



Strzelecki promoted to chief of police

29-year veteran loves Niles

Tiles Deputy Police Chief Dean Strzelecki was chosen to fill the soonto-be vacant job of police chief by the village board Tuesday, July 27.

The 29-year veteran will replace Gerry Sheehan who has held the post since 2000 and will stepping down September. Strzelecki has served as a patrolman, detective, sergeant, watch commander, and was promoted to deputy chief in 2000. He is currently in charge of the Police Department's Administration Division.

"I'm looking forward to the challenge," Strzelecki said. "I really love working with the staff."

The village made a commitment to choose an internal candidate because the transition would be easier. But it wasn't just about choosing a local, Niles Mayor Nick Blase said that Strzelecki was a highly qualified candidate.


"In the 44 years I've been mayor we've always done it this way," said Blase. "If you have a quality candidate, you should go with them and Dean is a qualified candidate."

Strzelecki has been a Niles resident since age 16 and has coached baseball and football. Now, he'll be managing the department's budget as well as overseeing its three divisions that are managed by two deputy chiefs and a division command-

"This is a great town to work for," Strzelecki said. "I'm not only looking forward to the challenge of managing the police department but also to giving back."

When Trustee Tom Bondi announced a motion to promote Strzelecki to the chief's position, a board room packed with police department personnel and residents applauded. Even the board




