



Teacher who committed suicide was picked for award

When Richard Balentine was named the Niles Chamber of Commerce's Teacher of the Year. it was at the encouragement of Niles mother Sandie Beierwaltes.

Beierwaltes nominated Balentine for the honor, saying she was impressed by the Notre Dame College Prep teacher's interactions with students and the positive influence he had over her own son Jonathan, a Notre Dame graduate.

"He was a constant fixture there," Beierwaltes said of Balentine, whose April 16 death at the Notre Dame campus has been ruled a suicide. "I was always impressed with the relationship he had with the parents and students. You'd see him and there would be a flock of people around him. He was just very kind and gentle. He had a way with the kids and they knew if they needed anything he was a person they could go to."

Balentine took groups of Notre Dame students to New Orleans each year as part of a Habitat for Humanity project where they participated in building homes for victims of Hurricane Katrina. Jonathan attended the mission twice and even returned to help immediately following his graduation, Beierwaltes said. She attributed her son's dedication to Balentine's influence.

"He gave them experiences they normally wouldn't have in their life," Beierwaltes said.

The Niles Police Department said that prior to Balentine's death he had been under investigation by the department for an allegation of "inappropriate communications between Mr. Balentine and current or former Notre Dame students."

"That's nothing that was ever experienced in my house," Beierwaltes said, saying she is "devastated" by Balentine's death, but happy that he knew he had been selected for the Teacher of the Year award.

"I'm so grateful I nominated him and he saw the letter that I wrote so he knew what an impact he made on so many people, not just the boys at Notre Dame, but the whole community," she said.



Teacher killed self after accusations of 'inappropriate communications'

Funeral services were held in Pennsylvania this week for a Notre Dame College Prep teacher who committed suicide amid a police investigation.

The Niles Police Department said the investigation of Richard Balentine, 38, involved allegations of "inappropriate communications between Mr. Balentine and current or former Notre Dame students."

Niles Police Chief Dean

Strzelecki this week declined to comment further on the allegations or the number of complainants. The investigation, he said, was "in its infancy" at the time of Balentine's death.

"We're going to wait and see if there is anyone else who calls (with an allegation)," Strzelecki

Balentine, who was set to receive a Teacher of the Year Award from the Niles Chamber of Commerce on April 27, was found

dead on the morning of April 16 inside his residence on the Notre Dame campus at 7655 W. Dempster St.

The Cook County Medical Examiner's Office said Balentine was found hanged and ruled his death a suicide.

Police said Balentine had been interviewed by investigators on the morning of April 15, the day before he was found dead. Police released Balentine after the interview and have not determined if the communications were criminal in nature. the department said.

Teresa Connolly, spokeswoman for Notre Dame College Prep, said Balentine had taught at the school for six years. Though it is uncommon for teachers to reside on campus, she said Balentine was staying in an area that had once housed priests.

"He had been living here for a brief time while awaiting the closing on his condo," Connolly said.

According to Connolly, Notre Dame was made aware of the police investigation, but school officials are not aware of any details.beyond what police released publicly.

"We always cooperate with the police, but we have not been asked for any information," she said.

According to a statement on the school's website posted later in week, Notre Dame had not received any complaints regarding Balentine.

Ryan Blackburn, a spokesman for the Archdiocese of Chicago, said the Archdiocese was never involved in the police investigation. nor is it aware of the details behind the allegation.

A native of Pennsylvania, Balentine served as Notre Dame's director of campus ministry and was also chairman of the Religious Studies Department.

He had been nominated for a Teacher of the Year award by a parent and had been set to receive the award during the Niles

Chamber's Night of Roses banquet, said Chamber Director Katie Schneider.

Scott Czarnik, a former student in Balentine's religion class and a 2009 graduate of Notre Dame, described the teacher as "a friend as well as an educator."

"The way he bonded with the kids was one-of-a-kind," Czarnik recalled. "No other teacher would relate to us the way he did. He became close to everyone who wanted to become close to him."

Czarnik said Balentine made himself available to his students after school, and kept in contact with them after the graduated. Czarnik said the two attended Blackhawks games together and were "friends outside of school."

After graduating and moving to Arizona for college, Czarnik found himself reaching out to his former teacher when he was having trouble adjusting to college life.

He called the allegation that Balentine had engaged in "inappropriate communication" with students "very out of character."

"As far as I knew him, he was a friend and that's what he wanted to be - nothing more," Czarnik said.

Anthony Lupo, also a 2009 graduate, called the allegation "shocking."

"I never thought any of the communication I or any of my friends had with him was anywhere near inappropriate," he said. "There was a fine teacher-student line there that I never saw crossed."

Lupo knew Balentine as the chaplain to the school's hockey team. Lupo, a member of the team, said Balentine drove the team bus to every hockey game.

Lupo called the teacher "one of the most genuine people I had ever met. He loved his students. He was strict in that he wanted you to do well in school, but if it was outside of school and you wanted to talk about sports or whatever, you could talk about that, too."

Counselors and religious staff were made available to Notre Dame students and faculty following Balentine's death.

Park District names new chief

The Morton Grove Park District will enter the busy summer season with a new leader at its helm.

Tracey Anderson, a 25-year parks and recreation veteran, assumes the executive director post May 6.

Commissioners unanimously approved Anderson's hire at a special meeting on April 15. She will earn \$102,000 annually plus benefits.

Anderson has served as Homewood-Flossmoor's

superintendent of recreation since December 2009. She has also worked at Olympia Fields' Irons Oaks Environmental Learning Center, the Lake Bluff Health Care Center and Vitas Hospice Care in Skokie.

According to a release from the park district, Anderson is skilled in the areas of program development, fundraising, budgeting and management.

Park Board Vice President Eileen Coursey described Anderson as a "very vivacious person" with a great sense of humor. She said the park board sought "somebody (who) had a good fight" in them.

The park district has been without a permanent leader

since last October when Brian Sullivan, the former director, abruptly resigned to "pursue other opportunities," a park district release said.

Rich Grodsky, who retired from Elmhurst's park district last year, was tapped to serve in interim capacity in early November. He did not apply for the permanent position, park district spokeswoman Sue Braubach said.

For assistance in finding the new top leader, the park district worked with executive search firm Hazard, Young, Attea & Associates, which is headquartered in Rosemont.

Over 40 applicants, half of whom had experience in parks and recreation work, applied for the position, reported commissioner Dominick Burdi. He said Anderson was one of three applicants interviewed by the park board for the job.

At the April 19 park board meeting, commissioner Kevin Lochner read a statement recognizing Grodsky's contributions to the Morton Grove Park District over the past five months.

During his brief tenure, Grodsky completed the park district's five-year capital plan and orchestrated the financial and construction planning for the upcoming \$6.44-million overhaul of Oriole Pool.

Lochner thanked Grodsky for

his time and work, noting "his experience and organizational skills make a tremendous difference in how quickly the park district was able to stay on course and find a new director."

Park staff and officials echoed Lochner's sentiment.

"We all feel a great deal of gratitude and we appreciate your hard work," Coursey told Grodsky.

His last day with the park district is April 25.

Park district delays paving Harrer Park lot

Plans are on hold to pave a lot adjacent to Harrer Park where a now-vacant building stands.

Morton Grove Park District officials tabled a motion April 18 to authorize a \$69,900 construction contract with Lake Zurich-based Chicagoland Paving Contractors, Inc. in order to

buy more time for discussing the future of the 6210 Dempster Street site.

The park district purchased the former bank property in December 2010, In February. park officials approved tearing down the structure, which includes a drive-through, for

Demolition was scheduled for March, but had been postponed due to pending permits from Cook County, reported park spokesman Sue Braubach.

Commissioner Dominick Burdi said work at the lot needed to be part of a larger, long-term planning discussion on Harrer Park.

"We didn't think it was an appropriate amount of money." he said of the decision to postpone the paving. "Instead of putting a ton of money into there right now, we're looking

at doing something different."

Harrer Park's pool would likely need to be fully replaced in the next three to five years. Constructed in 1962 and first renovated in 1995, it is in slightly better shape than the vounger Oriole Pool.

This summer the park district is undertaking a \$6.44-million project to create a state-ofthe-art aquatic facility at Oriole. The park district is eveing

Harrer next.

Braubach said the 6210 Dempster Street site would be fenced off for safety purposes until the park board makes a decision on how to proceed.

The park district received eight proposals for asphalt work ranging between \$69,900 and \$90,730.

The park board is expected to take the matter back up May

Park district to spend 4 percent more

The Morton Grove Park District is predicting a four-percent bump over last year's budget.

For the upcoming 2013-14 fiscal year, the park district budgeted \$5.75 million in expenditures, an amount appropriated to \$6 million to defray additional costs and liabilities.

Most revenue comes from real estate taxes, followed by income from programs. The park district expects to collect more than \$150,000 more in each area, with property taxes making up \$3.27 million and program revenue accounting for \$1.22 million.

However, with Oriole Park Pool closed for the summer. pool passes and related income are expected to be down by \$51,000.

The park district's expected

fund balance on May 1 is \$4.5

Cash reserves were also expected to decline in the current fiscal year. The 2012-13 budget reflected an estimated vear-end cash balance of \$4,25 million, down from \$5 million a year ago.



Q: Do you know what you'd like to pursue after





Judge orders payment from escrow to Glenview, Niles

A Cook County judge ordered payment from an escrow account to Glenview and Niles in a longstanding waterbilling dispute between the villages.

Judge Rita Novak signed the order April 17 that gives Glenview \$1.2 million while Niles will receive \$2.1 million.

Both parties agreed to the decision, in which Novak determined that Niles overcharged Glenview for 15 months from April 2010 to July 2011.

The dispute began when Glenview officials discovered Niles had over-charged Glenview's North Maine Utilities by including in its water rate costs for its sewer system, and not providing North Maine Utilities with the lowest

rate.

Glenview then withheld payments to Niles in escrow and asked for an audit of the village's utility records.

In response, Niles sued Glenview for nonpayment and Glenview countersued.

In late March, the escrow account totaled \$10 million, and a court hearing on the issue was set for June 28.

"Niles officials have indicated a desire to resolve the dispute. Absent a resolution of the issue, Niles said it will continue to pursue its lawsuit," stated a Niles' release.

Niles also will continue to provide water to the Glenview customers.

Glenview and Niles will hold discussions to resolve the remaining issues in the lawsuit. Should a resolution not result, Glenview will continue to pursue its counterclaim.

Niles teen arrested for theft

A Niles teen was taken into custody last week after he was seen allegedly throwing a video game system and suspected marijuana out of his car while being followed by police down several village streets.

Police said Eric Biarnesen, 18, of 8040 Ottawa St., was suspected of stealing three packs of cigarettes from an address in Elk Grove Village and an a Niles police officer was dispatched to his home on the morning of April 15. Upon arriving at the home, police said a vehicle matching the description of the one seen in the Elk Grove theft pulled out of the alley and drove away. While the officer followed the car, the driver began throwing items out the window including a bag containing suspected marijuana, an electronic scale, and a Nintendo DS video game system, police said.

The driver, later identified as Biarnesen, was taken into custody after driving down several streets and returning to the 8000 block of Ottawa Avenue, police said. Biarnesen also reportedly struck a parked car on Overhill Avenue, but no damage was reported by the owner.

Biarnesen was charged with theft, possession of marijuana and reckless driving. He has a May 21 court date.

Firefighter hurt responding to call

A Park Ridge firefighter was slightly injured in a fall while responding to an appliance fire inside a single-family home.

The fire occurred April 16 inside the utility room of a two-story home on the 300 block of Cedar Street. Park Ridge Deputy Fire Chief Jeff Sorensen said the fire originated in the dryer, but whether it was the result of a mechanical malfunction, electrical problem or other cause remained under investigation.

The fire was discovered by a resident of the home around 6:30 p.m.

"I'm glad the resident was home because if she wasn't there to notice the fire, it could have been a lot worse," Sorensen said.

The fire was contained to the utility room, though smoke damage was reported throughout the home. Damage was estimated at \$10,000.

While responding to the fire a fire-fighter suffered a minor leg injury after falling on an uneven surface outside the home, the Fire Department said. He was treated and released from Advocate Lutheran General Hospital in Park Ridge.





"We look at it as a public service for seniors," sai d Barton. Seniors received information on how to stay healthy and active and they learned what organizations in the community can offer them.


"It's been a really good turnout," said Dan Balmes, a volunteer with St. Matthew's Church. "The entertainment definitely draws people here."

When Arlie Ramirez was walking to the train station to go back to his hotel after proudly crossing the finish line at the Boston Marathon, he heard a boom, but didn't think too much of it.

However, when he walked into a restaurant by his hotel, people were coming into the restaurant crying, and he knew something was really wrong.

The Niles resident crossed the finish line at the Boston Marathon after three hours and 13 minutes, a time that he is proud of. He was supposed to meet some friends near . the finish line, but since he was experiencing some cramping he decided to go back to his hotel room

"People started walking into the restaurant and hotel minutes later crying and freaked out over what happened," wrote Ramirez, in a Facebook message to the Niles Herald-Spectator. "In a way, I wish I was there to help anyone. At the same time I'm blessed to not have been there because who knows what could have happened."

Ramirez said he finally qualified for the Boston Marathon after trying for five years.

"It's such a big deal for

everybody," said Ramírez.

"There is camaraderie that runners share globally and this one sport unites the world," wrote Ramirez. "I'm sad this marathon or any can be ruined by one selfish person who put a scar on so many people. ... People shared so many

The Boston Marathon was Ramirez's seventh marathon. He has three kids, the oldest one attending Maine South High School in Park Ridge.



Floodwaters fill Maine Township homes — again

Thalia Davos has had enough.

She's tired of replacing her furnace, hot water heater and everything else destroyed by floodwaters pouring into her unincorporated Maine Township townhouse. And she's equally tired of cleaning up the mess that has been left behind in at least eight floods she's counted since moving into the Colonial Ridge subdivision on Robin Drive 17 years

"It's time to move out," Davos said, standing in the alley outside her home last Thursday after yet another flood, her eyes on the swollen retention pond next door. "I cannot take it anymore."

This time, in addition to the eight feet of water in her basement. Davos watched as water flowed over her front steps, under the door and into her living room on the morning of April 18. She had already replaced her hardwood floors, which were ruined in an earlier flood.

Nearby, cars slowly made their way through the stillflooded alley on the east side of the densely-populated neighborhood north of Maine East High School, creating waves which flowed into the backyards of homes closest to the retention pond. Davos' husband. Gus. waded into the almost knee-deep water with a shovel, attempting to clear debris from a sewer to speed up the drainage.

But the water continued to flow as residents in the rows of townhouses behind him pumped out their basements, adding to the deluge.

"My husband just had heart surgery. Why does he have to clean the sewer? Why isn't the city coming out?" Thalia Davos asked. "Nobody comes to see if you are alive or dead."

Flooding is nothing new on Robin Drive and the neighboring Dee Road community to the west. Before last week, the area had flooded each year between 2008 and 2011. In the 1980s, one man drowned in his own

Also not new is the frustration among residents in the

ethnically diverse, mixed-income neighborhood who feel little attention has been paid to them as their homes flood and then flood again.

Because it is an unincorporated area, Robin Drive is under the jurisdiction of the township government. Maine Township Supervisor Carol Teschky said she and other township officials did visit the area the day of the flooding and provided sand, sandbags and trash receptacles for the residents to dispose of their damaged possessions.

"We've done everything

we can," she said Friday from the township's Senior Expo at

On Monday, Teschky and other township officials returned with clean-up kits consisting of mops, buckets, rubber gloves and cleaning solutions which were distributed to Dee and Robin residents.

On the morning of April 18, Julia Cabrales had just finished spring cleaning at her Robin Drive townhouse when. for the fourth time in as many years, she and her family found themselves again

fighting against rising waters to rescue whatever they could from their basement. Stacks of boxes, children's toys and mattresses were piled high in the living room of the home, the floor still wet and muddy from water that had, once again, reached the first floor.

"It's unfortunate that we have to keep going through this," said Cabrales, a wife and mother of eight children who had also invited Pioneer Press into her home following the September 2008 floods that ravaged the area. Last week she described how her family pulled together to try to save their possessions as the water rushed in around 3 a.m.

"They get nervous, they get scared," Cabrales said of her children. "We were all forming a chain so we could bring up as much as we can. One was holding one thing, the other was holding another. The two smallest were asleep, but the older ones were in gear, helping us. They know we can't keep going through this every single time. It's expensive."

Nearby neighbor Brenda Berrum, 12, described how water reached the second stair on the first floor of her

"It smells really bad, too," she said.

Families on the east end of the subdivision blame overland flooding on the nearby retention pond which sits on property belonging to Advocate Lutheran General Hospital and is located within the

city of Park Ridge. Sarah Mitchell, engineer for the city of Park Ridge, said the city required water retention when the hospital built its north campus.

A call to Lutheran General was not returned.

Several residents in the area filed a lawsuit against a number of municipalities, including Maine Township and the city of Park Ridge, due to severe flooding that occurred in 2008. The case is still pending in Cook County Circuit Court.

A deluge of water on Dempster Street - which resulted in closure of the road for much of the day last Thursday - also flowed into the Robin and Dee neighborhoods, forcing residents to find higher ground for their cars. Adding to the residents' problems is Prairie Creek, which snakes through the area just feet from some homes; the Des

Plaines River, which backs up into the creek and its tributaries; and the low-lying nature of the area, according to Maine Township Highway Commissioner Robert Provenzano.

"They should have never been built there," Provenzano said-of the townhouses, duplexes and apartments that line the small area across the street north of Maine East High School. "They were built next to a creek 40 years ago."

In 2010 Robert Cohen, Maine Township's Director of Emergency Management, reported that creek beds may also have been bulldozed in order to construct the residences decades ago. They were also built without stormwater detention, he said, something that would be required of new construction today.

According to the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District, the organization is evaluating floodwater storage and improvements along Prairie Creek that "would provide flood reduction to areas of Park

Ridge and unincorporated areas of Maine Township north of Dempster Street and west of Greenwood Avenue."

A preliminary analysis is currently being finalized and the project. which would cost an estimated \$19.8 million, would be funded by the MWRD, according to spokesperson Dan Wendt.

Prairie Creek, as well as the Prairie/Farmer Creek to which it connects, have long been part of watershed studies and projects over the years, including the Levee 50 project which was expected to relieve flooding in Des Plaines, Park Ridge and unincorporated Maine Township.

Until - or if - change comes to the neighborhood, residents who remain behind are hoping last week's flood will, finally, be the last.

"You try to think positive. It's hard, but you have to stay positive," Cabrales said. "What else can we do? Just keep going forward."

Village workers rescue biker from floodwaters

What they thought was a garbage bag floating on the street along with tree limbs, was really a man who fell off his bike and was stuck in deep water.

"All of a sudden a hand came up," said George Alpogianis, owner of Kappy's Restaurant in Morton Grove and a new Niles village trustee. "He barely had his head up over the water."

Alpogianis lives in the area near Harts Road and Riverside Drive, and was out helping the Niles Public Works team with sandbagging during the rain that hit Niles and surrounding communities hard on Thursday, Apr. 18.

Alpogianis said the man, who was wearing a garbage bag as a rain coat, was trapped by his bike near a tree stump.

"He was pinned," said Alpogianis. He said that logs were flying through the water and it was a very dangerous situation.

When the man put his arm up, Tony Dati, Mike Reid and Peter Arvanitis heroically came to the rescue.

"He was all tangled up in his bike," said Dati. He said that the whole time they were trying to rescue him he kept pointing to Touhy Avenue and saying he had to go that way.

After the brave public works employees rescued the man in waist-high water, he didn't talk with the men who saved him. Dati said he wasn't sure if he spoke

another language and there was a language barrier.

"He just got on his bike and left," said Dati. He said the main thing is that the man is safe.

"They put their lives in harm's way," said Alpogianis. "It shows how great our village is and the people who work for us."

Dati said Alpogianis also helped them save the biker.

Throughout the village, streets were closed, homes were flooded and vehicles were stranded.

Niles firefighters rescued a few people who were stuck in their vehicles, shared Niles Fire Chief Steve Borkowski.

Four vehicles were stranded on the roads on April 18, according to Niles Police Sgt. Robert Tornabene.

"We've had vehicles that have gone around barricades that ended up getting stranded on the roadway," said Tornabene.

"It's been nonstop," Tornabene said Thursday morning. "There's


flooding throughout the village."

Tornabene said the road was closed on Harts Road between Days Terrace and Franks Avenue due to the Chicago River cresting over the bridge. Howard Street was also closed between Nordica and Oak Park avenues.

"I can't tell you how big a flood situation it was yet," said Acting Village Manager Steve Vinezeano on Friday. He said that he did not think the numbers were as bad as in 2011, when the village received more than 750 calls about flooding. On Monday morning, Vinezeano said he still did not have any information on the number of homes affected by flooding.

Niles Public Works Director Scott Jochim said that a tree limb also damaged a gas main under the bridge on Harts Road between Milwaukee and Touhy avenues.

Jochim said he is very proud of the public works employees that put their own lives in jeopardy to save the biker.



Major roll call votes in the Senate

EXPANDED GUN CHECKS

Senators voted, 54-46, failing to reach 60 votes needed to advance a bid to require criminal and mental-health background checks on most gun purchases. A "yes" vote backed the so-called Manchin-Toomey measure to greatly expand background checks on gun sales. (\$ 649) Sen. Richard Durbin: Yes; Sen. Mark Kirk: Yes

CONCEALED-CARRY LAWS

Senators voted, 57-43, failing to reach 60 votes needed to amend \$ 649 (above) so as to make it easier for individuals to carry concealed handguns to other states. A "yes" vote was to impose a de facto, uniform federal standard on the variety of state concealed-carry gun laws. Sen. Richard Durbln: No; Sen. Mark Kirk: No

ASSAULT WEAPONS BAN

Senators voted, 40-60, refusing to outlaw the future sale, manufacture, possession and importation of 157 specific semi-automatic

assault weapons while defining as legal 2,258 specific hunting and sporting firearms. A "yes" vote was to ban military-style assault weapons. (S 649) Sen. Richard Durbin: Yes; Sen. Mark Kirk: Yes

REPUBLICAN GUN PLAN

Senators voted, 52-48, failing to reach 60 votes needed to advance a GOP alternative to a pending Democratic-drafted gun bill (S 649). A "yes" vote backed a bill that emphasized school-safety and mental-health efforts along with stricter enforcement of existing oun laws. Sen. Richard Durbin: No; Sen. Mark Kirk: No

MAGAZINE LIMITS

Senators voted, 46-54, to turn back an amendment to \$ 649 (above) that sought to outlaw magazine clips holding more than 10 bullets. Present law has no such limit on high-capacity magazines. A"yes" vote was to end a GOP-led filibuster against the amendment. Sen. Richard Durbin: Yes; Sen. Mark Kirk: Yes

Major roll call votes in the House

1. CYBER-SECURITY, CIVIL LIBERTIES

Members voted; 288-127, to ease privacy and antitrust laws in order to spur data-sharing between U.S. security agencies and private firms such as Internet service providers. A "yes" vote was to send the Senate a bill to bolster cybersecurity in the U.S. (HR 624)

2. PASSWORD PRIVACY

Members voted, 189-224, to defeat a motion to assure the privacy of passwords for social network sites such as Facebook as part of HR 624 (above). A "yes" vote was to prohibit employers from requiring employees to divulge their passwords as a condition of employment.

City IG blasts Rahm Emanuel for lack of access to documents

Chicago faces a "risk of increased waste, fraud and misconduct" by city employees and contractors because Mayor Rahm Emanuel has refused to give the city's inspector general unrestricted access to city documents and the power to enforce his own subpoenas, Inspector General Joe Ferguson warned last week.

Ferguson fired back, one week after Emanuel made it clear he has no intention of introducing a legislative remedy to an Illinois Supreme Court ruling that could tie Ferguson's hands and insulate Emanuel and his staff from investigation.

"The city faces risk of increased waste, fraud and misconduct among city employees and vendors by ignoring the problems the IGO faces ... This office has only the authority to do the job the mayor wants it to do and not the authority to do the job that it is statutorily obligated to do," Ferguson wrote in a letter to aldermen that preceded his quarterly report.

"The mayor, in publicly stating that the IGO has all the authority it needs, is mandating that the IGO cannot follow the evidence where it leads. Instead, the mayor and his corporation counsel can cut off access to the evidence needed to definitively determine who, or what is responsible for possible waste, fraud and abuse in city government.

Pat Quinn and Lisa Madigan differ on issues of guns, housing

Illinois voters got a peek last week at what a 2014 gubernatorial primary might look like, as Gov. Pat Quinn and his potential toughest Democratic challenger played up their individual efforts to help the housing market bounce back and offered differing takes on the state's concealed carry discussions.

Quinn and Attorney General Lisa Madigan - who said she's still mulling a decision on if she'll run separately addressed the Illinois Housing Leaders Conference in Springfield.

Quinn detailed state agency efforts with a focus on work to get veterans housing, while Madigan touted her office's legal efforts to take on the banking industry, including a large 2011 settlement with a Bank of America subsidiary over allegations of discriminatory

The ongoing work "at times feels like it has become my life's mission to save homes and rebuild our housing market in the wake of the mortgage crisis that turned into a devastating foreclosure crisis," Madigan told the group, which includes real estate agents. Her office sued Countrywide Financial Corp. in 2010, which helped lead to a \$335 million national settlement the following year.

Quinn, a Chicago Democrat like Madigan, praised his own housing authority and real estate agents as the "heart and soul" of neighborhoods.

AP Poll: Public pessimism on sour economy is on the rise

For the third year in a row, the nation's economic recovery has hit a springtime soft spot. Reflecting that weakness, only 1 in 4 Americans now expects his or her own financial situation to improve over the next year, a new Associated Press-GfK poll shows.

The sour mood is undermining support for President Barack Obama's economic stewardship and for government in general.

The poll shows that just 46 percent of Americans approve of Obama's handling of the economy while 52 percent disapprove. That's a negative turn from an even split last September - ahead of Obama's November re-election victory - when 49 percent approved and 48 percent disapproved.

Just 7 percent of Americans said they trust the government in Washington to do what is right "just about always," the AP-GfK poll found. Fourteen percent trust it "most" of the time and twothirds trust the federal government just "some of the time"; 11 percent say they never do.

The downbeat public attitudes registered in the survey coincide with several dour economic reports showing recent slowdowns in gains in hiring, consumer retail spending, manufacturing activity and economic growth.

Legislature must figure out concealed carry

In the debate over the concealed carrying of weapons in Illinois, legislation must not put the public at greater risk of gun violence.

Advocates of concealed carry argue it makes citizens safer, but there is no systematic evidence of this. In one recent example, a Texas district attorney and his wife were shot to death last month even though the attorney was armed at all times and knew he had been threatened.

Illinois and the District of Columbia are the only places remaining in America with an outright ban on concealed carry. The U.S. 7th District Court ruled Illinois law is unconstitutional and gave the Legislature 180 days to agree on a law permitting some kind of concealed carry.

The 180 days runs out on June 9. If the Legislature doesn't act by then, the case will be sent back to the lower court, and what would happen next is anyone's guess. It would be wisest not to leave such an important issue up to the courts.





Teachers bank on basketball fundraiser

After sinking a long two-point shot from top of the key, social studies teacher Matthew Arends raised his arms in triumph.

Danny Walker, who assists with extracurricular programming at Apollo School in Des Plaines, returned the favor with a steal and layup assist on the opposite end of the court.

Fans wearing blue and yellow in the bleachers went wild.

There were no losers in the fast-paced yet friendly basketball game between faculties at Gemini Junior High School April 12.

The only number that mattered was the amount East Maine School District 63 raised for children with cancer.

The district-wide basketball fundraiser, now in its 34th year, pits junior high staff members against their elementary and educational service center colleagues.

Gemini's former athletic director, Bill Gibson, organized the first basketball charity event in 1979 following the death of one of his pupils, Sharon Helbrun, from juvenile leukemia.

The event honors Helbrun

as well as Gemini student Kelly Russotto, who succumbed to a brain tumor four years ago at age 12.

Gibson said the painful reality is that, with a yearly student population of about 800 students, some become fatally ill.

That's not to say nothing can be done to lessen the weight of statistics. Since event's inception District 63 has raised over \$130,000 for pediatric services.

This year the community rallied to donate \$5,614 to the Ann & Robert H. Lurie Children's Hospital of Chicago.

The Friday night faculty face-off was held in the William Gibson Gymnasium, renamed last August for the fundraiser's founder.

Though retired from teaching, Gibson continues to run an after-school teen center and two open-gym programs for the school district. He handed over the reins for the charity game to math teacher and basketball coach Bob Wirtz, who has helped plan the event with Gemini's student council over the past 12

"We're raising money for an amazing cause and, at the same time, it's bringing everyone together in our area," Wirtz said.

Gemini took home a win for the second year in a row, but no one is really counting the score. Wirtz said the 60 staff

members who step onto the court do more so for show than competition.

The players - some in jeans. a few with striped knee-high socks, and many with sweatbands - subbed in every two minutes.

"There is a wide variety of talent," said Wirtz, who played alongside his wife and brother, also staff at Gemini.

"The kids get a kick out of seeing teachers playing," he

Whether they throw air balls or alley-oop passes, "the kids of course cheer everyone on," Gibson added.

Two rising stars who once walked the junior high's halls returned for the game.

Glenview songstress Iliana Incandela, a finalist last year on the CW music competition show, "The Next," had an endless line of youngsters seeking autographs.

Kids also surrounded Des Plaines native Charles McKinney, the DePaul Blue Demons' six-foot-three guard.

McKinney played with Gemini's squad, picking up an assist from Gibson's three-pointer. He also caught air a few times and slamdunked the ball, causing Wirtz to pump his fists from the sidelines and students to scream.

It took the efforts of many to pull off the annual event.

Members of the Parent Teacher Organization worked

with local businesses to get all food and beverages donated so that 100-percent of concession sales went to the children's hospital.

"They really went to town and hustled," said languagearts instructor John Turnbow, who also serves as a student council moderator.

'This is like our favorite thing to do," he said.

Seventh-grader Peter Azzo was on the ground with a

camera capturing the electric atmosphere for the school yearbook. Gemini cheerleaders, along with a cheer squad from Maine East High School, tumbled during halftime.

Among them was 14-yearold Natalia Pieczonka, who grinned from ear to ear at the turnout.

"It's really nice for the community and it's all for a good cause," the eighth-grader said. "It all worked out."



Dog escapes death, lands on Maine South stage

One of the stars of Maine South High School's latest musical production almost didn't live long enough to make his stage debut.

Rusty, a 1-year-old Chihuahua who plays the part of Bruiser in this weekend's debut of "Legally Blonde," was one day away from being euthanized at a Tucson, Ariz. shelter when he caught the eye of Jay Haines last summer.

"He was emaciated — you could see his bones he was so skinny," the Des Plaines resident recalled. "I asked (an employee) what the blue lines on his paper were and he said, 'He's a \$10 special. He's going to be put down tomorrow."

Wanting to save the dog from the fate that awaited him, Haines adopted Rusty — then named Ranger — and nursed him back to health. Five months later he brought Rusty to the Maine South stage in Park Ridge for his very first audition.

"I wasn't sure the dog was going to work when it came to the audition, but it ended up being the best choice," said John Muszynski, director of "Legally Blonde." "I'm a softie for animal rescue and I think it's a great story. He's a wonderful little dog and I'm hoping people can find out about animal rescue when hear his story."

Haines himself is a proud stage parent of sorts.

"I tell him, 'You're going to work now because you're a working boy,'" he laughed.

"He's getting along with the other kids really well," Haines noted. "He's just a great little dog. He responded very well, better than I expected."

Rusty is also seemingly content to be carried around in a big pink purse by Guliana Bartucci, who plays the lead role of Harvard Law student Elle

Woods.

"Oh my God, I love the dog!" she exclaimed. "I have a Chihuahua myself so I'm used to them. He's so precious. He's just so cute."

But Rusty isn't the only pet on stage. A bulldog named Bear plays the role of Rufus Buonófuonte. Not exactly a mover and shaker, Bear was being carted about in a wagon during rehearsals.

"Both of the dogs seem to be pretty attentive — for the moment," Muszynski said, laughing. "You never know."

"Legally Blonde" tells the story of Elle Woods, a college sorority girl who, in an effort to win back her exboyfriend, enrolls in Harvard Law School. While there, she surprises everyone with her legal expertise.

Playing the part of Elle has required Bartucci to undergo her own personal transformation.

"I did end up dying my hair," said Bartucci, a natural brunette. "We were going to use a wig, but the role calls for so much energy and costume changes. It would be just way too hard with a wig."

She's also taken away some characteristics from her alter ego.

"She's made me a better person,"
Bartucci said of the character Elle. "I
have to keep up her optimism and all
her personality. She's a very loving,
non-judgmental person and I think
I've taken that out of rehearsal and

applied that to my life."

Muszynski says audiences can expect a fast-paced, exciting, music-packed production — a "guilty pleasure" of sorts, but with an important message at its core.

"People think it's a fun, contemporary story, but for my students and the community it makes a really strong statement about not judging anyone on a surface level," he said. "There's so much more to them than just the color of their hair, per se."

Rowdy students shut down Niles West pep rally

Pep rallies are meant to be high-energy events.

But the scene at Niles West High School Friday afternoon was borderline chaotic.

The boys' gymnastics team had just begun a tumbling routine at the last school-wide assembly of the year when the cheering and chanting started.

Then rolls of toilet paper were launched. Colorful strands of silly string and confetti flew all around. The shouting rapidly got louder.

One student, hoisted into the air, briefly body surfed in the bleachers.

After seeing a bicycle tire-like object fly overhead, sophomore John Botonakis said he remarked to a buddy: "It's about to get crazy here."

As more than 200 of the 2,600 teens appeared increasingly out of control, principal Kaine Osburn abruptly called the event off.

But rowdiness ensued. After calls by staff to get out of the gym, some students began running through the hallways. Someone scribbled "2013" and "2014," representative of the class' graduating years, in washable paint on the walls.

The assembly, scheduled for the last hour of school, lasted a mere 10 minutes.

Students were not violent or hostile, Osburn said, but their actions were also not tolerable.

"It wasn't anything like a riot," he said. "It was simply a group of seniors in the assembly who chose to behave in a way that was disruptive, and it bordered on unsafe."

Teens immediately took to Twitter to recount and question what went wrong. A Twitter account run by student publication Niles West News started using the hashtag #nwnassembly.

"Did that just happen? Was our assembly 9 minutes? Did I really have to wait 45 mins for my bus? What's with all the glitter?" wrote user @ morgGstalt.

Several used the social media website to chastise their unruly peers, primarily the seniors, for being disrespectful

to the event's participants and planners.

"Senior class should be ashamed," posted user @ Kyle_Collett. "Ruining Osborn's (sic) last assembly was what we'll be remembered by. Really showed them."

Osburn is leaving for a new job in Naperville after 14 years at District 219.

Students still managed to sneak in toilet paper, balloons and other celebratory props, just as they had in the past.

Senior Daniela Cicio said she didn't understand the administration's reaction. Such behavior had been tolerated in the past, she said.

"It has been worse in previous years," the 18-yearold from Skokie said. "We

thought we were showing our school spirit."

Osburn said exhibiting school and class spirit is OK, as long as the behavior is appropriate.

The rambunctious cheering on Friday, however, took away from the students who were performing, he said. Other student groups, including a dance team and basketball players, were also expected to show off their skills.

"Ultimately it's really just selfish behavior," Osburn said, adding disciplinary measures would be taken on Monday.

Botonakis, of Lincolnwood, acknowledged students might have gotten out of hand but they didn't need to be sent home.

Suicide summit to focus on prevention

RIVERWOODS

The saddest moment in the 15-year history of Willow House is measurable: It came in the huge number of phone calls that followed a Stevenson High School student's suicide.

And that sadness was the spark of what may prove to be the brightest hour for both Willow House and another non-profit agency serving the grief-stricken, the Lauri S. Bauer Foundation for Sudden Loss. The groups are organizing a conference next week in Wheeling to battle teen suicide.

"I don't think we've ever had as many calls as we did for this one." Stefanie Norris, Willow House's executive director, said of the community's response to a 15-year-old girl's suicide during Spring Break. "We can't just keep taking the calls and, one-to-one, help people as best we can. We know it's going to happen again.

"Why wait until we have more?" she added. "Let's do something now."

That something will be "Understanding, Preventing and Coping with Teen Suicide," a two-hour program with three featured speakers that the Bauer Foundation and Willow House are putting together May 1 at the Westin Chiacgo Northshore, Experts David Clark, Peggy Kubert and Nancy Perlson will answer questions from the audience and address points: recognizing someone who may be suicidal,

what one can do to prevent suicide, and how to cope when someone close kills him- or herself.

"We really expect it to be a full house," said Scott Bauer, who created a foundation in memory of his wife, who died of a sudden heart arrhythmia. "It is, unfortunately, something that is really on the minds of a lot of people."

Students at Stevenson, Glenbrook North and Barrington high schools have all lost classmates in recent weeks. Norris said that spring has always been the time of year when suicide rates increase - a counterintuitive phenomenon that she said Clark would speak about.

There is no registration or fee for the event, Bauer said. He thanked the Westin management for waiving almost all of its typical rates.

"The Westin is charging us a minimal, minimal amount," he said. "The speakers are not charging us."

Norris said that when she came up with the idea for this event, she knew right away that she wanted it to be larger than anything her staff could handle. Willow House specializes in helping young people deal with losses of loved ones, and the Bauer Foundation specializes in helping survivors of an unexpected loss cope with their grief; the two groups have worked together before.

"We have a shared mission, and I think we could do a wonderful job putting a program together," Norris said.

Both said that the gathering needed to be their urgent priority - before spring goes much further.

"Unfortunately, these deaths just keep coming," Norris said.

Parkinson's researchers may need to change course

April is Parkinson's Awareness month.

A local physician and researcher is using new research to snow that we may need to take a second look at the strategies being considered as potential treatments for the disease.

"It's an opportunity to pause, and to reconsider the treatment strategy," explains Dr. Demetrius Maraganore, Chairman of Department of Neurology at NorthShore University HealthSystems and Co-Director of the NorthShore Neurologic Institute.

After many years of research, Maraganore recently published a paper that questions the approach many scientists and researchers are taking as they look for a treatment for Parkinson's disease. Maraganore explains that Parkinson's is a complicated disease, and for many years the research focused on "identifying people at risk

and trying to predict and prevent Parkinson's disease altogether."

That research led experts to focus on a specific gene, alpha-synuclein. Since its discovery as a cause of familial Parkinson's disease nearly 20 years ago, alpha-synuclein has been at the center of the research and the con-

ventional wisdom was that suppressing this gene could be a treatment for the disease.

"Our research suggests therapies that seek to suppress alpha-synuclein in Parkinson's disease may actually accelerate the disease process and increase the risk for developing severe physical disability and dementia," Maraganore said.

Maraganore and the NorthShore team, in conjunction with a team

of researchers from The Mayo Clinic, followed almost 1,100 patients for nearly 15 years. They wanted to see how natural levels of alpha-synuclein impacted outcomes. Researchers focused on the patients' need to use a wheelchair and/or their likelihood of developing dementia, two debilitating

side effects of Parkinson's disease. The results showed those with lower levels actually had a 23-percentgreater risk of becoming wheelchairdependent or developing dementia.


He is sharing this information not to disappoint those who are seeking a treatment or cure, or to discourage, but to encourage further investigation by the research community.

"It's a much more complex story," said Maraganore. "The number one

therapeutic strategy for slowing or halting Parkinson's disease may be very effective in prevention, but could be devastating in treating the disease if you've got it. We believe it is our responsibility to release this data because this type of treatment may have long-term harmful effects. Our primary responsibility is 'first do no harm.'"

A vaccine that targets reducing alpha-synuclein levels is currently in Phase I clinical trials, and other preclinical research is targeting molecules that target the protein for reduction.

Maraganore and other researchers will now continue to review the results and see if they can replicate the findings. While this is occurring they will continue to undertake the task of trying to understand Parkinson's disease and to develop a safe and effective treatment.



There's something about spring that makes you want to freshen up.

"It's time to throw open the windows, clean up, declutter and bring a little


brightness into life. (Although spring has been taking its sweet time getting to the Chicagoland area.)

This is also the perfect time to refresh your decor. All you need is a canvas and a couple of supplies. These three art projects won't take up too much time and don't cost much, depending on the size of your canvas.


- · A canvas
- Tape (you can use masking tape or a painter's tape)
- · Acrylic paint
- · Foam brush or pouncer

This is a versatile project. They can be in the same color paiette, but the designs can be radically different. Tape-painting uses multiple strips of tape to make a design across the canvas. Take a strip of tape and lay it across your canvas. Make sure the ends of the tape reach the back of the canvas. Do this vertically, horizontally and diagonally. Don't fill the entire canvas with tape. The strips of tape should intersect, but you should still see spots of the canvas. Make sure the tape sticks to the canvas tightly or the paint will seep under the tape. Using acrylic paint, paint the entire canvas including the tape. Remember to paint the sides of the canvas too since they will be visible. Let the canvas dry for at least an hour, then remove the tape. You can create a pop of color by using one or more paint colors.

- A canvas
- · Fabric that will fit your canvas
- · Staple gun

You can find fabric at stores such as Jo-Ann Fabric and Craft Stores, Hobby Lobby and Ikea. You can also use things like tablecloths or bedsheets if they fit your decor. Put the canvas in the middle of the fabric, with the back of the canvas facing up. Cut the fabric so there's at least a 2-inch border of excess that will be stapled to the back of the canvas. Start at a corner and staple the fabric to the canvas. Continue to staple the fabric, pulling it taut as you go, until the entire piece is stapled to the back of the canvas. Cut off any excess fabric.

- A canvas
- At least two packs of 24-count crayons
- · Hot glue gun
- · Hair dryer or heat gun

This project is perfect for a kid's room or a craft room. Take the boxes of crayons and pair the like colors together. Arrange the crayons in a line, side-by-side, in a color pattern you like. You can either leave the crayon wrappers on or remove them. Take the hot glue gun and start gluing the crayons, point-side down, along one side of the canvas. Once all the crayons have been glued to the canvas, put down a tarp or a couple of garbage bags next to a wall. Lean the canvas, with the crayons on top, against the wall. Take the hair dryer and start melting the crayons. Continue to apply heat until the crayons melt all the way down the canvas in a pattern you like.

"If you really want to make a friend, go to someone's house and eat with him ... the people who give you their food give you their heart."

That Cesar Chavez quote is the mantra at Curt's Cafe.

Since its inception one year ago, the nonprofit training café, located at 2922 Central St. in Evanston, has helped place a dozen participants in its at-risk youth program into schools or jobs.

Students learn employable skills working on the café line, individual mentoring and classroom instruction. Subjects range from computers to food history. Students receive a stipend while they train, as well as iob placement assistance upon program completion.

"I love the concept behind Curt's," said Blythe Yost, Yost, a Winnetka native, has an exhibit of 20 watercolor paintings at the café through May 15.

"This show is an opportunity to help — to be involved," she said.

The paintings, a series she calls "From Above," were inspired through her work as a landscape architect. She operates two landscape businesses while living in Pearl River, N.Y.

"Just as in landscaping, there

is a juxtaposition of natural, linear lines and swirly elements in these works," she said.

Curt's Cafe also hosts music performances, yoga sessions and other events.

What Employee Benefits Matter Most to Job Seekers

By Monster Insights

It's an all-too familiar recruiting scenario: You've found a qualified candidate that you hope to hire. Everything seems to be a go - until they decide to go with another position. They turned down your offer - why? The other job offered benefits that were more attractive. Understanding the motivational drivers for candidate job offers is key to a successful hiring process. The issue prompted the Monster Insights team, which has provided human capital information, research and data tools to help Monster customers with strategic workforce decisions for over 10 years, to research the topic further. The Monster Insights study, conducted in early 2012, included a cross-section of 1,679 participants by gender, employment, career level and household income. While the survey findings are not meant to be a final recommendation for HR managers and recruiters, they can help shed some much-needed light on the employee benefits that matter most to today's job seekers.

Average Importance of Benefits

Monster asked survey participants what is valued if they considered a prospective job compensation and benefits. Benefits included:

- · Healthcare plan
- Vacation Time
- · Pay Raise
- Employee Benefit
- Performance Benefit
- Retirement Plan

Monster then varied the benefit or benefit level to see how survey participants reacted to accepting the new job. Survey results found that a healthcare plan was the most valued class of benefits, accounting for almost one-third of the value prospective employees would place on a benefits package. Such a strong finding is consistent with past Monster employee benefit surveys which also showed how valuable healthcare is to job seekers and employees. Survey results ranked average importance by benefit as follows:



- Healthcare plan = 32%
- Vacation Time = 25%
- Pay Raise = 15%
- Employee Benefit = 10%
- Performance Bonus = 9%
- Retirement Plan = 8%

Average Importance of Benefits by Income

Income can have a major impact on how job seekers and employees value different compensation benefits. In general, survey findings found that the lower the income, the more important healthcare is to the job seeker. For example, those with income less than \$90K per year indicated that healthcare could be up to 35% of the value of their compensation, while vacation time placed a distant second to healthcare benefits. However, those earning over \$90K per year indicated vacation time as their most important benefit, narrowly outdistancing the importance they place on nealthcare. Such findings suggest that varying the degree of compensation benefits by the current income level of a job seeker, particularly healthcare and vacation time, can greatly influence how a job candidate will perceive an offer.

Average Importance of Benefits by Gender

Both male and female survey participants placed healthcare as a high priority in compensation with vacation time as second. However, women appeared to place a bit more importance on vacation, while men valued a performance bonus slightly more than women. The study showed that varying compensation benefits and levels would generally have little to no impact between the sexes.

Average importance of Benefits: Unemployed vs. Employed

Monster survey findings again show how important healthcare is and how it can be leveraged in recruiting. Unemployed versus employed job candidates in the survey indicated a significant difference in how they value healthcare benefits. While employed job candidates value healthcare, unemployed job candidates placed even greater value on this benefit. In doing so, the unemployed candidate is more willing to accept a lower pay increase in favor of the peace-of-mind that healthcare benefits can provide. In those having healthcare benefits, the study found that an employed job candidate will place greater value and consideration in a pay raise. All other benefits tested to have similar value between employed and unemployed job candidates.

Average Importance of Benefits by Career Level


Career level (entry, mid-career, management and executive) can play a strong role in how job candidates perceive compensation benefits. While these job levels place the same rank level of importance on each benefit class, there is relative distinction among a benefit class. Similar to the surveyed unemployed job candidates, an entry-level job seeker places the greatest value on healthcare benefits. They are also more willing to trade this benefit for a retirement plan or performance bonus, which they rate lower in importance. Those mid-career survey participants placed greater importance on vacation time compared to entry-level, managers or executives. However, managers and executives see greater value in performance bonuses over their entry-level or mid-career candidates.

Average Importance of Benefits: Those with Children vs. Those Without Children

A job candidate with children has a similar value system to job candidates without children. However, the Monster survey discovered some differences in benefit levels that could be useful in the recruitment process. Those job candidates that were childless appear to value a pay raise as a slightly higher value than those with children. And those without children also placed greater importance on such employee benefits as life insurance and disability insurance. Not surprisingly, job candidates that have children placed a much higher degree of Importance on paid child care over those candidates without children. Knowing the family structure of a job candidate can enable the recruiter to fine-tune a compensation plan, optimizing it so that it has the most appeal to a particular job candidate.

Rick Mancuso, owner of Lake Forest Sports Cars and racing aficionado, shifts gears for his Sunday in Chicago

ick Mancuso spends his days at Lake Forest Sports Cars (990 N. Shore, Lake Bluff) surrounded by Ferrari Enzos and Aston Martin Vanquishes, the car made popular by James Bond in "Die Another Day." To put that in perspective (in case you're not a car connoisseur), it's much like singing karaoke with Adele and Sting: A little intimidating and very, very exciting. But this is the high-speed world that Mancuso has made his home. "We deal with limited-volume, high-performance, elegant and beautifully built cars," he explains of his Lake Forest dealership. The spot specializes in five brands: Aston Martin, Ferrari, Lotus, Maserati and McLaren, with "one or two more brands possibly coming soon," he hints.

And Mancuso isn't slowing down:
He's gearing up to go full-throttle with
his business, opening a new McLaren
showroom downtown with his brother
Rob Mancuso at the corner of Huron
and Clark in June. "It will be the first
McLaren satellite showroom in the
country," he says. "We'll try to do a
couple of showrooms like that around
the city — smaller, boutique-type centers where customers can learn about
the cars and get the experience."

When he's out of the office, Mancuso likes to be on the track. He's spent the past 25 years proving his mettle on the racecourse, completing the arduous 24 hours of Daytona endurance race three times along with a slew of other impressive racing victories. Now, motorsport has become a family activity for Mancuso, one that he shares with his two sons, Adam and Nick. "They're better drivers, and never fail to remind me of that," Mancuso says, laughing. "We have a few grudge matches coming up, though."

Here, the king of the track hits the gas on his perfect Sunday.



Mancuso takes a drive (usually in his favorite Aston Martin Vantage) to Luxbar (18 E. Bellevue) for a healthy oatmeal breakfast with his

friends.

Mancuso takes his time on the drive back to the North Shore. "My time by myself is important to me — my music, my temperature, my environment. It's therapeutic."



After spending a few hours at the office, Mancuso pops into Smith's Mens Store (770 N. Western, Lake Forest) for some shopping and mingling. "It's always about the people. I have good friends there," he says.

5:30 P.M.

The Mancuso clan heads back downtown to The Capital Grille (633 N. St. Clair) for an early dinner. When deciding what to eat, "I listen to the waiter's suggestions, and it's always good," he says.

8 P.M.

Mancuso and his wife head to the Regal Theatre (300 Parkway, Lincolnshire) to take in a movie. "I like the complete opposite of what my wife enjoys," he jokes. "I like high-activity movies." A recent favorite? "Zero Dark Thirty" with Jessica Chastain.

10:30 P.M.

He ends the night with a quick workout — light weights and Pilates — at his Lake Forest home.

BREAKING THEFA

Fall Out Boy's Pete Wentz and Patrick Stump on their time off. turning out a new album and taking a rock 'n' roll risk

don't think we're the biggest band in the world, but any time you're in a band, you're in a bubble. People appreciate you, or are paying attention to you, at the very least," says Fall Out Boy's Patrick Stump. "When you get out into the world, though, you're just like everybody else."

But the local band has always stood out from the crowd - Fall Out Boy is among Chicago's biggest music success stories of the previous decade. Named for a "Simpsons" character, the band was formed in Wilmette in 2001 by hard-core scene vets Pete Wentz, Joe Trohman and Stump. The trio's sound was very much inspired by Green Day's catchy, snotty punk and rapid tempos and by The Get Up Kids, a '90s-era band from Kansas City that headed up the second wave of what some call "emo" — a punk sound that marries controlled rock aggression with emotional

FOB released its first indie full-length album, "Take This To Your Grave," in 2003, then signed to Island Records for 2005's "From Under the Cork Tree," which went multiplatinum in an age of otherwise slipping sales. Stump and Wentz emerged as the leaders of the band, with bassist and lyricist Wentz becoming an unlikely alt-punk heartthrob for MTV's "TRL" set. He nearly overdosed on anti-anxiety meds during the making of "Cork Tree," and by 2008 had married pop singer Ashlee Simpson (they divorced in 2011).

As quickly as they'd risen to fame, Fall Out Boy began a descent. The band's fifth album, "Folie á Deux," expanded their sound palette, but was a commercial disappointment, despite guest spots from Elvis Costello and Lil Wayne. In late 2009, the band issued a greatest hits album and announced an indefinite hiatus, citing the strain of Wentz's celeb marriage on the band. It appeared that this Boy's life was winding down.

"It is really important to have to sit there and pay your bills, mow your lawn and do some dishes," says 28-yearold lead singer/guitarist/tunesmith Stump (married in Chicago this past September) on the band's time away from the spotlight. The growing-up time, he contends, made his excitement about a new record possible.

But in the three years before their hush-hush reunion in late 2012, neither Stump nor his bandmates gave up on music. Quite the contrary: Wentz, 33, made electro tunes



with Black Cards; guitarist Trohman, 28, and drummer Andy Hurley, 32, played in metal projects like The Damned Things; and Stump released a solo album, "Soul Punk," in which he played all instruments and experimented with styles that guitar-heavy Fall Out Boy would never touch.

Until now. The quartet's new album, "Save Rock and Roll," ventures into uncharted territory, favoring the clubby end of the radio dial. Synths and electronics propel tunes such as club anthem "My Songs Know What You Did in the Dark (Light Em Up)," while "Just One Yester-





day" recalls Adele, of all people. Despite the title, the album is largely devoid of the rock guitar layers that usually form the skin of a FOB tune. Stump's solo album, it seems, indicated a new direction for the band — which was his strategy all along. "I wanted to do a record and get out some of these ideas so we could force it into the band," he explains.

A "return-to-form record," as Stump calls it, would have probably easily pleased the faithful suburban emo kid. But rehashing the band's fervent and cathartic punk was not an option that Stump seriously entertained.

"There's a Picasso quote, something along the lines of, 'Even plagiarism would be preferable to repeating one's self.' "he says. "Repeating one's self as an artist is a negative thing, unless you can find a valid reason for it. We looked at ourselves and said, 'Is there any reason to do this thing again?' "

To hammer that point home, the band announced the album by posing for an Instagram photo, taken in snowy Chicago,

in which they are burning their previous albums. And to nail down the new sound, FOB reconvened (a difficult feat, considering Stump and Wentz spend most of their time in L.A., Trohman in New York and Hurley in Milwaukee) and began work with producer Butch Walker, whose credits include Pink, Weezer and Taylor Swift albums, at his Santa Monica studio.

On top of all that, they didn't tell their label what they were up to. "The ability

to make this album in secret was great, because there weren't expectations," says Wentz. "It allowed us to take our time — and we could throw it out if we wanted to."

There were false starts: Wentz and Stump (who fuse the former's lyrics and the latter's compositions by way of adjacent studios) tossed out tunes that either didn't make sense in the Fall Out Boy anthology or sounded too much like classic Fall Out Boy. Wentz's latest lyrics, he thinks, benefit from his time taking a break from the machinery of fame and from FOB's reflexive, drawn-from-a-diary personal viewpoint.

"Sometimes when you broadcast so much, it becomes white noise. [Being away] allowed me to home in on what I thought was important," he says. "In the past, I've written a love song like, 'This song is vaguely about the perils of celebrity,' or stuff that people can't relate to. On this album, it was about trying to make concise statements that are relatable to more people, because that's what we attempted to do with the band when we began."

Previous album collaborations featured everyone from Jay-Z to Debbie Harry, and "Save Rock and Roll" has star turns from Courtney Love, rapper Big Sean and Elton John. The guest spots seemed to materialize serendipitously, says Stump. "Elton John reached out to us and said, 'Hey, I just wanted to say I really like the single.' We hadn't finished mixing the album, so we said, 'Hey, you're a fan, would you be interested in working together?' "Elton was on board to sing on the title track.

The most surprising bit about "Save Rock and Roll" is not that it exists, or that it is an of-the-moment pop album. It's that Fall Out Boy has the mettle to take a risk and shed the youthful skin that once made it a staple for high-schoolers and tweens. "Save Rock and Roll" is an audacious album that positions rock not as a fixed sound, but as an attitude, and an adventurous record that the guys say they had to make to even consider giving FOB another turn. But it seems that sense of adventure is what fuels Stump and Wentz.

That and their influence on youth. Wentz says he relishes "the possibility that this album could reach somebody the way that 'Dookie' by Green Day reached me, and let me know it was OK to be this weird kid at my school. If this record could be in any way like that, could in any way inspire those kids or unlock that in them, that's what we're inspiring those kids to do."

SIDE NOTES

WENTZ ON THE MUSIC BUSINESS: "When you become successful in any industry, how well you do becomes attached to quarterly sales performance. These guys who are like, 'How your record does is going to affect how our company does.' That's fine in a lot of industries ... but it doesn't really work in art, know what I'm saying?"

WENTZ ON HIS
DIVORCE: "When
somebody used to ask
me questions about
it in interviews, that
would drive me crazy. I
would have a fit about
it. Now, if you don't
react to it, it goes
away. I still get asked

the same questions, when we're doing morning radio. If I don't react to it, then it doesn't become a big thing."

STUMP ON BEING EMO: "Anyone active in the indie and rock and punk scenes in the Midwest knows that emo was a thing, emo was an actual scene that actually existed that had a defined movement and a lot of defined bands. And we were NOT welcome in that world. When we got successful, people started throwing that word at us. Well, cool, but in my understanding of that word, we're not that. We're always trying to be ourselves."

WENTZ'S CHICAGO HAUNTS: "I like to go to the Shedd Aquarium at night and look at the




dolphins swim. I like to hang around my parent's old neighborhood and kind of remember what it was like growing up. In the summer, I go to the beach, go to shows at the Metro, go to Pick Me Up Cafe (at left) and maybe Strange

he Lamborghini's thick leather steering wheel feels like a pair of bull's horns in my hands. The exhaust rumbles with a powerful snort, signaling the machine's intent.

It's a Gallardo LP 560-4 Spyder, to be ex-

It's a Gallardo LP.560-4 Spyder, to be exact, and if the convertible's \$231,000 price tag didn't immediately strike å healthy fear into me, the 552 horses chomping at the bit beneath the hood certainly do.

The instructor in the passenger seat gives me all the coaching I'll need to get through the 3 ½-mile track at the Autobahn, a country club for car enthusiasts in Joliet. To begin, he tells me to ease off the brake and punch the gas. We're off

like a whip crack, galloping at 60 mph within four seconds. As we approach the first bend, he points out the traffic cones that mark the turning path, and we brake in a straight line before releasing the pedal, gliding through the apex and mashing the throttle on the exit. The car lurches forward and the acceleration pins us to our seats. In that split second, I can tell that this feeling — the pure elation I'm experiencing from driving a supercar for the first time — may never wear off.

The guy next to me is Joe Moore, the vice president of marketing for Xtreme Xperience, a Chicago-based company that makes exotic cars accessible to average drivers at various tracks across the country — from the Joliet Autobahn to the legendary Talladega in Alabama. "Real supercars on real racetracks with real instruction: That's our entire foundation," Moore says. "These cars have a racing heritage, and they've got racecar technology. They should be driven on a racetrack."

Growing up, Moore was a car kid: giant Lamborghini Diablo poster in his bedroom, model Speedsters, experimental projects with the lawn mower engine. But before he knew it, he found himself with a business degree and a desk job at a large marketing agency. That wasn't the plan. "I wanted to go to college to be an automotive engineer," he says. "My dream when I was 18 was to actually build cars."

So when his college roommate, Adam Olalde, who was working for a luxury rental car company, suggested they start their own business focusing on track time in powerful machines with expert instruction, Moore didn't need much convincing. He and Olalde joined forces to create Xtreme Xperience, providing rookie racers with the chance to take the supercars on a high-powered spin while accompanied by local pros who are native to each track. In the year since the business got off the ground, they've partnered with 15 tracks. across the country to create a full experience that offers at least three laps in a customer-chosen supercar for about \$400.

Like any good luxury hobby — golf, wine, cigars — there

are endless threads to explore, from the characteristics and specs of the cars to the nuances of each track. For the Autobahn, the closest Xtreme Xperience track to Chicago, Moore recommends the Audi R8, which offers a balanced setup perfect for the 1,200-foot straightaways and the track's combination of acute and obtuse turns. But the varied characteristics of the cars and tracks are just bonuses. The most important reason Xtreme Xperience exists, Moore explains, is to give regular folks the chance to play with big toys that are, most of the

time, economically out of reach.

"For a lot of people, this is a bucket-list activity," he says. "We had a guy from Maranello, Italy, where they make Ferraris. He grew up next to these cars but never got to drive one, and he came out to drive with us at Autobahn. He was crying."

The wind is jetting smoothly above our heads as we complete our third lap in this demon of an automobile, surging effortlessly past 100 mph. As we cross the finish line, the Lamborghini brakes crisply into its place, ready for the next wide-eyed driver. I let go of the bull's horns, feeling a bit like a matador. But instead of one of us conquering the other, the beast and I have simply learned how to move together.




Michael and Nicole Colovos, the husband-wife duo behind Helmut Lang, debut their bright spring collection

t's seems unlikely that a Spaniard and a New Zealander, both based in New York, could come together and design clothing that is so utterly Chicagoan. Yet that's exactly what Michael and Nicole Colovos have done with Helmut Lang, the line they took over after Mr. Lang stepped down in 2005.

The couple, who was in Chicago for a personal appearance last month, form a unique design dynamic: Michael has a pure fashion background — he attended the Fashion Institute of Technology in New York — while Nicole was previously a senior market editor for Harper's Bazaar magazine. They decided to go into business together in 2002, launching the denim line Habitual, and were quickly recognized as a fashion force, winning the first CFDA/Vogue Fashion Fund award for emerging designers.

As the creative directors of Helmut Lang, a brand known for its edgy and deconstructed design, they sketch with a specific woman in mind: "Sophisticated and tough, but



still sexy and chic," says Michael. It's a woman with a Midwestern work ethic — she can run a company by day and a family by night (much like Nicole, who balances work with three young children at home). And with the line's special focus on creating outerwear, it's a brand that's perfectly geared toward Chicago's capricious weather.

Their spring collection, currently carried at Chicago locations like Saks Fifth Avenue, Nordstrom and Barneys New York, breaks away from Helmut Lang's typical neutral color palette and dives into color with vibrant hues of amber and orange, cerulean blues and fire engine reds. "We were originally inspired by these crustaceans in some photographs we saw," explains Nicole. "We love these colors, these textures and the translucency. It's the idea of the wet look." True to their history of incorporating high-tech fabrics, this collection features wool-nylon hybrids, laminated cottons and a Japanese fabric that is made with the same fibers used in TV screens. By mixing the fabrics with their newfound color craze, they've created standout pieces like a glossy linen jacket in cardinal red (\$495), a chroma cutout dress in shimmering citrine (\$435) and a nylon mesh dress with a printed aquamarine kaleidoscopic pattern (\$735).

Nicole and Michael design with a scientific approach, paying close attention to every material selection and silhouette proportion and whittling the design down until there's nothing left to take away. "Tm very detail-oriented," says Michael. "I like to look at classic things and then chop off a lapel to make it look less obvious. But you can try too hard to do something different just for the sake of being different. I love classic with something that gives it a twist or an edge."

Every season, the couple tries to find a new twist. "We want to mix it up for our customer. After a while you look in your wardrobe and say, 'I hate everything in my wardrobe! I want all new things' "Nicole jokes. "We're women, we're very fickle."

While Helmut Lang continues to evolve each season with new silhouettes in new shades, they're committed to preserving their classic looks — and making them available at a lower price point — with their diffusion line Helmut Helmut Lang (dresses start at \$125). "It's our timeless pieces," says Nicole. "There are certain blazers that we've done that people still love and still want." Although by that logic, it could easily carry almost everything in the Lang repertoire.

Kendal Duque takes the helm at a new River North eatery

two-floor, 17,000-square-foot space with the largest HD TV in the Midwest isn't where you'd expect to find a two-time James Beard-nominated chef. But that's exactly what's happening at new River North spot American Junkie, where Kendal Duque (formerly of Sepia, Chicago Firehouse and City Tavern) is bringing his approachable yet sophisticated fare to the bar and restaurant. On the menu? Gourmet bar favorites, such as smoked chicken nachos (\$12) and pork belly sliders with quail egg (\$10), and complex dishes like a sea scallop pasta with artichokes and goat cheese sauce (\$21) and a bison ribeye with Brussels sprouts and mushroom sauce (\$29).

Upon being introduced to the team behind Riot Hospitality Group, which owns American Junkie outposts in Arizona and California, Duque knew it was the right fit. "In the restaurant industry, it's hard to find someone who is very real. But with them, what you see it what you get. It was refreshing." Over a plate of arctic char with a citrus salad (\$17), the chef dished on his career evolution.

Splash: While you were coming up, you worked in some notable kitchens, including Jean Georges. Which stand out to you?


Duque: Rocco [Dispirito] had one of the toughest kitchens. There were people who didn't even last a day. We worked from morning to night, six days a week. It was so

tough. He ran a really militaristic kitchen. But he was such an innovative chef. I still use what I learned.

S: Would you say you run a tough kitchen?

D: For me, it's about inspiration, reminding them why they got into this business. With celebrity chefs and the popularization of food in general, a lot of kids are getting into this business [with different expectations]. In reality, it's tough being there 12-14 hours a day, doing the same tasks and cometimes having someone vel

sometimes having someone yell at you. So you have to stop and ask them, 'Are you sure






this is what you really want?"

S: How have you seen the industry change since you started out in the 1990s?

D: I grew up in that world of the old-school chef, where they were nobodies — the celebrity thing [hadn't happened yet]. All the horror stories that you'd hear about the yelling and the throwing stuff — I think my generation has sort of eschewed that. But there's a fervor that still lives within us that's almost nostalgic. It's two completely different worlds, and at least I think I sort of have a duty to remind [young chefs] that this is where I came from and why.

S: What do you do in your downtime?

D: Life is short, and now that I'm older, I feel more like there's not enough time in life to do what we want to do. I have a couple TV shows here and there that I watch with my wife, but as chefs, we're always moving a million miles an hour. It's something that you have to love or you sink, because there's always someone more passionate or more creative or someone with more energy. You can never rest on your laurels.

im Kardashian and Kanye West's hot romance is already starting to fizzle!




brokered by mom-ager **Kris Jenner**.





HYUNDAI SANTA FE A STRONG CONTENDER IN CUV SEGMENT

Mottor Matters

Sleeker, bigger and more torque than any others in the class, says Hyundai of the 2013 Santa Fe. Let's get over being surprised by the innovation and consistent good products coming from Hyundai — once deemed a bargain-basement automotive brand. But the fact is Hyundai continues to surprise and delight.

As its sales in the U.S. approach 700,000 vehicles, the automaker is now the forth best-selling car brand in America. We took a closer look at what's innovative about the Santa Fe.

For starters, there's a completely revamped exterior, more upscale interior amenities, a host of advanced safety technologies, and a more powerful lineup of motors, with impressive fuel economy. The big news is the choice between the short wheelbase (106.3 inches/length 184.6), five-seater version

and the new long wheelbase (110.2 inches/length 193.1), three-row, six- or seven-passenger model. Starting at \$24,450, the 2013 Santa Fe is available in four trim levels: Sport, Sport 2.0T, GIS and Limited.

There are three powertrain options. Base is a 2.4-liter four-cylinder that produces 190 horsepower and 181 pound-feet of torque; it has improved fuel economy and acceleration. Stepping up is a 2.0-liter turbocharged four-cylinder that gets 264 horsepower and 269 pound-feet of torque; a 3.3-liter V6 that delivers 294 horses and 252 pound-feet also is available. All are matched to a six-speed automatic transmission with manual shifting capabilities, and can be ordered in frontwheel-drive or all-wheeldrive configurations.

We drove the 2013 Santa Fe Sport AWD 2.0T (20/27 miles per gallon) over a course of 150 miles tods: search for new and used cars

in the Park City, Utah region. Our motoring took us on a wide variety of roads, including unpaved forestry roads. Despite the high-elevation of more than 8,000 feet, we had ample power on tap at all times and the well-modulated brakes (ventilated front and solid rear discs), include ABS with brake assist technology.

On the road, Santa Fe is supported by front MacPherson struts and rear stabilizer bar suspension components. Standard are traction control, stability control and seven airbags, including a driver's side knee airbag.

The 2013 Santa Fe's exterior is more taut and tailored, defined by a wide grille, powerful shoulders and a snipped rear. Designers

the new look is a more robust evolution of Hyundai's design philosophy of "Fluidic Sculpture." Chrome shines up the grille and door handles, while LED accents brighten headlamps. A roof spoiler is standard, and emphasizes Santa Fe's crouching stance.

Inside, we found increased room, a cushier feel and more technology options. Notable is the comfortable and airy cabin, which is well appointed without a cluttered feel. Storage abounds, including an overhead console sunglass holder, two front and two rear seat cup holders. door bottle holders, cooled glovebox, enlarged central storage console, front storage bin, front seatback pockets, and an innovative cargo under-tray and floorboard storage.







Bloomington Trail a big boost for Wicker West owners

The rapidly emerging West Town community is targeted for a \$91-million recreational improvement called the Bloomingdale Trail, a planned 2.7 mile-long bike and jogging trail.

Plans call for the trail to run along the elevated old Canadian Pacific Railway spur along Bloomingdale Ave. (1800 North) from Ashland Avenue west to Ridgeway Avenue (3732 West), which is about three blocks east of Pulaski Avenue

Work on this massive City of Chicago park and recreational project is expected to begin this summer, with completion in 2015. Some \$53.5 million of the project's cost already is funded by the city and federal government.

The 14.6-acre project will provide a recreational connection to Humboldt Park and include construction of new pocket parks. The trail, which will feature 38 bridges, will connect sections of the Bucktown, Wicker Park, Logan Square and Humboldt Park neighborhoods.

Get personal with artists via Expanding Visions

Most people are comfortable discussing the artistic construct of a novel in book club, or debating the merits of a movie with friends.

But not many, according to Joanna Pinsky, are comfortable delving into the world of art interpretation.

"Art enriches our lives and helps people communicate," said Pinsky, artistic director of the Evanston art education and outreach not-for-profit Art Encounter.

Yet few have the skills and confidence to examine art, especially contemporary art.

"Often people looking at artwork are intimidated because they don't have an understanding of contemporary art." Pinsky said.

That's why she started **Expanding Visions 25 years** ago, a twice yearly, nine-week series of art tours where participants take it in turn to visit artists in their studio and then private collections.

"I engage the group in interactive discussion that allows them to look more deeply at the art," Pinsky said. "Through the response discussion process, they look at the work in a different way."

So far this spring participants have toured the house

and studio of an artist who incorporates her work into the design of her home, a private North Shore collection specializing in painting, lithographs and studio art glass, and two Bridgeport studios of up and coming multimedia artists.

Skokie resident Vita Browne has been attending the Expanding Visions series for several years now, and has discovered how much she enjoys contemporary painting. She's also developed a new appreciation for the process

that artists put into creating their work.

"Joanna is very, very knowledgeable and if you don't like the art, at least when she's finished with you, you'll appreciate it," Browne said.

Although Browne herself isn't an artist, she's learned how to look at a contemporary piece and carefully examine it.

"It has definitely changed the way I look at modern art," she said, especially deceptively complex pieces like a monochromatic canvas.

"Those paintings are not

quite as simple as they look," Browne said. "Joanna really pulls out the interesting things. For example, if there's a red dot on a painting, how it would change if that red dot wasn't there."

Expanding Visions is one of the educational programs of Art Encounter, a 30-year-old not-for-profit dedicated to art outreach. Art Encounter works hard to make art accessible. bringing it into community places like schools and nursing homes, and to others who don't normally learn to see or

appreciate art.

The goal of programs like Expanding Visions, which guests can visit once but then is only open to members, is not only to fund the outreach programs but also help members appreciate art in a new

"The idea is to see, over the course of the series, how artists work. The artists really enjoy this because they seldom get feedback on their work," Pinsky said.

And tour participants may discover new ways to approach art.

"The idea is to get people to really see how the texture. meaning, scale, and text all contribute to the ideas of the artwork," Pinsky said. "Our mission is really dedicated to educating and empowering people of different ages and backgrounds through interactive explorations of visual

Members of Chicago Writers' Bloc will introduce a dozen new plays, April 29 through May 22 in Evanston.

"Our annual showcase is a wonderful chance for our members to present their works before a live audience." said Zan Skolnick of Lincolnwood, spokesman for Writers' Bloc. "Usually, we read them for each other and comment, but that's not the same thing."

A number of the playwrights in this showcase, of course. have had full productions of their other works at various times throughout their careers.

Among them is Joanne Koch of Evanston, who with Honey West, wrote the play book for the opening night musical "Genderella," with music by Ilva Levinson and lyrics by Myrna Petlicki of Skokie. The show chronicles one person's gender journey based on an original story by Honey West, whose cabaret act ran for 13 years in Chicago and in touring productions.

"I've been writing plays for at least 15 years," said Koch, an Midwest Emmy winner and head of the graduate writing program at National Louis University. "Belle was a female comedienne in the 1950s," Koch said. "They called her the female Lenny Bruce."

department of Columbia Chicago, wrote the music for "Barth" and is the composer for "Genderella." while Petlicki, an arts writer for Pioneer Press newspapers and managing editor of Footlights, wrote the lyrics.

The opening night performance is a gala benefit and begins at 7 p.m. The event includes a silent auction, raffle and free refreshments and performances. Funds will be used by Chicago Writers' Bloc to assist with the cost of readings for its members.

Festival plays will include: "Jersey Justice" by June Finfer at 8 p.m. Tuesday, April 30. It's about the murder of an elderly white shopkeeper in Trenton, N.J., and the arrest of African American men by the police.

"Enduring Loves" by Zan Skolnick at 8 p.m. Tuesday, May 7 is a comedy about two septuagenarians dealing with aging, personal and financial loss, loyalty, friendship death and a secret love. It was presented in New York to positive reviews.

"Men Around the World" by Judy Veramendi of Evanston at 8 p.m. Wednesday, May 8 is a comedy dealing with an innocent's relationships abroad. Next Theatre previously presented her "Hall of Hungry Ghosts" about the people who disappeared during Argentina's "dirty war."

"I Owe You a Lullaby" by Ben Rosen at 8 p.m. Monday, May 13 is a comedy about a former diva who receives a visit from her daughter after 40 years of separation.

"Parasol" by Chloe Bolan at 8 p.m. Tuesday, May 14 is a musical about a survivor of the 1915 Eastland tragedy, when a tour ship capsized in the Chicago River, drowning 850 people. "All Other Nights" by Nikki Paley Cox at 8 p.m. Wednesday, May 22 is a comedy about a daughter who comes home to celebrate a Passover Seder in the hopes of reconciling with her family, but in the end questions her belief in family and in faith.

"We've had new play festivals in Chicago in the past," said Skolnick, "but this is a way to bring the festival north to Evanston, because there is so much support for theater on the North Shore."



Modern dance in step with folk music

Who knew contemporary dance and folk music could happily coexist?

Evanston native Julie Nakagawa, artistic director of DanceWorks Chicago, and Deborah Lader, of the folk trio Sons of the Never Wrong, think they've achieved a perfect blend in "My Witness."

The two arts organization will join forces on that 25-minute piece choreographed by Gina Patterson on Saturday, April 27 at the North Shore Center for the Performing Arts in Skokie. It will be the culmination of a concert in which each group also performs individually.

Nakagawa discovered the Sons of the Never Wrong when she attended a special event. "I thought they were fantastic as artists and as people — and fun, smart and generous," she said. "We knew we wanted to work with them at some point."

It took years for that collaboration to come together. To make that happen, Nakagawa called on Austin, Texas-based choreographer Patterson. "I thought that her musical taste and her personality and her movement would be a nice complement with the Sons," Nakagawa said. "So I set them up on a blind date via technology. It was a match."

Nakagawa described the resulting work as "a journey. From the title to the music to the movements to the environment created by the lighting, everyone has a journey, whether you're an artist on stage or an audience member sitting in a comfortable seat in the North Shore Center."

The full company (six dancers) piece is performed to a series of songs by the Sons of the Never Wrong.

"It's an unusual collaboration,"

admitted Lader, adding that Dance-Works "is open to new ideas."

Lader noted that "My Witness" was created five or six years ago so it is set to some of Sons' older songs. Revisiting the piece "is fun," Lader said, "because we don't often play these particular songs. We have eight CDs so we have so much music to choose from."

Lader described the piece as having "a very emotional trajectory." Most of the songs were written by band member Sue Demel. (The third member is Bruce Roper.)

One number, "Girl Shanty," is "a complete celebration of girlness," Lader said. "Three women dance the piece and it completely comes to life." "Crazy Dog," also by Demel, "is very quirky. It involves moaning hums."

Five other songs conveying different moods are included. "It takes you on a little bit of a rollercoaster of life experience," Lader concluded.

The Sons of the Never Wrong will open the show with one of their more typical performances. "We're going to do our usual thing," Lader said. "It's crazy and funny and we go with the flow of whatever the evening is going to bring us. Our music is pretty eclectic. Our songs range from being gritty and rockand-roll-ey to really beautiful, folky with beautiful harmonies. We're striving to entertain people but also make them feel something."

DanceWorks Chicago's portion of the show begins "with a little appetizer that's a surprise," Nakagawa said. You have to come early to experience that treat.


After the Sons perform, Dance-Works will open the second half of the program with the premiere of



Son's secret sparks father's crisis in 'Next Fall'

A father dealing with the serious condition of his son following an accident has to face a long-kept secret in "Next Fall."

Actor Jim Morley of Northbrook plays that father in the Chicago premiere of Geoffrey Nauffts' Tonynominated play at AstonRep Theatre Company.

"Butch is kind of an old-fashioned, very religious Southern Baptist father," Morley said. "Family and friends come together at the hospital after Luke, my son, has been hit by a car and is in a coma. Luke is gay but not out to his family. The conflict arises when Luke's boyfriend, who he's lived with for five years, is in the hospital waiting room as

Luke is a devout Christian like his father. His boyfriend Adam is an atheist.

Although Butch and Luke live far apart - Luke in New York and Butch in Florida - the father and son are very close. Whether he knows it or not, Butch doesn't acknowledge that Luke is gay.

Butch's attitude toward gay people is "very antagonistic," Morley said. "His philosophy is all Biblical based so, as with many Southern Christians, he looks down on the lifestyle, will not accept it and has told Luke that if he ever told him he was gay, he would never let him see his brother again."

Then he meets Adam in that hospital waiting room. "A conflict arises when we get to the hospital and there's no legal arrangement for the boyfriend," Morley related. "The family doesn't acknowledge him and he has no right to go into the room."

Playing Butch is a big change for Morley. "I've always tended to play more comedy," he said, "and this is a very difficult dramatic role."

The actor is enjoying the opportunity "to stretch and play a different kind of a role," he indicated. "The whole conflict of religion and the modern lifestyle is a fascinating aspect of this play. Our society has changed so much in the last ten years and the idea of whether or not religious beliefs can coexist with that change is interesting to approach."

Morley earned a theater degree from Northern IIlinois University, "After graduating, I worked for the

Chicago Park District for eight years teaching drama to kids and doing adult productions at Theater on the Lake and at Indian Boundary Park." he reported. After that, he spent 10 years away from theater working in business.

In the mid-'90s, when his three children were a little older. Morley began doing theater again. He is still in the business world, working as a mortgage banker, but has found time to carve out a performing career. Since then, Morley has appeared in "Lettice and Lovage" and "Shadowlands" at Redtwist Theatre. He has also performed with Polarity Ensemble Theatre, Irish Repertory of Chicago; Circle Theatre, Bailiwick Theatre, Promethean Theatre Ensemble, First Folio Theatre and Azusa Productions.

dealing with a son in his 20s in a coma is going to strike any parent. The idea of losing a child is just terrifying to any parent."

Morley said that "Next Fall" delivers "a surprisingly positive religious message." He added that audiences are likely to leave the show "thinking about the role of faith in our society and what rights we are going to allow to gay couples."

Super heroes, cops, families at center of TV pilots

At this point in the TV season, viewers begin to fret about the status of their favorite shows.

But even as network executives ponder the fate of shows, they're also playing judge, jury and executioner on a raft of pilots for prospective news series.

It's "pilot season," and these test episodes are in production, including NBC's Pittsburgh-set modern-day "Hatfields & McCovs" pilot that's filming in Boston. It stars Virginia Madsen ("Smith") as blue-collar-family matriarch Eloise McCoy and Rebecca De-Mornay as wealthy Mary Hatfield. The

official description of the show says the family feud is reignited by a "startling death" that unleashes decades of resentment that leads the clans to do battle for control of Pittsburgh.

This year NBC has the most pilots in production - 26 - followed by CBS and ABC with 24 each, 16 for Fox and eight for The CW, according to TheWrap.com.

At most, 35 of the 98 commissioned pilots will be picked up to series.

Which potential shows stand the best chance? Networks love a known quantity. So anything that sounds familiar in title or topic probably stands a better chance. Same goes for a known star or producer, which is why NBC ordered a new Michael J. Fox



comedy to series without shooting a pilot first.

Common themes this pilot season include military backdrops and shows about adult children and their parents. The CW has several shows set in the future, including one about humans re-colonizing a nuked-out Earth and another about aliens and humans co-existing. A couple of comedies are about assistants to demanding bosses.

Here are a few of the shows being produced that could become series this fall or next midseason - we'll know for sure when networks announce their fall schedules the week of May 12.

"NCIS: Red Team" (CBS): An introduction to the characters from this planned spinoff aired on last week's "NCIS: Los Angeles." John Corbett, Scott Grimes and Kim Raver star.

"Crazy Ones" (CBS): Drama writer David E. Kelley tries a



Action-comedy director Ruben Fleischer ("Zombieland") is no stranger to mayhem and crime, but taking on this ersatz, film noir-style and almost entirely humorless hardboiled cops and robbers saga still seems a bizarre choice. "Gangster Squad" works within a just barely true-to-life framework to re-imagine the downfall of the post-World War II era Los Angeles gangster kingpin Mickey Cohen (Penn) — courtesy of a crew of maverick cops organized to attack him outside the law. Brolin is suitably square-jawed as the gangster squad honcho

and Gosling is a plus as his enigmatic, world-weary righthand man. But the mannered tough-guy dialogue is as over the top as the bullet-riddled final showdown in the heart of downtown LA — and both are equally unconvincing. 



Director Bay gains by taking dramatic pains

"Pain & Gain" · ***/2

There's no shortage of pain in this near-alchemical transmutation of a grim true-crime story into whacked-out black comedy, but bupkis in the way of gain.

The fact that crime doesn't pay in "Pain & Gain" makes it easier to justify director Michael Bay's decision to give this particularly heinous tale of fraud, kidnapping, torture and murder the light-touch treatment. The justiceis-served angle is basically a gift, though, a built-in feature of the reallife story. The reason "Pain" works as well as it does - it's a personal best from Bay - is that he mixes his typical visual flash-and-dazzle with a brand-new emphasis on character development and performance. He even ties it all up with an actual overarching theme, namely a seriously warped view of the American dream on the part of the main bad guy.

That would be Daniel Lugo (Mark Wahlberg), whom we first encounter as he's being busted by a small army of cops. A lifelong believer in selfimprovement, fitness and the American ideal of working your way up from nothing, Daniel is a permanently pumped bodybuilder and physical trainer, who knows that business well. Unfortunately, he doesn't make enough to pay his rent.

Fed-up, he talks two other muscled-up trainers, Paul and Adrian (Dwayne Johnson and Anthony Mackie), into kidnapping a rich client, named Victor (Tony Shalhoub), and forcing him to sign over all of his

assets before they let him go. Only Victor immediately recognizes Daniel and refuses to sign any documents despite a month of beatings.

Bay spins the story here by softening the gang's quite brutal torture techniques and by portraying Victor as a supreme jerk, making it easier to stay somewhat sympathetic with the Sun Gym gang and laugh at their incredible incompetence. The outcome is the same, though. The gang unsuccessfully attempts to kill Victor in increasingly hideous ways. They still wind up with his money thanks to some equally incredible incompetence on the part of the Miami police. Thus encouraged, they eventually try to repeat the procedure with an evenricher phone-sex kingpin (Michael Rispoli) with much messier results after a double homicide.

All of the performances in "Pain" are believable enough to add considerable substance to the ongoing criminals-are-stupid jokes. When these guys do something especially inane - like indignantly returning a chainsaw to Home Depot because it clogs and stalls during an attempt to dismember a victim - it seems perfectly reasonable to them and understandable to us after getting to know

Maybe it has the ring of truth simply because it actually is true. This is definitely one to be filed under "No One Could Make This Stuff Up."
















Pitching, defense key for Vikings

On July 17, 1988, the Boston Red Sox's Wade Boggs, an eventual Hall-of-Famer and member of Major League Baseball's prestigious 3,000-hit club, opened the eighth inning against the Kansas City Royal's Israel Sanchez, now an assistant coach for Niles North.

Sanchez, a left-hander, remembers he worked the count to 1-2 then threw what he called one of the best sinkers of his life. He thought it nipped the outside

The ump called a ball, Sanchez argued the call. So too did his manager, who would get ejected, his pitching coach and legendary Royals third baseman George Brett. Sanchez walked Boggs, then, still frazzled, walked the next batter. There were two on, nobody out, as Ellis Burks, who was a single short the cycle, stepped to the plate. Jim Rice. another future Hall-of-Famer. waited in the on-deck circle.

The Vikings' success this year, as is true in baseball for almost every team at any level, is predicated on the defensive side. In the team's nine wins (it is 9-5-1 after a 7-3 win Saturday over Lane), it has given up 15 runs. In

five losses, the team has given up 45 runs.

"Every year is pretty much the same for all of us at the high school level - you only go as far as the pitching and defense," Niles North coach Ed Toledo

Going far is certainly in the mix for Niles North in a season where the team is off to its best start in years and has grand ambitions

for the rest of the season. The goals: win 20 games, the conference and a regional title.

"At least potential-wise, this could be the best team we've had (under Toledo)," said Ron

Zajorski, an assistant coach who's spent 17 years with the high school.

"Our senior class is outstanding," Toledo added. Top-tobottom, he said, the seniors are the most dedicated group he has ever had.

Among them is pitcher, shortstop and three-hitter Matt McTague, who has been crucial to the offense and pitching staff. After his junior

season was marred by three separate injuries - torn elbow ligament, broken hand, broken wrist - McTague is healthy and hitting .429 with a 2.57 ERA on the mound. (All individual stats through 14

"Sometimes your hardest working kids are not your most talented players," Toledo said. "That's natural at this age because they can do it so well

without much effort. But our most talented kids are our hardest working kids."

That includes McTague and other senior leaders like Elliot Mark, who is off to a blistering start, hitting .457 with 13 RBI. Zajorski pointed out that seniors Ari Cone and Nik Erickson have stepped up as pitchers.

A third of the way through the year, the Vikings will look

to its senior class for leadership as it tries to iron out some early season inconsistencies. Pitching will play a major factor.

"This year we have high expectations for the pitching staff," said Sanchez, who oversees the Vikings' rotation.

"The game has changed quite a bit since I played, quite naturally," said Sanchez, who pitched in the majors in 1988 and 1990 for the Royals. "But the more it changes, the more it stays the same."

No kidding. With two runners on and no outs, Sanchez struck out a batter then relied on his outfield to record the final two outs with no runs scored in the inning. Pitching and defense — some things never change.

It's extremely rare for a baseball player to go straight to the major leagues without ever playing a single game in the minors. And get this - only twice in the last 50 years has a player not only gone directly to the big leagues, but then played so superbly at that level that he was elected to the Hall of Fame. Any guesses? Here's a hint; one was a pitcher and one was a position player. The pitcher was Jim "Catfish" Hunter, and the position player was Dave Winfield.

One of the quiet success stories in 21st Century sports has been the NBA Development League. More than 25 per cent of players on 2012 NBA rosters spent time playing in the 16-team D-League. All 30 NBA teams have some relationship with the league, and every D-League game is streamed live and free on YouTube, But here's the real measure of success: A D-League franchise could be had for about \$400,000 when the league was formed in 2001. A decade later - about \$4 million.

The world's oldest marathoner has run his final race, or so he says. 

Notre Dame looks ahead to 2014

The Notre Dame boys lacrosse team is in the middle of its 2013 season, and coach Chip Seiple is still looking for an answer.

"We lack the one guy that finishes," Seiple said. "We started the season all playing as individuals, but they have started to mesh more lately and are working together as a team. I expect to see our scoring improve the rest of the season."

After a 3-1 start to the season, the Dons have dropped three in a row.

"We were playing great, but I think our heads got too big," junior captain James Maibuecher said. "I think we slacked off. We've got to get back to playing like we were."

The team has had to adjust to new personnel, which was a result of a major overhaul of the roster this season: Eleven players on last year's team have since graduated.

"We are predominantly juniors now; we have only one senior. Most of our impact players are juniors," said Seiple, who is in his second season as lacrosse coach at Notre

Dame after his team went 7-9 last year.

With that young roster makeup, Seiple sees this season as a chance to grow together while stockpiling as many wins as the team can muster.

"What we will have is another year with essentially the same team," he said, looking forward to 2014.

The lone senior on the team is Anton Mueller, who plays the attack position. His best

skill is the ability to carry-the ball, something Seiple said is a strength of the entire team.

"We carry the ball well, and we move the ball well," Seiple said. "But we have a young defense, with only one returning varsity defender."

Among the defenders is junior captain Kim McCoy, who "is not very physical, but he is very skilled. He is one of the more skilled players I have ever coached," Seiple said.

The midfield is anchored by

Maibuecher, for whom Seiple offered the greatest praise: "He is probably one of the quickest players I have seen at any level I have coached."

The team's top goal scorer is junior Sean Remlinger, who had 10 goals and two assists going into Tuesday's game against Bartlett. Maibuecher had six goals and 12 assists and Mueller had five goals and six assists.

Zucker throws no-hitter

Glenbrook South alumna Jennifer Zucker was recently named the Midwest Conference Pitcher of the Week after throwing a nohitter and stringing together several strong starts for the Beloit (Wis.) College softball team at the MWC Softball Classic.

The freshman from Glenview threw a no-hitter against Grinnell (lowa) College on April 14 in East Peoria. Zucker struck out 10 batters in that game and set a Buccaneers singleseason record with 141 strikeouts. Through Sunday, Zucker has a 3.03 ERA and just 15 walks in 134 innings pitched.

During the MWC Softball Classic, which ran from April 12-14, Zucker logged a 2-2 record with a 1.22 ERA, 34 strikeouts and three walks.


In one stretch, from the fourth inning through the sixth against Tennessee-Martin, Gullo retired nine straight batters.

Local gym focuses on triathletes

John Villani wanted something different than a traditional gym. A fervent cyclist, Villani was attracted to Amphibian Multisport in Libertyville.

"I've been to the other big gyms," the Libertyville resident said. "My core love is cycling, and here, your training reaches a higher level."

Villani doesn't seem to be the only one who feels that way.

Libertyville's Marty Taylor came up with the idea for Amphibian Multisport - a gym designed for triathletes, cyclists and other endurance athletes - two years ago. Taylor, an Ironman finisher and triathlon coach, saw the chance to open a facility that would focus on training for a triathlon's various stages (running, biking and swimming).

Taylor's girlfriend and business partner, Kristin Mac-Carthy, remembers when he texted her about the idea. A triathlete herself, MacCarthy saw the potential in a onestop facility.

Amphibian Multisport opened on Nov. 1, 2012, and Taylor retired from active Navy duty in February of this year. He said there has been an "overwhelming response," and the gym has more than 70 members, most of whom live in the Libertyville area. Taylor said he expects that number

to double when the facility opens a pool in the fall.

MacCarthy, whose background is in corporate finance, believes in the potential for a triathlon-focused gym. She likened the possible growth of triathlons to the trajectory that running and marathons experienced in the 1980s.

"The very first time I crossed the finish line, it changed my life," MacCarthy said. "It changes who you are. I want to get this out there to other people. People think it's impossible (to complete a triathlon), but you can come to this place, talk to Marty or I,

and see that it is possible."

The choice to set up at 753 N. Milwaukee Ave. in Libertyville was an obvious one for the owners. MacCarthy is a resident of the area, and both her and Taylor have found that the North Shore attracts a lot of triathletes because of the access to uninterrupted trails and a lack of congestion that city paths are known for.

They expect to break ground on a two-lane pool next month as part of a new 7,000-square-foot facility that will be a few blocks from the current location.

In the meantime, the facility

houses treadmills and allows athletes to hook up their bikes to devices called CompuTrainers, which help simulate various road courses and racing conditions.

like cardio classes and free weights, but Taylor said the goal of Amphibian Multisport is to help members get stronger and improve their times, not their overall fitness.

"I don't think we have a mirror in the place," he said. "It's not about looking good. It's about making you a better athlete."

For many members, the

CompuTrainers are a big selling point.

"Being able to bring your own bike was attractive," Villani said. "You really enhance your training with the abil-Some gyms provide options ity to go up against other racers."

> Jim Wolter, a Libertyville resident who is also an Amphibian Multisport member, said that although the facility draws elite athletes, there's also a sense of community.

"It's not just about paying dues," he said. "Everyone's a team. You want to support each other and help them succeed."

Simon sisters among state hopefuls

Sunshine Simon was a junior last May when she ran the 100-meter hurdles and the 300 hurdles for Niles West in the Class 3A girls track and field state championships.

She was overwhelmed by the experience and not ready for the scope of the event.

"It was so scary," said Simon, now a senior. "I was so shy and nervous. If I go again, I will have the experience. I will be confident. I won't be nervous."

The Wolves girls track and field team has several athletes capable of meeting state qualifying times, heights or distances this spring, and Simon is one of them. So is Sunbright Simon, Sunshine Simon's twin sister.

Sunbright Simon runs the 300 hurdles and 400, and the two girls are also on Niles West's 4x400 relay team. Coach Mark Medland hopes the sisters both get down to state this year.

"We are going to have to choose what is better for Sunbright," Medland said. "But I think they make each other better, and

they push each other in the **3**00 hurdles. Sunshine has gone 46.7, and Sunbright is at about 48.9."

As a freshman, Sunshine Simon was an alternate for the 4x400 team at state. She did not qualify for the meet her sophomore year, and last year she finished 17th in the 100 hurdles and 16th in the 300 hurdles. Medland wants her to make the all-state team, which requires a top-nine finish in the state meet.

"She has gone 15.5 in the 100 hurdles so far, and 15.4 is the

qualifying time," Medland said.
"Our goal there is to break 15, and that is what we need to do to get all-state. She does have the ability, and I think she can do that."

Medland thinks the 4x400 team can qualify, with sophomore Katherine De Lara running first, freshman Brittany Clark on the second leg, Sunbright Simon running third and Sunshine Simon fourth.

"If we can get all four of them running at 60 seconds, we have a state qualifying team," Medland said.

State potential

Niles West coach Mark Medland also has some field stars aiming for state qualifying. Senior shot putter Jasmine Townsend has been to the state meet the last two years, but she is being pushed by sophomore Flona Kanam, who is throwing 37 feet in early meets.

Discus thrower Vishna Patel, a senior, and high jumper Lily Chatman, a senior, are potential qualifiers, as well.

Given the cold weather this season, the Wolves coach likes the team's progress.

"We are having a very good season," Medland said.
