Plane engine explodes, scatters wreckage over Niles

Police, residents recover myriad small pieces in Pioneer Park

The left engine of American ■ Flight 1374 exploded last Thursday as it passed over Niles, scattering wreckage along Touhy Ave., throughout nearby Edison Park, in St. Adalbert's Cemetery and in Pioneer Park.

The flight took off from O'Hare International Airport bound for Philadelphia. 107 people were aboard. About ten miles out from the airport something went wrong in the plane's left engine, which forced the plane to make an emergency landing at O'Hare. Evidence indicated that a bird may have struck the plane. No one was injured either in the plane, or on the ground.

Police swarmed the area surrounding the intersection of Harlem Ave. and Touhy. Most of the wreckage found was small in nature, ranging from pieces of engine cowling to twisted bits of metal.

"It was right over my head," said Connie Ball of Niles. She was in Pioneer Park with her son Carson and friend Tina Nielson when the explosion occurred. "We just heard an explosive sound and then we

could see that the plane's left engine was on fire."

Ball said that they were looking directly at the plane when it happened because her son likes airplanes.

"We could see smoke and fire coming from the plane and then it suddenly veered off back toward O'Hare," she said. "We couldn't see any smoke after it went out of sight."

Ball and her companions didn't see anything fall from the plane, but were shaken by the incident.

"It was really scary," she said. "I've never seen anything like that. I fly a lot and it makes me wonder whether I'll be scared to get on my next flight. I'm glad I wasn't on that plane."

Residents of Niles helped police comb Pioneer Park Thursday, looking for anything out of the ordinary. A variety of pieces were handed in to police from about three inches to six inches in size and of various materials.

"I heard a noise from one of the Renaissance Condos," said Connie Bethel. "But I just thought it was the garbage

MGO files response to village motion

Village expected to reply by today

Organization, LLC (MGO) filed a response to the village's motion to dismiss their lawsuit last Thursday. The MGO's suit alleges that the village trampled on their rights by arbitrarily enforcing zoning laws and asks for monetary damages.

"We filed in a timely manner," said Patrick Kansoer, managing nember of the MGO, "as required by the court."

The judge for the case has also been changed, possibly pushing back the date for the final determination of the case. Paul Plunkett, formerly the case's judge, had set a date of Oct. 28 for a final ruling on the village's motions, but the new judge, James Holderman, has cancelled

This case has been in the early stages since late last year. The village's motions to dimiss allege that the MGO has not stated a cause of action.

"My motions right now state the they don't even have a cause of action," said Ted Hadley, the village's atttorney for this case. "I think the motions to dismiss will succeed."

Should Holderman rule against the motions to dismiss, the next step in the case would be discovery, when both sides ask the other questions and are allowed to question witnesses under oath Even after that, Hadley said there's a stage where the village could move for a summary judgement that would end the case before trial.

"Again, I believe our motions to dismiss will succeed," he said. Because of the reassignment of the case, Hadley said that he expected that Holderman would take some time to familiarize himself with the case.

"We expect that he will issue an order to find out the current state of the case and meet with each side," he said.



Maine Township selects single waste hauler for unincorporated area

Township's Board ended a nearly two-year quest to provide the 30,000+ residents of the unincorporated area with lower cost. higher quality waste removal service. Last night the Board approved ARC Disposal as the Township's designated hauler.


ARC was approved by the Board based on an unanimous recommendation of the Citizen's Garbage Committee which has been working on the matter since the successful referendum this spring gave the Township the public approval to pursue a single hauler and an eventual contract for

After reviewing responses to a Request for Proposal, the Committee and Supervisor Bob Dudycz did an analysis of all bids. The final four companies were interviewed to ensure that all the numbers were "apples to apples." "It was clear that ARC could

Tn what can be described as a provide the more quality service at precedent setting move, Maine a substantial savings compared to what is being charged by several companies to our residents now," Dudycz said in making the recommendation of ARC. "Now that the Board has authorized selection of this waste hauler, we will pursue an ordinance and eventual contract in order to begin service on October 1, 2004."

> Dudycz added that the full service to all residents will probably take as long as three months but should be fully functional by Jan. "I give credit to our state legisla-

tors who fought in Springfield for the legislation that laid the groundwork for our referendum and give "hats off" to our citizens' committee for a tremendous job on this entire process," Dudycz said. He later presented small trophies to each committee member and State Representative Elaine Nekritz for their work. The trophies had small garbage trucks on them.

Niles residents object to building variation

Dear Editor,

On Sept. 13 approximately 25 residents of the Bunker Hill subdivision of Niles attended a Planning and Zoning Board meeting objecting to the granting of a Zoning variation at 6848 Concord. The current owner wants a permit to construct an additional 1000 sq. ft. second and third floor addition which would reduce the required 40-foot rear yard requirement to the existing 17 feet and would allow the owner to exceed the maximum floor area ratio of 60 percent. The new second and third floor addition would raise the roof level from approximately 15 feet above the ground level to 32 feet above the ground level.

Many of the residents feel by allowing these variations, it would ruin the character and aesthetic value of the entire subdivision. Although some of the residents spoke at the meeting and had signed petitions of approximately 30 additional residents, the board completely ignored their pleas and recommended approval. The board went so far as to remove one resident from the meeting who is against the granting of the variation.

The Niles village board of trustees, who have the final say in these matters, has scheduled a review of this matter on Tuesday, Sept. 28 at 7:15 p.m. at 1000 Civic Center Dr. All residents of Niles and other municipalities that are experiencing similar problems are invited to attend.

Dear Editor,

I have three children enrolled at Nelson School. I have regularly attended the District 63 Board of Education (BOE) meetings for the last seven years. I am writing in regard to Ken Butterly's letter of Thursday, August 16, 2004. I attended the meeting about which Mr. Butterly wrote.

Mr. Butterly indicated that District employees received a 19.5% increase for the years 2000-2004. The increase is spread out over the time period he indicates with many factors affecting his calculated lump increase. Some employees show larger increases as they take on extra duties (e.g., running a sport program or Student Council). Some employees work part of a year and the next year come back full time (e.g., maternity leave which includes unpaid family leave). Years of experience and advanced educational degrees also affect salary increases. A check of Illinois School District Report Cards, shows that District 63 ranks last among neighboring districts in average teacher and administrator

Mr. Breihan asked about the expenditures for the health equipment at Gemini School. The response to Mr. Breihan was that the Board was still trying to determine the impact. The Board is working toward a positive outcome and does not want to prematurely release information. I would also like to add that Mr. Breihan, by his own admission at a previous BOE meeting, is not a resident of District 63. Why is he so interested in District 63 management?

A few years ago, the BOE started limiting individuals and District 63 Referendum Committee

groups to no more than 3 minutes for public participation. They also stated that public participation is "not a time for extended dialogue." These changes were made to manage public participation from abuses. Legally, the BOE does not have to allow public participation during open board meetings. Mr. Butterly has been invited several times, both publicly and privately, to meet with District administrators to discuss his concerns and issues. He was publicly invited once again at this meeting. He has not accepted these invitations, as of this writing.

Stacey Mallek has said that passing a referendum would only be a short term solution. Based on her calculations and educated assumptions, she stated it would get us out to 2010. The long term financial dilemma is a result of governmental funding that has dropped Illinois schools from 25th out of 50, in nearly all areas of education including funding, to 49th out of 50 in the last 26 years.

This referendum is about ensuring our children the solid educational foundation they need to succeed in life. Whether the referendum passes or not, staff will be paid because of their contracts. Our children will continue to suffer the consequences if the referendum does not pass. We need to protect our children. They are the future engineers, medical professionals, educators, scientists, and leaders of our community. Please vote yes for the District 63 referendum this



It's too bad the Bugle couldn't have waited until next April to make this change. Perhaps it would be unnecessary.



I am writing this as a member of the District 63 Referendum Committee and in response to those opposed to the referendum to increase spending for East Maine School District 63 on the November 2nd ballot. The only issue I do agree with the opponents of the referendum is that administrative salaries are too high and that some of their raises were ill timed. But that is were my agreement ends. Salaries are high in all of Illinois and the bottom line is that we must be competitive to attract good people. We already pay less than districts in our area.

We have a funding crisis in District 63, NOT because of administrators' salaries or teachers' raises or mismanagement or lavish spending. The crisis exists due to 3 million dollars in funding cuts and large corporate property tax refunds in the 2003-2004 school year and an additional 3 million dollars of revenue loses in the 2004-2005 school year. Passing the referendum is the only way to restore about 3 million dollars in funding and bring back many of programs that were dropped.

Class sizes district wide are up to 39 students in some classrooms. There are no teacher's aids to provide desperately needed one on one help, no school sponsored after school activities, no sports, no nationally recognized band program. Some classes at the elementary schools are split with 2 different grade levels in the same classroom. (1st & 2nd,3rd & 4th, 5th & 6th). Instead of 3 teams of teachers at Gemini, there are now 2 teams. An entire section of Gemini is unused. Library use at 2 elementary schools is limited to 2 days a week.

Stop for a minute and think about it.

Who will want to teach in a district that has 32-39 kids in a classroom, where there no teachers' aids, not enough supplies, increased duties at less than average pay compared to surrounding area teachers? What administrator will want to come to work here and how long will they stay with high paying jobs in adjacent neighborhoods. Who will want to buy a house in our community when the school district is not funded as well as those around us?

I challenge the opponents of the referendum to go and see the schools, talk to principals and teachers. Don't just sit back and find all the faults, go and see the good things are students are doing. Have the "guts" to look the kids in the eye and tell them why they are just a tax amount and that they don't deserve a first class education. A no vote will not change any salaries or lower any raises, it will only insure that our kids will not receive the education they deserve. A yes vote will restore badly needed programs and insure our community has good schools. Please vote yes for the District 63 referendum.



Park Ridge Considers Automated Garbage Pick-up

Public Works Director Joe Saccamano proposed a plan on Monday to fully automate Park Ridge garbage removal by May 1, 2005. The proposed plan had many advantages over the current system, but after facing two main objections by the Aldermen, the City Council sent the plan back to committee for further

Under the proposed plan ARC would distribute two carts to all Park Ridge residents—one 95 gallon cart for refuse and one 65 gallon cart for recyclables. The garbage trucks will then use cutting edge technology to gather the bins. Each collection truck will be equipped with an automatic arm that can extend, grab the cart, and automatically dump the refuse without the driver exiting the vehicle.

Currently, residents use 33 gallon tubs and are only allowed to store up to 50 pounds in them. Distributed recycling bins currently hold 18 gallons. Under the proposed plan, residents would be able to store up to 400 pounds in the carts.

Randy Huisman, Municipal Marketer for ARC highlighted the benefits of this new system: Higher Productivity-Less Cost for the City, Reduced Operator Injury and Fatigue, Improved Work Environment and Greater Safety, Consolidation of Refuse and Recycling, Improved Aesthetics, and it Eliminates Animal

Intrusions and Wind Blown Cans.



> Even though the online communication is directly between student and mentor, the teacher has controls in place and the ability to access all messages, files, and postings. The website automatically scans all communications for blocked words. Any questionable material is directed to the teacher's electronic mailbox for review.

> 'The university students provide individual responses to student essays and schedule real-time chats," Ulery points out. "The advantages to this type of learning experience are numerous. There is more complete, faster individual feedback along with reinforcement by an adult other than the teacher."

What do the university students get out of this arrangement? They get required education credits. It's a win-win for all involved.

The learning isn't restricted to writing essays. There are also online book discussions on an average of one per month. With this student-directed independent learning. the students choose from a list of books provided by the teacher then discuss what they read with one another as well as the teacher.

One of the effective techniques used in this program is "modeling". For example, if a student writes a poem, his/her mentor might discuss that poem but also share a poem the mentor has written. Ulery notes that such techniques and the overall experience impact her students in tangible and intangible ways through positive and supportive



Buy-and-hold investing is still a great ideas

If you're a buy-and-hold investor. these days may be proving very dif-A ficult for you. A lot of stocks have been hard-hit by recent developments, making the proven, long-range investment strategy of hanging tough with your stocks an especially fretful one.

If you've picked your stocks well. buy-and-hold is still the best way to go. Even though the technology sector has been hardest hit of late, tech stocks like Cisco Systems, Texas Instruments and Oracle are sure to recover and are worth holding onto for the long run.

But should the buy-and-hold strategy be an inflexible one? I think not. Rather, you should see it as an extremely conservative approach to making your investment choices, while allowing yourself the room to make adjustments when it's rational to do so.

When the markets are volatile, they are also emotional. When the Nasdaq headed up the roller coaster last year with an 88 percent gain, buy-and-hold (c) King Features Synd., Inc.

investors found it difficult to abstain from those wildly speculative stocks that could jump 1000 percent. But if you got into those stocks, you probably bought them just before they began to fall. The lesson: If you're going to step out of your buy-and-hold approach, don't do it when the market is running at a fever pitch. That's probably too late to get in on the action.

Now we're on the downside of the rollercoaster, and buy-and-hold investors are watching a severe erosion in stocks they have long held on to. When you consider that these stocks may have further to fall before hitting bottom, you can see the buy-and-holders biting their nails considering whether to bail out. Again, wrong move. Selling toward the bottom of an emotional cycle will have the adverse effect of getting out too late and watching formerly-held stocks start to rebound.

Instead, buy-and-holders should consider keeping a core portion of their portfolios (80 percent of their best stocks) unchanged, while retaining the latitude to sell the remaining part when the market tops, or buy when the market taps out.

This way, you can intelligently take advantage of the market's swings while still keeping the long-term strategy that will pay the greatest benefits to you
