

The store was closed Monday but reopened on Tuesday to began a close-out sale of display merchandise. Circuit City plans to permanently close the store by Feb. 23.



Hinkley Reservoir lease topic of last-minute debate

The final draft of the lease between the City and the Park District for the new reservoir site became the topic of last minute debate Thursday that has spilled into protracted discussion throughout the week. Commissioner Bob Trizna raised concerns that money promised to the Park District for capital improvements to Hinkley and Hodges Parks received the lowest priority under the agreement.

The final draft of the lease states that increased tax revenues resulting from the Uptown Tax Increment Financing (TIF) District will first pay for the city's debt service, then payments will be made to School Districts 64 and 207 as well as the Park District, then remaining funds will be used to pay for the capital improvements. Under the lease, the money could be paid by the city in four payments beginning with the sixth year. The money would also accrue interest of 2.4 percent annually after the sixth year.

Trizna said that the Park District should have the money guaranteed

because it has made Hinkley available for the reservoir, an action that saved both \$1.5 million in cost for the project and also hastened the process of redevelopment on the current reservoir block which would have to wait a year if the reservoir was constructed at the alternative site, 1200 Elm.

At last Thursday's board meeting, the Park Board was split on its position. Some members wanted to consider altering the agreement in order to change the level of priority for the capital improvements, placing it above payments to the School Districts and the Park District's own payment while others argued the contract was acceptable as it

Commissioner Fred Angelini said that there was no link between providing the Hinkley site for the reservoir and the capital improvements. "We made the site available because it was the right thing to do. We didn't do it for any gain. There was never any linkage."

Trizna disputed that there was no link and argued that it was the board's responsibility to look out for their constituents and not the constituents of other taxing bodies. However, since the Park Board


couldn't take action on the contract, further discussion was postponed until their next meeting, Thursday, Feb. 19.

In the meantime, Park District and City officials have been meeting in order to consider possible changes to the lease agreement. Two officials from the Park District met with City officials Friday. That meeting produced no substantive results. Park District Director Jim Lange and Park Board President Gail Wilkening met with City Manager Tim Schuenke, Acting Mayor Mike MaRous, and Ald. Larry Friel (7th).

On Monday, MaRous said that, while he did not necessarily think changes to the contract were necessary, a letter could be enclosed taking Trizna's concerns into account. "The money is not at risk," said MaRous. "They're entitled to the capital improvement money because they're providing a benefit


to the city and the taxpayers."

Schuenke said that if the Park District doesn't approve the lease at their next meeting, it would not significantly delay the project, but that if approval is not forthcoming, the city might have to look into alternatives, such as 1200 Elm.
