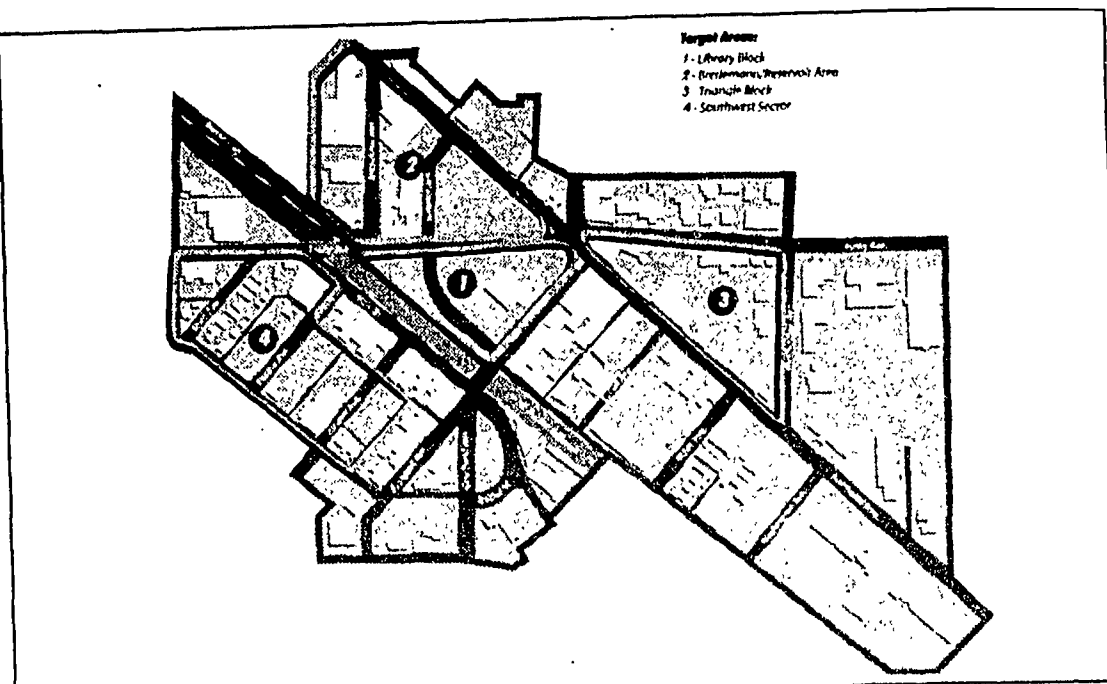

The changing face of Uptown



Over the next five weeks, The Bugle will be bringing its readers a running feature on Park Ridge's Uptown Redevelopment, an issue that has been called the most important decision for Park Ridge in the last 50 years. In an effort to promote the redevelopment efforts and inform the community, the feature on Uptown Redevelopment will be split into five different areas: "History" (Jan. 8), "Target Area 2" (Jan.

15), "Target Areas 1, 3, 4" (Jan. 22), "Financing" (Jan. 29), and "The Next Fifty Years" (Feb. 5). With the selection of a developer for Target Area 2 as little as three months away and ground-breaking as few as four months away, it is important that the citizens of Park Ridge are informed and that they avail themselves of the remaining chances for public input on the issue of Uptown Redevelopment.



Events in the Uptown Redevelopment Effort

■ 1996-Park Ridge Comprehensive Plan passed by the City Council. The plan was meant to encompass the entire city. It only provided general guidelines for the future of Uptown.

■ 1998-Bredemann auto dealer properties at Summit Ave. and Northwest Hwy., and Meacham Ave., Touhy Ave., and Busse Hwy. The city paid 3.8 million for the two parcels, which it planned to incorporate into a general redevelopment of the area.

■ Dec. 1999-Uptown Advisory Task Force was formed. It consisted of 26 individuals appointed by then-mayor Ron Wietecha. 10 members were members of city boards, commissions, or the council. The remaining 16 were prominent members of the community. The task force was assisted by city planning staff and the consulting firm of Trkla, Pettigrew, Allen, and Payne (TPAP).

■ Mar. 2001 - Leaking discovered in Uptown reservoir. Repairs are

conducted to patch reservoir.

■ Jan. 2002- Uptown Advisory Task Force submits Uptown Master Plan to City Council. The master plan was incorporated into the Comprehensive plan and used to develop specific goals for the Uptown Redevelopment effort. The master plan divided the Uptown area into four different target areas. One of the recommendations made was that the reservoir be moved from its current site because of the difficulties involved in constructing

atop it.

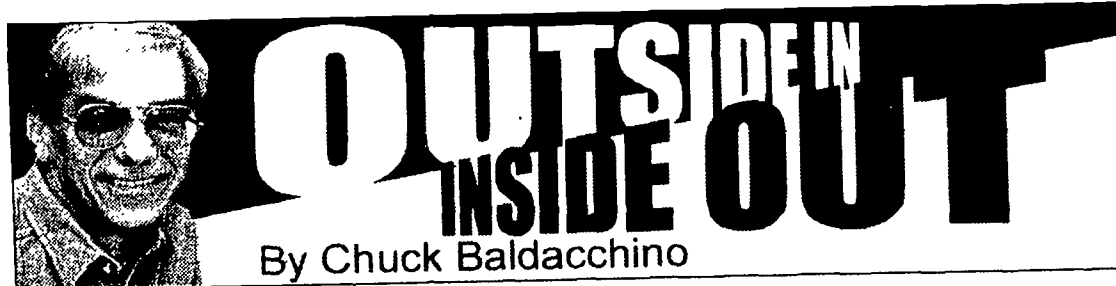
■ Mar. 2003 - City officially proposes the creation of a Tax Increment Financing (TIF) District in the Uptown area to encourage development. The idea was initially explored in late 2002 but the public process was begun in early 2003.

■ Aug. 2003 - TIF was adopted by the City Council for the Uptown area. In the same month, the council approved the Request

for Qualifications (RFQ) which were sent to about 150 developers. The RFQs set out the terms for a redevelopment of Target Area 2. Interested developers were required to return the completed RFQs by Nov. 3.

■ Dec. 1, 2003 - RFQs returned from 19 developers.

■ Dec. 15, 2003- Council narrows list to five developers. Specific proposals for TA2 due back by March 2004.

You think our schools are the best? Check last November's Illinois School Report Cards. (<http://206.166.105.128/ReportCard/rchome.asp>)

Do a comparison between D-64 elementary schools (and the District as a whole) to other communities that you think might be

comparable to ours. If history holds true (and I believe it will), you'll see our elementary schools fare statistically badly next to those in many other towns - especially when compared on per-pupils spending.

These tests don't tell the whole story? Fine. Pick some measurements you like (there MUST be some) and compare with those. Don't be too disappointed if the results are the same.

And ask the leaders of D-207 why there are ever-declining numbers of National Merit scholars coming out of our local high schools - and why there are ever-growing reports of expanding substance abuse among ALL our school children.

Our Park District is being run better and better each year. But,

the residuals from previous bad management have yet to be expunged, and - considering that it's called the Recreation and PARK District, go try to find a pastoral spot to enjoy the parks without interruption by recreation or by massive vehicle traffic. Bucolic? Not that I can find easily.

City services? Our infrastructure has been allowed to deteriorate to unsightly - if not dangerous - levels, especially over the last two decades. Do we need a new water reservoir? When was this detected? Why isn't it being fixed or replaced now?

Our streets? Walk, instead of drive. (That's better for you anyway.) Observe the cracks, potholes, and broken curbs that go by so swiftly and smoothly as

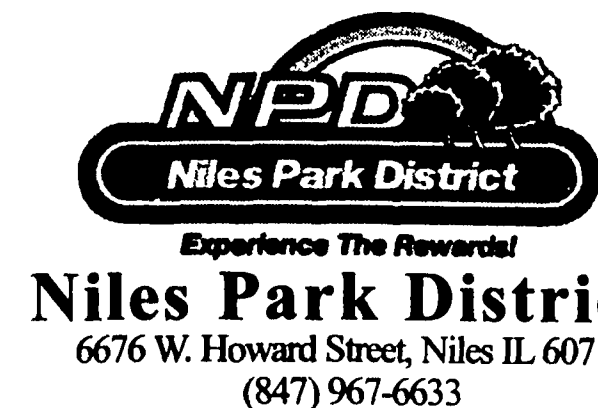
you drive in your car. Traffic and parking? Need I say more? Do something!

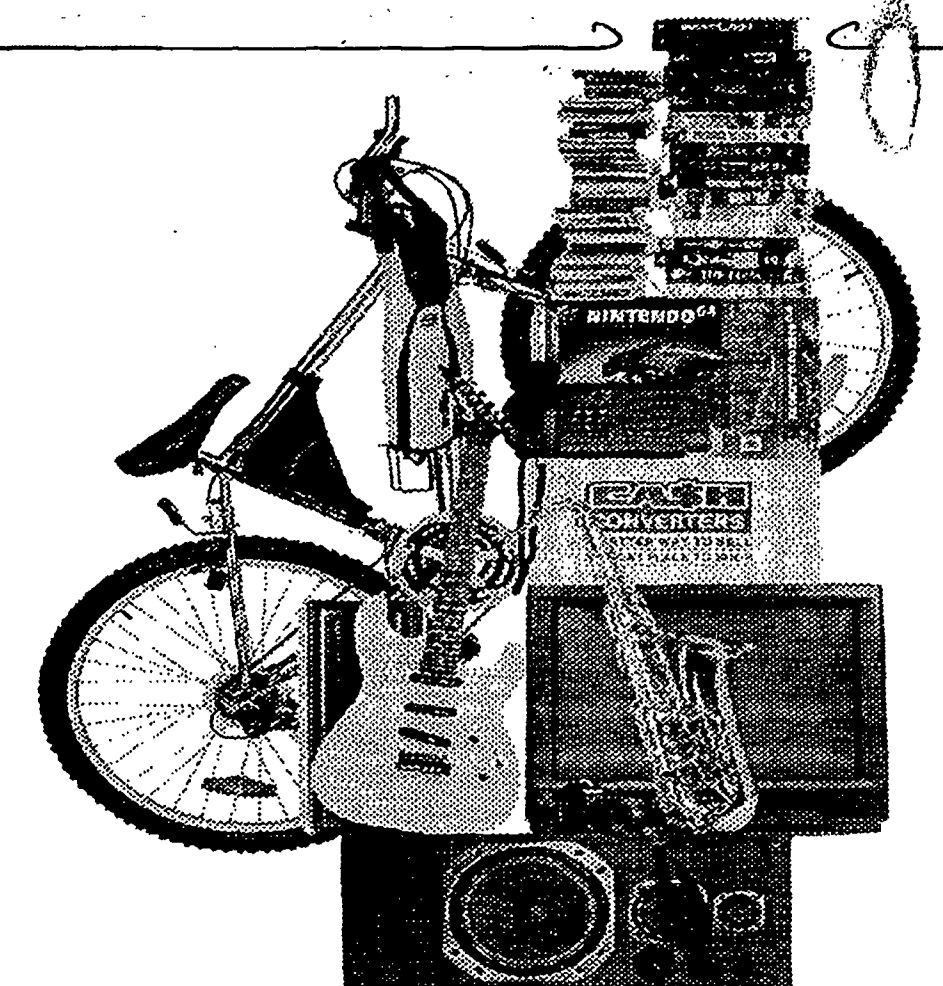

No matter how much love and attention you lavish on him, he still just left the litter, and he misses his mother, brothers and sisters. It's natural. However, two straight weeks of crying isn't common.

Check with your veterinarian first. He or she may ask you to bring Jake in for a look to make sure the puppy isn't experiencing health problems that were missed or that developed since his first visit. If Jake hasn't visited the vet yet, take him right away to assess his health and start his first round of shots.

Next, make sure the puppy has all the basic comforts: a crate to sleep in, food and water dishes, a collar and leash, grooming gear and a carrier. Add puppy-safe chew toys and treats. Now, put yourself in Jake's place. Imagine your first day in summer camp, or kindergarten, or other childhood settings that were new and unfamiliar. Jake could feel very much

the same: alone and confused. Give him lots of attention during the day, play with him often — and start his training in basic obedience. Spend more time on play at first than on obedience, but structure his day nonetheless. Make him feel like he belongs to the family and has a purpose in the household.

A last tip: At night, place a blanket or towel containing your scent in Jake's crate along with a ticking clock. You might even try wrapping the towel around a warm water bottle. In short, make the crate feel like a new home. Settling Jake in may take a few more days, but it is possible to ease his transition.

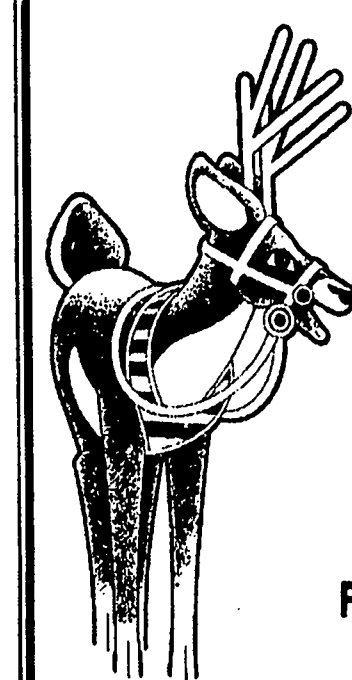

Sturdy Stair Building Tips

Q. I plan to build some back steps to our mobile home in January. Enclosed please find a diagram of the stairs I intend to build. Do you think this design is stable enough for everyday use? — Mike P., Salem, Mo.

A. For folks at home without access to this diagram, Mike is planning to build a short wooden stair to the back entry door of a standard mobile home. This is a really good little carpentry project and, with care taken throughout the process, such an outdoor stair can be built within a day. Measurement guidelines should be followed closely; be patient and double-check all your figures. Outdoor steps (for example, steps leading onto a deck) are required by many state building codes to be at least 36 inches

wide (for exact requirements, contact a building inspector). This helps keep the stairs stable under your weight. In addition, the vertical distance between each step should be between six and eight inches, and the width of the tread should be 10 to 13 inches.

To get the exact height and width of the steps, get out your calculator and measuring tape. Then, measure the distance from the bottom of the mobile-home door to the ground (the rise), and the distance from the ground where the back of the steps will be to the point where you want the stairway to end (the run). Looking at the height of the rise will tell you how many steps you'll need (for example, a height of 35 inches can be divided into five steps, each with a height of 7 inches). The length of the run, divided by the number of steps, will give you the width of each step (i.e., a measurement of 55 inches divided by 5 steps equals a run width of 11 inches each). When you cut the risers, using sturdy hardwood, of course, use these measurements to cut accurately. Stair treads should overhang the stringers by an inch on both ends. As to stability, the X-brace

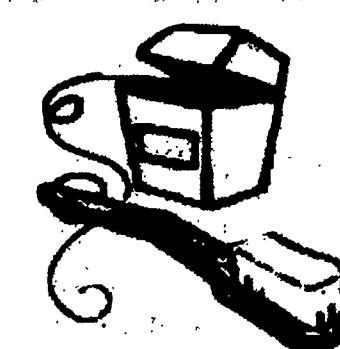
across the back of your steps should be sufficient to provide vertical stabilization. Make sure they are securely attached to the post boards on either side, but place only one nail (or bolt and nut, preferably) through the center where the boards cross so the wood can bend and warp with weight and weather changes with minimal damage. To increase overall stability, build a square frame around the entire back of the staircase. It serves as a flat, stable platform, keeping the back posts from sinking into the mud; the top can be bolted or clamped directly to the mobile home without compromising the posts, too.

HOME TIP

When cutting stair stringers, measure and cut the first one very carefully and use it as a template to cut the remaining stringers.

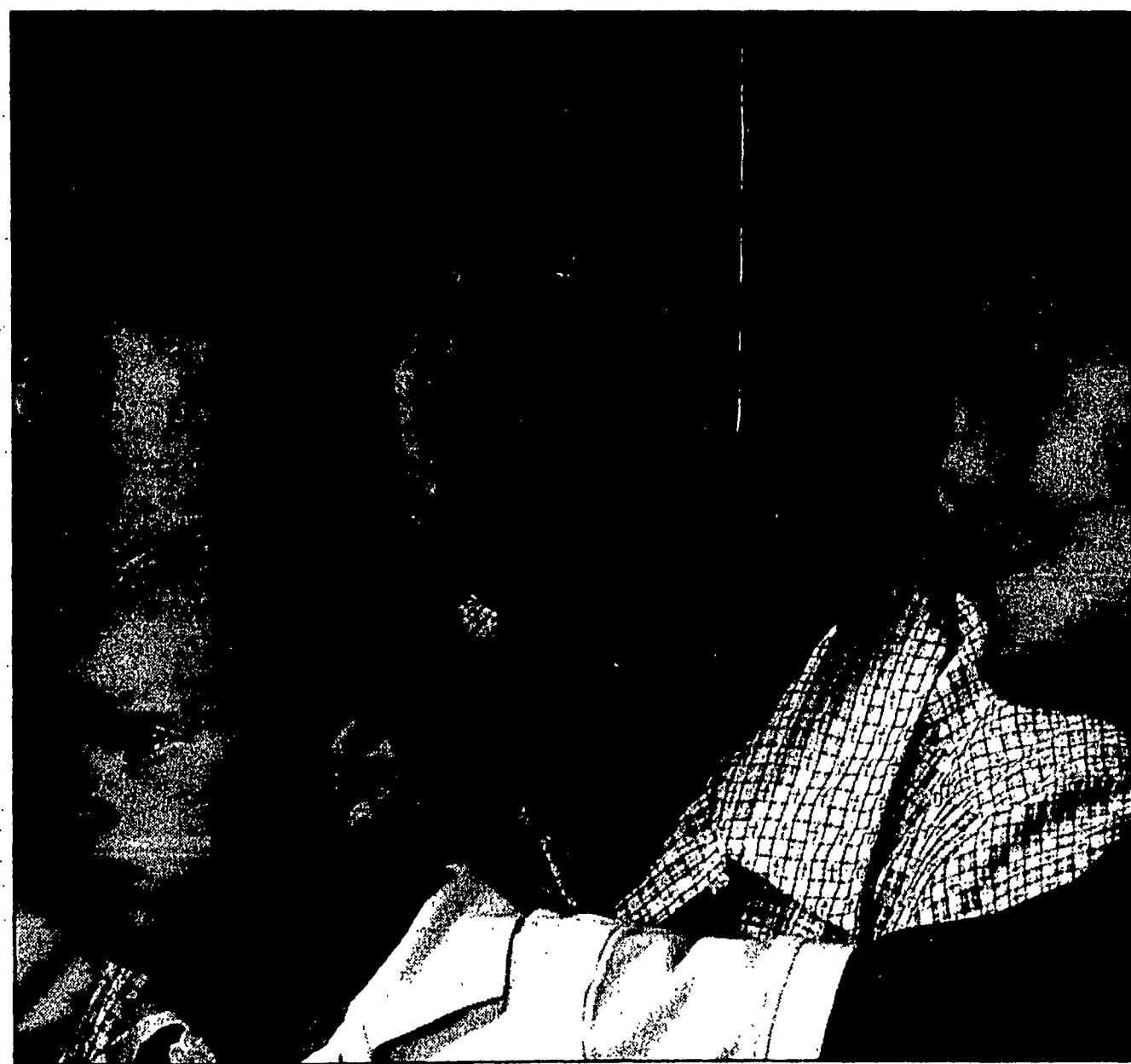
